The Owls Head Conservation Commission celebrated the expansion of Plaisted Preserve, and an extension of the easement by Georges River Land Trust, last fall amidst the first flakes of winter, with a warming fire and a toast! Thanks to our generous donors, and thanks to the the State of Maine from whom we received a *Land for Maine's Future* grant. A huge shout out to Robin White (OHCC) and Annette Naegel (Georges River Land Trust) who put in hours of work to attain a sizable matching grant to meet our goal. It was a group effort involving all of you in so may ways, starting with your vote to support the project. Thank you.

Stewarding Plaisted Preserve is an ongoing role for the OHCC and its volunteers. Usage has increased considerably in the past few years which calls for greater attention to trail maintenance. Due to some severe storms, many trees were uprooted and downed, resulting in impassable and hazardous conditions along the trails. Beth Long, who serves as primary steward of the property, is consulting with tree removal specialists as well as trails designers to address some of the more challenging trail issues. The need for volunteers is ongoing, so contact the OHCC to learn more about how you can help.
