# **Town Council Meeting Notes**

Your regular reporter is back on the job, after a threemonth absence due to work in New York. Many thanks to both Ken Schwartz and Sean Conlan for able work in covering those meetings. Eager to jump back into the fray, I was looking forward to sorting out complex or difficult issues for readers. Imagine my disappointment, then, to see an agenda that had no action items, only one new business item, and only five updates. On top of that, there were no presentations by residents, and very sparse attendance in the audience. Oh well. But maybe having a quiet low-key meeting is the better way to ease back into the reporter's role.

The preliminaries—the mayor's opening remarks, approval of the agenda, and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting all passed fairly quickly. Mayor Kacki noted that Malcolm Russell-Einhorn has now been appointed to the archives committee. Apparently, as noted in the *Bugle* last month, there was a hitch in his appointment due to an ordinance about residency requirements for town committees. The solution was to make him a "volunteer of special rank" (if I got that convoluted title right). She also noted that the grass has been cut and widows covered at the derelict house on Kenilworth, a house apparently now in foreclosure. Then both the agenda and minutes were approved with minor changes.

With no presentations by residents and no action items, the meeting moved on to new business. The sole item was a report by Mayor Kacki about a recent meeting and walk-through concerning a sidewalk on the south side of Strathmore Avenue, from the edge of Garrett Park to the entrance to Holy Cross High School. Although this is not officially a Garrett Park project (since it is not within the boundaries of the town), town residents have been active in pushing for it (recall the petition that circulated several months ago). The mayor was pleased with the meeting, which was attended by officials from the State Highway Authority (SHA), District 18 state legislators or their representatives from their staff, residents/officials of Garett Park and Garrett Park Estates, and administrators of Holy Cross. After years of indifference or opposition on the part of SHA, your reporter was surprised to hear that this project is now going to happen. The current goal is to have the design work done by the coming summer with actual construction occurring in 2021. Hooray!

The first update item was, of course, the neverending saga of the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) sidewalk project. Actual construction appeared to be likely in the very near future when your reporter disappeared at the end of the summer, and he feared that he would miss the chance to write about the actual start. Not to worry! Little niggling issue remain before construction starts, including something about "submittals" (don't ask; I have no clue). But there was at least the possibility that these would be resolved in a few more days, with notifications to residents affected by the work occurring by the time this report is printed.

Councilmember Wegner gave an update on the issue of additional lighted warning signs for the intersection of Strathmore and Keswick (with an additional flashing light on Strathmore, partway down the hill to alert uphill traffic to the presence of a pedestrian in the crosswalk) SHA is willing to support this, and councilmember Wegner is mobilizing our delegates to put some pressure on the county.

Councilmember Schulp noted that some warnings have been handed out already to cars violating parking regulations in the vicinity of Penn Place. He also noted that the Archives committee is moving forward now that it has its new member.

Councilmember Paczkowski's update on the land use committee provided what may turn out to be the most important news of the evening. The committee has been studying town side-lot setback requirements for corner lot properties and they are ready to make a proposal for changes in those rules. What is this all about? Apparently, this topic arose due to the county's desire to make it easier for homeowners to build accessory units on their property (e.g. motherin-law housing). Rather than saying more here, look for an email written by councilmember Paczkowski outlining what the committee has in mind. Suffice it to say that the issue is likely to involve a variety of views and will require discussion at public meetings to sort them out before any town council vote on the matter occurs.

Finishing out the evening, town manager Andrea Fox noted that revenues and expenses are proceeding as expected. All's well that ends well.

Communication. Please sign up for the resident's portal, as it provides the Town Office with one more way to reach you. Register at www.garrettparkmd.gov/residents-portal New to town? Contact the Town Office at 301-933-7488 or stop by the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor at Penn Place. We'll get you acquainted with what you need to know about living in Garrett Park.

Permits. A Garrett Park building permit is required when a new structure is to be built including houses, additions, sheds, garages, decks, porches, and driveways. This is in addition to the required Montgomery County permit. Complete your Garrett Park permit application and submit along with your plat and drawings to the Town Office before requesting a County permit. Yard Waste & Leaves. Yard waste is collected on the first Monday of each month now through February. Leaves are collected weekly, as early in the week as possible. Place leaves in rows streetside of the curb, and remove sticks, rocks, trash, and other debris that can damage the machinery. Shredded leaves or grass clippings should be bagged and put out for the regular yard waste collection on Mondays. Rain or inclement weather will delay leaf collection. Parents, please discourage your children from playing in leaves along the curb.


#### **CA Elections in January**

#### From the Archives

Feeling a bit overwhelmed that it's already 2020? Maybe it's time to visit the past at the Garrett Park Town Archives. We all know what life is like in 2020 Garrett Park, but what was it like 100 years ago in 1920? I did some exploring of our collections as well as the Library of Congress' Chronicling America website to find out ... Here are some interesting tidbits:

- In January 1920, Jason F. Defandorf (10800 Keswick) was the Mayor, and Smith L. Putnam (11006 Kenilworth) was Clerk-Treasurer.
- At their January 10 meeting, the Town Council ratified "The contract made with Charles H. Davis to perform the sanitary service for the town at 50 cents per house per month."
- The Town tax rate was 50 cents.
- In August 1920, town resident Lieutenant B.R. Donnelly's (11019 Kenilworth) request for telephone service was denied on account the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company had "no available conductors in our cable feeding that locality."
- In August 1920, the Town paid \$52.86 (less tradein value) to upgrade from an Underwood typewriter to an Oliver Model #9 typewriter.
- In September 1920, three months after passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, Jessie Ross Thomson (11018 Kenilworth), Garrett Park's local suffragist and President of the Woman's Suffrage League of Montgomery County, co-hosted a "citizenship school" in Rockville to teach women how to vote.
- In October 1920, Jessie Ross Thomson hosted 50 women from the Montgomery County Federation of Woman's Clubs at her home. Lunch was prepared and served by Garrett Park clubwomen

Mmes. Defandorf, Call, Truitt, Dye, Springer, and McMillan.

Who knows what you'll find when you dig through our Town Archives collections! Feel free to stop by. I'm usually here all day Wednesday and Thursday, but I'm happy to come in by appointment.

Santa Train Open House




The Altar family hosted their second annual Santa Train open house at 11100 Kenilworth Ave, and the Bugle is happy to report that it was a hit! Tony and Kristin were kind enough to provide some more background to the fantastic train set.

The layout is a combination of places the Altar family loves, including the Victorian homes from Garrett Park and Katonah, NY where they moved from in 1998; the mountains, rivers, and cabin home of northern California, and desert areas farther south; the midwestern small towns of Tony's native Pennsylvania; and places that live only in their imaginations. The wood platform and elevating mechanisms were made in 2017 by Tony and his engineering son, David. That project worked out beautifully and inspired the next 2 years of work creating the layout, requiring over 1,000 hours to complete. The base layer and all mountains are made from insulating foam blocks which are hand-sculpted and painted to look like rocks and natural terrain. The Altar's daughter, Juliana, and Tony designed the layout, and she learned how to use foam-cutting tools, solder, design switches and circuits, and operate the digitally-controlled locomotives.

The town benefits from an underground gold mine which provides significant economic benefit, though pilferage by some of its plastic inhabitants has been a problem. An active dinosaur digsite and Loch Ness monster sighting, working farm, and lively main street with two music bands performing are just some of the many attractions of this highly detailed and realistic layout.

When the layout is elevated, the houses are strategically placed to nestle between, and the streets lay underneath, the open beams of the ceiling joists (see below). This is the best "elevating" train layout Tony has ever seen. It is 6 x 10 feet in size with three separate oval tracks. The Altars had to keep pool and billiards in the picture, so this was like adding an extra room to the house.
