

NEED FOR DISINFECTION


Disinfection is a critical part of water treatment to keep water safe. It involves a twostep process that treats the water, then adds disinfectant to maintain water quality as it travels long distances through pipes to homes and businesses. Both steps are needed to eliminate and keep tap water free of harmful microorganisms, such as parasites and viruses.

NTMWD's Two-Step Water Disinfection Process:

- 1. Step One: Ozone and free chlorine disinfects water at the treatment plant.
- 2. Step Two: Chloramine, which is chlorine + ammonia, is added to the water before it leaves the plant to keep it disinfected. (Only chlorine-based disinfectants are approved by the EPA for this second step.)

TEMPORARY CHANGE IN DISINFECTANT

For one month each spring, ammonia is temporarily suspended and free chlorine is used to ensure water remains disinfected as it travels to the cities we serve and on to their customers. This temporary change in disinfectant helps maintain the system and high water quality year-round. NTMWD has been doing this for over 10 years, and good water quality that meets health standards has always been maintained.





HYDRANT FLUSHING TO HELP THE PROCESS

During the annual change, the cities we serve may help move the chlorine-disinfected water through the system faster by flushing water from fire hydrants.

Hydrant flushing:

- Helps maintain local systems and water quality year-round.
- Decreases odor/taste of chlorine during the temporary change in disinfectant.
- Is standard practice for many water providers who use chloramine to maintain systems.



HIGH WATER QUALITY MAINTAINED

Testing

During this brief temporary change in disinfectant, NTMWD continues to deliver safe water to our cities.

Ongoing water sampling is performed during the process by:

- NTMWD—results are reported to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and made available to the public.
- TCEQ—conducts routine water sampling in NTMWD and city systems through an independent laboratory.


 Cities served by NTMWD—samples are analyzed in NTMWD's state-certified laboratory and reported to TCEQ.

NTMWD tests for the concentration of chlorine at our treatment plant and at certain points in the transmission system every 15 minutes. NTMWD also conducts weekly testing at the delivery points where the cities, in turn, distribute to their customers. NTMWD's water meets all safety standards required by the TCEQ, the EPA and the Safe Drinking Water Act. Test results are available for the public to review online.

*NOTE: EPA requires water treatment facilities to maintain a minimum chlorine level of 0.2 milligrams per liter (mg/l) or parts per million (ppm), a minimum of 0.5 mg/t or ppm during chloramine operations and a maximum running average of 4 mg/l or ppm. These levels are deemed safe for consumption.



Home Testing

Homeowners who want more information about their water quality or are considering testing their water should consider these guidelines.

- Review water quality information on your city or local water utility website and contact them with questions.
- 2) Use a state-certified laboratory to provide sampling instructions, containers, and ensure accurate results. You can find an accredited laboratory in Texas through ICEQ.
- 3) Pool test kits are not a reliable method to test drinking water. You can learn more at CDC.gov.

Beware of claims from companies advocating filtration for water safety. NTMWD's water is safe to drink without filtration. Some filters can help dissipate chlorine odor, taste and skin sensitivities.

Disinfection By-Products

Disinfection By Products (DBPs) form when disinfectants, like chlorine, react with naturally occurring substances in the water. All commonly used disinfectants form DBPs.

NTMWD's water treatment process:

- Uses ozone and chloramine for most of the year, which actually reduces the DBPs in treated water.
- Keeps DBP levels well within the acceptable range EPA considers safe, including during its temporary, month-long change in disinfectant.
- Is regularly tested for the quality of water it produces. This year NTMWD has voluntarily increased the frequency of DBP testing to monthly. Results will be posted on NTMWD com.

ODOR/TASTE TIPS

Some people may notice a stronger smell or taste of chlorine during this time. While chlorine levels are consistent with the rest of the year, the temporary suspension of ammonia can make the smell or taste more noticeable. The water remains safe to drink and use.

For those who are sensitive to the taste, odor and skin contact, there are simple steps that can make it less noticeable.



Tips to Reduce Chlorine Odor/Taste in Water



Your water is safe — it meets all quality standards.

Here are some simple steps to minimize chlorine odor, taste or skin sensitivity:



Drinking water

- . Run the tap for a few minutes before using
- Refugerate water in an open pitcher for several hours
- Add alsi delof outrus/culcumber and let sit for several hours.
- Consider installing filters on kitchen faucets

Bath or shower water

- Add a crushed 1000 mg V tamin C tablet to bath water
- Consider Installing filters on bathroom faucets or shower heads

What's different?

- For one month a year aminiuma is removed from the water treatment process, and on cone on yis used for disinfection to keep water safe as it travels through o pes to consumers.
- This is a preventive measure to maintain the system and high water quality.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



What is the temporary change in water disinfection?

NTMWD first disinfects water using ozone and chlorine as part of the treatment process to eliminate bacteria and viruses. Then, for most of the year, NTMWD also adds chloramine (chlorine + ammonia) as a secondary disinfectant to keep drinking water clean as it travels from the treatment plants through miles of pipes to homes and businesses. Each spring for one month, NTMWD temporarily suspends the use of ammonia and uses free chlorine as the secondary disinfectant to maintain water quality year-round.



Why is this change necessary?

This change is a common water system maintenance practice among water providers in states with warmer climates. NTMWD uses it to maintain the system and ensure high water quality.



When does the change occur?

The temporary change usually occurs for about a month each year from the end of February through early April. It is done before the summer hotter temperatures which can increase the potential for bacterial growth in pipes.



Is the chlorine level tested during this period?

Yes, chlorine is tested, and many other compounds in water are monitored continuously. NTMWD conducts a quarter million tests each year in a state-certified laboratory to monitor, regulate and report water quality. During the disinfectant change in 2018, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) also collected 117 samples from 31 public water systems that deliver NTMWD water to confirm compliance. In some cases, NTMWD is voluntarily increasing the frequency of testing above what is required.



What did the 2018 test results show?

NTMWD and TCEQ tests in 2018 confirmed NTMWD's chlorine levels during its disinfectant change were within the chlorine residual levels required by TCEQ and EPA.



How do test results during the disinfectant change compare to other months?

Test results in 2018 indicate chlorine levels were consistent with the rest of year and within the annual average amounts required by TCEQ and EPA.



What can I do if I don't like the chlorine taste or smell?


The closer you live to the water treatment plant, the more noticeable the chlorine odor or taste may be. Some tips include refrigerating water in an open pitcher, adding a slice of citrus/cucumber several hours before using or using a National Science Foundation (NSF/ANSI) approved water filter. Why are fire hydrants flushed during this process?

Local water providers (cities or utility districts) who receive NTMWD water may help move the chlorine-disinfected water through the system faster by flushing water out of fire hydrants. Frequent flushing helps maintain the system, ensure high water quality and reduce the chlorine odor and taste. Performing system flushing in the spring also helps save valuable water during the summer months.

 - 1. Possible Council Liaison Report

V. REGULAR AGENDA

- A. Presentation from OpenGov.
 - Meredith with OpenGov introduced herself and she demonstrated how the system works and how people can access the information when it becomes live on the City's website.
- B. Presentation regarding last year's accomplishments and this year's goals and budgets.
 - Ben White explained since the last meeting he updated the form to show the Charter Commission.
 - Jason Lane, President of the FEDC (4A), addressed Council and stated they have discussed designating six thousand acres as primarily industrial when the future land use map is changed. He also discussed some items on the form they accomplished over the past year.
 - Craig Overstreet asked about the sales tax revenues and wanted to know if they estimated the same amount as last year.
 - Jason Lane stated they budgeted the same amount as last year, but they
 are keeping a close eye on those revenues as they come in and they will
 adjust their budget accordingly.
 - Craig Overstreet asked Mr. Lane about the spike in the façade grants.
 - Jason Lane stated they funded a couple of larger projects.
 - Craig Overstreet asked if they were going into their reserves to fund any façade grants this year.
 - Jason Lane stated they would.

- C. Presentation regarding the Crisis Response Team.
 - Chief Kim Morris stated that every year fire and police departments lose people to Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). He explained that most departments utilize Chaplain's to help their people get through traumatic experiences they see every day. He stated unfortunately the Chaplain's do not have the skills to treat the ones who truly need the help. He indicated the Farmersville Fire and Police Departments are taking steps in trying to prevent PTSD in their staff by entering into an agreement with Joseph Brigandi.
 - Joseph Brigandi addressed Council and stated the Crisis Response Team
 could counsel and help first responders who see critical incidents such as
 fatalities. It provides a debriefing of the event and they conduct a health
 and stress interview. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder is the leading cause
 of suicide among first responders. He stated that it requires someone to be
 a licensed practitioner to provide the services. They are going to serve the
 Farmersville community as well as others.
 - Craig Overstreet asked how many people make up the team.
 - Joseph Brigandi stated that currently there were two behavioral health professionals. He explained he and his wife, who is a licensed professional counselor make up the team. But, he is hoping to grow the team soon.
 - Craig Overstreet asked how larger cities are handling PTSD.
 - Joseph Brigandi stated they were starting to send people to training classes to help first responders.
 - Craig Overstreet asked if there was any kind of peer review to see if it has been working.
 - Joseph Brigandi explained there had been studies done.
 - Craig Overstreet asked if the Crisis Response Team reported back to the agency requesting the service for one of their first responders.
 - Joseph Brigandi stated that a summary was given back to the agency and they also gave those agencies referrals to other support systems so the first responder could receive the best possible care.
 - Mayor Rice asked if an individual firefighter or police officer could go to the Crisis Response Team themselves to get help or did they have to be referred.
 - Joseph Brigandi stated that was absolutely possible. He explained that
 most of the time active listening and caring would keep someone from
 committing suicide. He said a part of the program was mutual aid in the
 case of natural disasters.

- D. Consider, discuss and act concerning possible water additive program and water additive injection point at the water plant.
 - Ben White went over the Power Point presentation that was included in the agenda packet. He stated he has six public works staff, outside of the Electrical Department, that was taking care of field work. He explained of those employees, he has one staff member that handles the water. When the chlorine burn takes place it burns out the build up in the pipes and keeps the bacteria down. He explained that flushing lines tends to be needed more in the hotter months. He indicated the water system has lost money over the years, but the rate increase a few months ago should help the system. He stated chlorine residuals are critically low and it is a public health issue. He explained the solution is to add automated chlorine injection points throughout the system to maintain a controlled chlorine residual level. He stated the Medora ResidualHQ was the recommended design that he would like to purchase. He indicated it seemed to be the most beneficial system for the City's water system. He wanted to revise the accounting to correctly handle impact fees because the City has money that is earmarked for projects like this. He wanted to use the pilot program because it would reduce the City's risks and if we do not like the system we could stop using it. Then we would ask Eddy Daniel with DBI to make the City a custom system that would be compatible with our water system. He explained if we like it, next budget year we would fund the remainder of the chlorine injection hardware.
 - Craig Overstreet stated he does not see the need to be a part of a pilot program.
 - Eddy Daniel, with Daniel & Brown, stated the City could participate in the pilot program because of the installation price cut of nearly \$20,000. He explained the system was being used in North Dakota right now. He stated the North Texas Municipal Water District just gives the cities water with the amount of chlorine that meets the guidelines. He stated if the City could get an automatic adjusting system it would give the City constant feedback. In the summer the City has serious issues because the chlorine gasses off, he said. TCEQ makes the City keep a chlorine disinfectant in the water. He explained if the City has a zero residual then there is no way to know if all the bugs in the system have been killed. If it is a zero the City would have to go under a boil notice.
 - Craig Overstreet asked what impact fees could be used for.
 - Eddy Daniel stated you cannot use them for maintenance.
 - Alan Lathrom stated they could be used for capital projects for new development.

- Michael Hesse asked if the company would be liable if something went wrong with the system.
- Eddy Daniel explained the City staff would still go out and take samples
 from the system. He explained the City gets SCADA readings and we get
 manual ones as well. He indicated the City would only risk money each
 month if it did not work and he has other clients moving on the system right
 now.
- Ben White stated the other problem the City's faces right now was manpower. He explained that every time a line is flushed out of a fire hydrant it affects the streets.
- Donny Mason asked how long it would take to get the automated system in place.
- Ben White stated six to eight months.
- No decisions were made and Ben White stated he just wanted to present the information at this point.
- E. Consider, discuss and act upon Resolution #R-2019-0122-001 calling a general election for May 4, 2019 to elect Councilmember Place 1, Councilmember Place 3, and Councilmember Place 5.
 - Motion to approve made by Donny Mason
 - o 2nd to approve was Michael Hesse
 - All council members voted in favor
- F. Consider, discuss and act upon donations to the Senior Citizens Center.
 - Motion to accept with gratitude made by Craig Overstreet
 - o 2nd to approve was Michael Hesse
 - All council members voted in favor.
- G. Consider, discuss and act upon capital improvement projects for U.S. Highway 380 west wastewater.
 - Eddy Daniel, with Daniel & Brown, stated they have been working with Palladium in regards to their wastewater system. Originally, Palladium was looking to relocate the current lift station at Brookshire's and move it to Palladium's site for their use. He stated they have run the analysis and they could use a gravity main to take it all the way to the regional lift station. He explained the older lift station could be dismantled and it would provide gravity main service to a number of tracks in the future.
 - Donny Mason wanted to know how that would be affected if TxDOT came down the current U.S. Highway 380 alignment.

- Eddy Daniel stated he did not believe it would affect the lift station or the line. He stated that Palladium had allocated \$70,000 to \$150,000 to relocate the lift station. He indicated the City would have to come up with the rest of the money to fund the line.
- Donny Mason asked about the potential cost to the City.
- Eddy Daniel stated they had prepared a budget for the rest of the line and it was approximately \$200,000.00. He stated Council needed to keep in mind that impact fees would be collected from the tracks that would develop in the future. He explained that impact fees the City has already collected could be used to pay for the line because it would be providing capital improvements for new development. He explained they wanted to bring the option to Council to see if they thought it was a good idea to construct the line and use impact fee money to build it.
- Ben White started discussing another issue in the sewer system.
- Eddy Daniel stated the City had a 6" bottleneck that needed to be fixed. He indicate they have a 10" pipe coming together with a 6" pipe that is causing flow issues.
- Ben White stated the City could also use impact fees to fix this problem as well.
- Eddy Daniel stated that Palladium, Camden Park, and Collin College would use the line so it did need to be addressed.
- Ben White explained they would gather more information and bring it back to Council at another time.

REVIEW CURRENT CITY OF FARMERSVILLE PLANNING AND ZONING ORDINANCE AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENTS WITH REGARDS TO INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Mr. White presented to the EDC Board, Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, we do not have to do this all at once. Mr. White said there is a lot of information, suggested covering areas regarding Industrial Development. Mr. White asked the board to review and make recommendations of any suggested changes. Mr. Collins asked if the zoning map for the City is in the works. Mr. White stated yes we are going through a zoning

map update. City may also have to choose a route for Highway 380, if so that will trigger through fare map change.

Mr. White presented to the board the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, pointing out certain zoning districts within the document for review. Mr. White suggested to the EDC Board to review and in the next regular scheduled meeting to come back with any suggested changes, recommendations for discussion.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON CONCRETE FACILITIES

Mr. White stated the concrete facilities have been involved in creating the development agreements. Council approved development agreement with Listcom, if no changes are made the mayor will sign. Basic agreement, City will supply water, they will supply 8 foot wall with irrigation and street, plus sales tax. Performance criteria is to build a facility within so many days. Mrs. Piwko stated widening the roads near the facilities have them suppling the materials, but the City supplies all labor, how long will it take. Mr. White said he is not sure may take longer than projected. Nelson Brothers behind Listcom, all we will need to do is change name on the development agreements and go forward. Martin Marietta somewhat similar agreement we have a meeting set up for 10:00 a.m. Monday. Now that we have a model agreed to things should go faster. Martin Marietta has a huge piece of land; they are putting up 8 foot screening walls. They are in the doorway to our City. Mrs. Piwko asked can they also use vegetation as screening walls. Mr. White stated no we had asked for 8 foot screening wall, they are in the highway commercial district. Mr. Collins asked what they are doing with asphalt. Mr. White said their major business is aggregate products to supply this region with that type of material. They usually set up 3 different facilities, one for concrete, and one for asphalt. Mr. Collins asked if there are any environmental issues with asphalt. Mr. White stated he is not aware, did visit one of their facilities and found no issues. Mr. Collins stated once asphalt plant is established you cannot reclaim that soil. Mr. White stated they had concrete surface, and vessels on concrete, looked as though if asphalt spilled they had it contained. Mr. Lane said there are permit requirements. Mr. Collins stated due to the asphalt their agreement would be a little bit different. Mr. White stated he is open for suggestions. Mrs. Piwko said to would be a good idea to train our Fire Dept. to handle if there is an asphalt spill. Mr. Collins any agreement that Martin Marietta signs would apply to the lease. Mr. White said yes. Mr. Smith asked if both Nelson and Reliable will own property instead of leasing. Mrs. Piwko asked if the TIRZ board still funding water line, will this affect their funding of the bond. Mr. White stated they have money set aside. Mr. Smith asked when they will begin production. Mr. White said within 272 days of signing agreement.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON COLLIN COLLEGE

Mr. White stated he had another development meeting, went over utilities and streets. Mr. White stated he needs electrical numbers to provide right point. Mr. Collins asked would there be a better spot to bring in power. Mr. White stated could be, waiting to find out how much they need to be sure and get right spot. Mr. White stated they want an underground primary line. Mr. Collins can we bury a line along the pipe way. Mr. White stated if we got permission we could. Mr. Smith asked when the bond will receive

approval. Mr. White stated we will have funds February 2019. Mrs. Piwko asked about street lighting. Mr. Collins said typically have lighting in parking lot. Mrs. Piwko asked if we would have to place lights on road. Mr. Smith asked about the electrical substation. Mr. White stated we are in the process. Mr. Smith asked when you will need funds from EDC. Mr. White stated within the next few months it is in the budget.

REVIEW CURRENT CITY OF FARMERSVILLE PLANNING AND ZONING ORDINANCE AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENTS WITH REGARDS TO INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Mr. White stated we are going to review these documents in 3 parts. The document in front of you, I am asking for suggestions from the EDC Board. Mr. Collins stated he has several questions, in the draft ordinance the overlay district and base zoning, what is the difference. Mr. White stated the Overlay district is highway zoning, base zoning is stay in place, and additional requirements in the overlay district. Mr. White stated this is the way it is structured right now. Mr. Collins stated on page 14 parking lot section 3.6.4 primarily on AG usage, you are allowing on various AG uses parking lot/garage accessory all are permitted in single family area. Mr. Collins why would you allow any AG for SF1, recommend changing. Mr. Collins stated he would recommend reviewing all SF1, Mr. Collins stated some of those would not allow in SF 1. Mr. White stated we will review all SF1 and come back with suggested changes. Mr. Collins stated 3.6.5 example farm, ranch, garden, orchid, all allowed in SF1, needs review. Mrs. Piwko said what if you have a family homestead and growth happens. Mr. Collins said what you can do is place restraints. Mr. White stated he will take the comments and forward to Council. Mr. Collins stated on the industry side section 3.6.8, not allowed in use residential zones, recommend reviewing. Mr. Collins item 3.6.9 entertainment, day camp, what is this. Mr. White stated descriptions early on in the document. Mr. Collins, 3.6.11 sexually oriented business, why are we allowing any sexually oriented business at all. Mr. White stated it has to go somewhere, Mrs. Piwko said you have to allow by law. Mrs. Piwko said it is in light industrial, and operate under special use permit. Mr. Tedford stated this gives you a few items to start with. Mr. Smith asked while we are looking at the industrial section, should we look at commercial as well. Mr. White stated it is up to this board. Mr. Tedford asked if anyone wants to take it for review and give comment. Mr. Tedford stated every time he reviews these documents he finds something different. Mr. Tedford stated we will be reviewing these documents over the next 2 meetings.

Mr. Smith said he does not understand why we are looking at this. Mr. White stated reason is to have comments on the industrial area. Mr. Collins stated we should look at the commercial district.

Mrs. Piwko stated she said her mind set was to take the highway commercial overlay and take it in 2 sections.

Mr. Smith asked trying to understand lodging 3.6.7 why would we permit this in light and heavy industrial. Mr. White stated we placed in that region because it is somewhat compatible.

Mr. Tedford said it is not allowed in a residential area, so you are limited.

CONSIDER, DISCUSS AND ACT UPON ITEMS RELATING TO STREETS AND UTILITIES FOR THE NEW COLLIN COLLEGE CAMPUS

Mr. Tedford asked about the certificate of obligation, have you received those funds. Mr. White stated funds will be delivered in January 2019. Mr. Collins asked how much did TIRZ commit to fund the certificate of obligation. Mr. Ellison stated 222K will be budgeted per year. Mr. Tedford stated we received a good rate. Mr. White stated we are now able to cover what is required by the City to construct the streets around the College. Mrs. Piwko asked will there be any land acquisitions. Mr. White said there may be some. Mr. White stated land acquisitions will be on the north side of the College. Mr. Tedford asked when you will go out for bids. Mr. White stated March 2019.

Mr. White stated the electrical on the North East corner of the College is being designed, substation purchase is in play with Oncor. College has requested City to pay for infrastructure, Mr. White stated the agreement was to the North east corner, Mr. White stated the cost is approximately \$450k, our lineman think it may be less. Mr. White stated we may need assistance from EDC if the City helps with the electric. Mr. White stated here is the problem. However developing land it pays to get the electric to a point of use. Mr. White stated the agreement says North East corner. Mr. Collins stated the agreement does say City to provide electric to the North East corner, College has already trimmed square footage to stay within budget, so it is going to be a negotiation deal. Mr. White stated he talked with Dr. Matkin, he will send me the figures and we will work with it, work together and come up with a solution. Mrs. Piwko asked about the agreement when it was made 10 years ago, but now it is in phases. Mrs. Piwko asked cost difference substation whether in ground or above, Mr. White said we would not allow above. Mr. Tedford stated to Mr. White see what Dr. Matkin has to say, and come back to board with information.

Mr. Collins stated the building he is looking is a load center. Mr. Smith asked when they are acutely starting. Mr. Tedford stated 09-2019. Mr. Smith asked if Eddy will be done with engineering. Mr. White said he is pressing. Mr. Smith said he has construction schedule.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON CONCRETE FACILITIES

Mr. White stated the batch plant for Reliable the agreement has been signed and moving forward, Nelson Brothers are still proceeding forward, may take some time before there is any development of that lot. Mrs. Piwko asked if they have signed development agreement.

Martin Marietta is in jeopardy, Industrial neighbors are coming more concerned and active in that area. Martin Marietta understands surrounding industrial neighbors are concerned.

Mr. White said another batch plant wanted to come in but it was tabled. Sounds as though it may be a no go for them. Mr. White stated he had a meeting with Martin Marietta, and it did not go well. Mr. Smith said the development agreement is signed

off on Reliable, will construction begin. Mr. White stated they are working on the permits through the County. Mr. Smith stated the county line road, when will that be done. Mr. White stated we will hold that back at least a year or two. It is in the development agreement he has that right to hold off.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON HIGHWAY 380

Mr. White updated the simple recommendation from the CF delayed until April 2019. TXDOT has asked we hold off until they receive analysis

Mr.'s Piwko asked if it will affect the comprehensive plan. Mr. White stated it will slow it down. Mrs. Piwko asked will it go into next year. Mr. White said it could possibly happen within this funding year.

RECEIVE UPDATE ON MONT BELVIEU

Mr. White presented a slide show of his visit to Mont Belvieu. City of Celina, Scott Cromwell, visited to see what they have. Celina is interested in what Mont Belvieu in regards to fiber utility. (See attached presentation) Mr. Tedford asked what the motivation is. Mr. White said to supply bandwidth in our area. We are expensive and slow. This would be a good tool for drawing industries. Mr. Ellison said there are people who work from home and have to have hi speed in their homes. You need to provide services like this. Mr. White said it would differentiate use from other small towns. Mr. White stated his next step is to present to council, asking for EDC feed back and see how you feel about this. Mr. Collins said if we could move to high speed internet this would be a feather in our cap. Mrs. Piwko asked how they funded this project. Mr. White stated with bonds. Mr. White asked the EDC board would this be a good move to take before council. Mr. Collins stated this would be good for the citizens. Mrs. Piwko would love to see the City establish this and beat the legislation.

2. Program Commentary (list critical issues, problems, and successes/completed projects of the past month):

I have served as the Interim Main Street Program Manager since October 24, 2018 and plan to serve through February 28, 2019. After continued conversations with the City Manager, former and present Main Street Program Board Members and downtown business owners, my assessment of the critical issues includes the hiring of a full time Main Street Program Manager. The City Manager has begun the process of filling that position. Ongoing issues include: recruitment of volunteers, effective volunteer training, team building, effective communication and the recognition of volunteers once we have them. The Main Street Program Board members, the Community Development Board (4B), members, Chamber of Commerce, volunteers, business owners and other concerned citizens attended Main Street 101 training that was held on December 10, 2018 at City Hall and included refreshments. The training that was presented by Debra Dresher, State Director, provided a forum where participants were able to brainstorm ideas for ensuring that the Farmersville Main Street Program moves forward. Participants came away from the training with a sense of comradery and cohesiveness. The Main Street Program continues to gain momentum and support is steadfast. The City Council, City Manager, Community Development Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, volunteers and business owners continue to be united in the effort to maintain and grow the Main Street Program. The Interim Main Street Program Manager and volunteers have assisted the City Manager and staff in the automation of the Farmers and Fleas vendor application and it is now online and fillable. The RSVP Event Center and the Over Yonder Eatery and Market are open for business and several façade projects have been completed in the historical downtown district.

II. PUBLIC HEARING

A. Consider, discuss and act upon the replat for Farmersville Market Center II, which property is generally located south of U.S. Highway 380 and west of County Road 607 subject to the consideration, discussion and action upon the following required waivers requested by Palladium Farmersville, Ltd., for such approval:

- 1. A waiver of the requirement set out in Farmersville Code Section 65-42(b)(1) that each lot front onto a dedicated, improved public street given the fact that this development is a multi-family development situated within a subdivision that was originally platted as a commercial development and not a single-family residential development;
- 2. A waiver of the requirement set out in Farmersville Code Section 65-42(b)(6) that each multi-family lot shall have a minimum of 100 feet of frontage on a dedicated street because this multi-family development is an in-fill development project on a property originally platted for commercial development;
- 3. A waiver of the requirement set out in Farmersville Code Section 65-44(c)(5) that Palladium Farmersville, Ltd., as the property owner, provide all rights-of way required for existing or future streets, and all required street improvements because this multi-family development is an in-fill project on a property originally platted for commercial development that is taking access to and from public thoroughfares upon and across easements internal to the overall commercial development; and,
- 4. A waiver of the requirement set out in Farmersville Code Section 65-42(c)(17) that all subdivisions have at least two points of access from improved public roadways, and that driveway access onto roadways shall be provided because this multi-family development is an in-fill project on a property originally platted for commercial development that is taking access to and from public thoroughfares upon and across easements internal to the overall commercial development including a new private access and fire lane easement acquired from Brookshire's to provide a second point of ingress and egress to this multi-family community.
- Scott Johnson from Palladium stated the road at the front of the property was a shared access drive and that was why they were asking for waivers for items 1 and 2. He indicated the property was originally platted as commercial and not a multi-family residential district.
- Paul Kelly asked about the south access behind Brookshire's and why it was not being constructed.
- Scott Johnson stated the access easement with Brookshire's gives them the second means of access to the front of the lot.
- Wyatt McGuire asked about the access behind Brookshire's again and why it was not being built.
- Scott Johnson discussed the grade of the land and how building it would be almost impossible.
- Jim Hemby stated he was also concerned about the road not being constructed behind Brookshire's.
- Diane Piwko who resides at 200 McKinney Street, stated she has toured two of the Palladium complexes and explained they were very safe. She

explained that children being dropped off the school bus had to go through the office building to ensure their safety. She explained she was in favor of the apartments coming because of the quality they would bring to Farmersville.

- Paul Kelly left the public hearing open and stated they would continue to item B on the agenda.
- Scott Johnson from Palladium addressed the waivers for the site plan and
 the landscape plan. He stated they did not want to build a screening wall
 because the property already set down approximately 5 feet because of
 the grade. He indicated the whole property required a retaining wall. He
 stated they built the apartments to give a courtyard feel. He also felt they
 would provide adequate landscaping on the property and did not need a
 tree for every 40 linear feet on the access road.
- Paul Kelly closed the public hearing at 7:21 p.m. and asked the Commission for comments.
- Rachel Crist arrived at the meeting at 7:22 p.m.
- · Jim Hemby stated the access was a concern for him.
- Paul Kelly explained he was okay with all of the waivers except for the access road behind Brookshire's not being constructed. He was concerned there would be too many accidents and he was concerned about school buses entering the property off of U.S. Highway 380.
- Wyatt McGuire stated the same.
 - Motion to approve waivers 1, 2, & 3 on item A made by Lance Hudson
 - o 2nd made by Jim Hemby
 - All members voted in favor, but Rachel Crist abstained because of missing the discussion due to her late arrival.
- Paul Kelly read item #4 again and opened the floor for discussion among the Commission.
- Lance Hudson felt that residents of the apartment complex could use County Road 607 and turn into the Brookshire's parking lot if they wanted as well.
- Scott Johnson stated that most cities around the area like Van Alstyne, Anna, Garland and some other cities only required a single point of access. He explained there would be very little traffic for an 80 unit apartment complex.
 - Motion to approve waiver 4 on item A made by Lance Hudson
 - o 2nd made by Luke Ingram
 - Lance Hudson, Luke Ingram and Jim Hemby voted in favor of the motion. Wyatt McGuire, Paul Kelly and Rachel Crist voted against the motion.
 - o Motion failed.

- Alan Lathrom stated the plat did not meet all the requirements of the Subdivision Ordinance. Since item A, number 4, was not approved he stated Engineering would probably recommend the replat be disapproved. He stated the applicant would have the right to appeal the decision to the City Council.

 - All members voted in favor, but Rachel Crist abstained
- The Planning & Zoning commission was confused about approving or disapproving the plat.

- Alan Lathrom explained an approved plat that does not meet the Subdivision Ordinance because item A, number 4 was not approved.

DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS AND

PALLADIUM USA INTERNATIONAL, INC. Palladium Farmersville Sewer Line Project

This Development Agreement is entered into by and between the CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, TEXAS ("City") and PALLADIUM USA INTERNATIONAL, INC., a Delaware corporation ("Developer") (each a "Party" and collectively the "Parties"), acting by and through their authorized representatives.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Developer is developing and constructing a Class A apartment complex containing eighty (80) units identified as Palladium Farmersville Apartments (hereafter "Palladium" or "Development") that will be located on the south side of Audie Murphy Parkway (U.S. 380) and west of County Road 607 on Lot 4 of the Farmersville Market Center II Addition; and

WHEREAS, Developer must, under existing conditions, upgrade an existing sanitary sewer lift station together with related upgrades to the gravity flow sanitary sewer lines and force main lines required to serve Palladium that are situated offsite from the "Property," defined below, (the "Offsite Upgrades") at an estimated cost of One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000); and

WHEREAS, City has requested that Developer, in the alternative to making the Offsite Upgrades, work with City to design, construct, and install an offsite gravity flow sanitary sewer system that will serve Palladium and adjacent properties through a more reliable and efficient system and further allow the City to ultimately retire the sanitary sewer lift station that Developer would otherwise have been required to upgrade to serve Palladium (collectively the "Offsite Sewer Project"); and

WHEREAS, Developer has agreed to work with City to locate, design and construct the sanitary sewer system necessary to serve Palladium along the southern boundary of the Development and upon, over, under and about the "Property" in a manner that will match up with and connect to the Offsite Sewer Project at Developer's sole cost and expense (the "Onsite Sewer"); and

WHEREAS, Developer has agreed to escrow an amount equal to the cost of the Offsite Upgrades toward the construction of the Offsite Sewer Project in return for the City's agreement to obtain the necessary easements for, and design, construct, install and connect the Development to the Offsite Sewer Project; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to enter into this Development Agreement ("Agreement") to apportion the costs and responsibility for the design and construction of the Offsite Sewer Project between the City and Developer; and

WHEREAS, the Offsite Sewer Project will enhance and promote economic development in the City, promote the development of new and expanding business enterprises, stimulate commercial development activity, generate additional sales tax and enhance the property tax base and economic vitality of City;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the City and the Developer do mutually contract and agree as follows, to-wit:

A. <u>INCORPORATION OF RECITALS</u>

The Recitals set forth above are hereby approved and incorporated into the body of this Agreement as if copied in their entirety.

B. <u>PROPERTY</u>

This Agreement is for property located in an area located generally south of Audie Murphy Parkway (U.S. 380) and west of County Road 607 on Lot 4R of the Farmersville Market Center II Addition in the City of Farmersville, Collin County, Texas, containing approximately 6.745 acres of land, more fully described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and fully incorporated herein by reference (the "Property").

C. <u>PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS</u>

Developer agrees to escrow funds with the City for the construction of the Offsite Sewer Project to serve the development on the Property to be known as **Palladium Farmersville Apartments** as provided herein below in this Agreement.

Developer agrees to complete all other required public infrastructure for the development on the Property to be known as **Palladium Farmersville Apartments** prior to the recording of the record plat save and except those improvements identified herein below in this Agreement and the attached Exhibits, the funds for the design and construction of Developer's portion of the Offsite Sewer Project are being escrowed contemporaneously with the execution of this Agreement.

1. Responsibility of Developer for Onsite Sewer

- (a) Developer shall coordinate with the City's Engineering Consultant, DBI Engineers, to design and construct the Onsite Sewer upon, over, under and across the Property near its southern boundary at Developer's sole cost and expense in accordance with the plans approved by the City for the Onsite Sewer in a manner that will allow the City to incorporate the Onsite Sewer into and connect the Onsite Sewer to the Offsite Sewer Project specifically including, but not limited to, all required manholes on the Property to tie into the ten-inch 10" diameter polyvinyl chloride ("PVC") waste water lines to be constructed offsite and extended along the southern boundary of the Property.
- (b) Developer shall also dedicate to City, at no cost to City, such easements as are required for the Onsite Sewer to accommodate a minimum ten-inch (10") diameter PVC waste water line and all required manholes to serve the Property and provide the connection between the Onsite Sewer and the Offsite Sewer Project in a form reasonably satisfactory to the City
- (c) Such easements shall be provided to the City and the Onsite Sewer designed and constructed in strict accordance with the approved plans therefor and the City's Subdivision Ordinance and applicable design standards and final accepted by the City prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for Palladium Farmersville Apartments.

2. Responsibility of Developer for Offsite Sewer Project

- (a) Developer shall escrow a cash deposit with the City in the amount of One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000) (the "Escrow Deposit") for Developer's portion of the design and construction of the Offsite Sewer Project that will also provide the offsite connectivity required to provide sanitary sewer service to Palladium Farmersville Apartments.
- (b) Developer shall pay the Escrow Deposit to the City within thirty (30) days from the date this Agreement is signed by the last party to execute it ("Effective Date").
- (c) The City shall hold the Escrow Deposit in an interest-bearing escrow account in accordance with this Agreement. The escrow account interest rate shall be established in the City's discretion, and may vary.

(d) The City shall have the right to use the Escrow Deposit to pay for the design, construction and installation of the Offsite Sewer Project. The City shall also have the right to use any interest generated on the Escrow Deposit to cover unexpected or incidental costs of completion, including the City's administrative expenses.

3. Responsibility of City for Offsite Sewer Project

- (a) City shall cause its Engineering Consultant, DBI Engineers, to coordinate with Developer for the design and construction of the Developer's Onsite Sewer and the Offsite Sewer Project such that the Onsite Sewer, if properly designed and constructed, will work seamlessly with the Offsite Sewer Project when connected thereto without the need for the Offsite Upgrades.
- (b) The City will obtain the easements required for, and design and construct the Offsite Sewer Project that is generally depicted and described on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes allowed by law.

D. <u>DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF SEWER PROJECT</u>

- 1. Developer agrees and understands that the City will use commercially reasonable efforts to have the Offsite Sewer Project substantially completed within ______ (____) days following the Effective Date if, and only if, Developer pays the Escrow Deposit to City within the time frame required in Paragraph C.2., above (the "Substantial Completion Date"). The City shall be allowed to undertake the design, construction and acceptance of the Offsite Sewer Project at such time as the City deems it desirable or necessary, and in the sole discretion of the City save and except to the extent specifically provided otherwise herein.
- 2. City specifically agrees that City will provide Palladium Farmersville Apartments with sewer pumping service, as necessary, if (a) any phase or component of Palladium Farmersville Apartments is ready for occupancy after the Substantial Completion Date and (b) the Offsite Sewer Project is not then substantially complete. If City does not have then current funds budgeted for such purpose, Developer specifically agrees that City may utilize the Escrow Deposit for such purpose provided that Developer shall not be required to bear any additional costs associated with the Offsite Sewer Project. Any obligation to provide sewer pumping services under this paragraph shall automatically expire upon City's final acceptance of the Offsite Sewer Project.

- 3. The Developer agrees that the City shall have the right to enter upon Developer's property to survey, stake, bore, construct and install the connections between the Onsite Sewer and the Offsite Sewer Project at such time as the City deems necessary.
- 4. After Developer pays the Escrow Deposit to City, the City will solicit competitive bids for the construction of the Offsite Sewer Project in accordance with the requirements of Texas law.
- 5. City hereby agrees that City will, after receipt of Developer's payment of the Escrow Deposit, award the bid for the construction of the Offsite Sewer Project, and issue a notice to proceed with the construction of the Offsite Sewer Project to the low responsible bidder, as determined by City in City's sole discretion. City will thereafter monitor and oversee the work performed to obtain compliance with the contract documents for the Offsite Sewer Project.
- 6. Developer specifically authorizes the City to utilize the Escrow Deposit to pay for the design and construction of the Offsite Sewer Project and all necessary appurtenances to said improvements as needed in the sole discretion of City.

E. <u>CITY DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCES</u>

Developer shall develop the Property in accordance with the standards as set forth in City of Farmersville zoning, subdivision and land development ordinances, including but not limited to provisions as to drainage, erosion control, pro rata payments, storm water, park land dedication, impact fees, street design standards, public improvements policy and construction standards.

F. NO WAIVER

Nothing herein shall relieve the Developer, its successors, assigns, vendors, grantees, and/or trustees, from its responsibilities for construction of public improvements under applicable development ordinances upon development of the Property. Developer shall not be entitled to wastewater impact fee credits for any line that is not actually constructed or which is not constructed in accordance with the City's Master Plan and development ordinances.

G. AGREEMENT MAY NOT BE PLEDGED AS COLLATERAL

Developer may not pledge this Agreement, or any credits granted hereunder, as collateral for purposes of securing financing for development of the Property.

H. GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Notice of Default; Opportunity to Cure; Remedies

- (a) Should any Party allege that the other has defaulted in the performance of any obligation hereunder, it will provide at least thirty (30) days written notice to the other Party specifying the nature of the alleged default and opportunity to cure the default before exercising any remedy related to the alleged default.
 - (b) Upon the failure of either Party to comply with the provisions of this Agreement, which failure continues beyond the thirty (30) day notice and cure period provided above, the other Party shall have the right to enforce the terms and provisions of this Agreement by specific performance, or by such other legal or equitable relief to which the non-defaulting Party may be entitled.
 - (c) Any remedy or relief described in this Agreement shall be cumulative of and in addition to any other remedies and relief available at law or in equity.
 - (d) The foregoing notwithstanding, it is understood and agreed that in addition to any other remedy which the City may have upon default by Developer under this Agreement, should Developer fail to comply with the Subdivision Ordinance or any City development regulation, the City may terminate this Agreement. Upon termination pursuant to this subsection, all impact fee credits shall terminate.

2. <u>Entire Agreement; Interpretation of this Agreement</u>

- (a) This Agreement including any attached exhibits is the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous understandings or representations, whether oral or written, respecting the subject matter herein. If there is a conflict between this Agreement and prior written or verbal representations, this Agreement shall control.
- (b) This Agreement shall, in the event of any dispute over its meaning or application, be interpreted fairly and reasonably, and neither more strictly for or against either Party.

3. <u>Amendment</u>

No amendment of this Agreement will be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the duly authorized representatives of the Parties hereto, which amendment will incorporate this Agreement in every particular not otherwise changed by the amendment.

4. No Amendment of Other Agreements

Unless otherwise expressly stipulated herein, this Agreement is separate from and will not constitute an amendment or modification of any other agreement between the Parties.

5. Other Instruments, Actions

The Parties hereto agree that they will take such further actions and execute and deliver such other and further consents, authorizations, instruments, or documents as are necessary or incidental to effectuate the purposes of this Agreement.

6. No Third-Party Beneficiaries

Except as otherwise expressly provided herein to the contrary, nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to confer upon any person other than the Parties hereto any rights, benefits or remedies by, through, under or because of this Agreement.

7. Applicable Law; Venue

This Agreement shall be construed under and according to the laws of the State of Texas. Personal jurisdiction and venue for any suit arising hereunder shall be in Collin County, Texas.

8. Severability

The provisions of this Agreement are severable, and if any court shall ever hold any word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or other part of this Agreement or the application of it to any person or circumstance of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement and the application of such word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or other part of this Agreement to other persons or circumstances will not be affected by that and this Agreement will be construed as if it had never contained such invalid or unconstitutional portion therein.

9. <u>Counterparts</u>

The Parties may execute this Agreement in one or more duplicate originals each of equal dignity.

10. Notices

For the purposes of Notice, the addresses of the Parties will, until changed as provided below, be as follows:

The Parties will have the right from time to time to change their respective addresses upon written notice to the other Party. If any date or notice period described in this Agreement ends on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the applicable period for calculating the Notice will be extended to the first business day following such Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday.

11. No Waiver of Agreement

No waiver of any provision of this Agreement will be deemed to constitute a waiver of any other provision or any other agreement between the Parties. No waiver of any provision of this Agreement will be deemed to constitute a continuing waiver unless expressly provided for by written amendment to this Agreement; nor will the waiver of any default under this Agreement be deemed a waiver of any subsequent defaults of the same type. Nothing herein shall waive any obligations of Developer under applicable ordinances, including but not limited to the subdivision ordinance, the sewer and water impact fee ordinance, or the roadway impact fee ordinance.

12. Attorney's Fees

Should either Party be required to resort to litigation to enforce the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing Party, plaintiff or defendant, shall be entitled to recover its costs, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, and expert witness fees, from the other Party. If the court awards relief to both Parties, each will bear its own costs in their entirety except as otherwise specified by the court.

13. Governmental Authority

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to limit, restrict, modify, or abrogate the City's governmental authority or ordinances respecting the

facilities and wastewater improvements contemplated by the terms of this Agreement except as specifically waived or modified herein or by specific action of the City Council, nor the City's duty to provide for the public health, safety, and welfare in the construction or maintenance of the same.

14. Assignability

This Agreement shall not be assignable by Developer without the prior written consent of the City, which consent will not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed.

15. Binding Obligation

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their representatives, successors, and assigns.

16. <u>Indemnity and Hold Harmless Agreement</u>

Developer, its successors, assigns, vendors, grantees, and/or trustees do hereby agree to fully indemnify, protect and hold City harmless from all third-party claims, suits, judgments, and demands, including its reasonable attorney's fees, arising out of the sole or concurrent negligence of Developer, and only to the extent or percentage attributable to Developer, in the subdividing, development, or construction of public improvements, including the negligent maintenance thereof. Developer shall not be responsible for or be required to indemnify City from City's own negligence. The indemnity contained in this Paragraph shall expire five (5) years from the date of final acceptance of each phase of the improvements.

17. Revocation

In the event Developer fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Agreement, City shall be authorized to file this instrument in the records of Collin County as a Mechanic's Lien against Developer's property; and in the alternative, City shall be authorized to levy an assessment against Developer's property for public improvements to be held as a tax lien against the Property by City.

18. Rough Proportionality and Waiver of Claims

Developer has been represented by legal counsel in the negotiation of this Agreement and been advised, or has had the opportunity to have legal counsel review this Agreement and advise Developer, regarding Developer's rights under Texas and federal law. Developer hereby waives any requirement that the City retain a professional engineer, licensed pursuant to Chapter 1001 of the Texas Occupations Code, to review and determine that the exactions required by the City as a condition of approval for the development of this Property are roughly proportional or roughly proportionate to the proposed development's anticipated impact. (These exactions may include but are not limited to the making of dedications or reservations of land, the payment of fees, the construction of facilities, and the payment of construction costs for public facilities.) Developer specifically reserves its right to appeal the apportionment of municipal infrastructure costs in accordance with Tex. Loc. Gov't Code § 212.904. However, notwithstanding the foregoing, Developer hereby releases the City from any and all liability under Tex. Loc. Gov't Code § 212.904 regarding or related to the cost of those municipal infrastructure improvements required for the development of the Property.

It is the intent of this Agreement that the provision for wastewater improvements made herein constitutes a proportional allocation of Developer's responsibility for wastewater improvements for the Property. Developer hereby waives any federal constitutional claims and any statutory or state constitutional takings claims under the Texas Constitution and Chapter 395 of the Tex. Loc. Gov't. Code. Developer further releases City from any and all claims based on excessive or illegal exactions; it being agreed that Developer's infrastructure contribution(s) (after receiving all contractual offsets, credits and reimbursements) is roughly proportional or roughly proportionate to the demand that is placed on the wastewater system by the development of Developer's Property. Developer further acknowledges that the benefits of zoning and platting have been accepted with full knowledge of potential claims and causes of action which may be raised now and in the future, and Developer acknowledges the receipt of good and valuable consideration for the release and waiver of such claims. Developer shall indemnify and hold harmless City from any claims and suits of third parties, including but not limited to Developer's assigns. successors. grantees, vendors, trustees representatives, brought pursuant to this Agreement or the claims or types of claims described in this paragraph.

19. Continuity

This Agreement shall be a covenant running with the land, and be binding upon Developer, its successors, heirs, assigns, grantees, vendors, trustees, representatives, and all others holding any interest now or in the future.

20. <u>Termination and Release</u>

Upon satisfactory completion by Developer and City of their respective obligations under this Agreement and final acceptance of the Offsite Sewer Project by City, this Agreement shall terminate and City will execute a release of covenant to Developer, its heirs, successors, assigns, grantees, vendors, trustees, representatives, and all others holding any interest now or in the future.



COUNTY OF COLLIN § CITY – SCHOOL FARMERSVILLE

ELECTION SERVICES

BY THE TERMS OF THIS CONTRACT made and entered into by and between the CITY OF FARMERSVILLE, hereinafter referred to as the "CITY," and the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FARMERSVILLE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, hereinafter referred to as the "SCHOOL DISTRICT," and BRUCE SHERBET, Elections Administrator of Collin County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as "Contracting Officer," pursuant to the authority in Subchapter D, Section 31.092, of Chapter 31, of the Texas Election Code, agree to the following particulars in regard to coordination, supervision and running of the City and School District's May 4, 2019 Joint General & Special Election and a City Runoff Election, if necessary, on June 8, 2019. An additional cost estimate, early voting calendar, and Election Day polling place schedule will be prepared should a Runoff Election be necessary.

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises hereinafter set out. IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- I. DUTIES AND SERVICES OF CONTRACTING OFFICER. The Contracting Officer shall be responsible for performing the following duties and shall furnish the following services and equipment:
- A. The Contracting Officer shall arrange for appointment, notification (including writ of election), training and compensation of all presiding judges, alternate judges, the judge of the Central Counting Station and judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board.
 - a. The Contracting Officer shall be responsible for notification of each Election Day and Early Voting presiding judge and alternate judge of his or her appointment. The recommendations of the City and the School District will be the accepted guidelines for the number of clerks secured to work in each Vote Center. The presiding election judge of each Vote Center, however, will use his/her discretion to determine when additional manpower is needed during peak voting hours. The Contracting Officer

will determine the number of clerks to work in the Central Counting Station and the number of clerks to work on the Ballot Board. Election judges shall be secured by the Contracting Officer with the approval of the City and the School District.

- b. Election judges shall attend the Contracting Officer's school of instruction (Elections Seminar); calendar will be provided.
- c. Election judges shall be responsible for picking up from and returning election supplies to the county election warehouse located at 2010 Redbud Blvd., Suite 102, McKinney. Compensation for this pickup and delivery of supplies will be \$25.00.
- d. The Contracting Officer shall compensate each election judge and worker. Each judge shall receive \$12.00 per hour for services rendered. Each alternate judge and clerk shall receive \$10.00 per hour for services rendered. Overtime will be paid to each person working over 40 hours per week.
- B. The Contracting Officer shall procure, prepare, and distribute voting machines, election kits and election supplies.
 - a. The Contracting Officer shall secure election kits which include the legal documentation required to hold an election and all supplies including locks, pens, magic markers, etc.
 - b. The Contracting Officer shall secure all tables, chairs, and legal documentation required to run the Central Counting Station.
 - c. The Contracting Officer shall provide all lists of registered voters required for use on Election Day and for the early voting period required by law.

- d. The Contracting Officer shall procure and arrange for the distribution of all election equipment and supplies required to hold an election.
 - 1. Equipment includes the rental of voting machines, ADA compliance headphones and keypads (1 per site), transfer cases, voting signs and election supply cabinets.
 - 2. Supplies include smart cards, sample ballots, provisional forms, maps, labels, pens, tape, markers, etc.
- C. The Contracting Officer, Bruce Sherbet, shall be appointed the Early Voting Clerk by the City and the School District.
 - a. The Contracting Officer shall supervise and conduct Early Voting by mail and in person and shall secure personnel to serve as Early Voting Deputies.
 - b. Early Voting by personal appearance for the City and School District's May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election shall be conducted during the time period and at the locations listed in Exhibit "A", attached and incorporated by reference into this contract.
 - c. All applications for an Early Voting mail ballot shall be received and processed by the Collin County Elections Administration Office,
 2010 Redbud Blvd., Suite 102, McKinney, Texas 75069.
 - 1. Application for mail ballots erroneously mailed to the City or School District shall immediately be faxed to the Contracting Officer for timely processing. The original application shall then be forwarded to the Contracting Officer for proper retention.
 - 2. All Federal Post Card Applicants (FPCA) will be sent a mail ballot. No postage is required.

- d. All Early Voting ballots (those cast by mail and those cast by personal appearance) shall be prepared for count by the Early Voting Ballot Board in accordance with Section 87.000 of the Texas Election Code. The presiding judge of this Board shall be appointed by the Contracting Officer.
- D. The Contracting Officer shall arrange for the use of all Election Day Vote Centers. The City and School District shall assume the responsibility of remitting the cost of all employee services required to provide access, provide security or provide custodial services for the Vote Centers. The Election Day Vote Centers are listed in Exhibit "B", attached and incorporated by reference into this contract.
- E. The Contracting Officer shall be responsible for establishing and operating the Central Counting Station to receive and tabulate the voted ballots in accordance with Section 127.001 of the Election Code and of this agreement. Counting Station Manager and Central Count Judge shall be Bruce Sherbet. The Tabulation Supervisor shall be Patty Seals.
 - a. The Tabulation Supervisor shall prepare, test and run the county's tabulation system in accordance with statutory requirements and county policies, under the auspices of the Contracting Officer.
 - b. The Public Logic and Accuracy Test of the electronic voting system shall be conducted.
 - c. Election night reports will be available to the City and School District at the Central Counting Station on election night. Provisional ballots will be tabulated after election night in accordance with law.
 - d. The Contracting Officer shall prepare the unofficial canvass report after all precincts have been counted, and will provide a copy of the unofficial canvass to the City and School District as soon as possible after all returns have been tallied.
 - e. The Contracting Officer shall be appointed the custodian of the voted ballots and shall retain all election material for a period of 22 months.

- 1. Pending no litigation and as prescribed by law, the voted ballots shall be shredded 22 months after the election.
- 2. The City and School District can obtain the list of registered voters from the Elections Administration Office after this retention period. Pending no litigation and if the City or School District does not request the lists, the Contracting Officer shall destroy them.
- f. The Contracting Officer shall conduct a manual count as prescribed by Section 127.201 of the Texas Election Code and submit a written report to the City and School District in a timely manner. The Secretary of State may waive this requirement. If applicable, a written report shall be submitted to the Secretary of State as required by Section 127.201(E) of the aforementioned code.
- II. DUTIES AND SERVICES OF THE CITY AND SCHOOL DISTRICT. The City and School District shall assume the following responsibilities:
- A. The City and School District shall prepare the election orders, resolutions, notices, official canvass and other pertinent documents for adoption by the appropriate office or body. The City and School District assumes the responsibility of posting all notices and likewise promoting the schedules for Early Voting and Election Day.
- B. The City and School District shall provide the Contracting Officer with an updated map and street index of their jurisdiction in an electronic (shape file preferred) or printed format as soon as possible but no later than Friday, March 8, 2019.
- C. The City and School District shall procure and provide the Contracting Officer with the ballot layout and Spanish interpretation in an electronic format.
 - a. The City and School District shall deliver to the Contracting Officer as soon as possible, but no later than 5:00 PM Thursday, February 21, 2019, the official wording for the City and School District's May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election.

- b. The City and School District shall approve the "blue line" ballot format prior to the final printing.
- D. The City and School District shall post the publication of election notice by the proper methods with the proper media.
- E. The City and School District shall compensate the Contracting Officer for any additional verified cost incurred in the process of running this election or for a manual count this election may require, consistent with charges and hourly rates shown on Exhibit "C" for required services.
- F. The City and School District shall pay the Contracting Officer 90% of the estimated cost to run the said election prior to Friday, April 5, 2019. The Contracting Officer shall place the funds in a "contract fund" as prescribed by Section 31.100 of the Texas Election Code. The Deposit should be delivered within the mandatory time frame to:

Collin County Treasury 2300 Bloomdale Rd. #3138 McKinney, Texas 75071

Made payable to: "Collin County Treasury" with the note "for election services" included with check documentation.

- G. The City and School District shall pay the cost of conducting said election, less partial payment, including the 10% administrative fee, pursuant to the Texas Election Code, Section 31.100, within 30 days from the date of final billing.
- III. COST OF SERVICES. See Exhibit "C."
- IV. JOINT GENERAL AGREEMENT. See Exhibit "D".
- V. GENERAL PROVISIONS.
- A. Nothing contained in this contract shall authorize or permit a change in the officer with whom or the place at which any document or record relating to the City and School District's May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election is to be filed or the place

at which any function is to be carried out, or any nontransferable functions specified under Section 31.096 of the Texas Election Code.

- B. Upon request, the Contracting Officer will provide copies of all invoices and other charges received in the process of running said election for the City and School District.
- C. If the City and/or School District cancel their election pursuant to Section 2.053 of the Texas Election Code, the Contracting Officer shall be paid a contract preparation fee of \$75. An entity canceling an election will not be liable for any further costs incurred by the Contracting Officer in conducting the May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election. All actual shared cost incurred in the conduct of the election will be divided by the actual number of entities contracting with the Contracting Officer and holding a May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election.
- D. The Contracting Officer shall file copies of this contract with the County Judge and the County Auditor of Collin County, Texas.

JOINT ELECTION AGREEMENT

between

The City Council of the City of Farmersville (the City), the Board of Trustees of the Farmersville Independent School District (FISD), known as (the School), and the Board of Trustees of Collin College District (the College).

BY THE TERMS OF THIS AGREEMENT, the City, the School and the College, do hereby agree, pursuant to the provisions of the Texas Election Code, to hold a joint election for the General Election and Special Election should it be called, of the City and the General Election and Special Election should it be called, of the School District and the College to be held on Saturday, May 4, 2019. The entities have contracted with the Collin County Elections Administrator (Election Administrator) to perform various duties and responsibilities on their behalf.

The City, FISD and the College shall share equally in shared expenses applicable for the Early Voting location and Election Day Vote Center at the Farmersville City Hall. Expenses include polling location costs, election officials, supplies, ballots and any other and all necessary expenses for the election upon receipt of satisfactory billing and invoices reflecting the total of such election.

Tabulation and programming costs shall be shared equally between the number of entities holding an election on May 4, 2019. Centralized costs will be determined based on voter registration per jurisdiction. An entity canceling an election pursuant to Section 2.053 of the Texas Election Code will not be liable for costs incurred by the Elections Administrator in conducting the May 4, 2019, Joint General & Special Election of the City, the School District and the College; they will be liable only for the contract preparation fee of \$75.00.
