HISTORICAL SOCIETY: Inez Walters, representing the Historical Society submitted bids, as requested, to stucco the rear of the museum building. Bids were submitted by Luedke Construction in the amount of \$846.00 to stucco the south end of the building and the east wall except the bricked windows; Rawlins County Construction in the amount of \$2350.00 to stucco the rear of the building and complete east side, \$1520.00 for rear of building only. This request was tabled at this time due to expense of oiling the county roads, however, Mrs. Walters will discuss this with the board on November 29th when budgets will be reviewed.

BUDGET MEETING: The budget meeting was scheduled for 10:00 a.m. The 1984 budget was approved as published; there were no public participants.

COUNTY HEALTH: Wynemah Cox, director reported to the board that Colby Health Dept. will discontinue the Family Planning Clinics to Rawlins County, however, Colby will continue part of the service if Rawlins County will do the history and physicals. This is a State approved program. As the board has received no input from the citizens, this program was tabled.

--Ms. Cox requested that Jane Eller receive a 10¢/hr. raise. This was disallowed.

SERVICES FOR ELDERLY: Mr. & Mrs. Bruhn, Mr. & Mrs. Anslem Sramek met with the board to discuss the Senior Citizen Centers in Rawlins County. The recommended that Rawlins County provide \$1000.00 to match Federal Funds for the Northwest Kansas Area Agency on Aging, Inc. for 1984. The County provided \$1000.00 in January of 1983 and approved matching funds of \$1000.00 for 1984. This will be paid January of 1984. McDonald Senior Citizen Center recommended providing \$500 but stated they would cooperate with the other centers in the county.—Herndon presently is participating in a grant and Atwood is planning on applying for a grant to build a center.

-- the board appointed to the advisory council to serve Rawlins County Mrs. Gladys Bruhn and Mrs. Lillian Sramek.

HOSPITAL: The board reviewed the request from the hospital board to support and sponsor Industrial Revenue Bonds in order to purchase the Dill Medical Associated Clinic. The commissioners find that Doctor Dill did give the hospital board of trustees the option of extending the existing contract and as the hospital presently owns a clinic, we see no need in purchasing a second clinic. Also, a second clinic does not appear to be financially feasible. Therefore, we do not endorse issuing Industrial Revenue Bonds.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Jones reported he could not obtain a local bid on a new base unit and as we have a service contract with Motorola for the other units, the board approved purchase of the Motorola base unit in amount of \$4800.00. The present unit will go to McDonald.—discussed the sheriffs budget — Jones is concerned that the amount budgeted for the department will not be sufficient.

COURTHOUSE PAVING: the board discussed completing the courthouse paving. County clerk will ask that Finley construction meet with the board August 15th meeting date.

ROAD & BRIDGE: approved chip seal for all county roads. Revenue Sharing will be used for this expense of nealy \$90,000.00.

--noted that the Case tractors recently purchased have been in Beamgard's for repairs.

The bank representatives asked that Rawlins County utilize the service as this would be a service to the public rather than dealing with other counties. The banks agreed to pay for one-half the cost of the telecopier. Commissioner Unger moved that Rawlins County purchase the telcopier on a 50/50 cost basis with the banks. Second by Commissioner Lewis. Motion carried.

HOSPITAL: Eight members of the hospital board, Gordon Ensly & Pam Thomas presented the 1982-1983 audit report. Mentioned was a 48% increase in patient services; 57% of the charges were medicare patients, 24% was medicare write-off. Board designated funds are monies handled by the board, such as tax fund, donations.

VISITOR: Clyde Jensen reported that the inventory tax for his business is nearly \$14,000. and felt that this was unfair in light of the deletion of farm machinery.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Crews are clearing roads following the recent 20" of snow storm. The board confirmed the policy of clearing the main graveled roads, bus & mail routes as first priority. CLOSING: the courthouse will be closed December 26th for Christmas vacation, December 30th inorder to close books, and January 2nd for New Years.

MEETING DATE CHANGED: The commissioners meeting date will be changed to December 29th, due to the counthouse closing books on the 30th.

COUNTY INSURANCE: the board agreed to a \$200 deductible plan for Blue Cross-Blue Shield for the year 1984. It was also agreed to start an insurance fund by transferring \$200 per policyholder from each fund concerned; this money will be paid to the doctor or hospital when the bill is submitted for a service.

FISH & GAME LICENSE: County Clerk reported that McDonald Hardware has declared bankruptcy and has two game books in their possession. Darwin Higgins has been contacted by the McDonald bank, who carries the bond, but at this date has not turned in the books. Also, one of the county clerks game books is missing \$120.25. During 1983, the sheriffs office has been selling licenses for the clerk and turns in the money as they collect it. They are unsure whether this money has been taken during the evening or weekend at the sheriffs office or whether someone has gotten into the clerks office as the door has been found open several mornings.

ATTORNEY: Approved to hire an outside attorney when a possible conflict of interest arises.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: the board adjourned to executive session at 10:45. Commissioner Lewis was appointed to consult with Turner & Associates regarding the hospital problems.

TAX COMPLAINTS: Those discussing real estate complaints were: Raymond Wahrman on Mineral & Oil protests, also asked whether his brother Harold has to pay his tax as he is in jail & connot do the work on the farm. The board agreed that the M & O tax is a legal tax according to statuate and Harold is liable for his taxes.

--Brenda Smith feels that her house is valued to high according to similar houses. The board asked the appraiser to review this and suggested that Smith follow the proper procedure for filing taxes under protest according to KSA 1981 supp. 79-2005.

--appraiser Dixson reported that Floyd Frisbie also questioned the mineral & dil taxes and Lonnie Snodgrass the valuation on storage units. These are legitimate taxes.

EXTENSION: Dan Sanneman discussed with the board the 1985 budget estimate as the extension board will be meeting to work on their budget.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session June 18, 1984 with all members of the board present. Also in attendance was Rod Beamgard, Commissioner-elect for District #2.

DRUG & ALCOHOL ABUSE COUNCIL: Debra Thomas presented a report outlining a budget projection for FYE 6-30-85 as authorized by H.B. 2601. This reflects expense in the amount of \$5480 and revenue in the amount of \$2050 from Senate Bill #888 funds. Also presented was a calendar of projected events, public awareness programs. The Commissioners asked if this program is a duplicated of service between the hospital and mental health. The council replied that the medical approach is only one piece of the pie. The board also discussed locating the council at the hospital, rather than renting a building. The hospital also presented a budget projection for counseling for substance abuse, showing a projected deficit. Scott Beims, as County Attorney stated that he feels we have a council now that would be able to get out and make things work. No action was taken on this request at this time. In attendance at this session were Lynn Howard, Pam Thomas, Jim Bowles, Judge Dorothy Reinert, and Alice Heble.

AIRPORT: The board briefly disucssed the lease dated May 31, 1984 in which a tract of landwas leased to Atwood for the purpose of erecting a sign advertising the City of Atwood. Further discussion was tabled pending results of the City Council meeting this evening and the airport meeting the 20th.

HOSPITAL: The hospital board presented petitions signed by nearly 600 residents of the county as a request that the commissioners allow the voters of Rawlins County to vote on the question of whether or not a tax levy of not to exceed five mills should be imposed on the taxable property for the purpose of providing needed funds for the operation of the hospital. Pam Thomas presented a map which pinpoints areas represented by the request. Present at this session were the hospital board chairman, Doyle Beamgard, Barney Horton, Pam Thomas, Claude Kisling, Lester Jensen. There was also public participation and KSN news in attendance. Following the presentation of the petitions by the hospital board, the commissioners approved the following agreement and presented the same to the hospital board, which will be discussed at the hospital board meeting June 19th.

THIS AGREEMENT, Made and entered into this ___day of _____, 1984, by and between Rawlins County, hereinafter referred to as COUNTY, and Rawlins County Hospital, Inc, hereinafter referred to HOSPITAL.

WHEREAS, said HOSPITAL has requested that COUNTY submit to the voters of Rawlins County, Kansas the question as to whether or not the said COUNTY should impose an annual tax levy of up to five mils for the purpose of providing funds for the operation, maintenance and other legal functions of said HOSPITAL; and

WHEREAS, said COUNTY has agreed to submit said proposition to the voters of COUNTY proviced said HOSPITAL agree to certain conditions governing the expenditure of funds for the operation of HOSPITAL.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the election called for herein is to authorize the levying of up to 5 mils per year for the purposes set forth above, however, said election is not to be interpreted as automatically insuring to HOSPITAL that said levy will be made, but rather said HOSPITAL shall present to COUNTY prior to July 1 of each year its propsed budget, including projected receipts and expenditures and request for tax levy, if necessary, which request shall be finally determined by COUNTY in the same manner as any other budgetary request.
- 2. That in the event it is necessary to levy in excess of 2 mils for the purpose stated above for the calender year 1989 or later, then said matter shall again be submitted to the voters of COUNTY prior to its continuation.
- 3. That HOSPITAL shall be allowed to honor all legal commitments made prior to June 18, 1984 regardless of whether or not they might be in conflict with the provisions of this agreement, however, all commitments made by said HOSPITAL after June 18, 1984 shall be subject to the provisions of this agreement.
- 4. That so long as any COUNTY tax levy is required for the operation of the HOSPITAL said HOSPITAL agrees to operate the same in conformity with the laws of the State of Kansas, as they might exist from time to time, governing the operation of County Hospitals as the same laws relate to receipts and/or expenditures of funds, regardless of the source of the said funds. Exception to this agreement would be made only after prior approval of COUNTY. It is the intention of the parties hereto that funds of said HOSPITAL will be spent only in such a manner as a COUNTY HOSPITAL could spend the same unless otherwise approved to by COUNTY, even though said HOSPITAL is recognized by the parties hereto as not being a County Hospital, but rather a non-profit, private, corporation.
- 5. That said HOSPITAL wil file with the County Clerk, the same to public records, a full and complete accounting of all expenditures by draft number, amount and to whom paid. One exception to his is that the payroll expenditures shall show as only one item. These statements of expenditures shall be filed with said County Clerk within three (3) days after the board of HOSPITAL has approved has approved the same for payment.

Should HOSPITAL fail to abide by the terms of this agreement or should HOSPITAL determine that it can no longer operate said hospital, then and either of these events, HOSPITAL agrees to relinquish control of the same to COUNTY, and FURTHER AGREES that in the event of either of the above happening, that it will continue to operate the same for a period of sixty (60) days, during which time COUNTY shall take the necessary steps to assume the operation of the same, either by operating it as a County Hospital or by leasing it to another entity.

COUNTY agrees to submit the question as to whether or not it should levy up to 5 mils on the property of COUNTY for the purpose of providing funds for the operation of said HOSPITAL for the next four (4) years, upon the conditions of this agreement, said election to be held at either the PRIMARY OR GENERAL ELECTION in 1984, to be determined by HOSPITAL. In the event is is possible, said HOSPITAL also has the right to decide to submit the question to the voters of COUNTY, by mail, said HOSPITAL to stand the cost of the same. This agreements has been entered into by both parties with the intention that it will allow the continued operation of HOSPITAL for the benefit of the residents of Rawlins County and at the same time insure to the voters and taxpayers of COUNTY that the tax funds authorized in the event of the passage of said proposition will be spent in accordance with the laws of the State of Kansas governing publicly supported hospitals, unless otherwise agreed to by COUNTY prior to any such expenditure.

There was further discussion concerning the above, the Commissioners and the hospital board may hold a special meeting prior to June 29th regular meeting date in order to satisfy the legal publication deadlines.

BUDGET: The board discussed the 1984 budget request received to date. Atwood City Library requested \$39,198; the board agreed that adding 6% increase to the \$26,800 plus \$8641 received from Revenue Sharing in 1984 for all county libraries would be more realistic. Reviewed estimates from 8 Jr. Colleges, Court budget request, Mental Health, and Extension.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Reported that the solid waste machine is sucking dirt, as Sellers cannot find the problem, prroved to have Caterpiller look at it. Ella Holthus at Ludell called concerning a culvert, Frank Pochop reported a road condition, check a culvert at Joe Vaps, Sand located at Gary Sabatka's

The county reported that persons farming the shoulders of the road will be reported to the

County Attorney.

WATER RIGHTS: Agreed that the County reserves the right to use water resulting from fills made by the County.

Scott Pitner was granted a Leave of Absence, Jean Pitner was approved as his temporary replacement during this time.

Rawlins County Board of Commissioners
Rawlins County Hospital, Inc. Board of Trustees
June 22, 1984

The joint meeting was called to order at 7:15 A.M. Present were Commissioners Charles Unger, Henry Cahoj and Bill Lewis; County Attorney Scott Beims; Hospital Board Members Doyle Beamgard, Claude Kisling, Marc Walker, Lester Jensen and Mike Braxmeyer; Administrator Pam Thomas; Rod Beamgard, Dr. Rodney Dill, Dr. George Erbacher and a representative of Channel 8 news, Oberlin, Kansas.

Doyle Beamgard gave a brief review of events leading to this joint meeting and requested a report from Lester Jensen. Dr. Dill was called from the meeting at this point. Mr. Jensen reported that a committee consisting of himself, Mike Braxmeyer, Barney Horton and Charles Unger had met Wednesday morning to discuss possible modification of the Commissioner's original proposed agreement. Bob Lewis, Jr., Hospital attorney, was also present at that meeting. There was three items of proposed change:

- 1) The 4 yr. limit on the mill levy vote concerned the Hospital Board because a new vote will occur in the same year the present lease with the County expires. The Board feared that a mill levy campaign during a management change could jeopardize the hospital.
- 2) The report of disbursements will be included as part of the Hospital minutes each month, without a definite time set for reporting.
- 3) The clause concerning failure to comply with the terms should be changed to "willfully and substantially fail to comply" so that a minor problem would not result in the Hospital losing its lease.

At this point Commissioner Lewis moved and Commissioner Unger seconded that the Commissioners go into executive session for ten minutes to receive the County Attorney's advice on the proposed changes. This was unanimously approved.

Mr. Beamgard called the hospital Board into executive session concurrently with a second from Lester Jensen and unanimous approval.

At 7:50, the Boards came out to executive session into joint open meeting. Mr. Lewis stated that the Commissioners felt that a time limit on the mill levy was unnecessary, since the Commissioners had final approval the the Hospital budget each year and could call for another vote at anytime. He stated that there were no problems with the other proposed changes.

Lester Jensen then moved that the agreement be approved as amended by the Hospital and the County, with any reference to a time period after which another vote on the mill levy would be required being stricken from the agreement. Claude Kisling seconded, and it passed the Hospital Board unanimously.

Henry Cahoj then made an identical motion for the Commissioners, seconded by Bill Lewis, this passed unanimously.

The amended agreement was signed by Commssioners and the Board officers. The Commissioners made a public statement expressions their support for the mill levy question being decided by ballot, their confidence that many questions had been answered by this agreement, and their concern that the hospital continue to operate in Rawlins County. Mr. Beamgard expressed similar feelings for the Hospital Board. Mrs. Thomas was directed to notify the County Clerk that the question should be placed on the August primary ballot.

RESOLUTION: As provided by House Bill 2601, 1984 Legislative Session, the board approved establishing a .10 mill levy in Rawlins County for the education, prevention and treatment of alcohol and drug abuse. This will be published in the Citizen Patriot for two weeks and will become effective 30 days after the last publication, unless a petition signed by not less than 5 percent of the registered voters is filed within the 30 days of the last publication.

FAIR: Irene Holste presented the 1985 fair budget in the amount of \$17,043.00, which is same as last year. Motion by Commissioner Cahoj, seconded by Commissioner Lewis to approve this budget and commended the Fair Board.

--Also approved the following Fair Board Members, as presented by L. Ann Domsch; Driftwood-Pattie Wolters, Elk-Danny Wicke, Grant-Brenda Brown, Herndon Peach Beims, Jefferson-Marvin Nelson, Laing-Dennis Adnerson, Logan-Elmer Pianalto, At Large-Sandy Studer and Karen Nelson, Beaver-Doug & Jan Klein.

COMPUTER: Rusty Addleman presented an update on the computer system for the courthouse. Addleman quoted a price of \$24,300 for a 35 megabit, 7 port system, with 2 terminals, 1 moden, 4 cartridges for backup, and line conditioner. This price includes installation, software and 90 warranty & training, The board agreed to purchase the computer from Revenue Sharing funds as this quote is approximately \$10,000.00 lower than previous quotes and will enable the offices to be set up by January 1st. Addleman will have a contract available by the next meeting date.

NOXIOUS WEED: Bob Simminger met with the board to report the areas he has been spraying. Simminger asked that Randy Solko take pictures of the four main noxious weeds in three stages of growth and post these in appropriate places in order for the public to be aware of the weeds actually declared noxious. Approved.

--Reported bindweed in ditch on 5-1-31, Cliff Sattler has a field with a large area of Noxious Weed. If a plane is used, the county will assume ½ the cost of the chemical.

--also approved to work with the Road & Bridge using the truck to spray noxious weeds along the State Highway ROW.

AUTOPSY: County Attorney, Scott Beims reported autopsy's are strictly up to the coroner. EMT or the sheriff is to notify the family doctor when a death occurs.

HOSPITAL: Pam Thomas, Administrator and hospital board members Claude Kisling, Lester Jensen, and Marc Walker presented the 1985 hospital budget, based on the 5 mill levy, if approved by the voters in the August 7th primary election. This budget was accepted unanimously. Should the question be defeated, the budget will be revised. Also discussed laundry, possibly contracting with Good Samaritan Home, and swing-bed being implemented Sept. 1st.

BUDGETS: Tentatively approved budget for the County Attorney at \$21,500, Sheriff \$115,000, District Court \$10,550, Health Department .50 mill, and Mental Health .33 mill.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Scott Pitner asked for a three months leave of absence. This was denied, however, the board agreed to grant a vacation of 30 working days. Jean Pitner will be working at the shop, part time at \$3.50/hr.

--crews are to start stockpiling gravel at Reubers after signing contract
--on the SE 9-2-36, 1.8 acres of land was granted to the county in 1950 for a public road.
Following the death of the grantor in 1978, Thomas Powell took title to the land and now wishes to have the 1.8 acres returned to farm it or to sell it to the County. Scott Beims phoned Mr. Thomas; it was agree to gravel 1 mile of road for the easement of the 1.8 acres. Beims will draw up an agreement.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session December 28, 1984 with all members of the board present. Also present were County Attorney-elect Charles Peckham, who was acting in Scott Beims absence, and Commissioner-elect Rod Beamgard.

ASSESSMENT OF STORAGE BUILDINGS: discussed the storage buildings owned by Arkie Snodgrass which was acted on at the meeting held December 17th. County Treasurer and the County Appraiser reported the abatement for the 1984 clerical error has been taken care of.

APPRAISER: Reported that each farm assessor has a list of specific questions for each taxpayer concerning assessing property.

--also to obtain information needed by the treasurer and clerk for the solid waste fee to be added to real estate in 1985.

CHAIRMAN: Motion carried that Henry E. Cahoj act as chairman of the board for the year 1985.

MEETING DATES: 1985 meeting dates were approved for the third Tuesday and the last working day each month.

RESOLUTION FOR SECURITIES: the board named all county banks as official depositors.

OFFICIAL PAPER: approved the contract with the Citizen Patriot as the official paper for 1985.

PURCHASING AGENT: approved to delete a purchasing agent; each office will be responsible for their purchases.

BEER LICENSE: approved the beer license for the Columbian Club.

EXPENSES: agreed that the expenses will remain as last year: .22¢ mile and meal allowance of \$7.00 a meal.

After phoning the Walsch Agency and E.C. Mellick for particulars, the board agreed to renew with the Walsch Agency. A bid of \$37,088.55 plus \$6,777.30 for road hazard coverage, making a total bid of \$43,865.85 was submitted by E.C. Mellick Agency.

HEALTH: Approved to participate in the WIC program with Sherman County. No cost to the County.

MCDONALD SENIOR CITIZENS: Dale LeBow submitted the senior Citizen report from the McDonald Center and stated he would again be willing to serve on the N.W. KS. Area Agency board for a three year term.

INVENTORY: Register of Deeds inventory as submitted by Jeannette Bethell was approved.

APPRAISER: the board voted to eliminate the position of field man in the appraisers office. The board feels the aerial photos purchased last year can be utilized by the appraiser.

Commissioner Cahoj was appointed by the KS commissioners Association to the tax and finance committee.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session January 22, 1985, with all members of the board present.

MENTAL RETARDATION: Elmer Burk extended greetings from Jim Blume and the staff of DSNWKS. Burk reported the debt load in the entire area has been reduced by \$140,000 and they operated in the black in 1984. Burk also reported that Jim Blume is chairing a special committee which is preparing a response to the legislature on several issues raised by Proposal 38 which, if adopted, would affect a change in the mill levy statute.

-- Presented a report of the mill levy from other counties in the district.

--signed the annual agreement for services

--Commissioner Cahoj asked if the roof repair on the center has been adequate; Burk replied that it has held very well.

-- the center has two vacancies at this time.

reported that one client is semi-sufficient and one additional client will be moving to Colby.

N.W. KS. PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT: LeRoy Lyon met with the board to discuss 1985 membership dues. Last year the dues were divided between the county, Herndon & McDonald City, Atwood City and the Atwood Chamber. These entities will be contacted; if they are receptive, the county agreed to membership.

--Mr. Lyon also noted that 5 letters were directed to the board recently regarding the planning board, the farming situation in the area, bankrupties, & grants available.
--there are 19 members on the board, which includes representatives from each of the 14 member counties. Rawlins County did not have a representative in 1984, LeRoy Lyon encouraged appointing a representative in 1985. The meetings are held once a month at Hill City. Appointing a member was tabled pending pending approval from the cities.

HOSPITAL: Pam Thomas & Lester Jensen presented the financial statement for the hospital for the year ending June 30, 1984. It was noted that medicare withheld \$125,000, but because of current programs, \$81,568 was reimbursed. No lawsuits are pending at this time. The board funds are up, Dr. Barr paid back the \$80,000 note, the hospital board owes \$96,000 on the clinic although there is a chance to sell.

JURY DUTY: discussed the question of paying employees if they are serving on the jury. Some road & bridge employees were drawn for jury duty, the board agreed to take the recommendation of the county attorney at this time and to add this question to the manual. (the county attorney recommends regular pay).

CASH: motion made by Commissioner Cahoj that no office exceed cash by \$20, except the treasurers office. Seconded by Commissioner Unger.

APPRAISER: Audrey Dixson requested a 5% increase for Kathy Bearley rather than the 2.5% increase previously requested and the farm appraisers a 2.5% increase. This request was denied, however, the increase for Kathy will be reviewed in May.

--Kathy Bearley asked to meet with the board, the board adjourned to executive session at this time and the clerk was asked to leave.

AIRPORT: meeting with the board was the airport board consisting of Gary Worthy, Earle Niermeier, and Bill Beamgard. They reported that Finley Construction was hired to pour a concrete taxiway. Originally the cost was expected to be \$12 to \$15,000 rather it will cost \$40,000. The board discussed revenue sharing monies, no action taken at this time, pending further information from the airport board.

SOLID WASTE: the appraiser asked whether to add the solid waste fee to church parsonages & other exempt property. The appraisers office is collecting information in order to add this charge to real estate. Tabled at this time.

DISTRICT COURT: the board received a letter from Judge Willoughby noting that he found the court library in such disarray that he was almost unable to locate the proper books. Some books are located in Judge Reinert's book room, in the courtroom, & in the clerk's office.

He request that the board authorize some road & bridge employees to assist in moving bookcases, etc, into the courtroom. Also, that the curtains and the blinds in the clerk's office and the courtroom be installed as soon as possible. Sometime during this year, the Judge will order a new desk and chair for use by the judges in Rawlins County to be placed in the courtroom. Judge Willoughby also mentioned the plumbing in the men's restroom, and a large leak in the back of the courtroom. He also states that if the board has any complaints concerning the operation of the court system that he be contacted rather than the clerk of the court. The county attorney was asked to reply, stating that the above request will be taken care of. At the request of the board, the county attorney made a review of the applicable law concerning responsibility of maintenance of the courtroom. Citing K.S.A. 20-348, the county is responsible for all expenses incurred for the operation of the District Court, other than those required to be paid by the State. Under K.S.A. 20-349, the judicial district is responsible for submitting a budget, once the budget is established the judge has the actual control over the budget. Under 19-1309, the county is responsible for providing a suitable place for the County Law Library and that the courtroom is adequately furnished.

INSURANCE: the board discussed county insurance. The bid from E.C. Mellick Agency of \$43,865.85 includes road hazard insurance at a price of \$4.23 per mile while the Walsch Agency quoted by phone a price of \$19.00 per mile. As the board cannot obtain a bid or even an idea of further cost to the county, the board voted to renew the 1985 insurance policies with the Mellick Agency rather than the Walsch Agency. Mellick Agency is effective January 15, 1985.

ELEVATOR: reviewed a bid from Finley Construction for \$64,285 for construction of an elevator with a 3 hour fire door and 2 storage areas. No action taken.

COUNTY GOVERNMENT DAY: approved elected officials attending county government day at Topeka February 6th.

Approved a humidifier needed in the computer room.

Approved contacting Guinns Plumbing for necessary work upstairs.

Approved County Clerk attnedance at a clerks meeting in Hutchinson February 7, 8.

Approved Clerk & Treasurer going to Oberlin to view their computer in operation.

DISTRIBUTIONS: Noted that all entities receiving county tax money are to submit a list of expenditures before receiving further distributions.

Joe Kogl was a visitor, noting a lot of property in the county is not on the tax rolls.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session February 19, 1985, with all members of the board present.

DISTRICT COURT: the board viewed a request for improvements needed in the Clerk of the District Court's office. This was tabled, the county attorney was requested to set up a meeting with Judge Willoughby the afternoon of March 7th for input of this request.

AIRPORT: Commissioner Beamgard reported that the city of Atwood agreed to pay \$2000.00 this year and \$2000.00 next year toward the airport taxiway. Rawlins County will pay \$13,000.00 from Revenue Sharing. Finley will delay \$7,000.00 until next year, without charging interest on the portion he carries. On the 630 sq. yards formed and ready to pour, Finley will reduce the concrete charg 50¢ sq. yard. The taxiway will be 6" thick. At a future date, 354 sq. yards on the north side will be completed, as the airport board will utilize the asphalt until funds are available.

STORAGE: Ben Harwerth will build additional storage space in the furnace room for supplies, leaving the vault free for records.

AMBULANCE: CLaude Kisling reported on an updated radio system for the ambulances. This would allow all county ambulances and the hospital to be on their own frequency. The cost for the system will be \$18,000 and the county could get on Dunders radio tower for \$50/mth. as the county tower is not high enough. Approved the radio system, this will be paid for as follows: ambulance equipment fund \$4,000; back salary for Kisling \$1000; anonymous donation \$4,000; hospital \$4,000; \$5000 revenue sharing. Kisling will meet February 28th with the board to finalize the agreement.

RFD #2: Commissioner Beamgard reported the fire truck was repaired with a steel bottom at an approximate cost of \$1000.

MINERAL & OIL: Cheryl Wederski discussed back taxes due on mineral & oil. She will prepare a resolution to abate the expired taxes.

LIBRARY: the library money will be distributed by population, as currently distributed. This money will be distributed March 5th.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Norman Owings reported the Blakeman bridge is cracking horizonically along the deck & bottom. This bridge is over 300 feet with no expansion. RADIO EQUIPMENT/AMBULANCE & SHERIFF: Doyle Dodd of Motorola presented a quote for radio equipment for the ambulance radio system. Dodd also suggested a range survey, stating that a radio tower is of prime importance for a radio system. We are presently looking a 2 tower sites; Philpott & Dunker's. Discussed pagers for the McDonald Ambulance system, Claude will contact McDonald as to whether they will require the extra 3 pagers. The board makeup consist of three members from each county; Wynemah Cox, Doyle Beamgard and Jan Poore are board members from Rawlins County. In Rawlins County, Keela Case is located at the hospital each Thursday to see patients. Mental Health Fund receives a mill levy of .33; their budget is \$11,930.00.

AIRPORT: the airport board received notification of a suit involving less than \$500 in which an airplane was damaged. Gary Worthy stated that Flight Service at Goodland had been notified in October of the construction area at the airport. The county attorney will respond on behalf of the airport. Discussed the blacktop on the runway. Worthy also reported that he plans on attending a meeting in May at Scott City concerning available grants.

RURAL FIRE DISTRICT #2: Dennis Buford had 20 hours of labor on the rural fire truck in which the board approved paying \$4.50/hr. on February 28, 1985. Buford felt that as a mechanic, he should receive \$15/hr., as McMillin's Welding charged \$25/hr. for labor. Also, if the truck had been repaired at a shop, the district would be charged \$20/hr. for shop labor. Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session April 16, 1985 with all members of the board present. Also present: County Clerk Meredith Hrnchir and Charles Peckham, County Attorney.

BIDS were opened for the purchase of a motor grader. Present for the bid-letting were Randy Case with Berry Tractor, Don Williams with Martin Tractor, Geroge Welling with Murphy Tractor, and Homer Hunter with Sellers Tractor. The bids were submitted with trade-in of a Caterpiller 12E, and option of a rear ripper. Approved purchasing the Champion 720A motor grader form Sellers and agreed not to purchase the rear ripper. Bids were submitted as follwos:

Martin Tractor: Caterpiller 140G, \$78,273, ripper @ \$5500.

Don Williams noted that Martin Tractor will give a graranteed "maintenance program" for five years which guarantees that the county will not spend more than \$10,000 during the five years or 5000 hours on parts, other than oil filters, etc.

BIDS were also opened for the purchase of three (3) pickups. Bids were submitted by C.W. Beamgard Co., Adams Ford, and Worthy Implement. The County Attorney cited 75-4304 regarding conflict of interest law. Approved the following:

From Worthy: 1985 GMC 170n without air conditioning, and trading a 1976 170n 4x4 \$8400.

1985 GMC ½Ton with air conditioning, and trading a 1977 ½Ton GMC \$9400 From Adams: 1985 3/4 Ton without air conditioning, and trading a 1974 3/4 ton \$9102.50 Total purchase price for three (3) pickups \$26,902.50.

MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT: Agreed to reduce the mileage reimbursement from .22¢ a mile to 20.5¢ a mile in order to comply with federal regulations. This is effective April 1, 1985.

EXTENSION: Dana Belshi, Ann Domsch, and Terry Kastens, representing the extension council presented the 1986 budget request from the county in the amount of \$60,938.20, which reflects a 7.6% increase. The board requested that the council work on reducing this to a 5% increase and to meet on April 30.

HEALTH: Approved a general service grant in the amount of \$3426.00. Wynemah Cox also reported that according to State Law, all Home Health Agencies have to be licensed starting July 1, 1985. The fees could be set at \$1200 to \$1700 per year. Mrs. Cox stated at the meeting held at Salina recently that \$200 should be the maximum fee charged. There is a hearing on this April 30th which Mrs. Cox plans on attending.

TREASURER: approved part time help in the treasurers office this summer.

APPRAISER: approved Kathy Bearley attending appraisal schools at county expense, however, a raise will not be granted if the county pays for the schooling.

Also approved Audrey Dixson attending the required schools.

CUSTODIAN: approved to raise the custodians salary from \$200 a month to \$250 a month.

RFD #2: allowed voucher #9142 to Dennis Buford for contractual labor. This was issued March 29th and held for the April 16th meeting pending the decision of a full board.

ROAD & BRIDGE: signed project 77 C-1638-01 for the project east of Achilles. This is an 80/20 ratio, the matching funds required by the county will be approximately \$28,250.00.

--Pete reported that Art Bishop asked if the county would fix an area as agreed 15 to 20 years ago. The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session May 21, 1985, with all members of the board present.

AREA AGENCY ON AGING: Ellene Davis, Joann Booth, Harriet Berg presented the 1984 annual report for the Area Agency of Aging. They also submitted a booklet outlining the functions of the boards in the agency.

SOIL CONSERVATION: approved a 4% increase for the 1986 budget year. The county portion increases from \$6200 to \$6500.

CIVIL DEFENSE: Gary Worthy & Robert Creighton requested a public warning system for the City. They propose to purchase a new siren, installing this at Adams Ford, and moving the present siren to the power plant in the south part of town. This would enable a larger number of citizens to hear the sirens during emergency times. The pole, installation, labor, and siren is approximately \$6600. AGREED to share the cost 50/50 with the City. This will be paid from Revenue Sharing Funds, category of public safety.

EXTENSION: The extension board resubmitted the 6% increase, rather than a reduced budget of 5%, as requested April 30th by the board. The extension board felt they could justify the 6% increase as they are serving the public. Commissioner Cahoj stated that he would not approve more than a 5% increase, furthermore, he would approve no more than a 4% increase to be in line with the budget submitted by the Soil Conservation. Commissioner Beamgard concurred with the 4% increase. Commissioner Unger reminded the board that 5% had been approved April 30th. At this time, Terry Kastens, Extension board chairman entertained a motion that the board approve a 5% increase. This was seconded by Commissioner Unger. According to KSA 2-610 (d), the budget request shall be voted upon by the director of extension, the chairperson of the executive board and the three members of the commission. Those voting yes for the 5% increase were Terry Kastens, Chairperson; Phil Finley, Director; and Charles Unger, Commissioner. Those voting no were Commissioners Cahoj and Beamgard. The budget was then approved with a 5% increase.

MEETING DATE CHANGED: Commissioner Cahoj will be absent for the June 18th meeting, therefore, the meeting will be held June 11th.

CITY COUNCIL/ 8TH STREET: Marion Frye, Dick Corder and Robert Creighton presented a cost estimate for an asphalt overlay on 8th street in the amount of \$16,128.00. As this is a road used by farmers and the city has paid \$243,779.94 in taxes in the last five years. the city asked if the county would help provide funds for the project. Commissioner Cahoj replied that the board does not feel that the county should contribute funds for this, however, the county would be willing to work with the city by providing equipment and personnel.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Meeting with the commissioners were C.K. Fisher, A.B. Fisher, Bob Banister, George Banister, Jim Banister, & Kent Banister to discuss a road access for Fishers. Fishers are located on sections 11 & 12-4-36, Banisters on sections 13, 14 & 23-4-36, Kenneth House on 15-4-36 and Mary Lintner on 24-4-36. Fishers report they have to travel $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles going by Banisters and 18miles by Kenneth House in order to gain access to their fields. However, if they could have access to their field by using the trail on the section line between 23 & 14 and $\frac{1}{2}$ mile between sections 24 and 13-4-36, this would save them miles, both when working the fields and in hauling wheat. Bob Banister stated that Fishers have used this access trail in the past, however, they asked only that the tracks be worked after working the fields and this has been abused. Also, there are irrigation sprinklers in operation on 13 & 14-4-36, which waters the trail road. There is also a gas line crossing the trail road located on the section line between sections 14 & 23. Due to the irrigation, the trail road is rough and there is a hump located over the gas line that needs to be raised which would help to hold the water. Kent Banister stated he would be willing to raise that area. Apparently Murfin Oil Co. has traveled this trail road and have abused the privilege and as this is not an open road and Banisters have irrigated crops, they posted no trespassing signs. At this time it was basically agreed to contact Lintners for permission to use the ½ mile along the section between 24 and 18 to gain access to the open road in the same section. An agreement will be drawn up by the county attorney and sent to all parties concerned in order to settle this dispute. AT THIS TIME, the county agreed to blade $\frac{1}{2}$ mile on the section line between 13-4-36 owned by Banister and 18-4-35 owned by Beverly Scott in order for Fishers to gain access to their property. This $\frac{1}{2}$ mile is not an open road. Present at the meeting were Bob, Jim, George and Kent Banister, C.K. & A.B. Fisher, Beverly Scott, Charles Peckham, Meredith Hrnchir, and the board of commissioners.

RESOLUTION 85-2 CONCERNING ROAD CLOSING FOR ROGER HOLSTE: The board ordered the closing of the road between sections 9-3-32 and 16-3-32 in Union Township. The resolution is on file in the county clerks office.

RESOLUTION: all off-system bridges, approximately 100, have been posted.

AGREED to pay for the culvert ordered for the Holle problem area; cost \$9500.00. Because of the recent rains, this will not be able to be put in at this time.

ROAD & BRIDGE (cont)

Joe Prochazka reported that the ditches are below the road bed between sections 25-1-35 and 30-1-34. This was reported to Pete.

--Claude Kisling reported that Murfin Oil constructed a fresh water pit on the corner of the County right-of-way in 3-1-34. The board asked Pete to take pictures and to report this to the county attorney.

--Bishop road: the board could find no action previously reported in the minutes or road reports, therefore, no action was taken.

--crews will be mixing oil and oiling at the airport and patching oil roads.

--next graveling project will be in the Herndon area by Huss, Kastens, Wicke's, etc.

-- there will be a 15' fill at Bill Cahoj's.

--Norman Owings, Penco Engineering, discussed bridges posted and current road projects.

--on the project east of Achilles, 77C-1638-01, L & M Construction from Great Bend has the non-minority bid of \$120,000. The minority bid is \$141,000.

COMPUTER: discussed a request by Lyndon Montgomery to view the tax programs. These are the property of the county and cannot be sold or used by another person other than Rawlins County personnel.

Briefly discussed wage and hour laws. More information will be obtained in the near future.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session May 31, 1985 with all members of the board present.

GOOD SAMARITAN: Howard Geohring discussed the 1986 budget request; and reported on the progress of the addition and asked if he could submit the bills for the addition. These need to be submitted by the 25th of a month in order to be paid. Mr. Geohring also expressed the need to build another addition approximately 50' x 35' which would serve the need for a rehabilitation room and activity room. The Henningsen estate and funds provided by the State Health Dept. could be used. However, the State will not approve new buildings at this time. He hopes the State will lift the restriction by October and this can be done at that time. Also discussed the need for improvements on the sidewalk and parking areas. Hermingsen also possible.

HEALTH: Wynemah Cox discussed a problem with animal specimans with suspected rabies. Dr. Easterday, veterinarian, has been sending the specimans to the State, his cost is \$14.75 and he has not been charging for his time. There have been some problems with people wanting specimans sent that he feels is not necessary, however. Mrs Cox discussed this with the local doctors and with Dr. Easterday. As a result, it was agreed to initiate a policy whereby Dr. Easterday will be paid \$25.00 for this service. The county will stand the cost for the wild animals, however, owners of domestic animals will be billed. Dr. Easterday will have the final say as to whether the specimans should be sent in. Mrs Cox will submit a contract for the above.

APPROVED a 2% increase in wages for Shirley Organ as she has been employed for six months. Mrs Cox requested a 5% raise for the department if she and Jane Eller received a 3% raise also, otherwise she rocommended the 2% raise for Shirley. This is effective June 1st.

CUSTODIAN: the board has received a number of complaints that the machines and the equipment in the courthouse have been tampered with. Agreed to notify the custodian that any children accompaning the custodians should remain in the hall and not be allowed in the offices after hours.

MONTHLY CHARGES/WILLIAMS GROCERY: the clerk received a notice from Williams Grocery that due to mailing costs and the cost of forms, they are going to begin billing a monthly charge fee of \$1.50 for all charge customers to cover added expenses of this service. Chairman Cahoj called Mike Braxmeyer who stated the county would not be considered as an exception to this billing charge. Therefore, the board agreed not to charge at Williams as we do not have a "slush fund" to cover this expense. The clerk contacted Amans Grocery who have agreed not to charge a fee for this service.

PRAIRIE DOGS: Commissioner Unger asked about the policy concerning prairie dogs in behalf of some constituents in the Herndon area. This is a township problem; each township has its own policy regarding budget, etc. Also, Elmer Burk is the co-ordinator for the prairie dogs. In the past, the county has purchased a bulk supply of p9ison oats ordered by the townships and the townships then reimbursed the county.

ROAD & BRIDGE: the board discussed personnel problems concerning Roger Hutfles and Paul Pochop. Scott Pitner will write a description of the boards' complaints, thereby notifying these employees.—notified that the State rejected the bid for the Achilles bridge project; this will be resubmitted in July.

--received a request by the weight inspector to place signs at the sough end and at the McDonald end of the road south of McDonald informing drivers of the bridge weight limitations. This would ease enforcement of weight restrictions of overweight trucks. AGREED to post all secondary roads as to minimum and maximum weight limitations on bridges.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session June 11, 1985 with all members of the board present.

HOSPITAL: Kurt Erickson of Great Plains, hospital board members Lester Jensen, Doyle Beamgard, Claude Kisling, Raleigh Bergling, and Administrator Pam Thomas met with the board to discuss the 1986 budget request and to present the current year summary. The hospital is completing the first year under the DRG system. The fiscal year started with two physicians and beginning July 1, 1985 will have four physicians practicing medicine in Rawlins County. The hospital also has mulitiple specialists coming in from surrounding areas, which broadens the service the hospital offers patients. The hospital has seen an increase in the number of patients from surrounding areas and out-patient services are growing. The swing-bed program has grown by admitting 49 patients to the unit. Another service instituted in the last year has been the gastroscope and sigmoidoscope, which allows the physicians to do on-site procedures which improve the quality of diagnosis for the patients. This broadening of service also increases the capital needs. The board is projecting a profit income of 57,760; Commissioner Cahoj asked if the profit projection would build up the reserve. The board replied that it would not be sufficient because of the needed roof repairs and the 35 year old air conditioner. They need a minimum reserve of three months or \$240,000. The clinic is on a lease agreement for 18 months, this going toward the purchase price should Dr. Erbacher and Dr. Dill be able to purchase the clinic. Mr. Beamgard noted that Claude Kisling has donr the painting, etc. in the clinic. Also discussed the energy conservation measures, the birthing room and the wellness budget. Mr. Beamgard noted that without the five mill increase granted by the taxpayers and the cooperation between the hospital board and the board of commissioners the hospital would not be able to obtain the services of four physicians. THE HOSPITAL REQUESTED continuance of the five mill levy for 1986; this was APPROVED.

REGISTER OF DEEDS: Carolyn Marshall requested an increase in wages for Bonna Luedke. Mrs. Luedke presently recieves \$3.35/hr and is requesting \$4.25/hr as she has had seven years of experience in the office and the surrounding areas are paying up to \$5.00/hr. Due to her experience, the board approved \$4.00/hr increase of wages, effective June 1st.

FAIR: Clyde Jensen presented the 1986 Fair budget request in the amount of \$17,043.00. This is the same as last year and was approved.

ALCOHOL AND THE DRUG ABUSE COUNCIL: Debra Thomas, president; Donna Beims, treasure; and Kathy Davis-Vrbas, Public Relations presented a report on the accomplishments of the council in 1984 and requested the .10 mill levy again for 1986. This was approved.

CUSTODIAN: Commissioner Cahoj noted that the courthouse is dusty, the restrooms are not clean and the supplies in the restrooms have not been replaiced. He asked therefore to request a meeting with Dawna Vap for June 28th.

ROAD & BRIDGE: The board recieved a bill in the amount of \$416.54 from Southwestern Bell Telephone charging the county for damages to buried cable on June 5, 1985 at the SW 2-4-31 while placing new culvert. The board declined to pay this; the county attorney will reply.

--Commissioner Cahoj called Cheyenne County regarding a crossing brought to his attention by Mr. Dankenbrink. The area is in Cheyenne County; they agreed to put in a low crossing, not a culvert.

--Commissioner Cahoj asked that the oil roads be patched as soon as feasible in order to be resealed in August or September. A contractor will look at the roads Wednesday. The cost could be \$80 to \$90,000, however, if we haul sand it will save 20%.

--regarding the letter of deficiency sent to Roger Hutfles and noted in the minutes of May 31st, the board agreed to distroy this and to disregard any mention of the contents as more facts were brought to the attention of the board.

SOFT WATER SYSTEM: The board agreed to not install a soft water system as the cost of plumbing would not be feasible.

The board will reconvene June 28, 1985.

COUNTY HEALTH: Approved a basic Health Service grant in the amount of \$3132.00. --Wynemah reported that she will not be going to San Francisco, CA for the parental effectiveness workshop, which is funded by a grant. The state has approved an alternate workshop as she has had criticism from the public. She reported she will be giving a course in the fall.

- --the first WIC program will be given July 23rd in cooperation with Sherman County. --signed the suspected rabid animal policy. This is on file with the health dept. and the county clerks office.
- --Wynemah will pursue broader coverage for Home Health care for medicare reimbursement.
- --presented the 1986 budget request in the amount of \$76,537.00, which reflects a
- .50 mill levy in the amount of \$17,107.00.
- --approved a desk for the department, cost \$200.

SHERIFF: discussed with the sheriff the jail care charged to Thomas County for lodging James C. Hunter from Feb. 28, 1985 to June 14, 1985. Jones charged Thomas County \$20 per day for 116 days and \$25 for the first day, plus a fee of \$30.00 for medical care minus credit for Thomas County housing two Rawlins County prisoners for 3 days. Total charge is \$2305.00. Rawlins County charges \$50/day for housing out-of-county prisoners. However, Judge Willoughby stated this is not according to statuate in this case. Approved the charges.

--discussed with the county attorney who confirmed the report made by Judge Reinert that the sheriff has been deliquent in serving warrants, specifically a warrant outstanding as of the middle of April.

CUSTODIAN: the board reprimanded Dawna Vap as the restrooms have not been cleaned properly and the supplies have not been adequate. Also, the offices in the courthouse have not been dusted. Dawna reports the vacuum is not working properly and the tennis court is the reason the restrooms are not clean. County Clerk was asked to notify Irwin Thiele about the vacuum and ask him for an appointment with Dawna. Also, check that the courthouse is locked after 5:00 pm and weekends.

TREASURE: Cheryl Wederski reported that she had a discussion with a county bank concerning a law change on securities during peak deposit periods. The county attorney is checking into this matter. Also, the treasure informed the board that regarding personal back taxes, they are sent to the sheriff when deliquent, then to the district court if not paid by October. At this time some back taxes are in district court and the property is up for sale, therefore, the back taxes may not be collected.

SOLID WASTE: County Treasure reported on the uncollected solid waste fees. The board set a hearing for July 16th at 10:00 am --approved part time help for this task if needed.

APPRAISER: Appointed Audrey Dixson as county appraiser for a four year tearm, as directed pursuant to K.S.A. 19-430.

--Dixson reported that according to SB 164, dealing with re-appraisal, guidelines will not be issued until 1/1/86. The board discussed re-appraisal, and agreed that the appraiser should make a separate budget for this purpose as they are required to make reports to the state on their progress, etc. and will also need supplies for measuring, soil maps are out dated, and extra help will be needed.

MENTAL RETARDATION: The board met at the country club at noon with Developmental Services. An informative film was shown; approved the continuance of the 1 mill levy for 1986.

XEROX: the new machine is installed, however the tray has not been delivered and the machine is down at this time. Commissioner Cahoj phoned the company at Colby and no payment will be made until this is corrected and all supplies ordered have been delivered.

RURAL FIRE DISTRICTS: issued a policy, effective July 1, 1985 regarding payment for rural fire calls in each district. A maximum of two men will be paid \$15.00 each for a fire call, up to two hours. For each hour over two hours, the county will pay each of the two men \$7.50 per hour for the time they remain with the truck. ALSO, discussed the charge for fires between fire districts. This is on the agenda July 16th.

AIRPORT: Commissioner Beamgard reported that the runway will need an overlay in the future. The airport board has applied for a federal grant, however, in all probabality this will not be approved. Beamgard suggested the city and county match funds of \$4 to \$5,000 each and set aside these funds for this purpose.

GDOD SAMARITAN: The board has been served with a statement for mechanic's lien from Lindsey Cooper (Beaver Valley Interiors) and Good Samartian Home which is leased from Rawlins County. Good Samartian is indebted to Lindsey Cooper in the sum of \$2,263.22 for labor, material & equipment furnished in improvements on the home. The contractor is Norman Luedke. The board spoke with Howard Goehring who stated this has been taken care of by the Good Samartian Home.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Norman Owings met with the board concerning recent bridge inspections. Regulations for construction replacement on bridges were submitted on Structure #0429-0-0340-9, located 2.5 E & 7.9 S of Atwood and structure #0391-0-0352-9, 12.0 S and 1.0 E of McDonald. These are on off-system roads, cost will be on on the construction request. ALSO discussed the Blakeman bridge which will be replaced or rehabilitated, depending on the recommendation of the State bridge personel who will look at it by next month. This bridge has considerable constructual damage. Randy Case of Berry Tractor was a visitor.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session July 16, 1985, with all members of the board present.

BUDGET: Budget matters occupied the major amount of time of the board as the auditors were present to finalize the 1986 county budget. The final budget shows a mill levy of 36,811; the levy for 1985 was 36.783. Road & Bridge, Special Bridge, Noxious Weed, Hospital, Library, Health, Historical Society, Home for the Aged, Fair, Ambulance, Mental Retardation, Services for the Elderly, and Mental Health levies remained the same as 1985. Funds showing increases are Extension .60, Conservation .12, Airport Maintenance .10, Alcohol & Drug Abuse .10, and re-appraisal 1.40. Employee benefits decreased by .71, and out-district tuition decreased by .63. The general fund absorbed elections and appraisers cost fund. The 1986 budget hearing will be held July 31st at 10:00 AM at the courthouse. The board noted that the general fund does not require a levy, the budget expenditures for elected officials remained as last year, except the sheriff's budget which was increased 5% and the unified court budget increased 5%. The unified court submitted a budget increase from \$10,550 to \$17,576. The board amended this to \$11,078.00.

APPRAISER: Audrey Dixson met with the board to discuss the cost of re-appraisal. This will be a separate line item on the 1986 budget with a mill levy of 1.50. The cost estimate at this time is \$30 to \$50 per parcel, with approximately 5500 to 6000 parcels in the county. Extra personnel will be required, as well as supplies and a typewriter. Audrey stated that she does not require a typewriter with a memory, however she would like an IBM Selectric.

AGREED, therefore to transfer the IBM Selectric from the clerks office.

CLERK: Approved transfering the IBM Selectric to the Appraisers office and approved the IBM memory typewriter requested June 11th.

Also approved a salary increase for deputy Janet Stice as she has been employed for the six months trial period. Her salary will be \$4.50/hr effective July 1st.

TREASURE: Cheryl Wederski reported on securities. The county should be 100% secured, except the 60 days of two peak deposit periods, which is then 50% secured. Some banks are not willing to provide this security, therefore an alternative is to buy treasury bills. Cheryl will meet with the banks in the county for their input and report to the board at the next meeting date. APPROVED a typewriter for their office from the special auto fund, if needed. At this time, D. Luedke's typewriter has been for repairs a number of times. The office could use a spare. Cheryl also reported on the delinquent solid waste fees.

SOLID WASTE: The hearing for protest on the delinquent fees was held at 10:00 AM with no one in attendance. Cheryl Wederski reported that there was over \$600 due, after sending the letters informing renters & landowners of the delinquency, less than \$100 is now due. Of this amount, there are some who have moved from the state or county and this will need to be abated. In 1986 this fee will be on the real estate tax statement.

AMBULANCE: Claude Kisling reported that new radios and pagers have arrived. Karlin offered \$100 for the used pagers, however Claude suggested keeping them as other departments in the county would be able to use them. Agreed to keep the pagers, also agreed to sell Ed Leinwetter a pager for \$200. Claude will initiate a contract with Dunkers for use of the tower.

RE-APPRAISAL MEETING will be held in Hays July 25th. Attending will be Audrey Dixson, Kathy Bearley, Charles Unger, and Henry Cahoj. The other offices in the courthouse will help with the appraising duties the 25th.

AUDREY REPORTS that after 1/1/89, re-appraisal will be updated every four years.

REGISTER OF DEEDS: Approved refinishing an antique table at a cost of \$150 to \$160. Alan Riepl had the low bid. Vince Kanak's bid was \$390. There will be an additional table to refinish in the future. Also, Carolyn Marshall will check into a glass for the top.

CUSTODIAN: Commissioner Cahoj asked about the work of Dawna Vap this month; he feels the tax payers money is being wasted as the dusting has not improved. Commissioner Beamgard will inform Dawna of this area of neglect and that if the work is not improved by the 31st of July, she will be terminated. The board also discussed the vacuum, Mr. Thiele feels it is working properly but recommended a new vacuum. Henry Cahoj will bring his from home to compare the machines. The carpets have not been commercially cleaned this year. The clerk was instructed to have this done.

FAIR/PARADE: Agreed to close the courthouse during the parade August 1st. Also, after visiting with the offices, it was agreed to enter a float in the parade.

RURAL FIRE DISTRICTS: All controlled fires need to be reported to the fire department to eliminate sending the rural fire trucks out needlessly. Advising the dispatcher of the location of the controlled fire will also help should the fire go out of control. Dennis Buford informed the clerk earlier of the problem of obtaining water at the city meter. This hook-up requires quarters in order to obtain water to fill the truck, which is an inconvenience and is also slow. Dick Corder, city maintenance, has allowed the fire truck to install a device in order to fill the truck without charge.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Discussed with Norman Owings of Penco Engineering the request for construction of rehabiliation of bridge projects 4.9 miles north of Blakeman. Estimated replacement cost \$300,000 with 75/25 match. The project 2.5 miles east & 8 miles south of Atwood, Franklin bridge, \$120,000 cost with an 80/20 match. The necessary forms were signed and sent to the State.

--AGREED that if an employee takes days off, it will be subtracted from vacation time and the employee will not be allowed to relinquish pay for that time. BUDGET: Same mill levy as 1985.

--Approved resealing all county oil roads, county will haul the gravel. --Crews are spraying weeds the 2nd time.

LUDELL TOWNSHIP: In accordance with KSA 19-2716 a petition was presented for formation of a taxing district to provide street lighting in a designated area of Ludell township. SAID DISTRICT IS HEREBY FORMED and a taxing district for the purpose of levying a tax to furnish street lighting therein will be included in the 1986 budget for Ludell township.

- --Herndon shop floor replacement: bid from McCook was \$4700. Pete will get a bid from Finley Construction. The floor is 20x40.

BRIDGES: Norman Owings reported that the Achilles bridge bid will be resubmitted as the first bid was refused because of a 10% minority bid.

Also, a bridge 9 miles north of Blakeman is starting to crack. Owings suspects material defeciency and they will run core samples to determine cause.

PROPERTY VALUATION: Chairman Cahoj Phoned George Donatello concerning the proposed property re-appraisal. Mr. Donatello advised that the 1st priority would be deed research as they do not know at this date if Marshall & Swift books will be used or the type of base maps to use.

INSURANCE REIMBURSEMENT: County Clerk reported that the League of Municipalities refunded the county \$5,036.23 for 1984 participation in the league-sponsered Blue Cross-Blue Shield program. Road & Bridge recieved \$2585.25, the General fund \$1730.83, Health fund\$407.13, Noxious Weed \$98.75 and the Appraiser fund \$214.27.

MILEAGE VOUCHERS: Chairman Cahoj referred to a 1978 policy which states that mileage readings should be attached to the vouchers in order to recieve payment.

--APPROVED Dixson attending a school September 30th at Hutchinson. Commissioner Cahoj reported a feedlot located at Mike Coopers.

TREASURER: Cheryl Wederski reported that the county would receive securities from the State Bank of Herndon this week.

--Wederski estimates \$5000 more unpaid taxes as of this date than last year.

--APPROVED part time help in the treasurers office from approximately October 15th to December 31st during tax time.

SOLID WASTE: the board reviewed a number of questions presented by the clerk and treasurer concerning the solid waste fee. Agreed to the following: trailer parks and trailer lots \$6; Apartments up to two will be charged \$12.00, three & four charged \$18, five and up charged \$24; low housing authority \$24; tax exempt such as VFW, Lions, etc. \$12; Atwood, Herndon, McDonald Senior Citizens will not be charged.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES OF NW KANSAS: agreed to send a letter of support to KDOT supporting the application seeking funds for transportation under Section 18 under the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964.

HEALTH: Wynemah Cox requested plastic covering on the outside of the windows of the health department for winter. Approved. The board attended the Health Advisory Board meeting held this noon at the Buffalo restaurant.

--USD #318 school litigation: Mr. Peckham reported on the possibility of the county facing a potentially expensive litigation situation. Two sets of parents have refused to send their children to school. Pursuant to Kansas law, the school district has referred this matter to the Social and Rehabilitation Services of the State of Kansas who has, in return, referred it to the County Attorney. Mr. Peckham, and also Scott Beims have a conflict of interest which makes it inadvisable for either to represent Rawlins County. Terry Rogers, the Decatur County has indicated he would be willing to act as special prosecutor if necessary. The Superintendent of USD #318, Dr. Jones, met with the parents of the children; and it is his opinion they do not meet requirements for home schooling. AGREED to table this matter until Mr. Peckham has contacted the Attorney Generals Office for assistance. Also, the legislature at this point has not clearly defined competency of home teachers. The board will not approve appointing a special prosecutor at this time; pending further information from the County Attorney.

HOSPITAL QUESTION: Mr. Peckham will investigate a question concerning the hospital sponsoring the athletes, as constituents have questioned \$100 sponsored ads in the papers and on the radio. Commissioner Beamgard will contact the hospital.

MEETING DATE CHANGED: Agreed to change the November 19th meeting date to November 15th due to KOC.

ROAD & BRIDGE: the board adjourned for executive session from 9:30 am to 9:45 am in regard to road & bridge employees.

HOSPTTAL: Pam Thomas, Administrator and Doyle Beamgard presented an update of hospital concerns. They noted admissions have exceeded those budgeted. The board reported they had received a complaint from a constituant regarding the advertisements on radio and in the newspaper in which the hospital sponsored the Atwood High School football team. Pam replied that the public relations committee which consist of Mike Sramek, Mike Braxmeyer and Diane Montgomery have services available at the put together various pamplets, etc. which inform the public of hospital. As a result of this type of advertisement, th hospital received some "free time" on the radio, which resulted in the sponsorship. HEALTH: The board signed the 1986 child care licensing contract with the State of Kansas in the amount of \$130 a year.

XEROX: Register of Deeds reported the xerox machine has not been working properly. Commissioner Cahoj phoned the company for information. According to our maintenance contract, the county is not liable for damages or a defective machine. The board discussed a resolution which would eliminate peak periods by home rule. —granted permission todeposit in the Peoples Bank of McDonald and Ludell Bank. —approved part time help in the treasurers office during tax time.

SCHOOL LITIGATION: Terry Rogers, Decatur County Attorney discussed with the board the USD 318 school litigation. He was notified by Judge Reinert of his appointment to the case; despite the boards decision on Septemb $oldsymbol{arepsilon_{e}}$ 30th disallowing a special prosecutor at this time. The board spoke with Mr. Rogers on the 30th of this decision. Mr. Rogers was appointed by Judge Reinert after the 30th meeting and he felt this should be discussed. According to statuate, thismatter becomes a county obligation after the school board notifies SRS of th truancy. The home study in Rawlins Countydoes not meet the critera of a school system, Mr. Rogers reported, as he has reviewed this matter with an open mind, decided that these people are flouting the law because there isno provision for objective testing in the home study. There is also the question of whether the school board can bring action against the county for not fulfilling their obligation. Mr. Rogers feels this will possibly set a presidence in the State. The board asked if it is fair for the taxpayers of Rawlins County, with their limited resources to be a test case for the State of Kansas. Also, what could Rawlins County expect for our money, plus possibly losing a doctor. It has been reported that Hardons' will have people from Washington here who were previously involved in home schools; Mr. Rogers replied that instead of Hardons making his own laws here, he should take his Washington outfit to the legislature to change the law. --Mr. Rogers estimated his fees to be approximately \$1500 to \$2000 if it goes only to District Court, \$2000 to \$2500 if it goes to the Court of Appeals and around \$5000 if it goes to the Supreme Court. Commissioner Beamgard stated he will not approve payment until ordered by the court as he is concerned that the court appointed a prosecutor irregardless of the boards decision. Mr. Rogers stated he will not file anything at this time, pending further discussion with Mr. Peckham and the result of a SPECIAL MEETING which is scheduled October 23rd at 10:00 a.m. -- the board also discussed waiting on the Hardon case until the Garretson case has been heard.

ROAD & BRIDGE: discussed the city dump road; in attendance was Don Beamgard, Dennis and Anne Marie Worley. Approved to straighten the road following the shouldering to Don Beamgards.—Norman Owings presented photos of the bridge north of Blakeman. This is posted for 8 ton.—noted that we have not received the 5-year plan from the State.—the board viewed the Cheyenne/Rawlins county road with Cheyenne County Commissioners in regard to the road request by Query located at 31-4-36.

SCHOOL LITIGATION

Rawlins County Commissioners called a Special Meeting October 22, 1985 for the purpose of discussing the USD #318 school litigation suit with Judge Reinert, County Attorney Charles Peckham and Assistant Attorney Mike Flesher. All members of the board were present, also present was Meredith Hrnchir, Judge Reinert, and Marge Crabb of the Citizen Patriot. Dr. Jones, Superintendent of USD 318 was asked for his input and was also in attendance.

At the October 15th meeting, Terry Rogers, the court-appointed attoney stated he would not file necessary papers nor pursue this case until further consultation with Charles Peckham and pending the result of this special meeting. The board feels that the court may have taken the matter out of their hands and that this meeting should have taken place before the Judge appointed Mr. Rogers.

Judge Reinert reviewed the process stating that Kansas has no provision for Home Schools at this date and appointed Terry Rogers to review the case to determine whether a "child in need of care" did exist and if so, named him as special prosecutor. Judge Reinert has disqualified as judge in the case should a juvenile case be filed. If a suit is filed in juvenile court, there are three alternatives; home-bound schooling, order the child back to school, or to remove the child from the home. Under juvenile court law, the child must be removed from the home during the time the parents may be appealing the action. Phase I action involves the juvenile court. The judge feels the county has no choice in the matter according to State Law, specifically KSA 72-111. Juvenile court has to make a decision as to the childs best interest; perhaps the child wants to attend public school! Charles Peckham was asked why he could not prosecute; he replied that he has a conflict of interest as the Hardons are clients of his firm and also a close personal friend. Also, asked why did he not wait to pursue the Hardon case is different in that Jeff Garretson experiences severe headaches, this physical problem would qualify Jeff for the home bound rule, which Atwood Schools do have. Garretson's have until October 31st to comply with the home bound rule.

Dr. Jones feels the Garretson case is a good opportunity for a home bound school in view of the severe physical condition of Jeff Garretson; however, the law has been violated in the Hardon situation. Dr. Jones explained that the truancy was reported to him by his truant officer, he then is required by law to report the truancy to the Social Rehabilitation Service. SRS then asked Dr. Jones to make an investigation of the Hardon home which he did on invitation of the Hardons and submitted a report which determined the home school does not meet the requirements for statutory schooling in Kansas and turned the matter over to the County Attorney. At this point he believes his responsibility in the case ends. The board of education could push the issue as an official body if they voted to do so; however, the law provides no action for them to take. This is happening in other counties and the Kansas Association of school boards takes the position that home study is illegal, however, the law is unclear. Also, rarely in the State of Kansas has a hot political issue such as this been addressed in an election year.

The board asked why they have to pursue this particular case, why not also pursue the 55 mile spped limit if the county is to test the laws. Commissioner Beamgard feels the board should wait until the law is clarified by the State. This is happening in at least another 100 counties in Kansas and Rawlins County taxpayers should not have to stand the burden of testing this case. Commissioner Beamgard stated he would not approve payment to a court appointed attorney at this time. Chairman Cahoj agreed and also stated that the cost, if this is pursued, should be deducted from the attorney's budget. The board expressed appreciation for the cooperation extended by Dr. Jones and concluded the discussion by instructing the clerk to call Terry Rogers to recommend not filing any action pending results from other school districts who are further along in such suits.

KOC: Kansas Official Council willbe held in Wichita November 18th and 19th with most elected officials attending. Voting delegates designated were Henry Cahoj, Charles Unger and Rod Beamgard. Alternate delegates aere Meredith Hrnchir, Cheryl Wederski, Carolyn Marshall and Virgil Portschy.

APPRAISER: Audrey Dixson presented a rough draft of tentative mapping specs. for input from the board, and asked permission to attend further schools. This was granted. Dixson also informed the board that the grain bin exemption granted in 1977 will run out December of 1985. The board suggested putting these back on the tax roll January of 1986.

AMBULANCE: CLaude Kisling met with the board in regard to additional paving needed at the hospital parking area. Kisling will obtain information on the cost for a 30' x 100' strip on the north side of the present parking area. Also discussed the hospital car which is located back of the transfer ambulance and has to be moved before using the ambulance. This will also be brought up at the next meeting.

ROAD & BRIDGE; Norman Owings of Penco Engineering reported on the McCain bridge. Apparently KDOT has pulled the bridge following an increased estimate by KDOT of \$240,000. This would require \$130,000 in matching funds. We would be required to have this amount on hand. To date we have \$117,000 in federal matching funds. Owings feels the county could build a bridge at a lower cost. Suggested dropping this in hopes it would be included in the May letting on an 80/20 cost sharing. The board asked Owings to pursue this with KDOT to see if they have made an error in figuring their estimate. KDOT was then called; it is hoped this will be reentered in the January letting. Osborne County is building a similiar bridge at a cost of \$88,000, it was noted. --Don Williams of Martin Tractor presented prices on a bottom dump trailer. Rent for four weeks is \$1200; cost of a used 1984 model 1827 is \$19,895, and a new model 1827 is \$22,575. Williams also noted that a Ford Tractor has a 3-year warranty or 2500 hour limit, all supplies except the fuel is provided, should the county be looking into a tractor to pull a terracer. The board will check further following budget examination.

EMPLOYEE PARTY: set December 17th as the date for the annual party at the country club.

HEALTH: Wynemah Cox met with the board concerning an administrative problem with the prenatal department. Wynemah reports Connie Argabright does an excellent job in the department, however she needs documentation when her home visits exceed one hour. This is in compliance with both federal and state regulations. The board agreed with this and Commissioner Beamgard suggested a job description and a document which describes exactly what is needed from Connie by the department.

ANTIQUES: Clerk will contact Allen Riepl and Kanak for bids to refinish the antique furniture.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session November 15, 1985 with all board members present. This meeting was rescheduled from November 19th due to the annual KOC meeting in Wichita.

CANVAS VOTES FOR THE SPECIAL CITY ELECTION held November 12, 1985. The board determined that 588 voters turned out for the election with 282 voting "yes" and 306 voting "no".

IRRIGATED LAND/USE-VALUE APPRAISAL: Commissioner Cahoj reported that Ronald Bell and Joe Kramer have accepted the responsibility of participating on the irrigation committee which will be setting guidelines and factors for determining the use-value appraisals of irrigated land.

EMT INSURANCE: The clerk reported that the American Agency who insures the emergency medical technicians for liability will cancel the policy as of December 6th unless the county is willing to also insure the ambulances. E.C. Mellick Agency was notified and was able to secure insurance for the technicians at a cost of \$1412.00. Approved insuring with Mellick Agency.

PURCHASE USED TYPEWRITER: Rod Beamgard purchased a used IBM typewriter for \$250.00.

RECEIVED A PROPOSAL for an uninterruptible power supply and dedicated circuit to computer location in the clerks office, and connection of power and dedicated circuits to the power supply and installation for 1580.00. Clerk will check with Rusty Addelman for his input and this will be discussed November 27th.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Agreed to purchase a used 1981 4200 truck at a cost of \$25,000 from Curley Olney's of McCook NE. Also, a new Load-King standard length trailer from Martin Tractor at a cost of \$22,575. WATER LINE AGREEMENT: Signed an agreement between the Columbian Club, the Atwood Country Club, and the Fair Board by and through the commissioners. This would allow the fair board to tap into the water line owned by the Columbian Club for \$300.00. Other stipulations of the agreement are on file in the County Clerks office in the contract book.

HELICOPTER: the board updated a letter to the surplus property division requesting a helicopter. This was by request of Gary Worthy.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

DECEMBER 17, 1985

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session December 17, 1985 with all board members present. Also present were Meredith Hrnchir and Charles Peckham.

TREASURER: approved destroying treasurers checks on the State Bank of Herndon, #209 thru #501 as this bank closed in 1985.

--the treasurer reported her concern about peak deposit periods, should the banks close, the county could lose 50% over the amount deposited over the amount secured. Under the law, we are required to be 100% secured, except during the peak deposit periods of December 20 and June 20. The Farmers Bank is secured for one million four hundred thousand and the State Bank is secured for one million, one hundred fifteen thousand, which is sufficient according to the County Attorney. Cheryl Wederski also called Mike Billinger, Ellis County Treasurer for input.

HOSPITAL: Pam Thomas, Administrator, Lester Jensen, and Doyle Beamgard, hospital board members presented the annual audit report and discussed various concerns of the hospital; noting that without the mill levy, the hospital would not be able to operate effeciently and the health service has been increased as a result. The audit report reflects a 31.7% increase in total current assets, liabilities are down due to the decreased long-term factor. It was also noted that they have only one month of reserve at this time, still working on having a minimum of three months reserve. The swing-bed has 4 to 5 patients all the time and the physical therapy department has increased due to the swing-bed patients and the out-patient use. The capital expenditures purchased have been on the recommendation of the medical staff and these in turn have increased revenue and keeps patients at home. Most of the major purchases have resulted from the Esther Henningson estate.

NACO: approved \$81.00 payable to NACO to be used for revenue sharing lobbying. This is to be paid from the Revenue Sharing fund.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE: Chairman Cahoj reported he will be serving on the County Commissioners Association Insurance Committee. Approved to reimburse Commissioner Cahoj for expenses.

INSURANCE: Farm Bureau Insurance agent, John Henke and Mark McClain presented an insurance quote of \$42,512.38 for the 1986 insurance coverage. This excludes streets and roads existance hazard. They also recommended a blanket coverage or all risk on the county insurance.

--Grant Glad of E.C. Mellick Agency presented a bid of \$50,106, which included \$8600 for the streets and roads hazard clause. He also reports that the errors and omissions clause may be included in January of 1986.

AGREED to renew policies with E.C. Mellick Agency because of satisfactory past experience, the quote is comparible and it included the streets and roads existence hazard clause. We will drop collision on the Chryslers in the sheriffs department, and will not increase the building insurance by 4% as recommended by the company, and go with the minimum on uninsured motorist on all vehicles.

RE-APPRAISAL: Meeting with Audrey Dixson, Appraiser was Timothy Tripp, representing Tripps & Associates, a mapping firm. This is the first step needed in order to start re-appraisal. This firm will use the contract provided by the State, however they will change the wording to state payment will be made for the actual work completed. They will limit themselves to a total of 100,000 parcels in the state, Rawlins County has approximately 5,000 parcels. Dixson reported that the state will not accept the ASCS maps we are currently using. The cost will be \$12 to \$18 per parcel for the required mapping, they will deduct \$2.50 per parcel if the county does the deed research. Mr. Tripps stated that 20 companies have been certified by the State, but that in his opinion, he could recommend only six. The state wants all counties contracted by March 1, 1986. The board discussed combining services with four or five other counties of comparible size. No decision at this time.

BEER LICENSE: approved a beer license for the Copper Penny Cafe in Rocewood Township.

AUDIT CONTRACT: approved the 1985 audit contract with Bartlett, Settle & Edgerle.

BUDGETS: the board discussed the 1986 budgets and asked the clerk to notify all departments that they will be accepting means of cutting budgets in order to justify salary increases, should they be granted.

ROAD & BRIDGE: approved to purchase from Don Marshall an anti-gel for diesel fuel at a cost of \$3.50 a quart which treats 100 gallon of diesel. This will be tried first at McDonald. --discussed an oil burner for the shops. --the county line north of Kacirek's needs blading.

REORGANIZATION MEETING

January 13, 1986

Rawlins County Commissioners met January 13, 1986 for the re-organization meeting with all members of the board present.

CHAIRMAN: Motion carried that Rod Beamgard act as chairman of the board for the year 1986.

MEETING DATE: 1986 meeting dates were approved for the third Tuesday and the last working day each month.

RESOLUTION FOR SECURITIES: The board named all county banks as official depositors.

OFFICIAL PAPER: approved the contract with the Citizen Patriot as the official paper for 1986.

EXPENSES: agreed that the expenses will remain as last year: 20.5¢ for mileage reimbursement and meal allowance of \$7.00 a meal.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE: The following dates were approved for the 1986 holiday schedule: January 1, March 28, May 26, July 4, September 1, November 11-27-28, December 25-26.

SALARY: The position of road foreman at the county shop was eliminated. The board discussed with department heads their proposal for salary increases, however the final decision will be made at the regular meeting January 21st. For the most part, the departments recommended a 5% increase, with the exception of the sheriffs department in which the sheriff recommended a larger increase for the undersheriff who now has administrative duties; and the appraisers office. In this office, Audrey recommended an increase to the deputy appraiser of one-half of the \$14,000 saved by the county doing the deed research for re-mapping, and Dixson's salary would depend on re-appraisal work, whether this will be a joint effort, etc. A summary of 1985 salaries and the proposed increase will be available for the board January 21st.

SHERIFF: noted that bids were received for jail meals; Arnies was awarded the bid at \$1.00/meal. The Buffalo Cafe submitted a bid of \$1.75 for breakfast, \$3.25 for lunch and \$1.50 for supper sandwiches. -Sheriff Jones reported that according to the KBI internal audit inspection, a training session of 80 hours/year is required for dispatchers. Also, in line with requirements, the sheriffs office will be secured, paperwork is being increased and the officers training update requires 160 hr/yr. - noted that Ken Higley is a reserve officer, however he paid his own way to the academy and bought his uniforms.

-reported that regulations require that all immates have a physical and Dr. Dill has agreed to do this, he will be using the health department facilities.

APPRAISER: as a result of the meeting held in Colby January 7th, Rod Beamgard was appointed as the commissioner to serve on the committee which meets with other counties concerning re-mappping. This committee will have one commissioner and one appraiser from each county for input. Ten counties were present at this meeting who agreed that it would be beneficial for 10-12 counties to go together to obtain certain services. Commissioners Beamgard and Unger, and the appraiser will attend a meeting January 15th at Colby.

- Dixson reported the State has backed out on some proposed funding for the re-appraisal process. - reported on a tax grievance by Duane Roesch; according to information from the State Board of Tax Appeals, Roesch should file a tax grievance.

 $\overline{\text{HEALTH:}}$ the board received a letter from Dr. Erbacher applying for the position of County Health Officer and County Coroner. The coroner is appointed by the District Coroner, who is presently located in Hoxie. The Health Officer is employed by the county. No action at this time. The board will ask Dr. Erbacher to meet with them the 21st for further input.

INSURANCE COMMISSION: Commissioner Cahoj reported that the insurance committee will be meeting January 24th in Topeka and the tax and finance committee asked that he continue to serve in 1986.

ATTORNEY: Charles Peckham presented figures from his office which anticipates expenditures associated with the County Attorney in the amount of \$26,176. The 1986 budget is \$21,500. He also noted that some cases upcoming would increase this figure, such as the Hardon Case and the Miller appeal. The cases filed in 1985 consumed 950 hours, he reported. No action taken.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: a petition was received by the employees of the county shop asking that they be allowed the privilege of using the shop after hours as a benefit. Commissioner Unger reported that he has asked other counties about their policies in regard to the above and most do not allow the shops to be used by the employees because of numerous complaints from the public. The board agreed unanimously that the decision made in December stands: it is prohibited to work on private vehicles or machinery at the county shops.

- As Pete Portschy is on 24 hour call, it was determined that his use of the county vehicle is not a taxable fringe benefit.
- the McCain project will be let January 16th.
- JACK FINLEY met with the board in regard to improvements on the McDonald shop building. This will be continued the 21st.

DR. ERBACHER met with the board concerning the application submitted last month for the County Health Officer and Coroner. As a result of this meeting, the board established a policy whereby the County Health Officer will be rotated alphabetically on a two-year basis, starting January of 1987.

The coroner in each county is a deputy coroner, appointed by the District Coroner. Dr. John Rapp Neuenschwander, Hosie is the District Coroner for the 15th Judicial District and was appointed November 9, 1984 by Judge Willoughby. The term of office is four years, beginning January 14, 1985. The district coroner in turn appoints the deputy coroner, with the approval of Judge Willoughby. Dr. Dill and Dr. Hardon have been appointed deputy coroners with their terms ending on the second Monday in January, 1989. Dr. Neuenschwander reports he usually appoints two deputies in each county unless a specific problem arises which makes it necessary to appoint additional coroners.

SCHOOL LITIGATION: The board advised Terry Rogers, special prosecutor in the Hardon case they are opposed to pursuing an appeal in regard to home school as Judge Willoughby ruled in favor of the Hardons. County Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Rogers by letter of this decision.

RAYMOND WAHRMAN: Mr. Wahrman met in regard to severed mineral & oil taxes. He feels this is unconstitutional. The board noted that in 1981 this was appealed to the State Board of Tax Appeals by Mr. Wahrman and was denied. The board ruled that the tax is valid.

BEER LICENSE: issued to Columbian Club; Atwood Township.

NW KS PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT: At this date, the county has not had notification from the cities in regard to membership. Commissioner Beamgard will direct a letter to the Atwood City Council for input. The county will contribute only with the option of joint membership with the cities.

 $\underline{\text{SW BELL TELEPHONE:}}$ the board received a tleephone call in regard to the cahrge for damage to buried cable on November 20, 1985 by the highway department at the SE of 9-1-33. This was in the amount of \$020.30. The board replied that the cable was not properly buried and denied payment.

SALARIES FOR 1986: The board approved the following salary schedule; with two members of the board voting for the increase, and one member voting against. Commissioners: \$10/mth increase.

Road & Bridge: Road Supervisor \$20/mth increase, Steier \$6.30/hr, Pitner will not be paid by the month, rather by the hour with a 10¢ hr. increase over 1985, Pochop remains same as in 1985, all others a 10¢/hr. increase.

NOXIOUS WEED: Signed a certificate of employment to the State Board of Agriculture for Robert Simminger, Jr. for 1986.

- Chris McDiffit and Donald Drickey met with the board concerning noxious weed spraying along State and Federal highways in Rawlins County. Agreed to sign an agreement for the above with KDOT for 1986. The county will charge for labor: \$13/hr lst person; \$10/hr. each additional person and \$18/hr for equipment rental for the 1982 3/4 ton pickup. It was noted at this time for Simminger to bill KDOT for the 1985 spraying.

EXTENSION: Ann domsch alerted the board of an upcoming seminar to be held in Colby in February entitled Rural Communities in Change. This seminar deals with stress and the rural crisis and the cost is \$25.00. The county will not pay for this seminar.

HOSPITAL: Lester Jensen, Doyle Beamgard and Robert Lewis, Jr. asked about the valuation change on the Sunflower Clinic and the Dill Medical Clinic. These buildings were tax exempt while owned by Rawlins County, however they were put on the tax roll at the time the buildings were rented to the doctors. The hospital board feels it would be taxing Rawlins County as the buildings are basically owned by the hospital or Rawlins County. They report that the appraiser has stated that she would delete the valuation upon receipt of a letter stating ownership.

HARDON CASE/SCHOOL LITIGATION: discussed a letter received by Terry Rogers, special prosecutor appointed by Judge Reinert to represent the state in the Hardon Case. Mr. Rogers enclosed a voucher in the amount of \$1939.12 for his services and proposed that further cost would be \$300 to appeal the case. The board disallowed this voucher, and do not accept the offer of \$300 to appeal the case. Further, a letter was sent to Mr. Rogers stating that the voucher was not approved and asked that the appeal be dropped. Mr. Rogers was informed that the board will refuse to pay for any of his services to appeal the case and asked that he confirm that there is no appeal pending. A copy was sent to Judge Willoughby and to Judge Reinert.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES OF NW KANSAS: Elmer Burk submitted the annual agreement for services by providing services for the mentally retarded residents and of levying a tax of 1 mill for this service. The board signed the agreement.

 $\overline{\text{COURT:}}$ the board discussed the district court closing their office for the state designated holiday January 20th and asked the county attorney to direct a letter to the Attorney General asking for an opinion regarding compatible holidays with the county.

APPRAISAL: Ralph Hanson and Audrey Dixson met concerning the upcoming reappraisal process. Approved hiring Dean Groneweg to update new property at \$9.18/hr. plus mileage. This needs to be completed by April 15th.

- remapping: Commissioner Cahoj feels that we are in a stalemate as far as funding is concerned for reappraisal because of the bills before the legislature to stop reappraisal. Mr. Hanson responded by noting that Vic Miller has the authority to hire a re-mapping firm if we do not fulfill our obligation. He cited the instance at Garden City which had to hire an appraiser of Miller's choosing and who did not come cheap. Hanson also stated that using ASCS maps would cut cost to the county only \$10 to \$15,000 and the maps are not as good quality. In addition,

Federal ASCS maps are not always available when needed.

-discussed salary for Deputy Kathy Bearley. Dixson reported Bearley put aside the deed research pending the salary schedule. The board feels the deed research could be done by Bearley regardless of the pay; however this was tabled until the February 11th meeting date.

- Commissioner Beamgard asked Mr. Hanson about an earlier discussion regarding adding new

parcels to the tax rolls. He felt that there could have been more property added. Audrey will count the parcels completed in the past two years.

CORRECTION TO MINUTES OF JANUARY 13th: Audrey pointed out an error regarding the salary stated to Kathy Bearley; rather than an increase of $\frac{1}{2}$ of the \$14,000 saved by the county doing the deed research, the minutes should read $\frac{1}{2}$ of the \$3.35/hr. additional it would cost to hire an additional person.

HEALTH: the board received a letter from Dr. Dill regarding the policy of rotating the county health oficer. The clerk was requested to write Dr. Dill stating the board has no grievance as far as his service to the county is concerned, however we feel the decision to rotate the county health officer to be valid.

Accepted the bid from Finley as the building is all steel versus the wood post in the Morton building.

- signed a gravel and limestone contract with J.R. Ginther. He requested that 1½ mile of road to his place and his yard be graveled. He will furnish the gravel for this. Accepted. - Disallowed vucher #0453, amount \$97.64 dated 1/31/86 from the Road & Bridge fund. This was for rough-surface light bulbs. They will be returned.

- received a thank you note from Worleys for road work completed in their area. - noted that any mileage paid for will be vouched for on a reimbursement voucher.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session February 11, 1986 with all members of the board present. This meeting date was set for the 11th rather than the 18th as the board will be attending a meeting in Colby February 13th concerning hiring a mapping firm for reappraisal.

APPRAISER: Meeting with the board was James Swanson of Bucher, Willis & Ratliff. Their proposal to perform ownership mapping services was \$104,976. They would be able to handle no more than 6 to 8 counties. Mrs Dixson presented a chart of cost by the following firms. This cost is based on 5830 parcels in the county, less cost of enlargements, as the board will approach Surdex Corporation to do the enlargements at a cost of \$14,135.

The board agreed that lst, 2nd and 3rd choices would be Sall Engineering, Transworld Services, and Cardwell & Associates. This will be then be discussed February 13th at the Colby meeting. APPROVED a salary increase to \$4.50 hour for Kathy Bearley, effective February lst; with two members voting yes and one member voting no.

SHERIFF DEPARTMENT: also approved that Wilford Martin, McDonald Deputy be granted \$5/mth salary increase, effective January 1st.

NW KANSAS PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT: a representative of the agency met with the board to discuss the county's participation in the commission. It was reported that Herndon City has declined to join, McDonald City and Atwood City have not responded at this date. If McDonald and Atwood agree to join the commission, the board felt that the Area Promotional Council might be interested as the dues are based on 1/10th of a mill. It was also reported that member counties receive services free of charge and non-member counties are charged a fee of \$150 plus a consultation charge per hour.

SCHOOL LITIGATION: This was briefly discussed with the county attorney as the board received a letter of response from Mr. Peckham reaffirming his advice of 1/31/86 that the county would be liable to pay the special prosecutor for the reasonable cost of his service. To date the board has not received a reply from Mr. Rogers regarding intentions on not pursuing an appeal on the Hardon case.

INVENTORY: inventories were received from the Health Department, County Clerk, Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Road & Bridge. This will be completed at the 28th meeting.

HOSPITAL: Approved a prepaid warrant to the hospital in the amount of \$90,622.10 for their allocation. This had been omitted in error with the January warrants issued.

REVENUE SHARING: letters were directed to a number of senators and representatives requesting their support for the continuance of the Federal Revenue Sharing Program.

ROAD & BRIDGE: the crews are working the hills north of Ludell.

- Frank Buk asked that the road by his place be done by March 1st. If this cannot be completed by that date to wait until the 1st of June. Pete replied that it could not be completed by March. - Pete reported the D-7 is pumping oil into the transmission and it will have to be taken to Colby. The machine has 9750 hours.

- reported that Rolland Anderson has good gravel but wants a lease for one year rather than the usual five years. No action taken.

- Pitner reported the coop has expressed dissatisfaction that the county only buys gas the 1st four months of each year from them. In years past the dealers drew straws to determine which four months they would sell gas to the county and the coop drew the 1st four months. The purchase of diesel fuel is rotated every transport load, however the gas is not as the major fuel consumption is diesel. The board agreed to continue with the current policy.

-Pete reported that they would like to replace two pickups and a maintainer. Also are checking into a truck chassis to replace the 1959 Ford dump truck chassis. Agreed to obtain bids for these. - discussed time off when the vacation time has been used. The question was brought up because during harvest, the employees prefer to deduct their pay rather than subtract this time from vacation. The minutes of July 16, 1985 state that if an employee takes days off, it will be subtracted from vacatin time and the employee will not be allowed to relinquish pay for that time. THE BOARD AGREED THAT THIS POLICY STANDS AND IN ADDITION: IF ADDITIONAL TIME OFF IS TAKEN WITHOUT PRIOR APPROVAL THIS COULD BE CAUSE FOR DISMISSAL. This policy will be posted and added to the handbook.

- Norman Owings was present.
- Signed an agreement with Kansas Department of Transportation for the McCain bridge project.
Wrench Construction was awarded the contract, with the total cost being \$142,215.22 and the county matching cost is \$32,896.00.

OLD AGE HOME: Howard Goehring, Luke Braxmeyer and Marvin Boyd reported on results of an executive board meeting in which plans were discussed for improvements to the home. As recorded in the minutes of July 1985, the home is badly in need of a dining area for those residents who need to be hand-fed and a rehabilitation addition. The minimum estimated cost is \$85,000. They also noted that Dr. Erbacher recommends an addition to the home as he expects more residents in the future. Mr. Goehring however, has reservations in this area as he is concerned that they would not have sufficient staff to serve the residents. Funding was discussed, among the possibilities was the Henningsen estate money, bond issue or a larger mill levy. The current levy is .25, which finances the 1986 budget of \$9,125. The clerk noted that cash has been encumbered from prior years in the amount of \$16,595.73.

HOSPITAL: Jack Finley reports the hospital has requested 10 to 12 loads of dirt on the north side of the new paving so they can plant grass. The county crews will haul the dirt which is available from Atwood Grain Company as soon as they are able.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT: Wynemah Cox reported on the cost report recently completed. It was noted that the county will not have to reimburse medicare.

-Mrs Cox also informed the board she is the representative for the northwest area to set up future objectives for the aged. This concerns wellness programs and is a chance to obtain grants. It will entail a trip to Topeka on March 26th which was approved.

-presented a press release which has been approved by Dr. Dill concerning the testing of blood for aids free of charge for the Kansas Department of Health & Environment. This was approved.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES OF NORTHWEST KANSAS: Transportation Director Gerry Weber and Director of Communications, Rod Bittle presented an agreement transferring the responsibility for 3 vehicles currently titled to Rawlins County to Developmental Services of NW KS. This transfer of title is through the Kansas Department of Transportation; originally KDOT only worked with the counties, now however they are willing to work with other entities. This was obtained by DSWNK Section 18, Grant No. P-0556-01. AGREED to transfer the three titles and to sign the agreement.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Jones informed the board of the pending change in the teletype system. The KBI has mandated a change by 1989, Jones is considering a Datamaxx teletype as the AT&T teletype has not been approved and the office has had problems with AT&T. The board approved Jones attending a NCIC training school March 10-12 iln Lawrence.

-Jones also reported that he understands that on bankruptcy action, the Federal Courts are now paying back $1\frac{1}{2}$ % on the 1st \$1000 and 1% over \$1000; this to be designated to the county sheriff. He will check with the County Attorney in this regard.

FAIR: The fair association presented 1985 expenditures.

REAPPRAISAL: Dale Sall of Sall Engineering presented information for the remapping procedure. The cost reported on February 11th per parcel of \$14.55 is in error. The correct figure is \$13.87 per parcel. Also, the work index card preparation is no longer required so the total charge was dropped approximately \$4000. On the enlargements, the cost depends on the number of counties participating; from 56.00 to 51.50. Motion to hire Sall Engineering for the remapping procedure, APPROVED. Sheridan, Phillips, Decatur and Rawlins todate will be working with Sall Engineering. Offices will be located in Decatur County.

TELEPHONE OHMS/OMS Service option: the board agreed to pay the 90¢ per month charge option with Southwestern Bell Telephone for all telephones housed within the courthouse and the county shop.

(February 28 continued)

SCHOOL LITIGATION: the board has been served notice of limited action suit by Terry Rogers for the attorney cost in the Hardon case. This is set for March 13th or prior. The board met with Judge Reinert in regard to this suit, asking if she has the authority to order the county to pay these costs. Judge Reinert replied she does not have the authority as it has gone to Judge Willoughby. Commissioner Beamgard reaffirmed the decision that he has not refused payment; only that he will not approve payment until so ordered by the court. He stated that in all due respect to the County Attorney, it becomes clear that his original statement to wait until August to think about pursuing the case would have been the correct procedure, particularly as the Hardons have moved to another county. The board discussed the cost per hour charged by Rogers, Mr. Peckham replied this is in line. It was felt the county did not get our moneys worth as Rogers called only one witness, the board did not hire Rogers and was against pursing this. As Judge Willoughby will be in court March 4th, at least one member of the board will be present to discuss this with the Judge.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Larry Rakes, representative from Martin Tractor presented information on a sloper, as requested. The cost of a sloper, installed is \$26,500. No action taken. -McDonald shop has been rewired. The machinery storage shed is expected to arrive the first weekend of March.

-Purchased a 1970 Ford Dump truck from Decatur County for \$3000.

-Signed a resolution to close the road located in Driftwood township on 1-1-33 in order to start work on the McCain bridge project 77 C 0763-01.

-Kenny Ruda inquired about the dam located in his pasture.

CUSTODIAN: Numerous complaints have been received in regard to the custodian; specifically the rest rooms are not cleaned properly and children are still allowed in the rooms even though it has been requested they not be allowed in the rooms.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session March 18, 1986 with all members of the board present.

TREASURER: Cheryl Wederski reported on back taxes; according to Kansas Statuates, when a tax sale is held the treasurer is allowed to go back only three years. The last tax sale was held in 1980 and \$3,714.31 was cleared and distributed to the taxing units. As there is \$8362.26 uncollected from the last sale and including up to 1982, and this involves a lot of extra work for the treasurer and the attorney, the treasurer does not recommend a tax sale this year. The board concurred with this recommendation but asked that this be checked again next year. -Cheryl also reported that the State will be installing a VIPS computer in all the treasurers offices by 1989 for vehicle information processing. The state will pay for the terminal and the county for installation and telephone costs.

-also discussed a subordinate bond which covers employees in the treasurers office. At a recent meeting it was brought out that as the treasurer is bonded separately, so should the employees in the office. The bond was approved at a cost of \$195.00.

PREPAID WARRANT CHECK: approved a prepaid check payable to Terry Rogers in the amount of \$1939.12 as ordered by the court. This is in payment for the school litigation suit.

CUSTODIAN: The board agreed to terminate the employment of Dawna Vap, effective March 31, 1986. This action was taken due to failure of not correcting deficiencies in terms of cleaning and of allowing children in the offices.

-the board reviewed applications submitted and phoned the three who have applied; after interviewing Kathy Riepl, Becky Lang, and Cindy Barnett, the board agreed to hire Becky Lang. She will be on a six month probation period at \$200/mth. The cleaning should be done after hours and no children or friends should accompany her.

- This action was taken after meeting with Dennis Bell of Bell & Carlson. The board gave their APPROVAL TO SUPPORT an application for a Community Development Block Grant on behalf of Bell & Carlson. These funds, if approved, will help provide the working capital needed to expand the company, thereby creating jobs for the county residents. As a number of Herndon area residents have applied for a job at Bell & Carlson, the board feels Herndon City should be involved.

PIONEER DEVELOPMENT meeting will be held in Hill City April 2nd. Commissioners Beamgard and Unger will attend.

XEROX: Adrian Thomas has requested a special rate of 5¢ a copy as he is writing a book and would need to copy over 1000 pages. This was denied.

AGREED to charge 25¢ a copy for any out-of-county charges.

NORTHWEST KS COUNTY OFFICIALS MEETING will be held April 9th at Colby.

ROAD & BRIDGE: discussed expensive repairs needed on two maintainers.

-asked Pete to check a bridge on the north side of the golf course.

-will consider bids for maintainers at the meeting on the 31st.

-noted that the road by Niermeiers is almost done.

-Manire Berens returned to work March 17th.

-Commissioner Beamgard will check with Eliott Glad concerning possible limestone west of Reno Fikans. The county pays $30 \, c$ a yard.

-Pete reported no limestone at J.R. Ginther's, but they do have gravel.

--good limestone reported at Balik's.

-Commissioner Unger reported Rolland Anderson will sell his gravel when the county is ready to stockpile and haul.

-Mike Cooper reports there is 3 miles of road to be graveled by his place as this is a bus route and mail route. Along this 3 miles is 2 big hills and the bus hauls 30 kids. He stated there is gravel at Larry Curtins and at his place.

APPROVED use of the courthouse grounds for the carnival to be held in conjunction with the rod run May 17th. Also discussed the children playing on the grass; Ben Harwerth is concerned about the condition of the buffalo grass. This was tabled until the next meeting date.

LAKE ROAD: briefly discussed a letter received from Robert Creighton, Atwood City Mayor concerning the condition of the lake road as this affects the annual race. There was no specific request made and the board took no action.

CONCRETE AT HOSPITAL: Noted that the concrete at the hospital parking lot is cracked. The board will check this with Finley Construction.

ROAD & BRIDGE: the board received bids for the purchase of a motor gradear. Agreed to accept the bid of \$62,635 from Martin Tractor Company. This is a Caterpiller Model 140G and includes a three year warranty or 5000 extended warranty at no extra cost. This price includes a \$700 option which produces 180 hpr. The original bid was \$61,935 for 150 hpr. Sales representative is Larry Rakes.

Additional bids were presented from Berry Tractor on a Galion Model A-550. This motor grader is $175~\rm{hpr}$. and was bid at \$61,485. Sales representative is Randy Case.

EXTENSION: Terry Kastens met with the board in regard to the upcoming extension budget. As federal and state entities will be reducing their share of the funding for 1987, Kastens just wanted to get an idea of the boards' feelings for the county share. The board suggested they will work with the 1986 mill levy of 1.63. The board also SIGNED A PROCLAMATION in recognition of Kansas Extension Momemakers Week May 4 through 10, 1986. A picture of the board with Maxine Phelps, Violet Holle, and Rathel Lea Reuber was taken at the signing of the proclamation.

RAYMOND WAHRMAN & RUSSELL RAULSTON were in attendance. Mr. Wahrman reported the sheriff driving a vehicle registered to Wm. Jones with an expired tag TH 11. He state that the sheriff should be arrested as he is violating the law. The County Attorney asked when the vehicle was sighted and if there was a witness. Sheriff Jones was seen on December 23, 1985; March 29 and April 5, 1986. Clarence Lorentz was a witness on April 5th. Commissioner Beamgard asked what business a Decatur County & Red Willow NE resident has in RAwlins County in regard to the law and what they wish to accomplish. GOOD SAMARITAN HOME: Commissioner Beamgard reported on a problem incurred at the home regarding sewerage. APPROVED to hire a plumber to solve the problem at an approximate cost of \$400 to \$500.

RURAL FIRE DEPARTMENTS: discussed the amount of pay to Marc Walker for work done on RFD #1 truck. No action taken at this time; this will be taken up at the May 20th meeting. Rural Fire District 2 will have a meeting this month in order to discuss fire calls and to get an update on the district.

RE-APPRAISAL: Commissioner Cahoj noted that there has not been enough work completed in th office, especially with the deed research. RAWLINS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MET IN REGULAR SESSION MAY 20, 1986 WITH ALL MEMBERS PRESENT.

NORTHWEST KANSAS PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT: Ned Webb met with the board regarding Community Improvement Grants. An elevator for the courthouse was discussed. At the present time there are about 25 applications from N.W. Kansas being processed of which approximately 40% will be approved. Mr. Webb will return in November to work on a capital improvement plan with the commissioners, who are to be thinking of improvements they would like to see in the county besides just the elevator. Paper work on the grant will begin in December. If accepted HUD will provide 70 to 80% of the funds with the county suppling the rest.

EXTENSION COUNCIL: Terry Kastens, Ralph Carlson and Gordon Hawkins presented the proposed budget for 1987. Also present were council members Ann Domsch, Kenneth Wilkenson, Carol Sramek, Dave Hubbard, Betsy Holste and Phil Finey the area extension director. The Commissioners expressed their desire of seeing the extension council and other funds such as the library, Historical Society, Mental Retardation, etc. put on the ballot to be voted on. The extension council will return to finalize negotiations when the valuations are figured.

MENTAL RETARDATION: Jim Blume and Paula McElwee, representing the Developmental Services of N.W. Kansas, presented a slide show and an informative talk on what their department has done for the mentally handicapped citizens in our area. They presented documentation of where the money recieved from Rawlins County was spent and the good it has done. They expressed their appreciation for the support of Rawlins County. Mr. Blume showed the board two of the projects done by their clients that are sold locally.

The DSNWK are requesting a *mill levy increase to help meet a balloon payment on the Prairie Developmental Center. This would amount to approximately \$8000.

RAYMOND WAHRMAN: Mr. Wahrman met with the board about several issues. He objects to the Mineral & Oil tax, but stated he would not attend the protested tax hearing now scheduled. Mr. Wahrman signed a complaint against Sheriff Jones for driving without a current tag. Additional alligations were brought up by Mr. Wahrman against Sheriff Jones, but Commissioner Beamgard asked Mr. Wahrman to present witnesses and not just hearsay. Mr. Wahrman left saying that he would never be back.

COUNTY HEALTH: Wynemah Cox reported on the KPHA Convention. She stated that it was a very informative and interesting meeting. Two of the main topics covered were AIDS and the number of cases in Kansas, and the environment and the amount of nitrates in the water.

Wynemah also reported that their Home Health Insurance is being transferred from Kansas BC/BS to DesMoines, Iowa. Wynemah and Shirley will attend a meeting in Topeka on May23 on the new proceedures needed to file claims.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: The board signed an acceptable proposal with Williams Tele-communications Company. They will be installing cable across county roadways at a minimum depth of 5 foot.

NOXIOUS WEED: George Sutton of the KDOT met at the request of the board in order to discuss noxious weed spraying along the state right of way. Sutton reported the state will be using either white or yellow flags to designate the areas to be sprayed. Simminger was present after Sutton left the meeting and was notified of the flags. He was also cautioned to bill the state promptly in order to receive payment for spraying.

- Commissioner Unger reported to Simminger that Elmer Solko has a complaint regarding spraying musk thistle. This is a 30 acre field that was sprayed by plane and cost Solko \$200. He stated it did not kill the weed and is presently digging them by hand. Simminger will check this.

AMBULANCE: the board discussed with Claude Kisling setting up a policy regarding county employees who are serving as emergency medical technicians. As a result of this discussion, the following policy was adopted.

POLICY: COUNTY EMPLOYEES SHOULD NOT BE DOCKED PAY WHEN SERVING THE COUNTY AS EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS OR AS FIRE FIGHTERS IN THE COUNTY.

Kisling also reported that the 1973 Chevrolet Ambulance located in Herndon over-heated following a run to Oberlin hospital and is presently at Worthys for repairs. Also reported that Atwood and Herndon have had 107 runs to date, compared to 54 runs last year.

TIME CLOCKS: Approved the purchase of two time clocks from Heinz Office Supply, Goodland at a price of \$225 each. These will be located at the Atwood county shop and the courthouse. Each employee, including elected officials will be required to record time worked.

TREASURER: Cheryl Wederski requested part time help during the summer; denied.

COURTHOUSE: Finley Construction is repairing the southwest corner at the top of the building. Approximate cost is \$240 unless damage is severe. Some of the bricks have shifted allowing water to erode the side of the building.

KEITH STUTTERHEIM who is a registered engineer met with the board. He recently returned to the states from working overseas and is looking into possible situations, either as a full-time engineer or as a consulting engineer. No action taken.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Bill Lewis, Gene McCain, Roger Holste and Charles Walker voiced their concern on 4 miles of county road located south of mile marker 62. Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session June 17, 1986 with all members of the board present.

PROPOSED 1987 BUDGETS: Although estimated valuation figures are not complete at this date, a sizeable decrease in valuation is expected. The board is requesting that all funds hold the mill levy at the 1986 level, if possible. The reappraisal fund will be increased by necessity and possibly others if the 1986 carry over is not adequate.

SOIL CONSERVATION: The 1987 budget request was presented by Louis Sabatka, Marvin Holle, Bob Martin and Jon Wicke. This reflects an increase of \$300, which will be reduced to the 1986 mill levy of .19. The board noted that the conservation district will be on a priority basis, should an increase be granted as the districts funds are matched by the state. The dollar amount requested was \$6800.

FAIR: The fair budget presented by Irene Holste in the amount of \$17,033 is the same budget as 1986; however the mill levy will remain at .46 which could reduce the budget. Mrs. Holste noted that the rodeo association has disbanded and in order to save the facility, the fair association has taken the rodeo grounds over. The fair will be held July 28 - August 2nd.

HOSPITAL: the hospital board represented by Doyle Beamgard, Lester Jensen and Claude Kisling requested a 5 mill levy for the third year, which was approved. They explained that although the hospital is currently in the black, because of the DRG system, this could figure to a deficit figure in a matter of days. Satellite clinics located in Bird City, McDonald, Herndon and Trenton NE have increased the patient load as well as the swing bed program. Their biggest problem at this point is a 1950 hospital needing capital expenditures.

DRUG & ALCOHOL COUNCIL: Donna Beims reported on the activities of the council during the year-noting that themajor activities have been the SADD programs and the post prom party held in April. The mill levy will remain at .10.

MENTAL HEALTH: 1987 mill levy will remain at .33.

GENERAL FUND: the board briefly discussed departments funded by the general fund. A letter was received from the district court requesting \$21,229 for court expenditures. The expenditures approved for 1986 was \$11,078. The board stated the expenditures will remain at the 1986 level.

HEALTH: Signed a contract with the Department of Health & Environment for a Basic Service Grant in the amount of \$4513.

SHERIFF: the board visited with Sheriff JOnes regarding the speed limit thru Ludell. This concern was voiced by a citizen at the May 30th meeting. Traffic will be monitored thru Ludell on a random time schedule.

APPRAISAL: Lindon Montgomery proposed that Double M Data make themselves available for 24 hours of service for a fee of \$800. This will be an advisory service dealing with re-appraisal and at this time Double M Data would act as an interpreter and use their expertise for the reappraisal process. Thomas County has given their approval for this service. Montgomery stated that should several adjourning counties approve the service, the fee would then be reduced. Tabled at this time.

- Audrey Dixson had no comment at this time regarding Montgomery's proposal.

- Dixson reported on the recent seminar.

-approved a four drawer filing cabinet under the reappraisal budget.

TIME CLOCK: approved needed wiring and a cabinet for the clock located at the courthouse. This will be implemented July 1st.

ROAD & BRIDGE: approved Scott Pitner pumping the septic tank at the shop.

- received a letter form Hartford Insurance informing the board that a transport load of cattle was involved in an accident by Mike Srameks because the road needed gravel. However, the area had received rain during the time in question and it was felt by the board that the driver was not driving according to road conditions. This letter did not require a response.

-crews are getting raods ready for harvest.

- Commissioner Unger reported he had received a number of calls concerning the Wahrman hill which needs a culvert and a fill. This will be taken care of.
- Merle Trail reported some curve signs and raod signs south of Atwood have been knocked down.

- noted that Penco Engineers will contact Gayle Loker in regard to the water channel as it needs to be inspected according to the Water Resource Board.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session June 30, 1986 with all members of the board present.

BEER LICENSE was issued to the Ludell Country Store for Gordon Reunitz.

TELEPHONE SYSTEM: the board discussed the possibility of implementing a 911 emergency system for the county. A representative of Phones Etc. from McCook NE will present information in this regard at the July 15th meeting.

EXTENSION: Terry Kastens, Kenneth Wilkinson, Irene Holste, Dave Hubbard and Phil Finley requested the amount of \$59,454 as the amount appropriated from the county for the 1987 budget. Motion by Commissioner Cahoj that the mill levy for extension remain at 1.63; this was seconded by Commissioner Unger. This mill levy would generate approximately \$52,160, assuming the valuation to be 32 million. The vote by the board of county commissioners for the 1.63 levy was unanimous, the vote by the extension board was two against the 1.63 levy. The 1987 mill levy will be 1.63.

HEALTH: Wynemah Cox requested a .50 mill levy for the 1987 health budget. Approved. -also presented a job description for the Rawlins County Health Officer and rewrote the job description for the administrator and the county health staff nurse, as required by state regulations.

TIME CLOCK: will be implemented July 1st for the courthouse and the Atwood County shop. It was noted by the board for those in the health department and the sheriffs office to make notations on the time cards when the employees are on call and unable to clock in before starting work. As a general rule, just to use common sense and to check in and check out anytime an employee is in the courthouse.

MENTAL RETARDATION: Motion made by Commissioner Cahoj that the mill levy for mental retardation remain at 1.00 mill; and that an additional .25 mill be levied in a separate fund in order to retire the local PDC building balloon payment. Seconded by Commissioner Unger. It is understood that this .25 mill will be levied for no longer than four years when the debt will be retired and that it should be requested each year.

COURT: the budget request for the district court was in the amount of \$21,229; amended by the board to \$12,000.

N.W. KS. AREA AGENCY ON AGING: Ellene Davis presented the annual report. It was noted that the Agency will undergo a 27% cut under the Gramm-Rudman Act, however they are not requesting additional monies. They receive \$1000.00 from Rawlins County each year. This is approved from the three senior citizen centers in the county.

FLOAT: the board asked that a float be prepared for the parade July 31st.

SOLID WASTE: the board received a letter from the Department of Health and Environment regarding the disposal of approximately 10 cubic yards of asbestos pipe and boiler insulation from the Rawlins County Hospital. Approval was given by the department providing certain conditions are met. These conditions are stated in the letter and are on file in the County Clerks office. Approval to deliver the waste must also be obtained from the landfill operator. The board leaves this decision entirely up to D.L. Weber, landfill operator.

ROAD & BRIDGE: instructed Scott to hold the warrant check issued to Martin Tractor Company until receipt of work order, etc. to be attached to the voucher. - approved obtaining bids to install a septic tank at the shop. - Scott is to contact Motorola regarding radio repairs.

Rawlins County Commissionres met in regular session July 15, 1986 with all members of the board present.

PRAIRIE DOGS: Paul and Doug Brown reported a large infestation of prairie dogs in Center and Union Township. This area is on the Delmar Green land. Mr. Green was called and reported that he has ordered poison and plans on eradicating the prairie dogs. He has agreed to meet with the board, along with Center and Union township officers on July 31st. The county attorney sited KSA 80-1201 in this regard. The county clerk will contact the township officers concerning meeting on July 31st.

HEALTH: Wynemah Cox presented job descriptions for the helath department. Additions and corrections were made on the last page entitled Job Description, as follows: the county health officer will serve for a two year period beginning January 1st; replace the wording "such as" with "including but not limited to" in the description portion. Changed the wording under the portion supervisor to Rawlins County Health Department rather than Kansas State Board of Health. This proposed job description was then approved and will be on file in the health department and the county clerks office.

911 EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SYSTEM: Stan Davis of Phones, Etc. met with the board in order to look into the cost of setting up the 911 emergency phone system in the county. They will first look into the cost by Southwestern Bell or by radio system. Also need to look into updating the phone system in the sheriffs office. The clerk will need to send a letter to S.W. Bell authorizing them to release information to Mr. Davis. The system is being considered because of a multitude of prefix numbers in this county, a majority of elderly persons and the confusion resulting from emergency calls for the ambulance. All emergency calls would be received by the sheriffs office if the 911 emergency system is implemented.

THANK YOU FOR NOT SMOKING signs have been ordered and should be placed in each office in the courthouse.

COUNTY ATTORNEY: discussed a letter from the county attorney regarding an increase in the 1987 budget request. This is partly due to adding malpractice insurance in the amount of \$1786, which is the difference between his private insurance coverage and the malpractice insurance as county attorney. This was denied as the county has special liability and if there should be a suit, the county would be liable to pay the cost. Also denied an increase in the budget for office expenses.

CUSTODIAN: the board commended Becky Lang on the good job and recommended a salary increase to \$250.00. This will be effective August 1st.

COMMISSIONER BEAMGARD announced he has purchased a home located in Center township and will be moving this fall from his present commissioner district. The board discussed the feasibility of changing the commissioner district, as by statuate, redistricting should be considered every three years. The clerk will obtain population figures for the townships.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Rolland Query inquired about graveling one mile of road going past his place. This road was elevated 4 or 5 years ago and will be added to the work list.

- Wilber and Lance Leebrick, Paul and Doug Brown, and John Buck reported the road south of Leebricks (34-4-34) washes out during heavy rains. Presently a culvert is located at the low spot and all agreed that a larger tube will not handle the problem. Pete will have Norman Owings look at the situation. This road is not well traveled and in 1982 Mr. Leebrick asked that it be closed, however he now farms inl the area.

- Larry Rakes of Martin Tractor Company presented information on a total cost proposal for purchase and maintenance on Caterpiller machines. This includes a guarantee buy-back after 5 years or 6000 hours, and a guarantee total repair expense. The total cost bid format combined with a 5 year lease purchase agreement will allow an entire fleet of old machines to be replaced with a fleet of new machines. This would save by reducing repair cost and allowing budgeting in a more efficient manner. Mr. Rakes will return August 19th with more details.

- crews will haul excess mat mix from the airport either to the landfill or on the clay hill by Keith Barnetts.

- Commissioner Cahoj noted that the headwall has not been completed at Elmer Coopers and the area washed out again.

- Commissioner Unger reported that 314 between Wahrmans and Grafels will need to be elevated and graveled.

Rawlins County Commissioners met in regular session August 19, 1986 with all members of the board present.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF RAWLINS COUNTY, KANSAS: That the SPECIAL LIABILITY FUND be declared dormant and the funds remaining in said account be transferred to the General Fund January 1, 1987.

1987 BUDGET HEARING was held at 10:00 a.m.. In attendance was Terry Kastens, representing the Extension Council. Kastens noted that the mill levy of 1.59 which was published in the legal notice is not the levy agreed upon June 30th. At that time the board had agreed that the mill levy of 1.63 for 1986 budget would not be reduced. After conferring with the auditors, the board agreed to make up the difference of \$1201.36 to the extension from the General Fund rather than re-publishing the budget because of the time element.

COMMISSIONER MEETING DATE CHANGED from September 19 to Friday, September 12th. This is due to a conflict with Commissioner Cahoj.

DUANE ROESCH/TAX APPEAL on real estate. Mr. Roesch asked that the board recommend to th State Board of Tax Appeals that a further tax refund be granted on his real estate as he feels that he paid excess tax in the amount of \$1200.00. This is on a house built and assessed in 1978. Ludwig Zerr, Appraiser at the time in question noted on the records that he was not allowed in the house and a 20% reduction was allowed as it was assessed as a non-agriculture home site. The State Board of TAx Appeals did allow a refund of taxes to no more than the three most recent tax years. After reviewing the information available, Commissioner Beamgard declined to sign the recommendation, based on the language "clerical error". Commissioner Unger voted to sign the recommendation, and Commissioner Cahoj voted to declined.

APPRAISER: Audrey Dixson reported that the Division of Property Valuation is asking for information on use value appraisal of agriculture land. Their analysis indicates that the major dryland crops harvested are wheat, weighted 81% and sorghum, weighted 17%. The board did not concur with this and changed it to read wheat 77% and sorghum 23%.

PRAIRIE DOG: Commissioner Cahoj reported that Elmer Burk has not been successful in obtaining poison at this time.

COURTHOUSE has loose tin on the south side, it was approved on the 8th of August to have this repaired for \$145.00. The board also reported loose tin on the north side of the courthouse.

SURPLUS PROPERTY asked that the county update the authorization forms in order to select and pick up surplus property from the Kansas Correctional Industries at Topeka. The board deleted Harvey Steier from the list and approved Virgil Portschy, Claude Kisling, Rod Beamgard, Dave Brown, Wynemah Cox, Larry Lee Jones, Scott Pitner and Gary Worthy.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Larry Rakes from Martin Tractor Company called on the board. - approved to install a tube by Leebricks at a cost of approximately \$1000. - discussed the bridge by Dick Roesch which was reported by Eastep's on 7/31/86. The tube recommended will cost approximately \$7000.

- Norman Owings presented a bridge inspection report. He has compiled a record of off-system bridges. There are 121 bridges 20' or longer in the county.
- signed a request for a construction project with the Kansas Department of Transportation on FAS route NO. 179 located 3.5 miles west & 1.5 miles south of Herndon. This includes grading and bridges. Estimated cost for the project is \$125,000.

- the department purchased the used tire changer from Quality for \$500 rather than the \$700 originally quoted.

- Kendricks asked about gravel on the west side of 36-4-33. This is $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of road from their house to the main road. This will be added to the list.

GOOD SAMARITAN HOME: Howard Goehring, Administrator and Luke Braxmeyer presented plans for an addition and remodeling of the home, as drawn by an architect from their home office. This would allow a private area for feeding residents with special needs, laundry facilities, administrative offices and storage. Estimated cost is \$175,000 to \$190,000. HEALTH: Wynemah Cox reported that USD #317 has contacted the county health department for services at the school for around 87 students. Agreed to draw up a contract with the school system for salary plus expenses for county health personnel doing the service. This would be a reimbursement to the county health fund.

- the county health department have done some testing for aids; two cases have been reported in Hays and Wynemah predicts that this could be a major problem in a few years.
- reported that on September 4th Dr. Lorene Phillips who is head of the Kansas Public Health Association is making a tour of N.W. Kansas and will be visiting the county.
- Advisory board meeting will be held September 9th at noon.

PRAIRIE DOG: received some information from Elmer Burk for prairie dog control.

ROAD & BRIDGE: approved ordering needed culverts.

- gave approval for Caterpiller to check the 613 which is Manire Berens machine.

COMMISSIONER ROD BEAMGARD submitted his resignation by letter to Governor Carlin and to the board, effective September 14, 1986 as he will be moving from District Two to District Three.

- Mayor Bob Creighton and R.O. Frick, on behalf of a number of citizens met with the board to discuss the possibility of redistricting the commissioner district in order for Rod to continue his term. Rod declined the suggestion of a petition, stating that although he would very much like to remain as commissioner, he would not like to see any dissention in the county. Commissioner Cahoj and Unger expressed their regret but agreed they were uneasy about redistricting at this time.

GOOD SAMARITAN HOME: Motion by Commissioner Cahoj, seconded by Commissioner Unger to present a question for a mill levy in order to construct a private area for feeding residents with special needs, a new laundry area and administrative offices and storage space. This might be accomplished with a bond issue as the 1987 budget has been set, or for approval from the public to increase the 1988 budget. The County Attorney and County Clerk will obtain the information needed and the legalities concerned.

APPROVED to have the exterminators from Norton spray the 1st floor of the courthouse for bugs each month at a price of \$30.00.

SIGNED an agreement with Williams Telecommunications Company to bury communications cable in Rocewood Township. The legals are attached to the agreement and are on file in the county clerks office. The cable will be buried a minimum of 40" on the county road way, the trench will be packed so the shoulder of the road will not erode, and the cable location will be marked every 500 feet. It was also noted that Williams Telecommunications Company shall be solely responsible for the construction and maintenance of the cable and shall hold Rawlins County harmless from any and all liability which may arise out of the presence of the cable in the road right-of-way.

RE-APPRAISAL: the board signed thecontract agreement with Sall Engineering and surveying for ownership mapping programs for Rawlins County at a fee of \$80,875. The performance bond from Sall Engineering was presented by Audrey Dixson.

-gave permission for Audrey to hire Jane Wolters as part time help

-granted permission for both Kathy Bearley and Audrey to attend a school in Garden City October 20 - 24 on use-value of land.

-AGREED to havethe STATE intervene and consolidate issues concerning AT&T valuation assessments.

PUBLIC RADIO: Mike Braxmeyer reported that a group of citizens applied for a grant for a public radio and have received funds from Atwood, Herndon and McDonald cities as three translators will be needed. They also received funds from the Second Century Fund and will need to raise \$3300 privately. There is an option which concerns the county, whereby equipment can be installed in the dispatchers office to enable the sheriff to break into the signal for a local emergency situation. Needed for this option is a dedicated line, costing \$37.00 a month, a power supply for \$30 - \$50, amplifier for \$200, and \$74 for installation. Braxmeyer asked if the board would be receptive to this option, if so, he will contact the FCC for guidelines and further information. After the radio system is installed, Mike will have the information needed to make a decision on the option.

ROAD & BRIDGE: John Pianalto requested one mile of gravel on the hill north of his place. This road was elevated a year ago. John reported gravel located at Joe Kogl's and Earl Browns.
