INTRODUCTION

In 2019, the Buena Vista Charter Township Board of Trustees resolved its intent to pursue Redevelopment Ready Community certification by engaging in the Michigan Economic Development Corporation's Redevelopment Ready Communities® program. This marketing plan has been created as part of Buena Vista Charter Township's efforts to obtain status as a Certified community in the Redevelopment Ready Communities® (RRC) program through the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC).

The purpose of this marketing plan (the "Plan") is to establish an action plan and provide tools for Buena Vista Charter Township, in partnership with local and regional community, civic, and governmental organizations and agencies, to re-establish the downtown area as a thriving, commercial district. This plan primarily focuses on coordinating existing efforts with support from the MEDC as an RRC Certified community. Guidelines for the Township's branding are also included.

ABOUT BUENA VISTA CHARTER TOWNSHIP

Buena Vista Charter Township strives to be a safe, progressive, diverse community where families and businesses live, work, and play. This encompasses protecting our natural environment and our health and safety, and enhancing our prosperity, cultural heritage, diversity and recreational opportunities. The highest priority of the Township is to provide residents with access to transparency in governance by supplying relevant information in a timely fashion.

Primely situated in Saginaw County, Michigan, Buena Vista Charter Township is located directly east of Saginaw. Buena Vista Charter Township is located in the central portion of Michigan's Lower Peninsula, in the Great Lakes Bay Region (Saginaw, Bay and Midland Counties). Interstate 75, Michigan Highway 46 (Holland Rd.) and Michigan Highway 81 (E. Washington Rd.) cross through the Township. These three highways link the Township to Saginaw, Bay City, Midland, Flint, Ann Arbor, Lansing, Detroit, and the Mackinac Bridge.

The land uses within Buena Vista Charter Township are entirely affected by human activity; transportation infrastructure, shopping areas, industrial production plants, homes, and parks. While a majority of the Township consists of farmland, the land has been cleared of forests, tiled to drain its swampy character, made uniform with all rocks and obstacles removed, treated annually with pesticides and fertilizer, and planted with non-indigenous crops determined by economic factors.

Demographics

Between 2010 and 2020 the population of Buena Vista decreased 5.8 percent, from 8,676 persons to 8,171 persons. The rate of population loss within Buena Vista is less than the City of Saginaw but greater than Bridgeport Charter Township, Saginaw County, and the State of Michigan as a whole. While Buena Vista is not the only community experiencing a decrease in population, decreases can signal that the community needs to address reasons for the decrease.

Within the Township, 17 percent of residents 25 years and older have attained an associate's degree, bachelor's or graduate degree. In a broad sense, land use decisions cannot directly impact secondary education graduation rates. However, land uses that promote places where learning occurs, such as learning centers, should be planned so that the opportunities are abundant for local children and community members.

In 2020, 27.3 percent of the population in Buena Vista was under the age of 20. With demographics that skew towards younger age groups, the Township would be wise to provide services that cater to younger demographics.

The population of Buena Vista is racially and ethnically diverse. In 2020, 32.6 percent of the total population reported being white, 62.6 percent reported being black, and 3 percent reported being two or more races.

Community Input

Township residents showcase broad support for several improvements to enhance community image and identity. The most important improvements are to clean up the downtown area, enhance the Township's blight enforcement efforts, develop a defined entryway, and provide public parks and spaces creating a focal point to promote community identity. Residents were clear in their desire to attract a variety of retailers to Buena Vista and once again establish the downtown area as a viable commercial district. At the same time, residents realize that the Township should also pursue economic development opportunities targeted at developing and recruiting businesses to provide stable, long-term, employment opportunities, including high-tech firms, professional offices, and health care services.

The support of broad economic development reflects a community understanding that development in the downtown area must accommodate a mix of uses, and that a successful commercial district depends on a well rounded, diversified local economy. The Township Board of Trustees and the DDA already undertake economic development activities. The Township has developed an industrial park and has recruited industrial businesses to the park. The current economic development efforts will be expanded to reflect Township aspirations.

The following vision statement represents the future that the Board of Trustees and the DDA of Buena Vista Charter Township desire for the downtown area over the next ten years.

In the year 2033, as we look back over the last ten years, we see how far our community has brought itself. Our downtown area is now a thriving commercial district. Local residents can purchase needed goods and services locally. Others come from throughout the region to enjoy the dining and entertainment opportunities that are available.

A growing population, many of whom live in new housing constructed over the last ten years, supports our downtown merchants. The local economy is boosted by new jobs. Residents now have easy access to health care, banking and other services. Most importantly, we have a real sense of community. Beautifully landscaped entryways let people know they have arrived in downtown Buena Vista. Our downtown park and fountain provide a focal point that people think of when they hear Buena Vista. The entire downtown is clean and attractively landscaped, welcoming visitors. Our annual (to be named) festival attracts thousands from all over Michigan each year.

Yes, we have become the community we set out to be ten years ago. The success of our community and economic development is a monument to the hard work of our residents, businesses and public officials, as well as testimony to the partnerships we have forged with local and regional organizations. In fact, regional cooperation has been a hallmark of our revitalization success.

Vision: Buena Vista Charter Township is planning, rebuilding, and enhancing a new quality of life that values education, family, and commerce.

Mission: Buena Vista Charter Township strives to be a safe, progressive, diverse community where families and businesses live, work, and play.

TOWNSHIP ASSETS

Priority Development Projects

Former Buena Vista High School - In 2013 the Buena Vista School District was closed. A portion of the building has been transformed into the Buena Vista Farmers Market, with plans to further develop the remaining portions of the building into mixed-use facilities.

Town Center - The Township has planned the Town Center for mixed-use, high-quality development that suits the needs of residents while capturing the demand generated by the site's close proximity to highway I-75. A market analysis demonstrated that consumer spending can be expected to support 233,538 sq. ft. of retail space in the downtown area, less than the site's existing 380,000 sq. ft.

Kroger - Adjacent to senior housing, with direct access to Dixie Highway, the commercial lot now serves as indoor storage with potential to serve several varying redevelopment possibilities.

Racer Trust - The Township would like to redevelop this 233-acre vacant lot for intensive industrial use or as a multi-modal transportation hub. Racer Trust offers access to I-75, railroads, and the Saginaw River.

Outer Drive Hotels - There are two vacant/blighted hotels in the downtown area that offer optimal access to I-75 and local businesses. The Township recommends development as modern hotels to service the industrial and business community or new commercial developments such as restaurants, retail, or health care related.

Streetscape (I) and Gateway - The streetscape project will improve the appearance of Holland Avenue and Outer Drive, by constructing curb and gutter, constructing new sidewalks, landscaping, installing street furniture, and installing coordinated lighting. The gateway includes decorative paving and crosswalks, landscaping to frame the gateway, community signage, flag poles, and a small plaza and plaque wall to honor the community's history and/or veterans.

Housing, Offices, and Streetscape (II) - Increasing the number of households in the vicinity of the commercial district will provide additional consumer spending support for downtown businesses. Multiple-family housing could be apartments, or townhouses, or condominiums. The Township's Economic Development Plan identifies parts of the downtown area where new offices can be developed in a campus-like setting. The second phase streetscape project will improve the appearance of Holland Avenue and Outer Drive from the end of the first phase to the railroad tracks that form the boundary of the downtown area.

Community Events

Buena Vista Charter Township hosts several events to promote a sense of belonging amongst residents. The annual Holiday Bazaar, Twilight Movie Night, and the opening of the Buena Vista Farmers Market are some of the many initiatives used to support positive shared experiences.

Buena Vista Charter Township has not undergone a formal branding effort, but has developed its own brand and image over the years, which can be identified throughout Township materials.

Township Engagement


