#### CITY OF FARMERSVILLE ORDINANCE # O-2016-0510-001

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES. CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, AS HERETOFORE AMENDED, THROUGH THE AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 74, "UTILITIES," BY AMENDING ARTICLE II - "WATER, SEWER AND ELECTRICAL CHARGES," BY DELETING SECTION 74-95, "AVERAGE PAYMENT PLAN," IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACING SAID SECTION WITH A NEW SECTION 74-95 THAT IS ENTITLED "AVERAGE BILLING AND PAYMENT PLAN FOR CITY UTILITIES"; REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY: PROVIDING FOR GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY: PROVIDING FOR INJUNCTIONS; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; PROVIDING FOR ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT; PROVIDING A PENALTY OR FINE NOT TO EXCEED THE SUM OF FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00) FOR EACH OFFENSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas ("City Council"), pursuant to Texas Local Government Code, Sections 51.001 and 51.012, is authorized to adopt an ordinance, not inconsistent with state law, that is for the good government, interest, welfare, peace, or order of the City of Farmersville ("City"), and that is necessary or proper for carrying out a power granted by law to the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that amending Chapter 74, "Utilities," by amending Article II – "Water, Sewer and Electrical Charges," by deleting Section 74-95, "Average Payment Plan," in its entirety and replacing said section with a new Section 74-95 that is entitled "Average Billing and Payment Plan for City Utilities" is in the best interest and public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Farmersville, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, THAT:

#### <u>SECTION 1</u>. INCORPORATION OF FINDINGS

The findings set forth above are found to be true and correct legislative and factual determinations of the City of Farmersville and are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Ordinance and made a part hereof for all purposes as if fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2. AMENDING CHAPTER 74, "UTILITIES," BY AMENDING ARTICLE II —
"WATER, SEWER AND ELECTRICAL CHARGES," BY DELETING
SECTION 74-95, "AVERAGE PAYMENT PLAN," IN ITS ENTIRETY AND
REPLACING SAID SECTION WITH A NEW SECTION 74-95 THAT IS
ENTITLED "AVERAGE BILLING AND PAYMENT PLAN FOR CITY
UTILITIES"

From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, Chapter 74, "Utilities," by amending Article II – "Water, Sewer and Electrical Charges," by deleting Section 74-95, "Average Payment Plan," in its entirety and replacing said section with a new Section 74-95 that is entitled "Average Billing and Payment Plan for City Utilities" to read as follows:

"Sec. 74-95. - Average Billing and Payment Plan for City Utilities.

- Farmersville's Average Billing and Payment Plan for City Utilities ("Program") is available to qualifying residential customers who desire to avoid monthly fluctuations in their utility billings due to seasonal changes; and, who desire to pay the average cost of their annual usage of utilities over a one-year period in 12 equal monthly payments.
- 2. To participate in the Program, all of the following conditions shall be met:
  - a. The Program is available to residential customers for residential consumption only.
  - b. Residential customers shall submit an application to be considered for participation in the Program.
  - c. Residential customers must have at least twelve months of billing history on their residential account to participate in the Program.
  - c. Current account balance(s) must be zero.
  - d. No more than two delinquent payments may have occurred during the previous 12 month period.
  - e. No cut-off notices may have been issued during the previous 12 month period.
  - f. Residential customers who have not previously had their deposits for City utilities released and all new residential customers shall be required to maintain utility deposits with the City, in such amounts as determined to be sufficient by the City, at all times during their participation in the Program.
- 3. The average monthly billing and payment shall be determined by averaging the total cost of all utilities

used by the residential customer during the most recent 12 months of billing history up to and including the date of application. This calculation establishes the amount of the average fixed billing statement ("Program Billing Statement") that will be issued to the residential customer for 12 months (the "Program Period").

- 4. The calculation described in the immediately preceding paragraph shall be repeated at the end of each Program Period for each residential customer participating in the Program and the Program Billing Statement attributed to the residential customer shall be adjusted up or down to reflect the residential customer's actual usage during the immediately preceding Program Period.
- 5. If a residential customer participating in the Program uses more or less utility services than reflected in the Program Billing Statement during the Program Period, the residential customer shall not be obligated to pay the amount of any underpayment or entitled to reimbursement of any overpayment at the end of the then current Program Period.
- At the end of each Program Period, the amount of any residential customer overpayment or underpayment in an expiring Program Period shall be applied to the calculation of the Program Billing Statement for that residential customer for the following Program Period.
- 7. The City of Farmersville shall monitor the balances in each residential customer's account as the Program Period progresses. Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph 5, above, the City Manager or designee shall have the authority to request customer payment, administer customer refunds, and/or change the average billing and payment amount in cases where the Program Billing Statement was incorrectly calculated and/or if correctly calculated the customer reserve account balance is improperly funded due to some spike in utility usage by the residential customer.
- 8. Terms of the Program require that all payments shall be made on time. If payments are not received on or before the due date, the residential customer's

participation in the Program shall be subject to termination. If a residential customer's participation in the Program is terminated by the City, the residential customer shall immediately return to an actual usage billing and payment basis for all utilities. residential customer's utility meters will be read at or about the time of such termination. The residential customer shall be billed for the difference between the actual amount of utilities used during that portion of the Program Period successfully completed and the estimated average utility usage under the Program for which the residential customer was billed prior to termination to the extent that such actual usage exceeds the Program's estimated average usage of City utilities for which the residential customer paid during that portion of the Program period successfully completed. Any amount of underpayment shall be immediately due and payable and billed to the residential customer during the residential customer's next billing cycle.

- 9. If a residential customer voluntarily ends their participation in the Program or closes one or more of their utility accounts with the City, the residential customer's utility meters will be promptly read and the residential customer shall be billed for the difference between the actual amount of utilities used during that portion of the Program Period successfully completed and the estimated average utility usage under the Program for which the residential customer was billed prior to termination or closure to the extent that such actual usage exceeds the Program's estimated average usage of City utilities for which the residential customer paid during that portion of the Program period successfully completed. Any amount of underpayment shall be immediately due and payable by the residential customer upon receipt of the City's billing statement.
- 10. The Program shall automatically renew as to any residential customer participating in the Program unless the residential customer requests removal from the Program at least thirty (30) days prior to the conclusion of the then current Program Period.

- 11. The Program shall cover and include billing and payments for ALL of the following utilities:
  - a. Electric;
  - b. Water:
  - c. Sewer; and
  - d. Refuse.
- 12. Special one-time fees shall not be included in the Program and shall be paid by the residential user in addition to the Program Billing Statement.
- 13. Program balances are not transferrable between residential customer accounts.

#### **SECTION 3. CUMULATIVE REPEALER**

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other Ordinances and shall not repeal any of the provisions of such Ordinances except for those instances where there are direct conflicts with the provisions of this Ordinance. Ordinances or parts thereof in force at the time this Ordinance shall take effect and that are inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are inconsistent with this Ordinance. Provided however, that any complaint, action, claim or lawsuit which has been initiated shall continue to be governed by the provisions of such Ordinance and for that purpose the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **SECTION 4. SAVINGS**

All rights and remedies of the City of Farmersville are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the provisions of any Ordinances which have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and, as to such accrued violations and all pending litigation, both civil and criminal, whether pending in court or not, under such Ordinances, same shall not be affected by this Ordinance but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the courts.

#### **SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY**

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council of the City of Farmersville that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance should be declared unconstitutional by valid judgment or final decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this Ordinance, since the same

would have been enacted by the City Council without incorporation in this Ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

#### **SECTION 6. GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY**

All of the regulations provided in this ordinance are hereby declared to be governmental and for the health, safety and welfare of the general public. Any member of the City Council or any City official or employee charged with the enforcement of this ordinance, acting for the City of Farmersville in the discharge of his/her duties, shall not thereby render himself/herself personally liable; and he/she is hereby relieved from all personal liability for any damage that might accrue to persons or property as a result of any act required or permitted in the discharge of his/her said duties.

#### **SECTION 7. INJUNCTIONS**

Any violation of this ordinance can be enjoined by a suit filed in the name of the City of Farmersville in a court of competent jurisdiction, and this remedy shall be in addition to any penal provision in this ordinance or in the Code of the City of Farmersville.

#### **SECTION 8: PUBLICATION**

The City Secretary is hereby directed to publish in the Official Newspaper of the City of Farmersville the Caption, Penalty, and Effective Date Clause of this Ordinance as required by Section 52.011 of the Local Government Code.

#### <u>SECTION 9. ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT</u>

The City Secretary of the City of Farmersville is hereby directed to engross and enroll this Ordinance by copying the exact Caption and the Effective Date clause in the minutes of the City Council of the City of Farmersville and by filing this Ordinance in the Ordinance records of the City.

#### The Lavon Lake Watershed

Lavon Lake is the uppermost reservoir on the East Fork of the Trinity River and provides drinking water to over 1.6 million residents in North Texas. The 491,520-acre watershed which drains to Lavon Lake includes parts of Collin, Grayson, Fannin, and Hunt Counties (Fig. 1). While undeveloped or agricultural land encompasses most of the watershed, North Texas is one of the fastest growing regions in the nation. In total, there are 29 incorporated communities in the Lavon Lake watershed (Fig. 2). Most of the urban development found in the watershed is concentrated around Wilson Creek and lowermost portion of the East Fork of the Trinity River. However, projected population growth is expected to result in further expansion of urbanized areas in the Lavon Lake watershed.

#### The need for a Watershed Protection Plan

Wilson Creek and the East Fork of the Trinity River above Lake Lavon were identified on the state's most recent list of impaired waters (2014) due to elevated levels of bacteria. This list, known as the Texas Integrated Report 303(d) list, is compiled every two years using the most recent 7 years of water quality sampling data collected through the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Clean Rivers Program.

Data used for the 2014 Integrated Report were taken during the 7-year period between December 2005 and November 2012. The geometric mean of these data for *E. coli* bacteria was 164 colony forming units per 100 milliliters (cfu/100 mL) for Wilson Creek and 151 cfu/100 mL for the Lower East Fork of the Trinity River above Lavon Lake, which exceeds the state standard of 126 cfu/100 mL.

Under the Clean Water Act, states must not only assess water quality but take action to restore and maintain the chemical, physical, and biological characteristics of our nation's waters. The two major avenues by which Texas addresses water quality impairments are Total Maximum Daily Load calculations (TMDLs) and Watershed Protection Plans (WPPs).

TMDLs calculate the maximum amount of pollutant a waterbody can receive and still meet water quality standards, and allocate that load among the various sources present in a watershed. A TMDL focuses on a single pollutant and can have regulatory implications for permitted dischargers in the watershed. Through this process each point-source discharger is allocated a pollutant load (total amount allowed over a given time). The second component of a TMDL is the Implementation-Plan, which identifies the corrective action(s) and/or management measures which must occur to restore water quality.

In contrast, a WPP is a locally led, voluntary approach to addressing water quality that can serve as an alternative to TMDLs. WPPs are comprehensive plans that address not only the pollutant causing the impairment, but all potential pollutants in a watershed. Recommendations contained in a WPP are voluntary and are developed through a partnership with stakeholders who live and work in the watershed. These plans are often the best approach in watersheds where nonpoint source pollution is a significant concern.

Lavon Lake was selected for WPP development due to its identification on the 2014 303(d) list as impaired for *E. coli* bacteria and because of growing concerns about nutrient concentrations. Furthermore, Lavon Lake is predominantly a rural watershed, making a voluntary watershed protection plan approach the course of action best suited to address water quality issues. Upon completion of this project, stakeholders will have a guide outlining actions and management measures that when implemented have the best chance of restoring and protecting water quality in Lavon Lake and its tributaries. Additionally, upon EPA acceptance the WPP becomes eligible for federal funding through the state's 319(h) nonpoint source program, and has a greater potential to obtain funding from other outside sources.

#### Developing a Watershed Protection Plan for Lake Lavon

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) is responsible for administering Texas' soil and water conservation law and works closely with the TCEQ to fulfill our state's water quality management responsibilities under federal law. As part of that responsibility, TSSWCB administers a watershed protection planning program. Through this program, the TSSWCB has partnered with the North Texas Municipal Water District and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service to develop a Watershed Protection Plan for Lavon Lake.

This project will coordinate development of a voluntary, stakeholder-driven watershed protection plan for Lake Lavon through two major phases.

#### Phase 1

The initial phase of this project will provide critical supporting data and information necessary for development of a stakeholder-driven watershed protection plan for Lavon Lake. Collecting this information preemptively will allow the data to be analyzed and prepared for delivery to the public in an organized and efficient manner. Data collected will primarily include land use and land cover, and in-stream water quality monitoring. Combined with existing data sources, this information will provide better understanding of how the watershed behaves under different conditions. Characterizing the watershed in this way is crucial to development of an effective management strategy.

#### Phase 2

The final phase will facilitate the stakeholder-driven plan development process. Through a series of public meetings, stakeholders will be presented with data and information collected during Phase 1. Feedback from the general public will be used to refine and finalize essential data components and to prepare the final WPP, with special emphasis on a plan for implementation. By maximizing and sustaining stakeholder involvement throughout this process a comprehensive WPP that addresses all potential sources of pollution will be developed.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FARMERSVILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION RECOMMENDING APPROVAL OF A PROJECT TO STUDY THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS, AND OBTAIN RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING POSSIBLE ADDITIONS AND REVISIONS NECESSARY TO PROMOTE AND IMPLEMENT THE LAND USES IDENTIFIED IN THE CITY'S RECENTLY UPDATED AND ADOPTED COMPREHENSIVE PLAN.

WHEREAS, the Farmersville Economic Development Corporation (hereinafter referred to as the "FEDC") is a Type A economic development corporation, created pursuant to Chapter 504 of the Texas Local Government Code, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of FEDC met in a special meeting at the City Council Chambers, City Hall, 205 S. Main Street, in Farmersville, Texas, on April 28, 2016, at 6:00 p.m.; and

WHEREAS, the FEDC supported, promoted and paid for a rewrite of the Comprehensive Plan of the City of Farmersville, Texas, ("Comprehensive Plan") following a determination by the FEDC that the expenditure of funds for updating the Comprehensive Plan by the FEDC constituted a project for the creation or retention of primary jobs and was required or suitable for the development, retention or expansion of the following types of facilities identified in Texas Local Government Code Section 501.101(2), Subparagraphs:

- (A) manufacturing and industrial facilities;
- (B) research and development facilities;
- (C) recycling facilities;
- (D) distribution centers;
- (E) small warehouse facilities capable of serving as decentralized storage and distribution centers;
- (F) primary job training facilities for use by institutions of higher education; or
- (G) regional or national corporate headquarters facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Comprehensive Plan identifies the need to align the City's zoning and subdivision ordinances with desired development patterns to ensure

that zoning requirements promote (rather than prohibit) desired land uses as shown on the conceptual land use map of the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, a group of interested citizens have approached the FEDC and requested that the FEDC complete the processes initiated by and through the adoption of a new Comprehensive Plan by having a study performed of the City's Zoning Ordinance and obtaining recommendations regarding possible additions and revisions to the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmersville, Texas, necessary to promote and implement the land uses identified in the City's recently updated and adopted Comprehensive Plan that will spur economic development for the City and relate directly to the creation or retention of primary jobs as measured by Section 501.101 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, FEDC desires to support this proposal by funding a study of the City's Zoning Ordinance and obtaining recommendations regarding possible additions and revisions to the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmersville, Texas, necessary to promote and implement the land uses identified in the City's recently updated and adopted Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the FEDC's Board of Directors has determined that a study of the City's Zoning Ordinance and obtaining recommendations regarding possible additions and revisions to the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmersville, Texas, necessary to promote and implement the land uses identified in the City's recently updated and adopted Comprehensive Plan meets the definition of "project" as that term is defined in Section 501.101 of the Texas Local Government Code in that it is related to the creation or retention of primary jobs and is required or suitable for the development, retention or expansion of the following types of facilities identified in Texas Local Government Code Section 501.101(2), Subparagraphs:

- (A) manufacturing and industrial facilities;
- (B) research and development facilities;
- (C) recycling facilities;
- (D) distribution centers;
- (E) small warehouse facilities capable of serving as decentralized storage and distribution centers;
- (F) primary job training facilities for use by institutions of higher education; or
- (G) regional or national corporate headquarters facilities."

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FARMERSVILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION THAT:

<u>Section 1</u>. The foregoing recitals are hereby found to be true and correct and are fully incorporated into the body of this Resolution.

Section 2. The Board of Directors of the Farmersville Economic Development Corporation hereby recommends to the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas ("City Council"), that the City Council approve the project identified herein to perform a study of the City's Zoning Ordinance and obtain recommendations regarding possible additions and revisions to the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmersville, Texas, necessary to promote and implement the land uses identified in the City's recently updated and adopted Comprehensive Plan.

Section 3. The Board of Directors of the Farmersville Economic Development Corporation hereby finds and determines that the study of the City's Zoning Ordinance is a permissible "project" authorized by Section 501.101 of the Texas Local Government Code, as amended. Further, the expenditure is for the creation or retention of primary jobs required or suitable for the development, retention, or expansion of manufacturing and industrial facilities; research and development facilities; distribution centers; small warehouse facilities capable of serving as decentralized storage and distribution centers; primary job training facilities for use by institutions of higher education; or regional or national corporate headquarters facilities.

<u>Section 4</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately from and after the date of passage and is so resolved.

Bids were received for the above referenced project at 10:00 A.M. on 07 April 2016. The project includes the construction of approximately 12,875 LF of 8" Force Main, a Lift Station and approximately 4,445 LF of 8" Gravity sewer main along the north side of US 380 from Floyd Street to Brushy Creek.

Ten (10) bids were received for this project. The lowest bid was submitted by Morton Construction Company of Jacksonville, Texas in the amount of \$893,500.50. A bid bond in the amount of 5% was submitted. Five addendums were issued and acknowledged for this project.

City staff has decided to remove the proposed lift station from this project and combine it with a new lift station at Floyd Street for a future project at a later date. Items 15, 17 & 18 shall be removed from this project by Change Order #1 with the concurrence of the contractor. The revised project cost shall be \$578,560.50

Morton Construction Company has successfully completed several projects for the City of Farmersville. We find them to be a competent contractor with the equipment, experience and financial stability to successfully complete this project.

We recommend that the City Council award the contract to Morton Construction Company. A notice of award has been included along with Change Order #1.

Dear Leaca Caspari,

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) currently administers the State's 9-1-1 Program for your city/county, as directed by legislation enacted in 1987. NCTCOG is recognized nationally as a leader in the provision of 9-1-1 services. They have more than met the legislative charge of providing emergency dispatch centers with the latest and best available equipment and technology; and assuring that this equipment and technology is operating or backed up on a 24 hour/365 day basis. Additionally, they have actively assisted with the training and certification of dispatch center personnel.

I am writing this letter to you on behalf of the NCTCOG 9-1-1 Regional Advisory Committee, which is made up of elected and appointed officials from the entities which are served by the NCTCOG 9-1-1 program. We believe there is a positive opportunity for the participants in the NCTCOG program to have a real and larger impact on policy and fiscal matters than is now available through the state administrative program.

In the most recent legislative session, the Health and Safety Code was amended by SB 1108/HB 3462 to permit Councils of Governments/Regional Planning Commissions to establish Regional Emergency Communications Districts (ECD). We see a lot of potential advantages and opportunities that would be to our benefit by creating an ECD. I will attempt to lay out our reasoning in the following paragraphs.

Currently, our citizens and businesses are charged 50 cents on their phone bills to pay for 9-1-1 services. This money is remitted to and held by the state until the legislature appropriates all or part of the funds collected to the Texas Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC). CSEC then allocates these funds to councils of governments. The problem is that the Legislature does not always appropriate all of the funds collected, but rather retains some of the funds to show (on paper) a balanced state budget. Currently, the state is holding over \$150 million. Over 15% of this amount has been collected from our Region.

If we were to create an ECD, the monies collected through the maximum 50 cent fee would be remitted in their entirety to this district. The major benefit from this, aside from all the funds collected in our region coming back to it, is that a long-range strategic plan could be adopted outlining future capital improvements and replacements for our dispatch centers based on a known and reliable stream of revenue. Under the present situation, we have no certainty of the amount of funding that the region will receive during any given biennium. This results in a lot of inefficiencies because long-term planning for capital equipment is difficult to do.

The other major benefit to be realized from having our own district is one of local control. Policy and budgetary matters would be decided by a Board of Directors consisting of local elected officials from entities served by NCTCOG's 9-1-1 Program. An initial ECD Board of Directors consisting of a representative from participating entities would meet to determine the size of the permanent Board, and the qualifications of its members At least two-thirds of the initial Board members must be elected officials.

The new law specifies that councils of governments, NCTCOG in our case, will continue as staff to the district. This assures that there will be no disruption to the current services provided to our citizens and businesses through the already existing dispatch centers.

The new law requires that the governing body of each entity now served by a councils of governments pass a resolution calling for the creation of an ECD. Many of our entities have already indicated an interest in doing so. Thus, the Regional Advisory Council is now reaching out to everyone to see if there is a broader interest in creating a district. Please use the enclosed form to let us know of your preference and/or if you would like to have a meeting to learn more about this matter and to get any questions answered. Also enclosed is a sample resolution, which can be used if you are ready to support the creation of an EDS. The final enclosure is a membership list for the Regional Advisory Committee. #### CITY OF FARMERSVILLE RESOLUTION # R-2016-0510-001

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE CREATION OF THE NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS REGIONAL 9-1-1 EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS DISTRICT

WHEREAS, Chapter 772, Subchapter H, of the Texas Health and Safety Code, entitled as the Regional Emergency Communications District Act (the "Act"), provides for the creation of a Regional Emergency Communications District; and

WHEREAS, the Act applies to a state planning region established under Chapter 391 of the Texas Local Government Code with a population of under 1.5 million, composed of counties and municipalities that operate a 9-1-1 system solely through a regional planning commission; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the governing bodies of each participating county and municipality in the region adopt a resolution approving the creation of the Regional Emergency Communications District (the "District"); and

WHEREAS, the District's creation is effective on the date the last resolution is adopted by a participating county or municipality; and

WHEREAS, the City of Farmersville is situated within the state planning region established under Chapter 391 of the Texas Local Government Code under the regional planning commission identified as the North Central Texas Council of Governments; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of City of Farmersville, Texas finds it is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Farmersville, Texas that a Regional Emergency Communications District should be established to serve the citizens of the City of Farmersville, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS THAT:

<u>Section 1:</u> All of the above premises are found to be true and correct factual and legislative determinations of the City of Farmersville and are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Resolution as if copied in their entirety.

Section 2: The City Council of the City of Farmersville hereby approves the creation of the North Central Texas Regional 9-1-1 Emergency Communications District.

#### CITY OF FARMERSVILLE RESOLUTION # R-2016-0510-002

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, OBJECTING TO AND OPPOSING THE PLANNING. CONVERSION, CONSTRUCTION AND DESIGNATION OF U.S. HIGHWAY 380 A/K/A AUDIE MURPHY PARKWAY AND STATE HIGHWAY 78 AS LIMITED ROADWAYS AND **FURTHER** REQUESTING THAT COMMISSIONERS COURT OF COLLIN COUNTY RECONSIDER AND RESCIND COURT ORDER NO. 2016-089-02-01, WHICH ORDER SEEKS THE SUPPORT OF THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION COUNCIL AND THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO MAKE THOSE PORTIONS OF U.S. HIGHWAY 380 AND STATE HIGHWAY 78 LOCATED WITHIN AND ABOUT THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE INTO LIMITED ACCESS ROADWAYS.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas ("City Council") recently learned about Court Order No. 2016-089-02-01 adopted by the Commissioners Court of Collin County, Texas ("Commissioners Court") on February 1, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court through its adoption of Court Order No. 2016-089-02-01 seeks to make those portions of U.S. Highway 380 a/k/a Audie Murphy Parkway ("US 380") and State Highway 78 ("SH 78") located within Collin County into limited access roadways; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, the residents and stakeholders having an interest in the areas adjacent to and surrounding US 380 and SH 78 within and about City of Farmersville, Texas were not consulted regarding the decision of the Commissioners Court to make those portions of US 380 and SH 78 located within and about Farmersville into limited access roadways; and

WHEREAS, the City Council understands that limited access roadways are necessary to improve mobility in, about and through Collin County; however, significant study and due process need to be observed through the participation of persons and communities most impacted by the location of such limited access roadways being invited and encouraged to participate in the process to find the best route; and

WHEREAS, the City Council understands the need for improved mobility throughout Collin County, but believes converting those portions of US 380 and SH 78 located within and about Farmersville into limited access roadways is the wrong approach to improving mobility in the wrong location and bears too high an economic cost without a corresponding benefit to the public; and

WHEREAS, the City Council also understands that making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 located within Collin County into limited access roadways has not been

embraced by the governing bodies of all of the cities and adjoining counties through which parts of US 380 and SH 78 pass; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the potentially positive and negative aspects of making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways and finds the negative attributes of such a change far outweigh any positive attributes hoped for by the Commissioners Court; and

WHEREAS, US 380 and SH 78, which highways currently intersect within the corporate limits of the City of Farmersville, geographically divide the City into quadrants around such intersection and further bisect the City along the axis of each such highway; and

WHEREAS, US 380 and SH 78 are currently readily accessible to and easily traveled and crossed by residents, business owners and operators, visitors, travelers and pedestrians at numerous roadway crossings along and about the length of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that making limited access roadways of those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within the City of Farmersville will totally divide and fragment the City of Farmersville into four distinct quadrants immediately adjacent to their intersection and totally bisect the City along the axis of each such highway because the existing accessibility to, upon, over and across US 380 and SH 78 within the City of Farmersville will be entirely eliminated when the walls and barriers required to make those portions of US 380 and SH 78 into limited access roadways are constructed; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways will also negatively impact the businesses situated along both sides of US 380 and SH 78 through the anticipated taking of a portion of their property to make US 380 and SH 78 into limited access roadways, which acquisition may also render any number of parcels of land or lots on which businesses and their respective structures, signs and parking areas are situated nonconforming and subject to closure or otherwise make it impossible for a number of businesses to continue operating within the City of Farmersville; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways will also negatively impact the ability of residents and the customers of businesses to continue to frequent the businesses situated along both sides of US 380 and SH 78 because of the walls and barriers that must be constructed to make those highways into limited access roadways; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways will also

negatively impact the residents and other owners of property situated along US 380 and SH 78 through the taking of a portion of their property to make US 380 and SH 78 limited access roadways as well as the disruptions arising out of any required construction and the interruption and interference with the usual traffic and travel patterns of such residents caused by the walls and barriers established with a limited access roadways; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways: will, at a minimum interrupt, delay and change anticipated development; may interfere with and limit the City's ability to provide necessary municipal services; may interfere with the City's ability to provide emergency services; may possibly eliminate the planned expansion of a new Collin College campus into the City of Farmersville that will serve the residents in the eastern portion of Collin County; and will be injurious to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Farmersville, Texas; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmersville, Texas voted unanimously to object to and oppose making those portions of U.S. Highway 380 a/k/a Audie Murphy Parkway and State Highway 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS THAT:

<u>Section 1:</u> All of the above premises are found to be true and correct factual and legislative determinations of the City of Farmersville and are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Resolution as if copied in their entirety.

Section 2: The City of Farmersville is opposed to and objects to planning, designing, converting, constructing, designating and making those portions of U.S. Highway 380 a/k/a Audie Murphy Parkway and State Highway 78 located within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways.

<u>Section 3:</u> The City of Farmersville respectfully requests that the Commissioners Court of Collin County reconsider and rescind Court Order No. 2016-089-02-01, which Order seeks the support of the Regional Transportation Council and the Texas Department of Transportation to make those portions of U.S. 380 and SH 78 located within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways.

Section 4: The City of Farmersville respectfully requests that the Commissioners Court of Collin County, after consultation with the residents of the City of Farmersville, Texas and other residents, business owners and operators, property owners and stakeholders along and about US 380 and SH 78 identify other options to improve mobility through Collin County that do not involve making those portions of US 380 and SH 78 within and about the City of Farmersville into limited access roadways.
