





Whereas, Audie Leon Murphy, son of Emmett Berry Murphy and Josie Bell Killian Murphy, was born and raised near Farmersville; and

Whereas, Audie Murphy claimed Farmersville as his hometown, and proudly wore our city's name on his dog tags throughout his distinguished military career; and

Whereas, Audie Murphy earned a Medal of Honor and 32 other awards while fighting to liberate Europe from tyranny; and

Whereas, upon his return, the citizens of Farmersville held a great celebration in the town square honoring him, and that celebration received national coverage from a grateful nation; and

Whereas, the citizens of Farmersville have continued to honor Audie Murphy since his tragic death in 1972, by dedicating a memorial and a historic marker in our town square, by naming U.S. Highway 380 as Audie Murphy Parkway, by designating the beginning of the Chaparral Trail as the Audie Murphy Trailhead, and by using his birthday to hold an annual celebration to honor him and all veterans and active servicemen and women who have taken a vow to protect and serve this nation in times of peace and peril; and



FARMERSVILLE CITY COUNCIL REGULAR SESSION MINUTES For May 23, 2017, 6:00 P.M.

I. PRELIMINARY MATTERS

- Mayor Piwko called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members
 John Klostermann, Donny Mason, Michael Hesse, Mike Hurst and Leaca
 Caspari were all present. City staff members Ben White, Sandra Green,
 Mike Sullivan, Rick Ranspot, Daphne Hamlin, and City Attorney, Alan
 Lathrom, were also present.
- Prayer was led by the Rick Ranspot of the City of Farmersville, followed by the pledges to the United States flag and Texas flag.
- Calendar of upcoming holidays and meetings was included in agenda packet.
- Calendar for 2017 budget was included in agenda packet.
- Farmersville ISD Graduation will be May 25, 2017.
- The Building & Property Standards meeting scheduled for May 25, 2017 was cancelled due to FISD Graduation.
- City offices will be closed on Monday, May 29th in observance of Memorial Day.
- A public hearing for the Comprehensive Plan update will be held at City Hall on June 1st at 6:00 pm. All citizens are encouraged to attend and participate.
- Proclamation declaring May as Brain Cancer Awareness Month was read by Mayor Piwko.

II. PUBLIC COMMENT

Melissa Grabowski, who resides at 304 Summit Street, addressed Council
and spoke regarding the Proclamation for Brain Cancer Awareness. She
was the teacher of Liyah Craddock who died of DIPg, Diffuse Intrinsic
Pontine Glioma, last year. She explained how sweet and loving Liyah

Craddock was. She indicated that Liyah's favorite place was the City splash pad and stated she was interested in a bench or something to be placed at the splash pad to become a memorial for her.

- C. City Manager's Verbal Report
 - Wastewater System Status
 - We did not have to condemn the Midkiff property. The City is currently working with the Stephenson's at this point. They have asked if the City would stake out the location first so they could see where the easement would be located before they signed the documents. The loan documents are moving forward. There are two remaining right-of-entries that the City needs granted. One is with the Corp. of Engineers and the other is with James Murray. This is in order to complete archeology and surveys of the property. The environmental report is due the first part of July. The contracts are lined up to be presented to Council for approval and the loan closing is scheduled for the end of September.
 - Camden Park Status
 - The MOU, Memorandum of Understanding, is being negotiated with Ted Zeta. Once we receive Ted Zeta's approval, the MOU will be presented to Council. Ted Zeta has asked the City to pay for half of the one mile force main. This would cost the City approximately \$68,000, which is more than what the City was planning on. The force main was never a part of the equation. In the money that is being put forth Ben White does not see any reason why the City should not go forward. Ted Zeta will be paying for the lift station and any upsizing will be paid for by the City. But, he is wanting to break ground now. Ben White stated he will be working with the TIRZ Board and 4A to try and obtain funding for the project. A lift station would need to be started mid to late summer to ensure homes could be built in December. He wants to go before the 4A Board for a loan and then the City would repay it when loan funds come in

- from the Texas Water Development Board. If the loan does not come through, the only way to cover the costs would be to take the money from the wastewater fund.
- Mike Hurst asked if Ted Zeta was going to accept the MOU.
- Ben White indicated he did verbally, but Mr. Zeta was wanting to share the cost with the City. Once he has a reassurance the City will share the cost he believes he will sign it.
- Leaca Caspari asked if the money the City would receive for the loan would cover the \$68,000.
- Ben White indicated it would and if any money was left over the last priority would be a lift station on the south side of town.

Splash Pad Upgrades

- o The City had a control box down in the ground and the electronic components would not be good year after year because of the water leaking on it. This year the City is going to mount the control box on a metal sheet above ground. The City has also installed a sail shade. There is a park bench missing at the splash pad and Ben White indicated he would like to replace it with a bench that has an inscription for Liyah Craddock who lost her struggle with cancer. The splash pad should be operational by Memorial Day weekend.
- John Klostermann asked if the City still had plans to move the gazebo.
- Ben White stated the City has been wanting to move it, but it is a low priority.

• Fishing Pier Progress

The City bought supplies and decided to stay with the same material that it currently has. Work will begin soon.

PARAGRAPH (b), "AT LARGE," IN ITS ENTIRETY AND REPLACING SAID PARAGRAPH WITH A NEW PARAGRAPH (b), ALSO ENTITLED "AT LARGE"; REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY; PROVIDING FOR INJUNCTIONS; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE AND IMPLEMENTATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after it passage and publication of the caption as required by law.

Ben White stated this Ordinance was a result of approximately 100

cities and how they were working together to create the rates. The packets provided at the meeting had Attachments A-C to reference. He stated a representative from Atmos was in attendance to answer any questions. Staff recommended approval.

- Motion to approve made by John Klostermann
- 2nd to approve was Leaca Caspari
- All council members voted in favor
- Alan Lathrom pointed out that the Ordinance only requires one reading.
- C. Consider, discuss and act upon the 1st reading of Ordinance #2017-0523-002 regarding placing liens on unpaid utility bills.
 - Mayor Piwko read the title block of the Ordinance. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE. TEXAS. AMENDING CHAPTER 74. "UTILITIES." THROUGH THE AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE II, "WATER, SEWER AND ELECTRICAL CHARGES," THROUGH THE AMENDMENT OF DIVISION 3, "SERVICE CHARGES," BY ADDING NEW SECTIONS 74-96 THROUGH 74-99 AUTHORIZING LIENS FOR CERTAIN DELINQUENT UTILITY BILLS, BY PROVIDING AN EXEMPTION FROM SUCH LIENS FOR HOMESTEAD AND RENTAL PROPERTY, AND BY PROVIDING FOR THE APPEAL OR RELEASE OF SUCH PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY: **PROVIDING** REPEALER CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION: PROVIDING ENGROSSMENT AND ENROLLMENT: PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING **EFFECTIVE DATE.**

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after it passage and publication of the caption as required by law.

• Ben White stated that Oak Grove Apartments left the City with a utility bill for \$13,237.19 and the City is trying to recoup the costs when things like this occur. He stated he had talked to the USDA and they have indicated they will be paying the outstanding balance and stated they have processed a check. The Ordinance is commercial in nature and it would not be applicable to homesteads. Ben White indicated he does not believe we need a lien on Oak Grove right now, but he wanted to have this Ordinance in effect so the City could. The property goes for sale on the County steps June 6th and a special Council meeting might need to be called if the USDA does not provide proof of payment being processed.

- Michael Hesse stated that rental properties are exempt according to the wording and wanted clarification.
- Alan Lathrom stated that liens can only be placed on a company not individual renters. In the case of Oak Grove the utilities were collected as part of the rent and then paid by Oak Grove. The meters were in Oak Grove's name, not the tenants.
- Donny Mason asked if the City would find out before the sale if the money is going to be paid.
- Ben White stated a special meeting would need to be called for a second reading to place a lien on the property before June 6th.
 - o Motion to approve made by John Klostermann
 - o 2nd to approve was Donny Mason
 - o All council members voted in favor

V. REGULAR AGENDA

- A. Swear in newly elected Council members and presentation of award for departing Council members.
 - Sandra Green swore in Michael Hesse for Place 3, Craig Overstreet for Place 1, and Todd Rolen for Place 5.
 - New Council members took their places on the dais.
 - Mayor Piwko acknowledged outgoing Council members Leaca Caspari and John Klostermann with a plaque thanking them for their service.
- B. Possible motion to reconsider award of bank contract made on May 9, 2017.
 - Mayor Piwko stated that after the last Council meeting where the
 Council had chosen a bank for contract, it was not understood that the
 term was for five years instead of one. The Council was evaluating the
 savings of the contract as \$1,200.00 per year. Weighing that with the
 amount of time it would take staff to handle the conversion of accounts,
 Council was only looking at a one year time frame.
 - Mike Hurst stated it was not brought to Council's attention that it was a five year contract. It would reflect approximately \$6,000 in income over the five year period. He stated that it is hard to undo or do different things after a decision has been made. But, looking back at what has come to light we may need to reconsider the contract. The City has been doing business with First National Bank of Trenton for ten years and Indpendent Bank before that. In all fairness if the City chose Independent Bank he believes that they would be agreeable to transfer everything in an expedient manner. He assumed with all the new information the City might need to change the decision at this point in time. The only difference is the rate of interest. He also

- inquired about how much time it would take and how many utility bills the City had that are done by bank draft.
- Daphne Hamlin stated some of the organizations that have bank drafts and she indicated it would take a couple of hours to complete.
- Mayor Piwko stated that getting signatory paperwork and other paperwork from Council was one of the most time consuming tasks.
- Alan Lathrom discussed the procedures that needed to occur in order to reconsider the item. He explained there needed to be a member that originally voted on the item to make a motion to have it reconsidered. Then, it needed to be seconded in order for the next item on the agenda to be considered.
- Michael Hesse stated he is all about saving the City money but the City has worked with First National Bank of Trenton for a while.
- Mayor Piwko stated it has been a smooth process with First National Bank of Trenton. She explained the \$6,000.00 a year is assuming we do not have any growth.
 - Motion to reconsider bank contract made by Donny Mason
 - o 2nd to approve was Mike Hurst
 - o All council members voted in favor
- C. Consider, discuss and act on award of bank contract subject to approval of a motion to reconsider.
 - Mayor Piwko stated the Council is deciding again on whether to select First National Bank of Trenton or Independent Bank to handle the City accounts.
 - Mike Hurst stated the only issue he had to discuss was the interest rate and which was better.
 - Ben White apologized that the Council did not receive all the information the first time and for there being misunderstandings.
 The interest rate for one year would cover all the work the City would have to do on their end to transfer banks, but the other four years would be extra revenue.
 - Craig Overstreet asked Council to look at the selection criteria that
 was stated in the RFP. There were four services the City
 requested. Three were relatively the same and the only item that
 separated the two banks were the interest rates. He asked that
 Council consider the criteria as they make a decision.
 - Motion to stay with the First National Bank of Trenton made by Michael Hesse
 - o 2nd to approve was Todd Rolen
 - Council members Todd Rolen, Donny Mason, and Michael Hesse voted in favor
 - Council members Mike Hurst and Craig Overstreet voted against

- D. Consider, discuss and act upon Reliant Energy contract.
 - Mayor Piwko stated Ben White wanted this item pulled from the agenda because there are changes to the rates coming in a future contract.
- E. Consider, discuss and act upon resignation of Craig Overstreet and Chad Dillard from Planning & Zoning Commission.
 - Motion to approve made by Mike Hurst
 - o 2nd to approve was Donny Mason
 - o All council members voted in favor
- F. Consider, discuss and act upon Kim Potter's resignation from FCDC (4B), Main Street Board, and Parks and Recreation Board.
 - Motion to approve made by Donny Mason
 - o 2nd to approve was Craig Overstreet
 - o All council members voted in favor
- G. Consider, discuss and act regarding the renegotiation of the North Farmersville Water Contract minimums.
 - Ben White indicated that Glenn McClain from North Farmersville Water
 District was in the audience. He discussed the graph presented in the
 agenda packet and that it showed what revenues would look like if the
 City took a 10% drop in the minimum.
 - Mike Hurst stated the growth in the water system at North Farmersville
 Water caused them to give up meters to Frognot. He wanted to know
 what would predict North Farmersville Water District's growth and if
 they were going to stop growth in that area. He also inquired whether
 the City was going to be faced with this same situation or request in
 two or three years.
 - Glenn McClain stated there are no developments that have requested a meter. Most of the land in the north is sectioned into large tracts of land and people are placing one house on those lots.
 - Mike Hurst asked Ben White about development in the north.
 - Ben White stated he had not heard of anything at this point.
 - Glenn McClain explained that after a developer met with DBI and found out the costs required to meet all the City of Farmersville's zoning requirements they changed their mind.
 - Mayor Piwko asked if the City could afford to take a loss out of the water fund annually. She said it would be nice to help Glenn McClain have the funds to upgrade his lines.
 - Ben White stated he does not like to see a decrease in revenue. He explained the City supplies certain capabilities to North Farmersville

Water District that only we can provide. The City has some cast iron lines that need to be replaced, but we do not have the funds. The degree of loss is not as big as he thought it would be after making calculations.

- Craig Overstreet explained this problem is one that all water districts are facing. Each district has to purchase a certain amount of water even if they do not use it. He explained that he did not know if the reduction in rates was the best approach in handling the situation. He believed it is a larger problem, and the relief is a bigger state wide problem.
- Mike Hurst asked if the North Texas Municipal Water District and the attorney's that filed the suit had made any decision on the water rates.
- Ben White indicated they have not. Right now there are lawsuits ongoing by other cities, but no outcomes have been announced yet.
- Donny Mason asked what amount Ben White would be comfortable with.
- Ben White stated he was not comfortable with any amount that lowers the City's revenue. He does not recommend lowering North Farmersville's water rates, but he knows that in a time of need he would like to help them. He explained if the City gave anything he might be okay with 10%.
- Mayor Piwko did indicate that North Farmersville had increased their water rates to help offset the costs. She also asked if the City would help them if they had a major water line break.
- Ben White indicated we would.
- Craig Overstreet does not think the item needs to be open ended because it sets a precedent.
- Ben White stated we would could change the contract and it would stay in effect until it was asked to be brought up again. All of North Farmersville's supply comes from the City. Copeville and Caddo Basin pulls from the City's water only in an emergency.
- Mayor Piwko stated the City was already going to take a hit from the lowered water rates from customers outside the city limits that we recently approved.
- · Mike Hurst asked about the length of a contract.
- Ben White stated the contract was ongoing until it was to be looked at again.
- Mike Hurst asked if the rates for the City went up were those rates then charged to North Farmersville Water District as well.
- Ben White indicated that was correct, so it would be a wash out.
- Mike Hurst asked if the City was comfortable with 10% or 0%.

- Ben White stated he preferred none, but he believed the City could absorb it. He assumed they were asking for relief because they needed help.
- Glenn McClain stated they have been paying the current minimum for over 10 years.
- Ben stated we refigured the contract in 2011 and changed a few items.
- Mike Hurst stated he was concerned about a reoccurrence of this issue soon. He wanted to know what would happen if North Farmersville Water District hit the magic number of meters and inquired if they would then put in what the State required at that point.
- Ben White indicated that he believed Glenn McClain was going to try and keep the meters under the magic number of 250 meters total.
- Glenn McClain pointed out that half of Willow Brook was in the North Farmersville Water District, but the City services the meters to help.
- Craig Overstreet stated he does not want to set a precedent.
- Michael Hesse asked what organizations could come and ask for reductions.
- Ben White stated anyone that had interconnections with the City.
 People outside the city limits could come in and start asking the City to go even lower than what was just approved. Also, Camden Park is going to be starting soon.
 - Motion to deny the request made by Craig Overstreet
 - o 2nd to approve was Donny Mason
 - All council members voted in favor
- H. Consider, discuss and act upon signage in regards to children at play.
 - Ben White explained the copy of the white signs in the agenda packet were like the ones in Rockwall and they work really well, but they are heavy. Rockwall is transitioning to the yellow "your speed" sign because it is easy to move around. It could have a strobe action as well, but the signs are costly. They are \$3,700.00 each and the City would need two signs. The speed cart the City already has records the speed, but the signs would not.
 - Craig Overstreet asked if the signs are portable.
 - Ben stated they would be in a sleeve and we could move them.
 - Mayor worried about theft of the signs.
 - Ben White said Rockwall did not have a problem with theft of the signs.
 - Mayor Piwko stated the City has a lot of faded stop signs and feels
 we could use the money to replace the current signs and look into
 this option later in the future.

- Ben White stated the signs are a good solution, but again they are very costly. He suggested the cost could be built into the budget for next year.
- Mayor Piwko asked if the City could use safe routes for children funding.
- Mike Sullivan stated it could possibly be funded by that. He
 explained the speed signs would be an easier solution. But, he
 agreed the signage currently around town should be replaced first.
- Mayor Piwko asked if Council delayed this item would Chief Mike Sullivan research funds for the safe routes for children and report back to Council.
- He indicated that would not be a problem.
 - Staff directed to research funds and bring back to Council at a future meeting.
- I. Consider, discuss and act upon Resolution #R-2017-0523-001 regarding roadway support for North Texas Central Council of Governments.
 - Ben White stated Princeton brought this to his attention. They are banding together with other cities because they are having trouble getting traffic through town. Ben explained what routes they were trying to negotiate in order to help the traffic flow. What the Resolution would do is accelerate the funding for these alignments. Ben thought it looked positive for Farmersville, and it seemed like a good idea to get North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) to fund these routes. Staff recommends passage of the Resolution.
 - Craig Overstreet stated the City would have a Planning Workshop on June 1st and he would like to have the constituents weigh in on this issue. He explained if everyone read Section 5 of the Resolution the last few sentences discussed converting sections of U.S. Highway 380 to limited access. He stated that wording concerned him. Limited access on U.S. Highway 380 should bother residents that live on that road since the City does not know where the roads are going yet. He believes Council should hear from the community first.
 - Ben White stated the particular wording is meant to support and evaluate the different alignments. They are currently evaluating the options of alignment for U.S. Highway 380. It is the corridor of a north east roadway that will run close to Farmersville. It could be on U.S. Highway 380, but it could be somewhere else. He suggested getting rid of Section 5 in the Resolution and then it could still move forward.

- Mayor Piwko asked if it would even be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan workshop.
- Ben White suggested the Resolution will support the roadways that will help Farmersville residents travel west and south. Ben White indicated the 399 Spur is the most important part of this and it will stop at the lake.
- Craig Overstreet explained the Resolution talks about U.S.
 Highway 380 in Section 1 as well, and he is concerned about that because the City does not know what that means.
- Ben White stated they have to put a roadway east of Princeton but they do not know where it is going to be located. He explained that for growth it makes sense.
- Mike Hurst explained that at the last meeting he attended they stated they had two really good routes to go through Princeton. They were going to expand State Highway 78 to six lanes. On this side of the lake where Farmersville was concerned they did not discuss limited access.
- Ben White stated he understood there was a limited access roadway they were considering. They are trying to make that tie in to Rockwall. There are thoroughfares and an outer loop they are considering. It has always been about the spur and it would be beneficial for the City to go south and to the lake.
- Craig Overstreet stated in his motion he would recommend taking out section five.
 - Motion to approve after omitting Section 5 made by Craig Overstreet
 - o 2nd to approve was Todd Rolen
 - All council members voted in favor
- J. Consider, discuss and act upon the procedures for City Facebook pages.
 - Ben White explained that based on an event that happened during the election the City was trying to get things in place that would be effective in monitoring and ensuring no accidental posts would be made. The City currently has Facebook accounts for a few departments, such as the Police Department, Fire Department, Main Street, and the Library. When there is a City sponsored site, the requirement will be for it to be managed by a City employee. Everyone would have to go through a filter and the administrator could add things. He wants City administrators of the accounts to attend training classes through the Texas Municipal League (TML). All City sites must be approved through the City Manager and the City Secretary will review the policy every year. For the time being, all the administrators should add

- the terms of use on each City operated Facebook page. He indicated Daphne Hamlin will change the sections in the policy manual pertaining to the new Facebook requirements.
- Mayor Piwko wanted to know if we would have more than one administrator.
- Ben White stated currently no, but he could add that a minimum of two administrators would be required.
- Michael Hesse wanted one administrator at City Hall and then another at a different location, such as the Police or Fire stations.
- Mike Sullivan stated they have three administrators for the Police Department. Brian Alford, Shaycee Jackson, and Chief Sullivan are the administrators.
- Ben White explained that it would be important to only remove items that went against the terms and conditions of the site. The City has the right to change the policy at any time.
- Mayor Piwko wanted to know how the City would get the terms and conditions out to people.
- Mike Sullivan stated it is always posted on the website for everyone to see.
- Ben White stated the item would be brought back to Council in the future for formal approval to the policy manual.
- Alan Lathrom pointed out that Facebook is not an exception to the open meetings act and the City should put that in the policy.
 Council and other board members cannot use it as a means to communicate with one another.
 - O Ben White indicated he would move forward with the policy change.
- K. Consider, discuss and act upon receiving \$100 donation to the Fire Department.
 - o Motion to approve made by Craig Overstreet
 - o 2nd to approve was Donny Mason
 - All council members voted in favor

VI. REQUESTS TO BE PLACED ON FUTURE AGENDAS

 Mayor Piwko wanted to see a review on the infrastructure plans for Collin College.


- 1. The department was on stand-by if our assistance was needed in Canton post their tornado incident.








Monthly Electrical System Disconnects for Non-Pay

FARMERSVILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION MEETING MINUTES

April 20th, 2017

The Farmersville EDC met in regular session on April 20th, 2017 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers with the following members present: Kevin Meguire, Robble Tedford, Randy Smith, and George Crump. Absent, Jason Lane. Staff members present were City Secretary Sandra Green, City Manager Ben White. Special guest recognized, City Council Liaison Mike Hurst, Mayor Diane Piwko, Sarah Jackson Butler owner of Wag jack Enterprises and Donna Williams.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Meguire convened the meeting at 6:35 p.m. and announced a quorum was present.

RECOGNITION OF CITIZENS AND VISITORS

Special guest recognized, City Council Liaison Mike Hurst, Mayor Diane Piwko, Sarah Jackson Butler owner of Wag jack Enterprises and Donna Williams.

PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comment taken.

REVIEW KEY INITIATIVE ARE GOALS (KIA'S)

Mr. White addressed the 4A EDC Board and stated we are trying to get the map on the Cities website. It is very difficult to do. Daniel and Brown has GIS mapping and they can create and embed into the map. The City of Georgetown has an interactive map that was shown to the 4A EDC Board as an example. Mr. Smith asked if we are targeting Highway 380 and Highway 78. Chairman Meguire stated we are proposing to show the whole city. Mr. White stated it will be intermixed.

Chairman Meguire asked Mr. White where the City is in relation to the re-zoning. Mr. White stated rezoning will be considered throughout the City. We are updating to something more modern.

Mr. White stated that he was asked to send out info to a list of brokers, but I have not done that yet. Mr. White explained the process he is taking when people come to the City. Mr. White brought up an example; Minecraft a distribution center. It was right next to the railroad tracks. Mr. White presented to the 4A EDC Board the contract and questionnaire. Mr. White brought up that project cake that is due Monday, it is a food distribution center.

Mr. White again presented the brokers list spreadsheet through power point. The idea is to send a package out to all the brokers but he wants to include the drone video before doing so.

Mr. White explained the drone video is \$1,000 apiece. The Chamber is willing to pay. Chairman Meguire stated it will be a 50% split. Mr. White stated it would be \$1,000 each for 4A EDC and \$1,000 for Chamber. The video is 3 minutes long. The script is going to be in a male voice for the commercial portion and female voice for residential portion. The first video was take on May 2nd, 2017. The Goal for viewing the video is May 14th, 2017. Chairman Meguire stated the target as it relates to the video is the Downtown, Railroad, Highway 78, Highway 380, Proposed Loop, Chaparral Trail, Tedford Chevrolet, etc.

Mr. Smith asked if we are going to use in the video the proposed College site and Farmersville ISD. Mr. White stated we can show it. The residential video would show more of the Farmersville ISD. It was agreed by the 4A EDC Board members to wait on the videos completion before sending information packets out to brokers. Chairman Meguire said we need to set the agenda on how to set the meetings and discussions with people. Daphne will work with the 4A EDC board and Ben to create a timeline of 1 per month to have a presentation so that every broker is targeted and followed up.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON GIS MAPPING

No discussion.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON TEXAS TEAM GROUP PRESENTATION

Chairman Meguire asked that the groups (Texas Economic Development Council, Team Texas), are invited to the 4A EDC meeting in October 2017.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPONG LOCAL BUSINESS RQUEST FOR ANNEXATION

Mr. Smith spoke to Home Grown Plants and stated the owner has major plans for his site. Owner wants to change the façade facing Highway 380 and add a restaurant and a wedding chapel in the back with a vineyard. Might even have an event space.

Mr. White said we received a non-binding letter about him annexing. Owner stated he may not want it right away, but he needs the sewer and he wants a gas line. The sewer has been solved by the lift station planned for construction next fall. Atoms' line stops at Lexington and he wants that on his property. We are getting some mixed signals from him about the time frame.

Mr. White has talked to owners asking if they would annex if they had gas lines on their property, and will ask the attorney if they would have to annex into the City. Mr.

Smith commented that Home Grown owner was told that the gas company was too backed up and could not supply gas for now. Mr. Tedford stated it is very expensive to run the gas line from Highway 78 to Brookshire's plus the bore under the street. Mr. Smith stated Big D Concrete annexation and property owner on the county line road in Hunt County are in favor of annexation. Chairman Meguire said this is the site of a 33 acre concrete plant. Mr. Smith stated 5-6 acres are for the batch plant and they will pave the rest of the property and put up walls to have an RV and Boat Storage facility. Mr. White sent out a letter in support of Big D Concrete to TCEQ last week. This would add 50-70 jobs. Chairman Meguire asked if Council is favorable of this project. Mr. Hurst stated he didn't see why the council would have a problem with it. Mr. Hurst stated that Home Grown needs gas because of all the propane he uses. Chairman Meguire asked how 4A EDC can support Big D Concrete. Mr. White stated they need water and sewer now. We won't have sewer until next fall. It might be beneficial to help pay for the water line. Chairman Meguire asked can 4A EDC help fund this project. Mr. Tedford asked how much would it cost. Mr. White stated \$150,000 to get to the Rudiciles and \$200-300,000 for supplies and lines. Chairman Meguire asked for information regarding job forecasting and the tax revenue.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON FAÇADE GRANT APPLICATION

Sarah Jackson Butler owner of Wag Jack addressed the 4A EDC Board with a detailed budget of proposed façade repairs. Mr. Tedford asked if we currently had a grant opening. Chairman Meguire stated yes, but can we do this. Do we need 3 bids? Ms. Butler stated she read in the façade policy that 4A EDC only requires one bid. Chairman Meguire asked if Daphne could look into the policy on how many bids are required. Mr. Crump asked what her time line to complete the construction was. Ms. Butler stated they would start immediately upon approval of the 4A EDC Board. On motion by Mr. Tedford to accept the 1 bid with a 50/50 split up to \$25K., Second by Mr. Crump, motioned carried all in favor.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON FIBER OPTIC CABLE FOR THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE

Mr. White was asked during last regular scheduled meeting to give a brief update on the fiber optic cable for the City of Farmersville. Mr. White stated he has received a lot of push back on this issue. If he felt this board was behind it then he would fight for it. The numbers scared people and there was a lot of risk. He has put it on the back burner in hopes that something would come along to make it on the front burner. Mr. Tedford said we paid someone \$30,000 for a bid and did not see what we wanted. He supported the study but thinks we were sold nothing. Mr. White said that Celina is moving forward and suggestion is to watch them and see what happens. Chairman Meguire stated if Mr. White would have been up front and told the 4A EDC Board it was a 20m dollar project they would have said no. Mr. White stated he did not know the cost of this project at that time. Chairman Meguire asked for Mr. White to keep an eye on Celina and continue to

give updates in the future. Mr. Smith asked if anyone in the Government facilities are receiving high speed internet. Mr. White stated not right now, not until the City pays for their own line.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON CAMDEN PARK PROGRESS

Mr. White stated residential and developing an apartment complex are in the plans for Camden Park. Problem now is wastewater, but the City is working to resolve this. A memo of understanding, basically assuring the developer he will have sewer. Mr. White stated currently have a lot of trailers parked on Bob Tedford Drive and we are working on cleaning those up to help sell. Mr. Smith asked what the hold is up on the developer. Mr. White stated he is trying to get financing for the apartment complex. Chairman Meguire said right now there is no finances available from 4A. Mr. Smith stated he wants to continue getting updates because we could help promote the commercial side in that area

RECEIVE UPDATE ON COLLIN COLLEGE

Mr. White stated he could not speak on the bond part of the Collin College. Mr. Smith state we have put up signs on Highway 380 and yards signs in support of the Collin College Bond. Mr. Smith stated the Mayor knew of an organized group in Frisco who was opposed to the Bond project. Mr. Hurst stated since then they have changed their minds. Mr. Smith stated some people do not want it because they do not have any kids or grandkids here that will attend, and they are upset about the taxes. Mr. Hurst stated that 600 million dollars come from the college in tax funds. The County is supposed to double in their size. Mr. White stated that construction is scheduled to begin in Farmersville in 2020.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON ITEMS FOR PAYMENT

On a motion from Mr. Tedford to approve items for payment, second by Mr. Crump, motioned carried all in favor

CITY MANAGER REPORT

City Manager Ben White provided a written report and highlighted the following: The Farmersville Facts publication is being used to attract new business to town. A three-minute drone video is planned which will also target new businesses. The Rotary Club is looking at sponsoring a shade feature at the splash pad. Downtown weeds will be addressed soon. Bids have been received for repairs at the fishing dock at Southlake Park. White will be recommending that the Centennial Committee assist with major improvements to the Senior Center parking lot, as well as repair of mold damage at the Rike Library. The signal light at SH78 is awaiting TXDOT construction. There are delays concerning the Main Street grant for ADA improvements due to paperwork. Electric crew has been replacing electric poles in front of Dollar General and James' Auto. The storage PODS outside City Hall have been removed. The Chamber office awning will be replaced. Donna Williams asked if the Gazebo at the splash pad will be moved; White indicated it would be. She also commented that it would be helpful to know the Centennial Committee's budget as the city make plans for repairs.

MAIN STREET MANAGER UPDATE

Main Street Manager Adah Leah Wolf presented a written report for March 2017, and highlighted the following: She has submitted a letter to the City Manager indicating her intention to retire in November of this year. She is giving early notice to help with the city's plans for transition. She submitted two award applications to the Collin County Historical Commission; one is for the building renovations completed by Matt and Lisa Crowder, and the other recognizes Boy Scout Troop 310 for adopting the care of the Prairie Grove Cemetery, where Audie Murphy's mother is buried. Winners will be announced at the Preservation Celebration on April 29. She met with Mandy Weaver and Eddy Daniel for assistance with designing a Chaparral Trail map. The map links downtown to the trail, and show exercise stations as well as type of trail surface. Glenda Hart and the manager met with Jennifer Lowe at Tatum Elementary, to plan for an additional downtown field trip for the students, planned for May 19. The Shed Sale was a success on Saturday, planned by the downtown merchants. The First Baptist Church is having issues with

repainting the ceiling of the sanctuary (paint won't adhere). The Post Office has removed the windows for offsite repairs. The new laundromat (LQ Laundry) has opened.

Farmersville Main Street Board Minutes April 3, 2017 City Hall

The meeting was brought to order at 5:02 PM by President Anne Hall. Present were board members Anne Hall, Glenda Hart, Randy Rice, Kim Potter, and 4B representative Donna Williams. Also present were Main Street Manager Adah Leah Wolf, City Manager Ben White, Councilman Leaca Caspari, and Mayor Diane Piwko.

Consider for approval March 6, 2017 Meeting Minutes:

There was no discussion regarding the March 6, 2017 meeting minutes; motion to approve by Randy Rice, second by Glenda Hart. Minutes were approved as presented.

National Register Rollout:

We received a press release from the Texas Historical Commission regarding our National Register Commercial District designation. The Farmersville Times included an article about it in the paper. The press release was also sent to area newspapers. There is a form for building owners to order plaques; three different sizes are available. The 5 x 7 is \$350, 7 x 9 is \$450, and 9 x 12 is \$550. The forms are submitted directly to THC. Adah Leah will get forms to the appropriate building owners. It is up to the owner to order the plaques if they are desired. The owner must also decide where to install them. Diane Piwko has volunteers who will help install them if desired. The next downtown meeting will include a Q &A session on plaques and learning more on Register. We may want to think about a plaque for the Square, perhaps the Gazebo would be a good location. The walking tour brochure will be revised with info from the national register application, done for Old Time Saturday for tours. There was discussion of Adah Leah's suggestion of having an annual historic building tour on Christmas parade day of 5-6 of the contributing buildings. We could collaborate with the historical society on this, and it could be a fund raiser. We could include a different assortment of buildings each year.

A draft of the new Chaparral Trail brochure was provided. It provides information about the trail along with a tie-in to downtown. Map information was provided from Eddy Daniel and Kim Potter provided photos. It is easy to modify and has the city hall address on it for orientation. Randy Rice suggested it be edited to open in the normal direction. A work order has been submitted to hang a brochure rack at the trail head.

Anne Hall handed out Shoppers Guides & Chaparral Trail Guides at the last Farmers & Fleas Market. There is on overlap in our projects as we are advertising as many of our tourism attractions as possible.

Discussion of Health Initiative Progress:

Glenda and Adah Leah met with PE teacher Jennifer Lowe at Tatum Elementary. We could coordinate a field trip for the students with an art project, for example for fire prevention week. The idea is to have more field trips to downtown since it is within walking distance. The students could do a hands on project once they are downtown, such as a scavenger hunt. It will be an all-day event on May 19. A class at a time will come downtown, from 8:30 am- 3 pm approximately. Will need greeters to assist. Where to greet them? TBD. We will welcome them and tell them a little information about downtown, and have a brief activity.

The new Chaparral Trail billboards are up on Hwy 78 and Hwy 380 (4B paid for them).

Kim Potter is still working on the Main Street Mile. Plano Walking Club will be here on May 6, during Farmers & Fleas Market. Rotary's annual Golf Tournament will be on April 18. Players and sponsors are needed.

Update on Downtown Merchants events

April 8 will be the Shed Sale, from 8 am – 2 pm. Spaces are \$20-\$25 (10 x 10 size). Farmers and Fleas vendors were given information at the last Market. Anne Hall volunteered to help greet people. On June 3 there will be downtown car show (in conjunction with Farmers & Fleas market) with music and food trucks. Yards of Yard sales will also occur on June 3; it will be a simplified version without maps. Donna Williams requested city to include Farmersville Events list for 2017 in utility bills. Ben White indicated this could be done; Adah Leah to check with Paula to see what size paper would work (1200 total).

Main Street Manager Monthly Update:

Adah Leah provided a written monthly report, and highlighted the following: We could use coupons for tour groups that are coming; if someone wants to adopt this project. There was a Wylie Senior group that came in March. The Shoppers Guides have been revised and are on the website. The Farmersville Heritage Museum was able to relocate most of the Audie Murphy collection to the museum from City Hall. The First Baptist Church is having some issues with paint not adhering to the ceiling in the sanctuary. The Post Office has removed their windows, which are being worked on off site. Bill Daniel is working with public works as our tree "volunteer"-many city trees have been trimmed. The Museum had its final ADA inspection, and they are collecting photos and archival information for displays. The LQ Laundry is now open on McKinney Street, owned by Long Lekim. The 4A is working on a 3 minute drone video project to help promote the city to businesses and residents.

Lisa Eastman has drafted a script for the video. Adah Leah will email a link to a similar video as an example.

 - Chris Calverley asked Mrs. Thomas when she sold it.
 - Mrs. Thomas stated they will close by the end of March. She indicated the new owner will be Carlos Duran.
 - Alan Lathrom indicated the new owner will need to be re-noticed and no motion would be required at this meeting.
 - Carlos Duran showed up at the meeting and indicated he was buying the property and will signing the closing documents soon. He gave his address as 2040 Brook Hollow Dr., Garland, TX 75041.
 - Frank Delorantis asked Mr. Duran what he was planning to do with the house and property.
 - Carlos Duran explained he was going to tear down the house, clean up the
 lot, and plant grass. He also indicated he was trying to get a timeline
 together and he would provide that as soon as he could.
 - Ben White explained to Mr. Duran that he would be required to obtain a demolition permit and informed him to contact Paula Jackson at City Hall.
 - Carlos Duran asked when the permit would expire.
 - Ben White indicated he was not for sure, but if he would contact Paula Jackson she would help him with that information.
