Subject: November 2015 Budget Report

The monthly budget report will focus on the analysis of budgetary variances of the revenues and expenditures of each of the major operating funds and project the impact on available fund balance. As a benchmark for comparison, we'll bear in mind that as of the end of November, 2/12 months or 16.67% of the fiscal year has passed. For revenues and expenditures occurring evenly throughout the year, we expect to have used or collected close the 16.67% level, and to have 83.33% remaining budget for the remaining of the year.

Presented in this format are: 1) an executive summary describing current budget issues, 2) budgetary comparison schedules of each major operating fund of the city, and 3) a fiscal year to date activity summary for cash and investments.

Executive Summary

The major operating funds that are part of the annual operating budget of the city are the general, water & wastewater, refuse, and electric funds.

General Fund

Total revenues in the general fund are 14.42% collected.

Ad Valorem collections currently received is 7.42%. Majority of property taxes are collected in the month of January

Sales Tax current collection rate @ 18.84% close to projections.

Gas Franchise fees are collected on an annual basis. Total collected to date is 116.26%.

Municipal Court Revenues currently collected is 10.72%

Refuse Fund

Total revenues are 16.88% and total expenses are 11.01%.

Water & Wastewater Fund

Total revenues for the Water Fund are 17.51% Total revenues for the Wastewater Fund are 15.80%

Water expenses in Administration are 13.83%. Water Department overall expenditures are 12.55%

Wastewater expenses are 18.92%.

Electric Fund

Total revenues are 14.05%; the expenses are at 18.08% and include transfers to general fund.

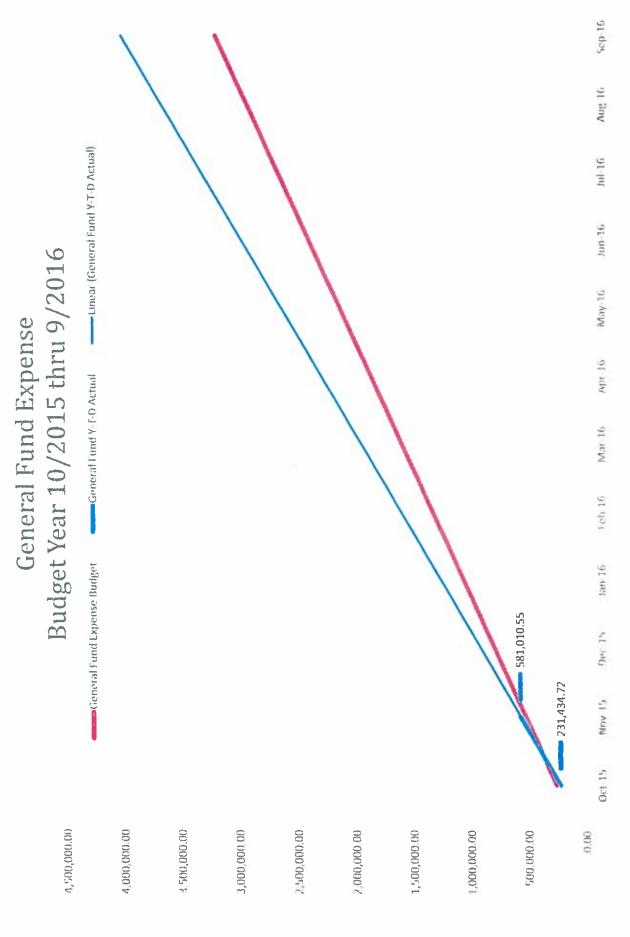

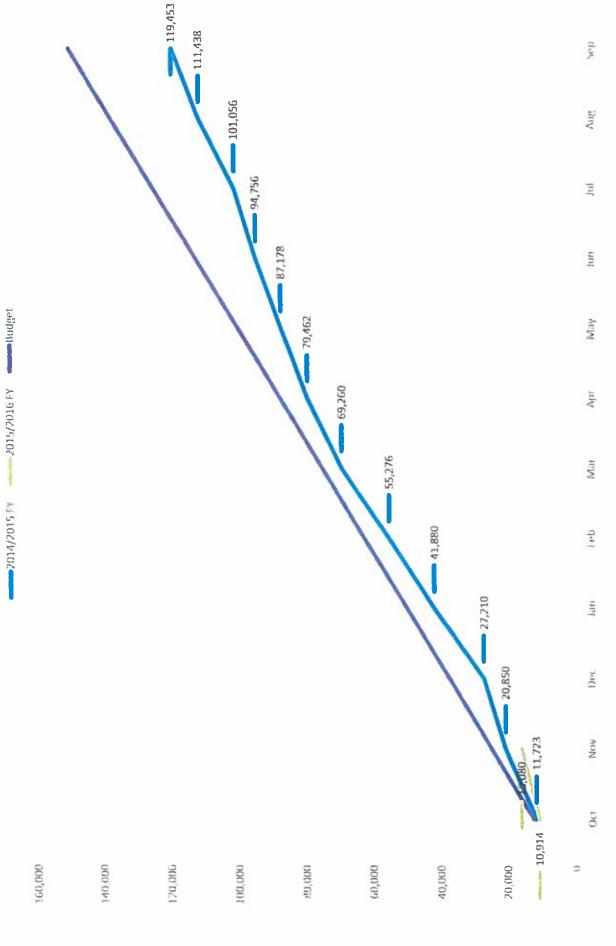

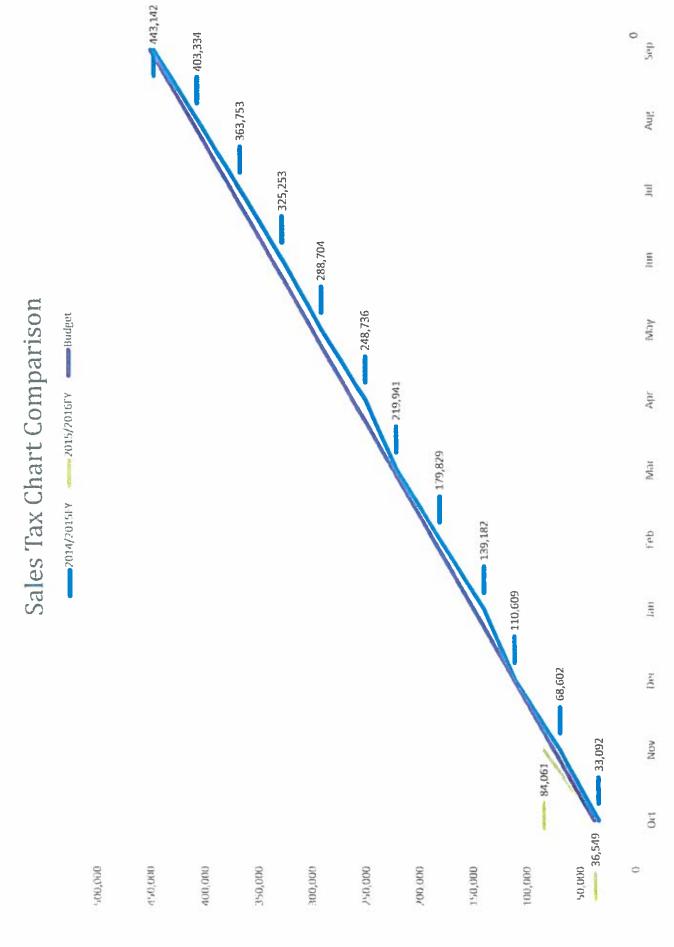

FARMERSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES October 27, 2015

The Farmersville City Council met in regular session on October 27, 2015 at 6:00pm in the Council Chambers at City Hall with the following members present: Mayor Helmberger, John Klostermann, John Politz, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari and Jim Foy. Staff members present were City Manager Ben White, City Attorney Alan Lathrom, Warrant Officer Rick Ranspot, Fire Chief Kim Morris, Finance Director Daphne Hamlin and City Secretary Edie Sims.

ITEM I) CALL MEETING TO ORDER, ROLL CALL

Mayor Helmberger called the meeting to order. Edie Sims called the roll and announced a quorum was present. Benny Mondy with Galloway Memorial Church of God in Christ offered the invocation. Mayor Helmberger led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

Mayor Helmberger announced City Offices will be closed November 11th in observance of Veteran's Day. The Council meetings have been changed due to the upcoming holidays. There will be only one meeting in November, November 17th. All monthly reports will be presented at this meeting. December will have two meetings, on December 1sth and December 15th. All monthly reports will be presented on December 15th. Mayor Helmberger also announced the City received the Keep Texas Beautiful Award from Community Waste Disposal for the second year.

<u>ITEM II – A) PRESENTATION FROM COLLIN COUNTY REGARDING THE COLLIN COUNTY MOBILITY PLAN "ALTERNATIVE BUILD-OUT SCENARIO"</u>

Clarence Daugherty, Director of Engineering for Collin County, came before the Council with a mobility plan presentation. Mr. Daugherty spoke of being innovative in the early 1980's as an initiative to assist planning for cities within Collin County. Mayor Helmberger stated he serves on the Collin County Planning Board. The Mobility Plan was approved by Commissioner's Court August 14, 2015. Mr. Daugherty displayed a power point showing build-out projections predicting the eastern side of Collin County to build out very similarly to the western side of the County. By developing two scenarios, traffic demands are modeled for planning purposes. This planning tool is far beyond what others have done. Some of the development has shown to be inadequate. NCTCOG focuses on population projections, so Collin County took the next step into mobility of the population projections. Traffic Survey Zones were used which also followed City plans. Dwelling units per acre are expected to be at 30%. More cities are planning for more density than what was being planned a couple of years ago. Estimates are predicting 3.1 million people in Collin County where there is currently a little less than 900,000 people.

The Collin County Outer Loop project will have a dramatic effect on the eastern side of Collin County. Employment predictions are interesting with 73% jobs being created from the Outer Loop. The Loop will serve a lot of people on both sides of the County. The jobs will be market dependent, but there is a reasonable idea of the future.

Mayor Helmberger applauded Collin County Commissioner's for their foresight as this is critical. Dallas/Fort Worth began planning in 1950's. The need for utilities and roadways is more than we can imagine right now. Mr. Foy stated this information can be used to enhance our Comprehensive Plan. The Outer Loop is definite with the alignment and momentum has picked up within this past year. Mr. Foy would also like to add this information to our Land Use maps.

Denton County is realizing the need for a freeway. Development of the Outer Loop will promote residential development and good schools. With development comes the need to plan roadways.

Mayor Helmberger recused himself as he has a personal financial effect from the next two agenda items. Mayor Pro-Tem Jim Foy presided over the meeting at 6:42pm.

<u>ITEM II – B)</u> RECEIVE PRESENTATION REGARDING THE WASTEWATER SYSTEM FROM KIMLEY HORN

Jeff James, with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc., came before the City Council reporting a progress update of the wastewater treatment system and interceptor lines. There are two pieces to this project: the wastewater treatment plant and the interceptor line.

Service areas have been established and on a power point, Mr. James showed the areas able to service. The Land Use map will need to be expanded for sewer service. Presently the sewer plant is in concert with the transportation as presented by Mr. Daugherty. The wastewater treatment facility and interceptor line will also be in concert with the Comprehensive Plan and County plan in preparation of future growth. This plan is being driven by the need to serve this area for sizing and capacity.

A portion of the interceptor line will follow the railroad; however most of the line will follow creeks for minimum impact to property owners with strategically placed lift stations. The current wastewater treatment plant has been evaluated and the engineers are considering initiating the 1960's plant in operation. It would be cost effective by offering 220,000 gallons per day.

The primary goals are to consistently meet treatment goals which affect the environment; minimize the economic impact through cost effective options; operate a simple, flexible treatment plant that can respond to changing conditions; and be sensitive to the appearance, odors and noise. We are currently permitted for .5 mgd now and the engineering designs are planning to phase into a 12 mgd site. Mr. James stated he is on schedule for a draft report to make future decisions. Options are being reviewed to use the current plant. More consideration will be made when the draft report is presented.

ITEM III – A) PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON A REQUEST TO CHANGE THE ZONING ON APPROXIMATELY 100.81 ACRES OF LAND IN THE W.B. WILLIAMS SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 952, IN THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, COLLIN COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM PLANNED DEVELOPMENT (PD) DISTRICT WITH SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3), MULTI-FAMILY 2 (MF-2) AND COMMERCIAL (C) DISTRICT USES TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT WITH SINGLE-FAMILY 2 (SF-2) DISTRICT USES, SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3) DISTRICT USES, MULTI-FAMILY 2 (MF-2) DISTRICT USES AND COMMERCIAL (C) DISTRICT USES, AND APPROVING CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS TO THE REQUIREMENTS ESTABLISHED BY THE BASE ZONING OF THE SINGLE-FAMILY 2 (SF-2) DISTRICT AND THE SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3) DISTRICT

Mayor Pro-Tem opened the Public Hearing at 6:56pm and updated the audience on the project when has been involved for the past 10 years. A zoning request was made in 2006 and in 2012. The presented plan has gone through several iterations. Mr. Foy asked for those FOR the zoning request to come forward. Jeff Crannell, engineer for the project, came forward stating the developer has agreed to 50 SF-2 lots with the open space to buffer neighbors. After the last Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, the number of SF-2 was increased to 75 lots. The neighbors of the development have been very helpful to voice concerns and believes most of the concerns have been either addressed or able to compromise. The minimum house size has been

changed to 1,500 square feet minimum which allows the developer to add larger houses as well. The developer has also agreed to purchase the property currently owned by Texas New Mexico Power to align with Farmersville Parkway and become the main entry into the development. However, once the zoning has been overcome, the developer will proceed with the purchase of the property. The open space of 3.4 acres is closer to the eastern boundary including a detention pond to mitigate drainage concerns. Erosion onto the Midkiff property was pulled off so not to repeat further drainage issues. The plan before the Council comes after numerous meetings and workshops. The proposal amends the zoning from 2012 which changes the overall development from an active adult community. The market just was not going to support a 55+ community, so the developer has re-devised the project with SF-2 and SF-3 residential homes. A preliminary plat was not included with the zoning so the residential could be the main focus. The other zones are not immediate and may change in the future. The residential lots have come down to 281.

Mr. Crannell stated he heard concerns of traffic, drainage, school impact, and wastewater concerns. Yes, the development will increase traffic and have an impact on all the issues. Mr. Crannell also stated he expects the main traffic flow through the Industrial Park to the south of the development rather than utilizing the County Roads. Mr. Crannell also stated the City of Farmersville created a TIRZ District. Tax dollars will help fund all infrastructure including roads and drainage. The developer has prepared to spend \$750,000 for the lift station which will open growth along Highway 380. This development is a cooperative effort and felt all the issues with neighbors have been met. Growth is coming this way and this will be a wonderful community.

John Richard Smith, residing at 617 CR 610, come forward stating he adjoins the development on the North side. Mr. Smith brought forward several discrepancies between the Zoning Exhibit and the ordinance. One of the discrepancies was the maximum lot coverage of 52% versus 60% as stated in the ordinance. Tract 3 of the Zoning Exhibit has Multi-Family listed as retirement assisted living but the ordinance has designated the 3.2 acres as Commercial. Mr. Smith stated he would rather have the Multi-Family and would like the entire development to remain age 55+.

Randy Smith, residing at 508 CR 610, stated he lives across from the development on CR 610 and has the same concerns as stated by John Richard Smith. The traffic impact changing from senior living will increase substantially. When will the wastewater be available for the increased population as well as preparing for schools, fire and rescue services as well as other services? When the plan was approved in 2006 and again in 2012, Mr. Smith did not oppose as he did not feel the changes would adversely affect the area. The current plan will definitely adversely affect Farmersville. However, if the plan remained the same for senior living, he does not feel the effects would be as dramatic. What happened to the need for senior living as was proposed.

Mr. Smith disseminated pictures reflecting the condition of CR 610 and stated construction within the subdivision will further deteriorate the existing roads. With no funds available to improve Farmersville Parkway now, how will the streets be handled? What if Collin College never comes? How will the streets be improved if funding is not available to take care of them now? Mr. Smith stated he does not see the benefit of increasing the lot coverage to 52%. Many changes have been presented for this property. With commercial being increased 132%, Mr. Smith does not see developers have done anything to move forward. He does not see benefits of the new proposal. Finally Mr. Smith addressed the wastewater treatment situation and asked if capacity will be available to provide for the new homes.

City Manager Ben White replied stating the City cannot approve permits for homes without proper wastewater capacity. Also, the City is working on infiltration issues. When infiltration

issues are resolved, capacity will substantially increase. Mr. White also addressed the issue of Farmersville Parkway and stated the City's position is currently funding issues. The condition of CR 610 will be dependent upon the traffic patterns including other developments and Collin College.

Cathy Strong, residing at 314 Woodard, stated cities lose so much when there is growth and would like to see Farmersville stay the way it is. She moved out of Plano 20+ years ago to Farmersville and loves Farmersville. We have a great community and does not see 55+ groups asking to build houses.

Mertis Fitzgerald, residing at 805 Westgate, stated she was raised here and opposes the development. If the development must come, she would rather have the 55+ for seniors.

With no further comments from the audience, Mayor Helmberger closed the Public Hearing at 7:34pm.

Leaca Caspari stated the cost for homes according to the 2012 plan was \$150-180,000 for an average 1,500 square foot home. Now the price is not feasible. Several concerns have been expressed by the public but there do not seem to be answers. Nothing has been answered regarding traffic and wastewater issues. When will impact fees be issued? What is the target homebuyer? Has a market study been performed? What is the impact for family sized housing?

Jeff Crannell stated he would love to have a senior community. He does not have a market study but does believe there is a demand for that product. The various drawings leading up to the request presented shows the developer is trying to create a successful project. It is definite CR 610 will need improvements but until a traffic study is done, there are no guidelines at this stage of the project. There will be tax dollars from the project that will generate revenues for the City. Leaca Caspari replied there will be a lot of traffic and a need for a stop light on CR 610. There is still not answers for road improvements. Mr. Crannell stated he feels a high percentage of residents in the development will travel south through the Industrial Park to connect to Highway 380. Mr. Crannell also stated this entire area is poised for growth. It would be more beneficial for the growth to occur within the City. There will be substantial tax revenues plus other revenues from 281 homes.

City Attorney Alan Lathrom requested an Executive Session. Council exited the meeting at 7:43pm for an Executive Session with the City Attorney.

Council reconvened the meeting at 7:49pm with no discussion from the Executive Session.

John Politz stated the engineer working on the wastewater treatment plant brought up utilizing Plant #1. This plant in operation should assist with the capacity needs for this development. City Manager Ben White stated the City has a big problem with infiltration with he and many others working toward resolving those issues which will offer more capacity.

John Klostermann asked what the timeline was for homes to be built. Mr. Crannell stated he is wanting to get through the zoning stage first but would expect after infrastructure that buildings could start in mid-2017 with 45 homes per year. However, the homes being built will be market driven. Mr. Crannell stated he is guessing for a complete build-out in 5 years.

Jim Foy stated the development has been through many iterations but he prefers the plan from 2012 where senior living is the desired goal. Mr. Crannell stated all the changes throughout each iteration has been accounted for and encouraged the Council this will not be the only development to come to this area. All sizes of lots are needed in this area as there is a shortage now. Many developers are looking at smaller lots with larger homes. Leaca Caspari stated she is concerned of park area not being sufficient since yards are small. Ms. Caspari also stated she is concerned of drainage issues as well. Mr. Crannell again stated the developer will not be

restricting the area to seniors only but would like to encourage buyers who are of any age, including 55+. The goal is to provide housing for all needs in this community. The TIRZ District and impact fees should help offset costs for improvements such as the streets. The plan presented is a lower impact than the original plans.

John Klostermann motioned to accept the recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commission and approve the Zoning request as presented with John Politz seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari no and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with 4 approving and 1 in opposition.

Mayor Helmberger returned to the meeting and presided over the remainder of the meeting at 8:08pm.

<u>ITEM IV - A) FIRST READING TO CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE INTERNATIONAL SWIMMING POOL AND SPA CODE WITH MODIFICATIONS</u>

City Manager Ben White thanked City Attorney Alan Lathrom for crafting the ordinance and recommended approval. The main concern and direction of this ordinance was to resolve backwash from pools. Through this ordinance those issues will be resolved. Mayor Helmberger stated an issue is to be resolved regarding the section number on page 3 which should be Section 32.183 referencing the International Code. The changes will be made for the final reading at the next meeting. Leaca Caspari motioned to approve the ordinance with amendments with John Politz seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

ITEM V - A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON CITY FINANCIAL REPORTS

Finance Director Daphne Hamlin reported the City completed the year fairly well. All projects were not completed and a budget amendment will be required. Mayor Helmberger noted a shortfall with Farmersville Electric pf \$164,000. City Manager Ben White stated overall he felt the City did better than expected, especially with Farmersville Electric. Ms. Hamlin stated the figures presented are unaudited.

Ms. Hamlin also reported the Water Department completed the year on a good note. This is the first time in several years the Water Department broke even. Mayor Helmberger accounted this to the Rate Study performed several years ago. Jim Foy requested a graph be presented for the revenues and expenditures rather than a straight line. Jim Foy motioned to approve the City's Financial Reports with John Klostermann seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

<u>ITEM V - B) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON A CONTRACT TO LEASE A PHONE SYSTEM FOR CITY HALL THROUGH NEC FINANCIAL SERVICES</u>

City Manager Ben White stated City Hall's phone system has been having issues. The system is 10 years old and the time has come for an improved and reliable system. Mr. White decided a 5 year lease was the best option for new handsets and hardware. Mr. White also stated the new system will allow the City VOIP with multiple mailboxes which has the technology to use the system instead of the off-sight call center. Doing so would save \$105 per month which will basically cost the City \$70 per month to operate the system. The phone system was recommended by our IT vendor. The service will remain through Time Warner. Mr. White stated the technology will allow the City to have a City wide phone system. We have an option at the

end of the lease to purchase the equipment. Also this expenditure was not planned so the Administrative budget will be adjusted to accommodate this expenditure. Mr. White would like to integrate the entire City in the future, but start with City Hall since the current phone system is dying. Michael Hesse asked once fiber optics is available if this unit will still be viable. Yes, this unit will be viable and compatible for future growth. Jim Foy motioned to approve the contract as presented with John Klostermann seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

<u>ITEM V – C) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON CONTRACTING WITH COLLIN COUNTY ELECTIONS TO PERFORM FUTURE ELECTIONS</u>

City Secretary Edie Sims requested the Council consider contracting with Collin County Elections to perform all future elections. The City of Farmersville is the last entity within Collin County that has performed the elections internally. The cost factor is such that it is more cost effective to work with Collin County. Jim Foy motioned to approve a contract with Collin County Elections with Leaca Caspari seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

<u>ITEM V - D) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON MOWING IN RIGHTS-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY</u>

City Manager Ben White directed Council to the example by the City of Anna regarding mowing in rights-of-way within the City. Typically the homeowner takes care of the right-of-way but we do not have this clearly written. City Attorney Alan Lathrom indicated this is part of the Property Maintenance Code 2006 Edition that describes the property is to be maintained by the occupant from the property to the back of the curb. Some cities have a separate ordinance but the International Property Maintenance Code covers this. No action was taken by Council.

<u>ITEM V - E) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT REGARDING AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ALLOW A FLEA MARKET USE IN THE HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL AND OTHER ZONING AREAS</u>

City Manager Ben White stated he has received a request by Storage Wars Outlet owner Larry McIntyre to see if Council would consider having this type of business discussed by Planning and Zoning Commission to be allowed in our Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance. Currently this type of use is not in our schedule of uses. This type of business is exclusionary by nature. Jim Foy stated parking, restrooms and other items will be on the site plan. This type of use does need to be clarified in Highway Commercial zoning. Mayor Helmberger questioned if this type of use should be limited to just Highway Commercial but look at other zoned areas as well.

A short discussion was raised regarding sales tax dollars from sales from flea markets. The State Comptroller protects the City and will fine those that do not pay proper sales taxes. Council concurred to submit this request to Planning and Zoning for discussion and recommendation.

<u>ITEM V – F) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON THE RESIGNATION OF BETTYE PETREE</u> <u>FROM THE PARKS AND RECREATION BOARD</u>

Mayor Helmberger publicly thanked Bettye Petree for her service. Jim Foy motioned to accept Ms. Petree's resignation with Leaca Caspari seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

<u>ITEM V - G) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON FULFILLING THE VACANCY ON THE PARKS AND RECREATION BOARD</u>

Jim Foy stated he spoke with Kim Potter who is willing to fulfill the vacancy on the Parks and Recreation Board. Jim Foy motioned to appoint Kim Potter to the position with John Klostermann seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

ITEM V - H) UPDATE ON CHAPARRAL TRAIL PROJECTS

City Manager Ben White there is a section of the Trail still in need of repair due to drainage issues. This portion was not part of the original contract. In reaction, Change Order #5 has been created with \$17,000 to repair this section of the Trail. This will place the project at the right amount of funding available. The contractor did not have the portion of Trail finished as promised for the Chamber's Trick It Up Bike Ride event.

Mr. White stated he is upset with the contractor and wants them off the Trail completely. Further repairs or upgrades Mr. White is suggesting the City do in-house. The City could purchase equipment to seal the decomposed granite for approximately \$2,000 and \$5,000 should cover the cost for pre-mixed materials. There are a couple of drainage spots across the trail. The retainage is still being withheld and the contractor has not requested additional days to work. Mayor Helmberger stated we should allow the contractor to finish and the City can fix needed areas afterward.

<u>ITEM V - I) UPDATE ON STREET, WATER AND WASTEWATER GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND PROJECTS</u>

City Manager Ben White stated he is waiting for the finances to settle out and determine if he needs to move forward on the South Hamilton Street project or go to Jackson Street. The other projects are done as budgeted. All pavements have been complete and we have come a long way with only one project remaining.

For the water and wastewater projects, Houston/Austin street tie-ins are nearing completion as the lines will need flushing. The gravity main project at Hwy 78/Maple is being prepared for pipe bursting. The force main and lift station design will set the standard when future liftstations are upgraded.

When streets are torn up due to construction, Mayor Helmberger questioned if the contract reflects the contractor is to repair with base and asphalt after the infrastructure project is completed. Mr. White stated that is part of the contract and will confirm existing projects have been followed through. Central Street still needs repairs and cracks are re-appearing in other recently laid streets. Mr. White stated the City will need to either hire or purchase equipment for ongoing upkeep.

ITEM V – J) UPDATE ON HIGHWAY 380 PROJECT

Barry Heard stated the actual Highway 380 project is complete, but TxDOT is now trying to work with Kansas City Southern Railroad to complete their portion of the project with the railroad crossing and bridge extending the second track. Locust Street is also waiting on TxDOT for the second track.

ITEM VI) REQUEST FOR CONSIDERATION OF PLACING ITEMS ON FUTURE AGENDAS

ITEM VII) ADJOURNMENT

Council adjourned at 9:05pm.

FARMERSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES December 1, 2015

The Farmersville City Council met in regular session on December 1, 2015 at 6:00pm in the Council Chambers at City Hall with the following members present: Mayor Helmberger, John Klostermann, John Politz, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari and Jim Foy. Staff members present were City Manager Ben White, David Ritter sitting in for City Attorney Alan Lathrom from Brown and Hofmeister Law Firm, Police Chief Mike Sullivan, Fire Chief Kim Morris, Librarian Trisha Dowell and City Secretary Edie Sims.

ITEM I) CALL MEETING TO ORDER, ROLL CALL

Mayor Helmberger called the meeting to order. Edie Sims called the roll and announced a quorum was present. Mike Phillips with Pathway Church offered the invocation. Mayor Helmberger led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

Mayor Helmberger announced the next Council meeting has been changed due to the upcoming Christmas holiday. The next meeting will be held December 15th. All monthly reports will be presented at this meeting. Mayor Helmberger also announced the annual Chamber of Commerce Christmas Parade starting at 7pm on December 12th. This coming weekend is Farmers and Fleas and motorcyclists with Toys for Tots will be traveling through Farmersville about 11:15am.

Mayor Helmberger thanked Farmersville Community Development Corporation for funding the lighting downtown. The entire downtown area looks beautiful.

Mayor Helmberger proudly boasted winning the Battle of the Bridge canned food drive between the City of Farmersville and the City of Princeton. Both food pantries win through this competition and Mayor Helmberger would like to have this challenge opened again in the spring.

To date, there are 197 Angels needing adopted through the Farmersville Angel Tree program. Lastly, John Klostermann announced his younger brother is a first time grandparent and congratulations were given.

ITEM II – A) SECOND READING TO CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON AN ORDINANCE AMENDING BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS REQUIRING AN ANNUAL REPORT TO THE CITY COUNCIL; CHANGE TIMING FOR ELECTION OF OFFICERS; REQUIRING MEETINGS TO BE HELD MINIMALLY ONCE PER QUARTER AND AMEND RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE LIBRARY/CIVIC CENTER BOARD

With no changes being made, Leaca Caspari motioned to approve the ordinance as presented with John Politz seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse yes, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

<u>ITEM III – A) RECEIVE PRESENTATION FROM LEXINGTON MEDICAL LODGE</u>

Don Miller, President of Foursquare Healthcare, Ltd., came before the Council to offer an update of Farmersville's new nursing and physical therapy facility. The journey for this f started almost 4 years ago through the State, then site selection followed. With zoning, construction and finally a completed facility, Mr. Miller was happy to report the following information for our facility.

Currently Lexington Medical Lodge has 90 employees with a payroll of \$275,000 since the inception. The facility now has 49 residents with 25 of the 49 being rehabilitation patients. Since opening on September 8th, the facility has had a total of 70 new admissions.

There have been 14 residents successfully discharged home from rehabilitation. Short term care is one of the main focal points of this facility, although long term options are also high on the list. Mr. Miller stated approximately 485 people attended the Grand Opening in October and appreciation was expressed to all who attended.

Lastly, Mr. Miller gave statistics of areas where admissions are coming from including admissions from other facilities 30%; admissions from home 16%; Medical Center of McKinney 19%; Baylor McKinney 9%; Hunt Regional in Greenville 6% and Dallas hospitals 14.2%. The facility is excited about the Dallas admissions and the word is getting out.

City Manager Ben White expressed his delight the median area has been landscaped even though the property does not officially belong to the facility. Mr. Miller stated he spoke with the landowners of the median area and they were pleased to allow landscaping be installed which improved their property and improved the face of the Lexington Medical Lodge. Mr. Miller stated a separate water line for irrigation was installed so the landowner could take over at some point in the future.

Mayor Helmberger thanked the Lexington Medical Lodge for their involvement in the community with Mr. Miller stating in order to be successful, one must partner with the community.

ITEM III - B) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON RESIGNATION FROM TODD ROLEN FROM THE PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION/CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE/CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND THE PARKS AND RECREATION BOARD

Mayor Helmberger expressed his appreciation for Mr. Rolen's service to the City. Jim Foy motioned to accept Mr. Rolen's resignation with Leaca Caspari seconding the motion. A poll of the Council was taken as follows: John Klostermann yes, John Politz yes, Michael Hesse, Leaca Caspari yes and Jim Foy yes. Motion passed with full Council approval.

ITEM III – C) UPDATE ON ADA COMPLIANCY

City Manager Ben White stated the Main Street grant was denied. There was not enough time allotted for training which affected the scoring. The grant cycle will be opened in March and we will re-apply for the same project. Training and further scoring methods will be approached in a timelier manner. Mr. White proposed all ADA projects be placed on hold until after the grant cycle which were related to downtown. If this grant does not fund, then the City will have to inch forward according to funding. The funds are in place for the grant match.

ITEM IV) PUBLIC COMMENT

No one came forward during the public comment section.

Mr. Foy also requested an item to discuss the TAPS situation. No one else requested items be placed on future agendas.

FARMERSVILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION MEETING MINUTES October 15th, 2015

The Farmersville EDC met in regular session on October 15th, 2015 at 7:01 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of City Hall with the following members present: Kris Washam, Jason Lane, Bob Collins and Kevin Meguire. Staff members present were City Accountant Daphne Hamlin, and City Manager Ben White. Absent Chris Lair. Guest recognized Jeff James with Kimley Horn and Ted Zata.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Collins convened the meeting at 7:01 p.m. and announced a quorum was present.

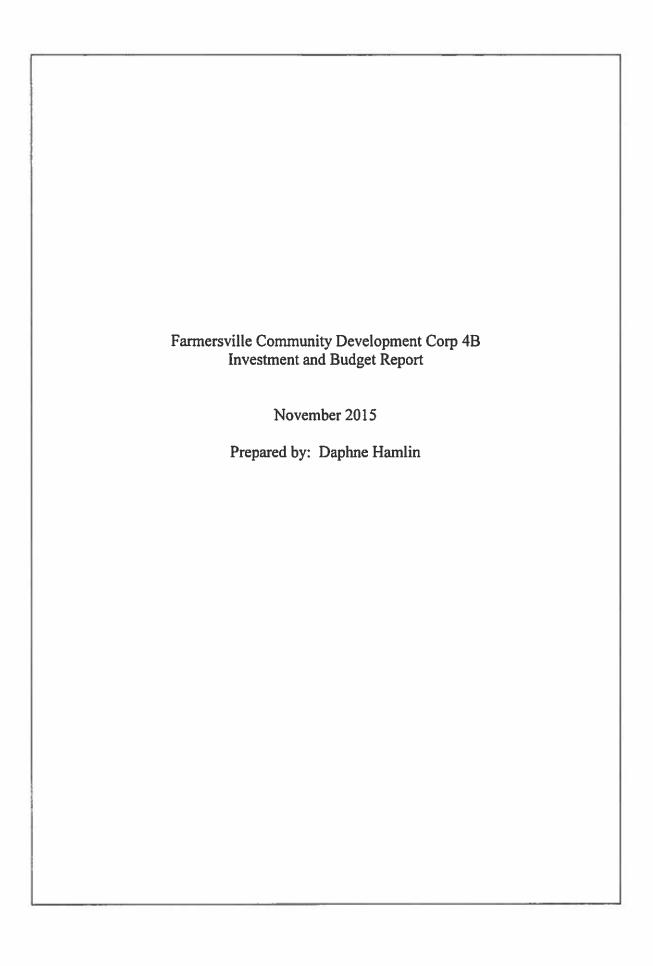

FARMERSVILLE PLANNING & ZONING COMMISSION SPECIAL SESSION MINUTES OCTOBER 26, 2015

The Farmersville Planning and Zoning Commission met in special session on October 26, 2015 at 6:30 p.m. at the City of Farmersville Council Chambers with the following members present: Chairman Bryce Thompson, Sarah Jackson-Butler, Craig Overstreet, Charles Casada, and Chad Dillard. Commissioners absent was Mark Vincent and Todd Rolen. Staff members present were City Manager Ben White, City Attorney Alan Lathrom, and City Secretary Edie Sims. Council Liaison John Klostermann was present.

CALL TO ORDER AND RECOGNITION OF CITIZENS/VISITORS

Chairman Bryce Thompson called the meeting to order at 6:30pm. Edie Sims called roll and announced that a quorum was present. Craig Overstreet offered the invocation and led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American and Texas Flags.

Item II — A) PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON A REQUEST TO CHANGE THE ZONING ON APPROXIMATELY 100.81 ACRES OF LAND IN THE W.B. WILLIAMS SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 952, IN THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, COLLIN COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM PLANNED DEVELOPMENT (PD) DISTRICT WITH SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3), MULTI-FAMILY 2 (MF-2) AND COMMERCIAL (C) DISTRICT USES TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT WITH SINGLE-FAMILY 2 (SF-2) DISTRICT USES, SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3) DISTRICT USES, MULTI-FAMILY 2 (MF-2) DISTRICT USES AND COMMERCIAL (C) DISTRICT USES, AND APPROVING CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS TO THE REQUIREMENTS ESTABLISHED BY THE BASE ZONING OF THE SINGLE-FAMILY 2 (SF-2) DISTRICT AND THE SINGLE-FAMILY 3 (SF-3) DISTRICT

Chairman Thompson opened the Public Hearing at 6:32pm and asked for those FOR the zoning change to come forward. Jeff Crannell, engineer for the project, came forward stating the revised zoning is new and improved from past submittals. The changes presented are derived from a workshop held with the Planning and Zoning Commission to resolve ongoing issues. There are 25 lots designated at Single-Family 2 (SF-2) that have 7,000 square feet scattered throughout the project and most have double frontage. These lots are along the northern border of the property which will buffer from neighbors along the borders of the property.

The developer has agreed to acquire the Texas New Mexico Power property along CR 611 upon positive progress of the project through the City. This area is designated as the main entry into the subdivision. TNMP has an offer on the table from the developer presently.

Mr. Crannell stated 3.4 acres of land is dedicated park land which is the required minimum. With an additional 2.76 acres located in the southwestern area of the property, Mr. Crannell and the developer hopes to offset the need for other parkland. The other area is a greenbelt where an existing utility line is located; however this area, according to a previous conversation, is not considered parkland.

Other lots within the subdivision have a minimum lot size of 1,500 square feet. The side yard set backs are being requested at 20' if the lot is on a corner lot. Larger lot

coverage is also requested to allow larger homes on the lots. The improvements made are hoped to support the project. The old project was approved and still viable. Mr. Crannell stated he is aware this development will have impacts on the schools, drainage, streets and other impacts; however most of these will be addressed in future processes.

With no one else coming forward FOR the zoning request, Chairman Thompson requested those OPPOSING the zoning request to come forward. John Richard Smith, residing at 617 CR 610, stated he found a few discrepancies with the presented zoning exhibit. (1) The requested zoning percentage in box 1 does not reflect equally as the ordinance found in the P&Z packet. The stated request in the exhibit is 52%, but the ordinance indicates coverage of no more than 60% for both SF-2 and SF-3 (2) Section 2 of the ordinance language states of the two the ordinance prevails, but it would be conflicting having two separate wordings; (3) Tract 3 (reflecting MF-2 retirement) states no zoning change; however the ordinance in Section 2 paragraph 2 shows Commercial Tracts 3, 4 and 5. Will the MF-2 be moved into Commercial zoning? (4) On the Zoning Exhibit 3rd box down, it shows the proposal to combine areas equaling 59.64 acres. Tract 2 is set for 18.16 acres and 9.32 acres for Multi-Family. Storage is in Commercial with 11.77 acres. General retail has 8.77 acres in Tract 5 with the right-of-way equaling 1.92 acres. The storage area has a mathematical error and would like to see the MF-2 be used as retirement and leave all the Multi-Family as presently allowed and not Commercial zoning.

Mr. Crannell answered stating the development standards were used with the basic zoning uses. A Homeowner's Association will be created to care for the open space areas and the detention ponds will be included. Mr. Smith stated if the developer stayed with the 55+ development, there will not be an issue impacting schools and probably would not have as much traffic. If the proposed zoning is allowed, the density will be greatly impacting the area as well as Farmersville. Having this many homes will also cut down on other services provided by the City.

Randy Smith, residing at 508 CR 610, stated he lives across the road from the proposed development and has the same concerns as mentioned by Richard Smith. Traffic on CR 610 and CR 611 is also a concern. By the time construction is complete, the existing street will not be functional. Mr. Smith asked if the extension of Farmersville Parkway will be completed by the time people move into this development. Same question is placed for the wastewater treatment plant that is being discussed for construction. Mr. Smith believes the majority of the traffic will be on CR 610, 611, 612. It will be hard to determine how many children will live in this subdivision which affects the school district. Mr. Smith stated he would prefer the 55+ development plan as well and felt that was the best use for this development. If the zoning is approved as presented, there will be no limit on the number of students impacting the schools and definitely no control of rental property. That leads to parking issues which Mr. Smith stated will be significant. There are plenty of storage facilities in Farmersville and does not think having a storage facility in the gateway of our community is the best use of the area. The northern boundary is small and the plans do not show if the water flow is proportionate to the detention ponds. There is an increase of 132% for Commercial zoning from the original plan in 2012. Mr. Smith stated he could live by a 55+ development and felt the cost range of \$150,000 - \$180,000 is good.

Cathy Strong, residing at 314 Woodard stated she does not understand how this development will help Farmersville. This development will disrupt everything about this small town. She questioned how the City will service all the homes planned. Ms. Strong stated even 55+ residents have school aged children. This development is too much too soon. This development is good for money but does not think citizens of Farmersville like it.

Jeff Crannell, engineer for the development, stated the City of Farmersville created a TIRZ District which will help fund back to the City for the infrastructure including the streets and drainage. The main traffic flow may be CR 610 but is hopeful most of the population will travel southward through the Industrial Park to Highway 380. Mr. Crannell stated he is hopeful the development will stir Collin College to build their campus which in turn will promote dollars back to the City. The project will be self-funding at some point. The points of discrepancies made will be corrected and synchronized with the City's ordinance for this development. Presently this is \$11,000,000 project and it is exciting to move forward. It is definite that development is moving to Farmersville. Addressing the sewer system impact, a permit cannot be issued if the proper amount of wastewater capability is not available. Mr. Crannell continued to state this project will generate revenues for the City. Growth is inevitable.

Sarah Butler questioned how and who would maintain the detention ponds. Mr. Crannell responded stating a Homeowner's Association would be created to fund and maintain the detention pond and other open space areas including the entry. Craig Overstreet was concerned the plan presented does not have curvature to the streets. Mr. Crannell offered a design to break up some of the consistency with some curves and added cul-de-sacs. There are 25 extra SF-2 lots with 7,200 square feet bringing the total of SF-2 to 75 lots.

Charles Casada expressed concern of having all houses under construction at the same time. Mr. Crannell assured the Commission the construction will be in phases; however all three points of access will be accomplished during Phase 1. Bryce Thompson questioned why the change of the detention ponds from the previous submittal. The ponds need to be deeper which reduces drainage issues. Mr. Crannell stated the project will be demand driven. He is expecting 5-10 homes during the first quarter of housing construction. If the Commission wants to change Tract 3, it will not be a problem based on the end user and Mr. Crannell stated he will make request for a zoning change based upon the end user.

Chairman Thompson closed the Public Hearing at 7:23pm. City Attorney Alan Lathrom indicated the notice and caption of the agenda was based upon the submittal from Crannell and Crannell on October 2nd. The notification and advertisement was based on the zoning from said submittal. If any modifications are required, a new notification and advertisement must be accomplished to notify the public of the modifications not supported in the presented submittal. The ordinance and zoning exhibit can have corrections to match according to the submittal; however the Commercial zone cannot be changed to Multi-Family for senior living purposes without advertising property to the public. Mr. Crannell stated this was not an issue until he has a firm end user. A change can be submitted in the future.

Mr. Thompson asked if the City Engineer has reviewed the zoning exhibit. City Secretary stated he has not as this is not part of the City's process. City Manager Ben

White indicated he would like to amend the City's process to include the zoning exhibits to be reviewed by the City Engineer in the future.

Chad Dillard motioned to approve the zoning with the following conditions: change Tract 3 to equal the ordinance, change the ordinance to 52% of the maximum lot coverage, include zoning classification for the right-of-way where the entry will be located on current Texas New Mexico Power property, change the maximum lots to 281 and state the minimum amount of SF-2 lots will be 75. Bryce Thompson seconded the motion. Motion carried 3 to 2 with Sarah Butler and Craig Overstreet opposing.

<u>Item III - A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON MINUTES FROM SEPTEMBER</u> 21, 2015 REGULAR P&Z MEETING AND SEPTEMBER 29, 2015 SPECIAL P&Z MEETING

Chad Dillard motioned to approve all the minutes as presented with Sarah Butler seconding the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Item IV - A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND REVIEW ORDINANCES RELATED TO DEVELOPMENT IN THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE TO: (1) OBTAIN GREATER VALUE AND ENDURING QUALITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS WITHIN THE CITY; AND/OR (2) EVALUATE THE PREFERRED DENSITY FOR RESIDENTIAL AND NON-RESIDENTIAL USES AND A BALANCE BETWEEN LOT SIZE, ROAD WIDTH, AND THE POSSIBLE USE OF REAR ENTRY GARAGES TO LESSEN ROADWAY CONGESTION; AND/OR (3) EVALUATE POSSIBLE CHANGES TO THE MINIMUM LOT AND DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS FOR NEW DEVELOPMENT WITH A FOCUS ON REDUCING THE PERCEIVED NEGATIVE IMPACTS OF SMALL LOT RESIDENTIAL USES; AND/OR (4) EVALUTE THE NEED FOR MANDATORY HOMEOWNER'S ASSOCIATIONS OR PROPERTY OWNER'S ASSOCIATIONS AND THEIR ROLE IN MAINTAINING CONTINUING AND ENDURING QUALITY FOLLOWING THE BUILD OUT OF A PARTICULAR DEVELOPMENT; AND/OR (5) EVALUATE ROADWAY DESIGN WIDTHS AND CROSS-SECTIONS TOGETHER WITH THE LAYOUT AND POTENTIAL FUTURE NEEDS FOR ROADWAYS TO SERVE THE CITY

City Manager Ben White presented a lot size mock-up with various lot requirements per the City's zoning and subdivision requirements. The direction understood was to have larger lots and not have SF-3 lots. The drawings reflected all existing requirements including sidewalks which are now required on both sides of a street. SF-2 lots are more acceptable with 2,500 square feet.

Mr. White encouraged the Commission to look at the best for Farmersville as long as the layout conforms to the zoning plan when a development is presented for review. A developer must understand there are no guarantees a specified zoning will be approved. After a plan is approved, the developer must submit a preliminary plat then a final plat.

Mr. White agreed the Comprehensive Plan and the Thoroughfare Plan needs to be brought together cohesively. Mr. White also reported the 50' right-of-way is fairly consistent with other cities guidelines. Currently Farmersville does not use collector streets since this is an older town. Cost is also a factor as the developer must include concrete sidewalks as well as concrete streets. Commission discussed the need for wider streets. A comment was made by City Attorney Alan Lathrom that sometimes wider streets are counter intuitive since speeders are more apt to travel wider streets.

Mr. White also indicated there have not been any developments since the ordinances have been in place.

Speaking of SF-3 lots, Mr. White spoke of retaining the lot dimension and limit the use or indicate the use through a Planned Development where mixed uses include SF-3 lots. When a zoning case is presented to the Commission, the Commission could deny any SF-3 lots. After discussing, the Commission opted to leave SF-3 lots in tack for now. By doing so, the zoning classification could be kept alive to avoid nonconforming uses.

Commission was satisfied with widths of streets. Commission asked to discuss alleys and approaches at the next meeting. For future developments, the Commission would like to characterize the development of a neighborhood and protect those areas. Craig Overstreet asked to see a comparison of lot sizes from other cities. Mr. Overstreet also asked for a concept showing rear entry and front entry for future discussions.

The Commission wants to have enduring quality that adds value to the development and to the City of Farmersville. Mr. Overstreet would like to have considered a street layout with character and no so linear. Also Mr. Overstreet noted a Homeowner's Association does not take over maintenance of an area until a percentage of lots are sold. The HOA must be established prior to filing the Final Plat with Collin County. The developer maintains control over maintenance of areas until said percentage of lots are sold then this authority is transferred to the HOA for responsibility of common areas, fences, detention ponds, etc. If these properties are not maintained, the City can step in and access charges to the owners of the property.

Item III) ADJOURNMENT

Craig Overstreet motioned to adjourn with Chad Dillard seconding the motion. Chairman Bryce Thompson adjourned the meeting. Commission adjourned at 8:23pm.

FARMERSVILLE PLANNING & ZONING COMMISSION REGULAR SESSION MINUTES NOVEMBER 16, 2015

The Farmersville Planning and Zoning Commission met in regular session on November 16, 2015 at 6:30 p.m. at the City of Farmersville Council Chambers with the following members present: Sarah Jackson-Butler, Mark Vincent, Craig Overstreet, Charles Casada, and Chad Dillard. Commissioner Todd Rolen submitted his resignation from the Commission same date as the meeting. Chairman Bryce Thompson arrived at 6:43pm. Staff members present were City Manager Ben White, City Attorney Alan Lathrom, and City Secretary Edie Sims. Council Liaison John Klostermann was present.

CALL TO ORDER AND RECOGNITION OF CITIZENS/VISITORS

Commissioner Craig Overstreet presided over the meeting and called the meeting to order at 6:33pm. Edie Sims called roll and announced that a quorum was present. Craig Overstreet offered the invocation and led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American and Texas Flags.

<u>Item II – A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON A PRELIMINARY PLAT FOR CAMDEN PARK, A PLANNED DEVELOPMENT, CONTAINING APPROXIMATELY 100.81 ACRES OF LAND IN THE W.B. WILLIAMS SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 952, IN THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, COLLIN COUNTY, TEXAS</u>

Chairman Overstreet opened the item for discussion by the Planning and Zoning Commission. Mr. Overstreet questioned Note #7 on the Preliminary Plat Exhibit where there are 2 points of ingress and egress for the development; however both points of access are not in the same phase. Jeff Crannell, engineer for the development, stepped forward stating the Note on the Exhibit was incorrect and the correct number of access points is 3. One is through the Industrial Park to the South of the development. One is on CR 610 and the third will be through the currently owned Texas New Mexico Power property which will be purchased upon approval of the project.

Charles Casada expressed concern regarding Note #10 which states "The City wants to consider placing the sanitary sewer lift station closer to Highway 380 to serve as a regional lift station. The developer is agreeable to this option as long as the city pays for any additional costs for this new location." City Manager Ben White stated this is the prime opportunity to plan for the future along Highway 380 and this developer is willing to work with the City. The City does agree to pay for additional costs beyond normal, such as placing a manhole in front of Homegrown Plants (2675 West Audie Murphy Parkway). Mr. Casada also noted Phase 1 has changed from the last submittal. Mr. Crannell informed the Commission due to the cost of concrete, the developer decided to utilize his costs to have the same number of lots. Mr. Casada also noted there are only 2 SF-2 houses in Phase 1 as shown and the remainder are in Phase 2.

Chairman Bryce Thompson arrived and presided over the meeting.

Mr. Crannell continued by stating the market will drive when the next phases of the project will begin. Street names will be another layer that will be started with the final engineering plans. Mr. Crannell stated the developer is working to meet the front end costs for infrastructure of the development including concrete streets, and the lift station.

Mark Vincent questioned if the development will be visible from Highway 380. Not much of the development will be visible and the developer is wanting to preserve the tree line on the south side of the development adjacent to the Industrial Park.

Commissioners requested a correction to show Street "E" to be Street "A" and strike Note 7. Craig Overstreet motioned to approve the plat conditionally by removing Note 7 and correct the Street labels and recommend approval with conditions to City Council. Mark Vincent seconded the motion.

Further discussion ensued with City Manager Ben White stating an ordinance or agreement will be in place for the developer to pay for road construction along the development boundaries. Mr. White is cognizant of the condition of CR 610 and CR 611. A traffic study will need to be performed in order for the developer to base his proportion. Chairman Thompson stated he would like to have the other utility letters on file prior to filing the Final Plat. Charles Casada strongly opposed the development and asked for the vote to be reconsidered.

Craig Overstreet motioned to reconsider the vote with Chad Dillard seconding the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

City Manager Ben White reminded the Commission of roadway requirements which are adjacent to a major street and how the streets are impacted by the Comprehensive Plan. The cost of the improvements will be based upon a traffic study due to the burden from the development. Mr. Crannell stated he does not see this development requiring a 4 lane road; but rather would request turn lanes dependent upon the traffic study results.

Craig Overstreet redirected the discussion to the lack of SF-2 homes in Phase 1. All Commissioner's showed disappointment with this decision by the developer. Mr. Crannell expressed his disappointment as well, but felt this was the best solution to meet the developer's request and the City's request. Mr. Crannell stated 100 homes equates to \$10,000,000. All want to see this development successful. Bryce Thompson stated he will vote no if SF-2 lots are not included. Further discussion was made regarding amending zoning areas; however the zoning has been approved and the development must follow the zoning as approved. Mr. Crannell stated he is willing to move the Phase 1 line to include Street "K" on both sides which are all SF-2 lots.

Craig Overstreet motioned to strike Note 7; Change Street "E" to "A" in Phase 1; enlarge Phase 1 to include both sides of Street "K" with 13 corresponding lots; acknowledge phone and utility service letters; and add cost of construction to CR 610 in documentation before Final Plat. Chad Dillard seconded the motion. Motion carried 5 to 1 with Charles Casada opposing.

Item III - A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON REVIEWING THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, THE THOROUGHFARE PLAN AND THE SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE TO CONSIDER POSSIBLE CHANGES TO THE MINIMUM LOT DEMINSIONS FOR NEW DEVELOPMENT WITH A FOCUS ON REDUCING THE PERCEIVED NEGATIVE IMPACTS OF SMALL LOT RESIDENTIAL USES; ALLEYS AND APPROACHES

City Manager presented comparisons of other cities regarding SF-2 and SF-1 lots. The City of Farmersville comparison to other cities is commensurate. After review

of the comparison sheet, Commissioners agreed to have a draft provision and redesign the setbacks to 1,600 square feet dwelling size and include a garage as part of the whole structure for SF-2. Commissioner's also requested the term dwelling not be used.

Item III) ADJOURNMENT

FARMERSVILLE CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE SPECIAL SESSION MINUTES November 16, 2015

The Farmersville Citizens Advisory Committee met in special session on November 16, 2015 at 7:49 p.m. at the City of Farmersville Council Chambers with the following members present: Bryce Thompson, Mark Vincent, Sarah Jackson-Butler, Charles Casada, Craig Overstreet and Chad Dillard. Commissioner Todd Rolen gave his resignation notice the same day as the meeting. Staff members present were City Attorney Alan Lathrom and City Secretary Edie Sims. Council Liaison John Klostermann was present.

CALL TO ORDER AND RECOGNITION OF CITIZENS/VISITORS

Chairman Thompson called the meeting to order at 7:49pm. Edie Sims called roll and announced that a quorum was present.

<u>Item II – A) CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND REVIEW PLANNING-RELATED ISSUES AND THE CITY'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AND THE SUBMISSION OF RECOMMENDATIONS TO CITY COUNCIL REGARDING SUCH DISCUSSIONS</u>

City Manager Ben White requested to review the Transportation section of the Comprehensive Plan for review. Per the strategy goals for Transportation, the newest housing development in Farmersville is opening opportunity to create street connectivity which adhering to the Thoroughfare Plan. Planning in the past has led to a good job planning for trails. Our trail plan is also integrated with Collin County's Trail Plan.

Per the Comprehensive Plan Transportation Goal 2, the City has taken the leading role improving the Chaparral Trail which is part of the Northeast Texas Trail system connecting at the Trail Head in Farmersville and following through to New Boston, Texas creating 130 miles of hiking, biking and equestrian riding trail area.

Goal 3 sets out a course to maintain and enhance Farmersville's existing transportation system. Currently this portion of the plan does not need to be updated. Our focal point is fixing and maintaining our road system. The East side of Main Street is needing attention. The problem remains there are more issues than available funding. Mr. White is expecting to introduce improved street, water and wastewater designs this upcoming year. The Safe Routes to School project has been completed from the list.

Listed under Goal 4 is the update of City-wide Standard Details with crosssections for pedestrian realm design standards for widths, lighting, buffers and other amenities. These streetscape enhancements are due for an upgrade and Mr. White stated he is expecting to move forward with these enhancements during this upcoming year.

Goal 5 requires coordination with regional entities to plan for future passenger and freight rail connections. The Intermodal Hub which was part of Farmersville's plan was moved to Wylie, which then removed the need for transit service in Farmersville.

Goal 6 is being accomplished to coordinate with regional entities to plan for future road and trail connections.

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The Citizen Advisory Committee adjourned at 8:04pm.

Consider for approval October 20, 2015 Meeting Minutes:

Kim Potter made a motion to approve the minutes as written; Kim Smith-Cole seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Consider for approval October 2015 Financial Statements:

Kim Potter made a motion to approve the financial statements as printed; Glenda Hart seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Shop Downtown Farmersville Website:

Donna Williams reported that she spoke with Marta Frey of the Collin Small Business Development Center about a website, and she recommended we use Wordpress to do the website for free. We will be able to link to the website from the city's and the chamber's websites. Kim Potter has developed the Clay Potter Auction website using this platform, and she is willing to conduct a how-to session for us. CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS ORDINANCE # O-2016-0112-002

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, ALTERING THE PRIMA FACIE SPEED LIMIT ESTABLISHED FOR VEHICLES UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF TRANSPORTATION CODE. SECTION 545.356 UPON AUDIE MURPHY PARKWAY (U.S. HIGHWAY 380) OR PARTS THEREOF, WITHIN THE INCORPORATED LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, AS SET OUT IN THIS ORDINANCE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 71, "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES," OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS BY DELETING SECTION 71-276, ENTITLED "AUDIE MURPHY PARKWAY (FORMERLY U.S. HIGHWAY 380)." IN ITS ENTIRETY AND ADOPTING A NEW SECTION 71-276. ALSO ENTITLED "AUDIE MURPHY PARKWAY (FORMERLY U.S. HIGHWAY 380)"; REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH: PROVIDING SEVERABILITY: PROVIDING FOR GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY: PROVIDING FOR INJUNCTIONS; PROVIDING A PENALTY OR FINE NOT TO EXCEED THE SUM OF TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) FOR EACH OFFENSE; AND PROVIDING AN **EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, Section 545.356 of the Texas Transportation Code, provides that whenever the governing body of the City shall determine upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that any prima facie speed therein set forth is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist at any intersection or other place or upon any part of a street or highway within the City, taking into consideration the width and condition of the pavement and other circumstances on such portion of said street or highway, as well as the usual traffic thereon, said governing body may determine and declare a reasonable and safe prima facie speed limit thereat or thereon by the passage of an ordinance, which shall be effective when appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected at such intersection or other place or part of the street or highway; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Department of Transportation ("TxDOT") has caused an engineering and traffic investigation (the "TxDOT Study") to be performed of the newly reconstructed sections of Audie Murphy Highway (U.S. Highway 380) and has provided information to the City of Farmersville regarding the maximum prima facie speed limit for such roadway section; and

WHEREAS, Upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation heretofore made as authorized by the provisions of Section 545.356, Texas Transportation Code, the City Council desires to modify and amend those previously adopted regulations appertaining to Audie Murphy Highway (U.S. Highway 380), as herein provided below, to better protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Farmersville and the motoring public; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas finds that all prerequisites to the adoption of this Ordinance have been met; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas finds that it is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare to modify and amend the previously

adopted regulations relating to the maximum prima facie speed limit on Audie Murphy Parkway (U.S. Highway 380) within the City of Farmersville;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. Findings Incorporated

All of the above premises are hereby found to be true and correct legislative and factual determinations of the City of Farmersville and they are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Ordinance as if copied in their entirety.

SECTION 2. Amendment of Chapter 71, "Traffic and Vehicles," by deleting Section 71.276, entitled "Audie Murphy Parkway (formerly U.S. Highway 380)," in its entirety and adopting a new Section 71-276, also entitled "Audie Murphy Parkway (formerly U.S. Highway) to read as follows:

From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, Chapter 71, Section 71.276, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Farmersville, Texas, entitled "Audie Murphy Parkway (formerly U.S. Highway 380)," is hereby deleted in its entirety and a new Section 71-276, also entitled "Audie Murphy Parkway (formerly U.S. Highway) is hereby adopted to read as follows:

"Sec. 71-276. - Audie Murphy Parkway (formerly U.S. Highway 380).

No motor vehicle shall be operated along and upon Audie Murphy Parkway in either an eastbound or westbound direction within the corporate city limits in excess of the speeds set forth in the following limits:

- (1) Beginning at County Road 607, thence continuing along Audie Murphy Parkway in an easterly direction, a maximum of 50 miles per hour;
- (2) Thence continuing along Audie Murphy Parkway in an easterly direction for a distance of approximately 2.15 miles, a maximum of 50 miles per hour."

SECTION 3. Speed limit signs to be posted.

The City Manager is hereby directed to cause to be erected, appropriate signs indicating such speed zones.

SECTION 4. Cumulative Repealer

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other Ordinances and shall not repeal any of the provisions of such Ordinances except for those instances where there are direct conflicts with the provisions of this Ordinance. Ordinances or parts thereof in force at the time this Ordinance shall take effect and that are inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are inconsistent with this Ordinance. Provided however, that any complaint, action, claim or lawsuit which has been initiated

shall continue to be governed by the provisions of such Ordinance and for that purpose the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. Savings

All rights and remedies of the City of Farmersville are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the provisions of any Ordinances which have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and, as to such accrued violations and all pending litigation, both civil and criminal, whether pending in court or not, under such Ordinances, same shall not be affected by this Ordinance but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the courts.

SECTION 6. Severability

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council of the City of Farmersville that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance should be declared unconstitutional by valid judgment or final decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without incorporation in this Ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION 7. Governmental Immunity

All of the regulations provided in this ordinance are hereby declared to be governmental and for the health, safety and welfare of the general public. Any member of the City Council or any City official or employee charged with the enforcement of this ordinance, acting for the City of Farmersville in the discharge of his/her duties, shall not thereby render himself/herself personally liable; and he/she is hereby relieved from all personal liability for any damage that might accrue to persons or property as a result of any act required or permitted in the discharge of his/her said duties.

SECTION 8. Injunctions

Any violation of this ordinance can be enjoined by a suit filed in the name of the City of Farmersville in a court of competent jurisdiction, and this remedy shall be in addition to any penal provision in this ordinance or in the Code of the City of Farmersville.

SECTION 9. Engrossment and Enrollment

The City Secretary of the City of Farmersville is hereby directed to engross and enroll this Ordinance by copying the exact Caption and the Effective Date clause in the minutes of the City Council of the City of Farmersville and by filing this Ordinance in the Ordinance records of the City.

SECTION 10. Penalty

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions or terms of this Ordinance or of the Code of Ordinances as amended hereby, shall be subject to the same penalty as provided for in the Code of Ordinances of the City of Farmersville, as previously amended, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense.

SECTION 11. Effective Date

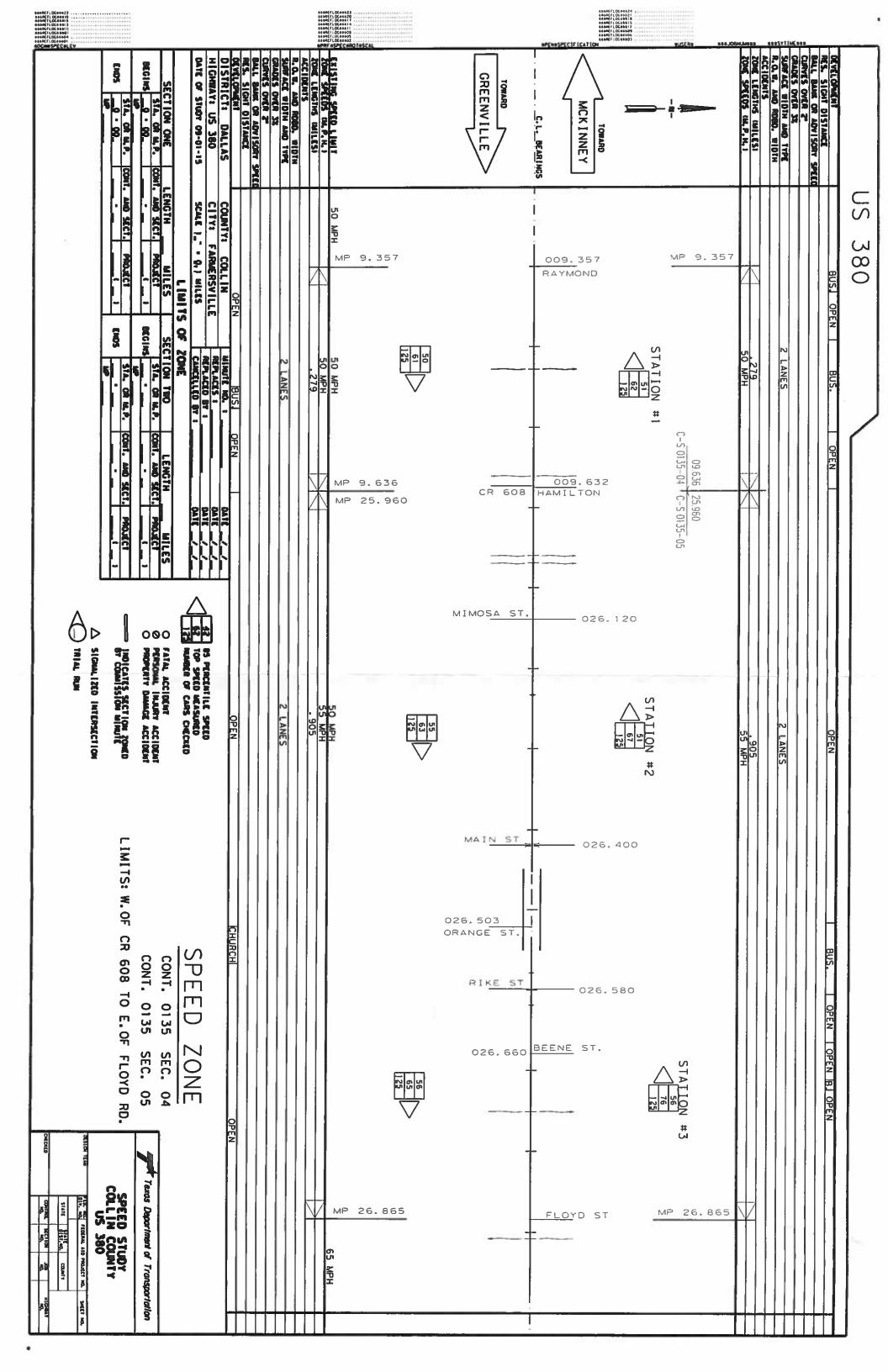

CITY OF FARMERSVILLE ORDINANCE 0-2016-0112-001

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, AS HERETOFORE AMENDED, THROUGH THE AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 56, "SIGNS AND ADVERTISING," BY THE AMENDMENT OF SECTION 56-31, ENTITLED "DEFINITIONS; SIGN REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS," BY DELETING THE EXISTING DEFINITION. REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS OF AN "OFF-PREMISES OR OFF-LOCATION SIGN" IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACING SAID DEFINITION, REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS WITH A NEW DEFINITION, REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR AN "OFF-PREMISES OR OFF-**LOCATION SIGN":** REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY; **FOR INJUNCTIONS: PROVIDING FOR** NOTICE PROVIDING AND IMPLEMENTATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City desires to promote growth and business opportunities in Farmersville; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas finds that all prerequisites to the adoption of this Ordinance have been met; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas finds that it is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare to amend the Sign Ordinance regarding off-premises or off-location signs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION OF FINDINGS

All of the above premises are hereby found to be true and correct legislative and factual determinations of the City of Farmersville and they are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Ordinance as if copied in their entirety.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 56, "SIGNS AND ADVERTISING," BY THE AMENDMENT OF SECTION 56-31, "DEFINITIONS; SIGN REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS"

From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, Section 56-31, entitled "Definitions; Sign Regulations and Requirements," is hereby amended by deleting the existing definition, regulations and requirements of an "Off-Premises or Off-Location Sign" in its entirety and replacing it with a new definition, regulations and requirements for an "Off-Premises or Off-Location Sign" to read as follows:

"Off-premises or off-location sign means a sign that advertises, promotes, or pertains to a business, person, organization, activity, event, place, service, product, etc., at a location other than where the business, person, organization, activity, event, place, service, product, etc., is located."

SECTION 3. CUMULATIVE REPEALER

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other Ordinances and shall not repeal any of the provisions of such Ordinances except for those instances where there are direct conflicts with the provisions of this Ordinance. Ordinances or parts thereof in force at the time this Ordinance shall take effect and that are inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are inconsistent with this Ordinance. Provided however, that any complaint, action, claim or lawsuit which has been initiated shall continue to be governed by the provisions of such Ordinance and for that purpose the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. SAVINGS

All rights and remedies of the City of Farmersville are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the provisions of any Ordinances which have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and, as to such accrued violations and all pending litigation, both civil and criminal, whether pending in court or not, under such Ordinances, same shall not be affected by this Ordinance but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the courts.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council of the City of Farmersville that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance should be declared unconstitutional by valid judgment or final decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without incorporation in this Ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION 6. GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY

All of the regulations provided in this ordinance are hereby declared to be governmental and for the health, safety and welfare of the general public. Any member of the City Council or any City official or employee charged with the enforcement of this ordinance, acting for the City of Farmersville in the discharge of his/her duties, shall not thereby render himself/herself personally liable; and he/she is hereby relieved from all personal liability for any damage that might accrue to persons or property as a result of any act required or permitted in the discharge of his/her said duties.

SECTION 7. INJUNCTIONS

Any violation of this ordinance can be enjoined by a suit filed in the name of the City of Farmersville in a court of competent jurisdiction, and this remedy shall be in addition to any penal provision in this ordinance or in the Code of the City of Farmersville.

SECTION 8. ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT

The City Secretary of the City of Farmersville is hereby directed to engross and enroll this Ordinance by copying the exact Caption and the Effective Date clause in the minutes of the City Council of the City of Farmersville and by filing this Ordinance in the Ordinance records of the City.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after it passage and publication of the caption as required by law.

PASSED on first reading on the 15th day of December, 2015, and the second reading on the 12th day of January, 2016, at properly scheduled meetings of the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas, there being a quorum present, and approved by the Mayor on the date set out below.

CITY OF PRINCETON

ORDINANCE NO. 2011-10-10-01

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PRINCETON CONFIRMING AND RATIFYING THE MAP RELATING TO THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CORPORATE CITY LIMITS; REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 2003-08-12-01; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Section 51.012 of the Texas Local Government Code allows a municipality to adopt an ordinance not inconsistent with state law that is necessary for the government, interest, welfare or good order of the municipality as a body politic; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the government, interest, welfare and good order of the City of Princeton to define the boundaries of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, Section 41.001 of the Texas Local Government Code mandates that a municipality shall prepare a map of the boundaries of a municipality and of its extraterritorial jurisdiction, which shall be kept in the office of the secretary of the municipality and the office of the municipal engineer; and

WHEREAS, Section 43.051 of the Texas Local Government Code provides that a municipality may annex area only in its ETJ unless the municipality owns the area; and

WHEREAS, Section 43.026 of the Texas Local Government Code provides the authority for the City to annex an area that it owns by an ordinance describing the metes and bounds; and

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2010, the boundary map for the City of Princeton was updated and published based upon annexations that occurred prior to that date; and

WHEREAS, subsequent annexations have occurred since the publication of the January 10, 2010 boundary map; and

WHEREAS, on or about January 12, 2010, a Quo Warranto suit styled *State of Texas ex. rel. Collin County, Texas v. City of Princeton*, Cause No. 366-00108-2010, was filed challenging whether the City of Princeton properly annexed a portion of F.M. Road 982 through Ordinance No. 104 adopted January of 1971 and ratified by and through Ordinance No. 2003-08-12-01, specifically challenging the tract identified as Tract No. 5, generally described as a strip of land being the right-of-way of F.M. 982 from the southern most city limits to the intersection with F.M. Road 546; and

WHEREAS, on June 30, 2011, the Court in the Quo Warranto action, Cause No. 366-00108-2010, issued a final judgment granting the State's Motion for Summary Judgment, and providing in pertinent part "that the City of Princeton's southern most corporate city limit extends to approximately 0.610 miles south of F.M. Road 982's intersection with U.S. Highway 380, and more specifically: beginning at said point (Station 0+00) being at the intersection with U.S. 380 in the City of Princeton, thence continuing along F.M. 982 in a Southerly direction for a distance of 0.610 MILE approximately, said point (Station 32+21) being Princeton South City Limits;" and

WHEREAS, based upon the Court's Final Judgment, the proposed boundary map reflects a southern most city limit along the right-of-way of F.M. Road 982 at a point 0.610 miles south of U.S. Highway 380; and

WHEREAS, numerous voluntary annexations have occurred, as reflected on the Annexation Boundary Map dated January 10, 2010, that remain unaffected by the Court's Final Judgment in Cause No. 366-00108-2010 as the annexations were based upon contiguity to city limits, other than the right-of-way along F.M. Road 982, were voluntary at

the request of the property owners and were properly annexed consistent with applicable law prior to the Court's Final Judgment; and

WHEREAS, upon review of the pleadings in Cause No. 366-00108-2010, no other annexation was challenged or judicially deemed to be affected by the Court's Final Judgment judicially disannexing Tract No. 5, the enumerated right-of-way along F.M.982; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed all of the annexation ordinances, the properties donated to and accepted by the City by Resolution and annexed into the City, in conjunction with the Department of Justice Inquiry 2011-1978 and ordinances reflected therein; and

WHEREAS, properties contiguous to the City limits and wholly unrelated to F.M. Road 982 include but are not limited to the following annexations: Ord No. 2007-12-11-03, Ord. No. 2008-11-10-01 (city owned property), Ord. No. 2008-11-10-02 (city owned property), Ord. No. 2009-05-05-01, and Ord. No. 2010-09-14; and

WHEREAS, properties contiguous to southern portions of the City limits, other than through adjacency to the judicially disannexed right-of-way along FM Road 982, include but are not limited to the following annexations: Ord. No. 2005-8-09-01, Ord. No. 2006-01-31, Ord. No. 2007-03-13, Ord. No. 2008-2-12-01, Ord. No. 2010-05-11, and Ord. No. 2010-11-16; and

WHEREAS, Annexation Ordinance No. 2008-10-01, was a voluntary annexation, contiguous to City owned property that had been donated and accepted by the City by and through Resolution No. 2008-08-12-R, prior to annexation of the entire tract, the City owned tract annexed by metes and bounds simultaneously with and as part of the remainder of the tract, and notwithstanding the judicial disannexation of F.M. Road 982, remains within the City's one-mile ETJ; and

WHEREAS, due to the Court's Final Judgment and judicial disannexation of the right-

of-way of F.M. Road 982, three voluntary annexations, each contiguous to City owned property that was donated after the lawful annexation and accepted by and through Resolution No. 2009-04-21-R and Resolution No. 2009-04-21-R-01, that at the time of annexation were within the City's ETJ, and that are currently judicially removed from the City's one-mile ETJ, which annexations ordinances include: Ord. No. 2007-09-25-02, Ord. No. 2007-09-25-03 and Ord. No. 2009-05-05; and

WHEREAS, The City's one-mile ETJ shall not be, and has not been expanded from the judicially created islands of city limits; and.

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that the map, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth herein, represents the boundaries of the City of Princeton; and

WHEREAS, the map attached hereto as Exhibit "A" substantially satisfies the requirements of § 41.001 of the Texas Local Government Code, that the City prepare a map that shows the boundaries of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, there has not been a final judicial determination challenging the boundaries of the City of Princeton as reflected in the map attached hereto as Exhibit "A";

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRINCETON, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the above recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and incorporated herein for all purposes.

Section 2. The map attached hereto as Exhibit "A" is the true and correct official map of the City of Princeton.

Section 3. The Mayor is authorized to acknowledge the veracity of the official map

which may thereafter be used for all official purposes.

Section 4. Ordinance, 2003-08-12-01, ratifying Tract 5 as reflected in Ordinance No.

104, is hereby repealed.

Section 5. The City Secretary is directed to file the official map in the office of the

City Secretary and forward a copy of same to the Clerk of Deed Records of Collin County, the

mapping department of Collin County, the Department of Justice and any other entity required

to receive notification of annexations.

Section 6. The City Engineer who has prepared the map, attached hereto as Exhibit A,

showing the official boundaries of the City of Princeton and of its extraterritorial jurisdiction,

shall keep a copy of the map in the office of the Engineer.

This Ordinance is approved during the open session of a regularly Section 7.

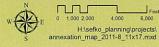


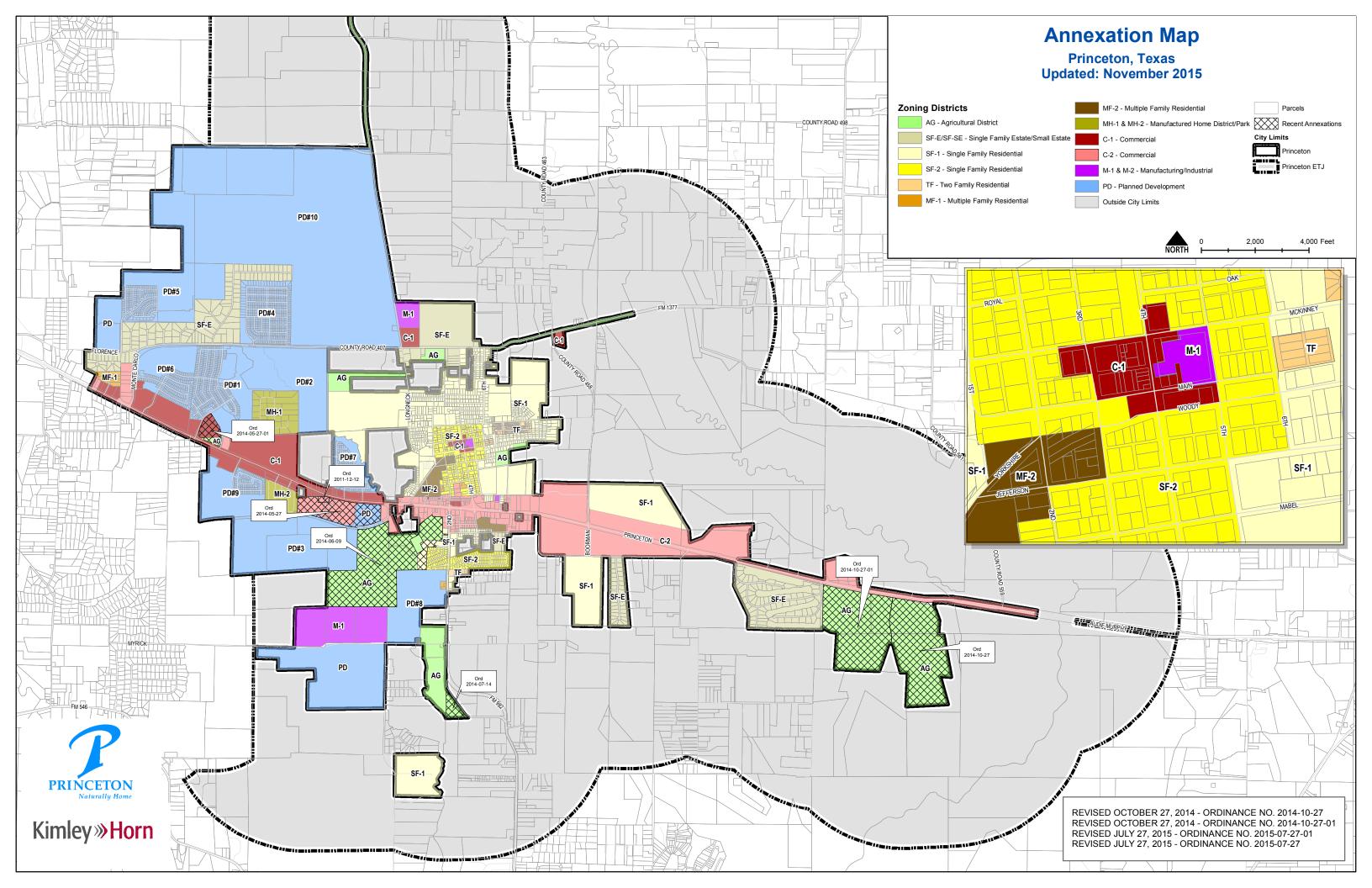
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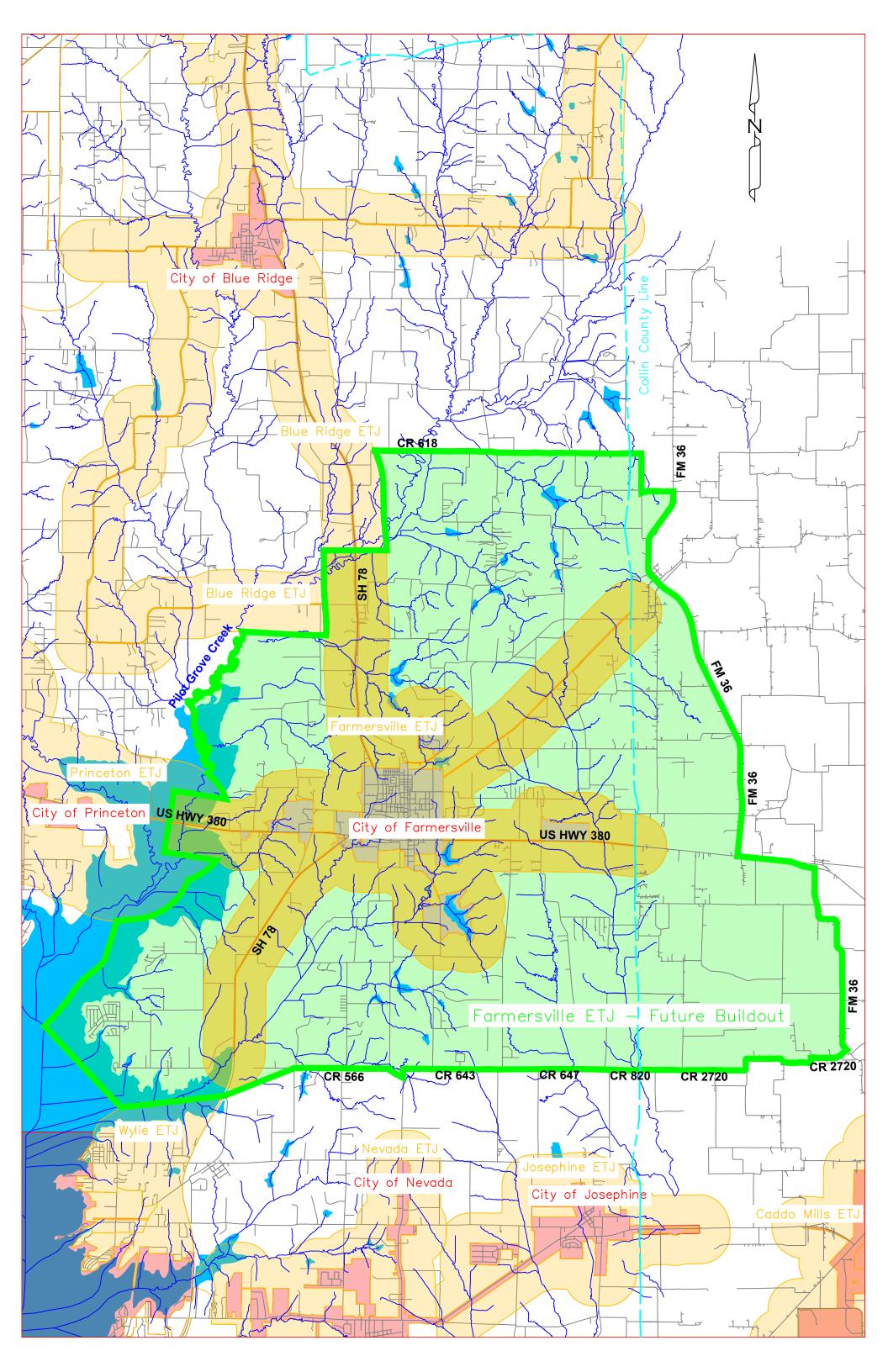




Annexation Boundary Map Princeton, Texas Date: September 2011

The territory is an area over which each Party has now or may obtain jurisdictional authority on their respective side of that line.
- 1.02 "Jurisdictional Authority" means a municipality's right or ability to regulate a or any condition or use within the territory whether it is within its corporate limits, extraterritorial jurisdiction, as defined by state law, or in an area where planning for future growth of Party has or may occur consistent with Exhibit "A."

Article 2: Boundary Delineation

- 2.01 Farmersville and Princeton hereby agree to the establishment of the Boundary Line, as depicted on Exhibit "A" and it shall be the dividing line between the two cities for purpose of establishing jurisdictional authority.
- 2.02 Farmersville shall, to the extent permitted by law, have jurisdictional authority over the area south of the Boundary Line and does hereby expressly abandon and relinquish jurisdictional authority, if any, to the north of the Boundary Line, and further agrees it shall not extend its jurisdictional authority to the north of the Boundary Line at any time in the future.
- 2.03 Princeton shall, to the extent permitted by law, have jurisdictional authority over the area north of the Boundary Line and does hereby expressly abandon and relinquish jurisdictional authority, if any, to the south of the Boundary Line, and further agrees it shall not extend its jurisdictional authority to the south of the Boundary Line at any time in the future.

2.04 The Parties agree to declare the area over which each party has or will have jurisdictional authority with respect to that Boundary Line.

Article 3: Miscellaneous

- 3.01 *Applicable Texas Law.* This Agreement shall be governed by, construed and enforced under the laws of the State of Texas.
- 3.02 *Performance*. The obligations and undertakings of each of the Parties to this Agreement shall be performed in Collin County, Texas. The Parties agree the exclusive venue for any action shall be in Collin County, Texas.
- 3.03 *Entire Agreement*. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of Farmersville and Princeton with respect to the subject matter of the Agreement. No agreement, statement, or promise made by any party or to any employee, agent, or officer of any party this is not contained in this Agreement shall be valid, binding, or of any force or effect. Any amendments to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by the Party or Parties to be charged.
- 3.04 *Successors and Assigns*. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors, heirs, representative and assigns.
- 3.05 Agreement Drafted Equally. This Agreement shall be deemed drafted equally by the Parties. The language of all parts of this Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to its fair meaning, and any presumption or principle that the language herein is to be construed against either Party shall not apply.
- 3.06 Severability. Should any provision of this Agreement be declared void by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 3.07 Attorney's Fees. In the event of any suit or other adjudication between the Parties to enforce any claim arising out of this Agreement, or to interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitles to recover its fees, damages, costs, attorney's fees, and such other and further relief from the non-prevailing Party, general or special, at law or in equity, to which the prevailing Party may show itself justly entitled as provided by Texas Local Government Code § 271.159.
- 3.08 *Covenant of Authority*. The respective signatories to this Agreement covenant that they are fully authorized to sign this Agreement on behalf of their respective Parties.
- 3.09 *Effective Date*. Subject to Section 3.02, the effective date of this Agreement shall be the latter of dates as signed by each Mayor after a properly held City Council meeting where a majority of the governing bodies voted aye.

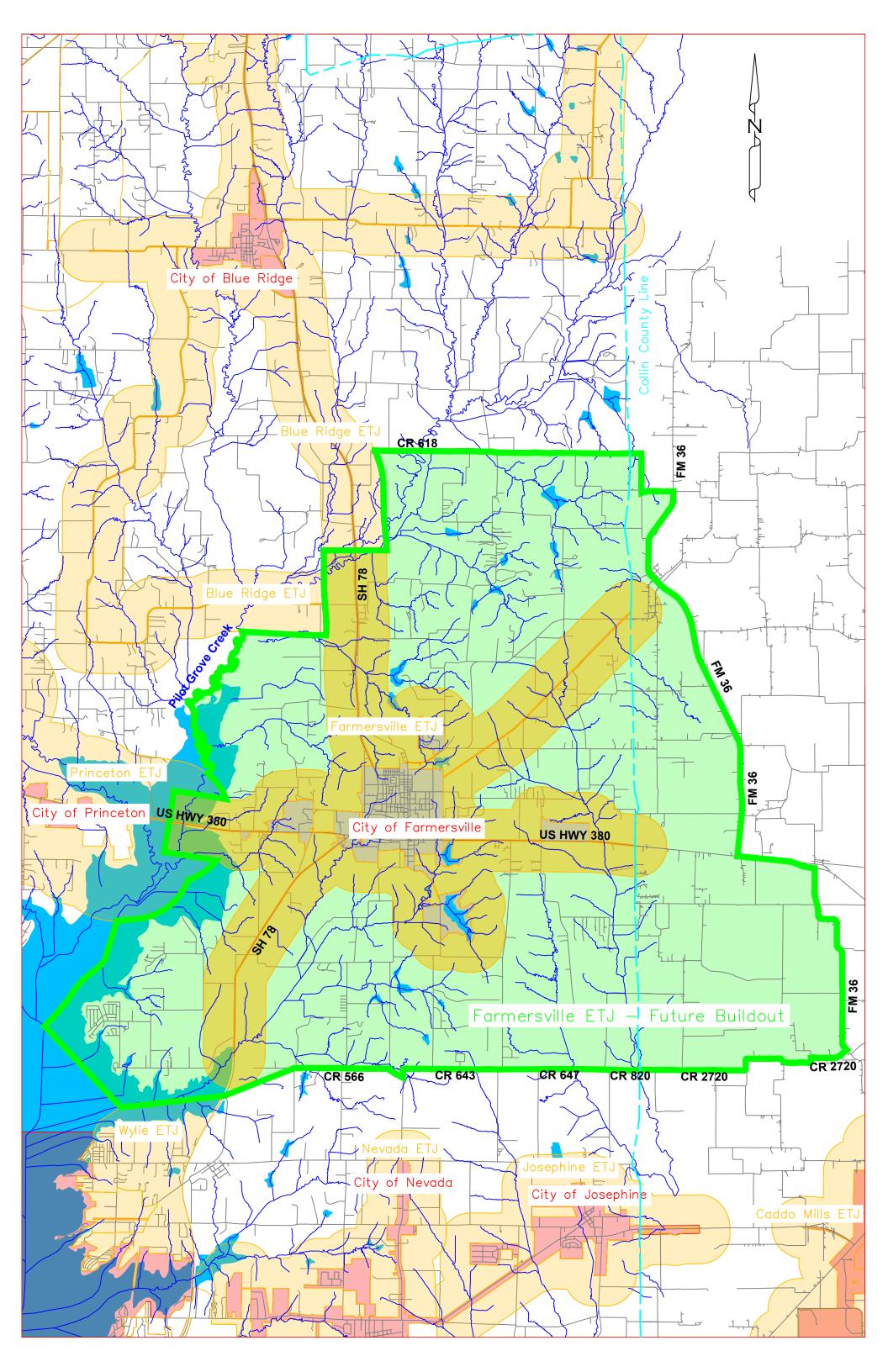

- 3.08 *Covenant of Authority*. The respective signatories to this Agreement covenant that they are fully authorized to sign this Agreement on behalf of their respective Parties.
- 3.09 Effective Date. Subject to Section 3.02, the effective date of this Agreement shall be the latter of dates as signed by each Mayor after a properly held City Council meeting where a majority of the governing bodies voted aye.
