ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM CITY HALL

NEW ORDINANCE - Outdoor fires are allowed with a few rules:

- Fire must be no larger than three (3) feet in diameter and two (2) feet in height.
- Materials must be seasoned firewood no green wood, leaves, trash, or construction materials.
- Fire must be more than 25 away from any building that is not on your property, and more than 15 feet from any building on your property.
- Fire must be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished.
- A fire extinguisher shall be accessible and be a minimum five-pound ABC extinguisher.
- Fire must be extinguished if it becomes a nuisance to nearby properties. (i.e., excessive smoke, odor, ash).
- Outdoor open burning may also be temporarily suspended by the Fire Chief or his/her designee as warranted by weather or other conditions.

The new ordinance has specific requirements to help residents plan and construct outdoor fireplaces, fire



pits, and outdoor stoves, along with requirements for bonfires, which are closely regulated. Ordinance 367 can be found at https://www.sylvanlake.org/government/ordinancecharter.php



Water/Sewer Rates Increase: Rates have not increased for 5 years. New rates will be on your August 2024 bill.

Water: \$6.60 per 1,000 gallons and \$61.69 base fee Sewer: \$8.50 per 1,000 gallons and \$72.95 base fee Garbage & Rubbish rate increase The market has changed a lot since our last contract. GFL will continue to pick up trash, recycle, and yard waste. Along with our fall leaf collection. The cost of \$311.76 per household will be levied on the winter tax bill.

I am pleased to introduce our newest police officer, Perry Edgell, who will join us on April 29th. Perry comes to us with a plethora of law enforcement experience. He began his law enforcement career with the Birmingham Police Department in 1993, and two years later, he transferred to the Royal Oak Police Department, where he distinguished himself as a detective. While with the ROPD, Perry was highly decorated and won the Officer of the Year honors twice and Detective of the Year once. Perry took advantage of an early retirement option in 2013 and started over again with the Farmington Hills Police Department. PARKS & GATES





All City parks are private and for the enjoyment of registered Sylvan Lake residents and their guests only.

City Hall sells Park tags, Sports tags, and boat ramp keys to make sure those using the parks are residents.

During the summer months, we have Park Rangers patrol the park areas and will ask to see your tag. If you do not have one, you will be asked to leave the park.

We also have gates on Ferndale and Lakeview streets closed daily from around Memorial Day to Labor Day. The gates are closed around noon and

open no later than 9:00 p.m., depending on the weather and how busy the parks are.

The Police, Park Rangers, and City Employees are the only ones authorized to open or close the gates.

Access to the boat ramp is from Pontiac Drive

Access to the Ferndale Park is from Oakwood

Access to Lakeview beach and all of Lakeview street is from Cheltingham at Garland.

- Beach Tags \$30 (\$25 for Senior Citizens 65 years of age and older)
- Sports Tags \$50 (tennis and pickleball courts, bocce courts, or volleyball court)
- Boat Ramp Key \$50,

Tags and keys will be issued only to persons showing proof of residency in the City of Sylvan Lake. Residents purchasing a Boat Ramp Key must purchase a watercraft sticker for each watercraft they intend to launch at the boat ramp or dock at their dock space. The watercraft must be registered to a Sylvan Lake resident with the resident's name and address on the registration.



Dogs in the Parks

- Dogs are only allowed on the parking lot side of the Community Center Park (Not on the lakeside of Pontiac Drive)
- 2. Dogs are <u>strictly prohibited</u> in any of the following park areas.
 - (1) Ferndale Park
 - (2) Community Center Park west of Pontiac Dr
 - (3) Lakeview Park & Beach area
 - (4) Memorial Park

The police will issue tickets for unleashed dogs, unlicensed dogs, and not cleaning up after your dog. The penalty for violating this ordinance is a misdemeanor with a minimum fine of \$150. Dogs may be walked on a leash directly to your boat.

When walking a dog off private property, the dog must be under reasonable control of its walker and held securely by a leash of suitable strength, not to exceed six feet (6') in length.

- Dogs are not to be off their leash at any time.
- While walking your dog, you must pick up after them.
- Dogs are not allowed to be tied up in the park.

You can use the canal near the bridge or the boat ramp if you want your dog to go in the water.

<u>Dog/Cat License Renewal</u> Dog owners will receive a renewal form from Oakland County Animal Control. New Owners should register their dog at 4 month. The cost is:

Pickleball/tennis courts

Look at those beautiful courts! One of the tennis courts was converted into four pickleball courts. All courts have been repaired, painted, and striped, and new nets have been installed.

COURT RULES

- Courts are for residents <u>only</u> and up to 3 guests.
- A current, valid sports tag is required for every four people and valid ID.
- Sports tag must be hung on the hook.
- Play is restricted to one hour if others are waiting.
- The courts are for tennis/pickleball only.
- Skates, skateboards, bicycles, scooters, and dogs are strictly prohibited inside the fence.
- Children under the age of 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times.

Petitions for City Council Seat There will be two openings on the City Council this November. If you are interested in serving a four-year term, you must have your petition signed and returned to City Hall by 4:00 p.m. on July 23, 2024. If you would like more information, please call City Hall.



Primary Election Vote: August 6th at the Community Center. You will be voting for party candidates to be placed on the November ballot.

How do I establish which party's ballot I am entitled to vote when participating in a partisan primary? You may vote the primary ballot for a single political party. If you vote in more than one partisan section of the ballot, the partisan

portion will be rejected.

Under Michigan law, you do not have to make a party choice until you have marked your ballot.

Absentee Ballots City Hall will be open Saturday, Aug 3^{rd,} from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for *absentee ballots only*. **Early voting** begins July 27, 2024, and goes through August 4, 2024. Watch for more information.



Recreational Vehicle Storage

Please remember that you must store/park your RV's at least 45 feet from the edge of the road and three feet from the side and rear property lines. Boats and/or boat trailers (only) may be in the driveway within 45 feet from the edge of the road only for the summer (April 1st to October 31st). RVs and/or boat trailers cannot be parked on the road right-of-way at any time. Only two RVs are allowed on one property at a time, and a boat hoist is considered an RV. RVs cannot be connected to water, sewer, or electricity on private property.




Tree trimming and removal were done at Memorial Park, and we will relocate some of the trees. City Hall has a plan drawn up that will open

Tree Planting. The city has once again worked with ReLeaf Michigan, planting 20 trees. The planting was completed on Saturday, May 11. It was a little dreary early but brightened up quickly. Again, a big thank you to Michigan ReLeaf, DTE, who donated the trees, and all the volunteers willing to learn about and assist in the tree planting. Thank you to Mike Weslock, who offered the service of seven of his employees. They made the work go very quickly.

The City does not cut down trees unnecessarily. The vast majority of trees removed are either invasive species choking out good trees or dangerous trees with the fear of falling and injuring people or property. A few have been necessarily removed to complete a project.

DOING ANY PROJECTS THIS SUMMER?

KNOW BEFORE YOU DIG!

Property Line Everyone takes pride in their property. Be courteous to your neighbors and discuss with them anything you may be doing close to the property line. This may be planting shrubs or flowers, planting or trimming trees or installing or removing a fence.

Building & Zoning Permits Building permits must be obtained if you are going to do any repairs, remodeling, renovating, building, plumbing, or electrical work on your home. Always check with City Hall before starting any project. Permits are also required for any improvements made in the road right-of-way. A zoning permit is required for fences, driveways, parking areas, etc. Permits are required for a few reasons, safety being the primary reason. It is very important that work performed in your home meets the current codes and regulations. Even something as small as adding a circuit to your electrical panel or installing a water heater needs to be inspected. Both could have disastrous consequences if installed improperly. If you have a contractor do the work for you, make sure they have pulled the appropriate permits. If you have questions on how the permit process works, please call City Hall.

Ordinance Hotline This is a reminder for residents to call in with any ordinance violations you may see. This includes residents doing work without a permit. You do not have to identify yourself, but we need you to provide an address and description of the problem. Call 248-682-1440 extension 222 after hours or you can contact the police immediately by calling 248-682-2104. That will go directly to the West Bloomfield dispatch, day or night, and they will have a Sylvan Lake police officer respond to your call.

Watering/Irrigation Ordinance Just a reminder there is an ordinance regulating automatic and manual lawn irrigation. This was done to decrease our maximum water usage at peak hours in order to achieve a better water rate from the Detroit Water Department. It will also provide for better water pressure throughout the entire system during peak water flows. There are different regulations for automatic and manual watering.

An **irrigation system** *which is connected to the municipal water system* is restricted between May 15 and October 15 of each calendar year. Automated lawn and/or landscaping irrigation is prohibited between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m.

A water user may **manually irrigate** residential landscaping utilizing garden hoses and sprinklers provided the irrigation is not connected to an automatic system and is attended and monitored by the water user. Manual irrigation is prohibited between the hours of 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.

All irrigation is also restricted based on your address with even address allowed to water Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday and odd address allowed to water Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays.
