2019 ANNUAL REPORT DEDICATION

Willard "Bud" Martin was born in Boston, Massachusetts and was later raised in Laconia, New Hampshire. In October 1988, Bud married Margaret Demos, and they moved to Sandwich permanently. He always said that his love for the outdoors and agriculture brought him to the woods and mountains of Sandwich. Bud has three daughters: Galya Martin, Melissa Martin, and Helen Martin.



Bud received his bachelor's degree from Bates College where he majored in Economics. He later went on to graduate from Harvard Law School. Several years after, Bud attended evening classes at Boston University Law School where he received an LLM in Taxation.

Bud has taken on numerous roles in the New Hampshire community. During his 57 years at Martin, Lord & Osman, PA, he served as an attorney, director, and president. After being appointed by Governor Walter Peterson in 1972, Bud became a special justice at the Laconia District Court in the Family Division where he served for 35 years. His docket consisted almost exclusively of juvenile cases. He made it his life's mission to make a difference in the lives of children and families in need.

While Bud's resume is quite exceptional, his life-long commitment to serving the community on both the local level and state level is what is truly noteworthy. When he was not acting in his capacity as a judge or attorney, Bud dedicated his services to many organizations including: Board of Selectman for the Town of Sandwich (2009-2018), Sandwich Planning Board (1989-2008), Salvation Army Advisory Board, CASA, Belknap County Citizens Counsel on Children and Families, Carroll County Juvenile Justice Program, Reclaiming Futures, Child and Family Services, Carroll County Coalition for Public Health, Carroll County United, Partners in Prevention, Neighbors in Need, the New Hampshire Bar Association, and University of New Hampshire Law School.

Whether it be leading a successful law practice or serving as a highly respected District Court and Family Division judge, or being a member of several professional associations, or volunteering on local government and nonprofit charity boards, Bud has always firmly believed in strengthening our economic and social community.

In his spare time, Bud could be found relishing in the oasis of Barville Pond Farm. Every fall, Bud opened up his apple orchard to the public so that people could pick their own

apples and make apple cider. During the winters, Bud opened up his sugar house, so that the public could learn about the sugaring process and take home maple syrup. Bud has won multiple first-place ribbons for his apples and maple syrup at the Sandwich Fair. His maple syrup even won third place for the prestigious Carlisle Award at the NH Maple Producers Association.

Bud has served the Town consistently since 1989. Hailed as a consensus builder, Bud's calm leadership and ability to find common ground made him an effective leader both on the Planning Board and as a Selectman. It is our honor to dedicate the 2019 Town Report to our esteemed colleague, faithful friend and gentleman farmer. Thank you, Bud, for your 29 years of dedicated and faithful service to the Town of Sandwich!

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In New Hampshire, the Board of Selectmen have unique statutory responsibilities to administer the operations of the town, which include the authority to "manage the prudential affairs of the town and perform the duties by law prescribed."

Selectmen Boldt, Dwyer and Haight were diligent in performing their duties in a transparent and collaborative manner acting in the best interest of the Town. The hardworking and dedicated team of Town employees is the critical component in keeping our community running smoothly. We are pleased to report that the Town's 2019 financial status is in good standing thanks to the taxpayers, Town employees, elected officials, and the volunteers that serve this community.

2019 was a year of significant progress and accomplishments. We identified challenges, worked towards establishing best practices, and set priorities to ensure that the Town continues to operate smoothly and in a fiscally responsible manner.

Highlights of 2019

Personnel

- Retirement of Tax Collector/Town Clerk Sharon Teel, and the election of Alison Gage
- Selectmen Bud Martin and Bob Rowan completed their long-time service.
- Selectman Haight was elected for a three-year term
- Selectman Dwyer was appointed for a one-year term
- Selectman Boldt became Chair of the Select Board
- Compliance Officer Michael Capsalis was hired
- Staff Meetings were held regularly
- Personal Assessment forms were implemented to better engage employees

Roads and Bridges

- The Highway Department maintains 45 miles of gravel and 20 miles of paved roads in Town as well as 7 miles of the Sandwich Notch Road, which has 125 culverts.
- The Highway team completed extraordinary work including:
 - -Construction of the temporary Basket Street Bridge within budget
 - -Completion of the Quaker Whiteface Bridge in conjunction with outside contractors under budget
 - -Metcalf Road large diameter culvert road stabilization project
 - -Completed 7 ½ miles of high-limbing and tree trimming

Projects

- Police Department furnace replacement; thanks to a generous citizen
- Town Hall flagpole lighting
- Central Fire Station flagpole replacement; thanks to several local contractors and the Fire Department
- Clean-up of abandoned boats around Littles Pond

Accomplishments

- Broadband Advisory Committee and their work including issuing an RFI and RFP and listening sessions
- Renewal of our Solid Waste Contract (6 years) with Waste Management locked in on pricing and our ability to continue with Single Stream Recycling
- Budget Advisory Committee volunteers provided outstanding analysis beyond the 2020 Budget
- Town Administration processed 60 property sales and 107 building permits
- Completion of the Fire Department rescue boat

Challenges

- Staffing transitions, compensation, retention and recruitment of qualified employees
- Emergency Services recruitment of a new generation of Firefighters and EMTs
- Rising costs and requirements of future equipment
- Planning for capital expenses
- Legal Action against the town

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

Trustees of Trust Funds are elected by the voters of Sandwich, one each year for a term of three years. They are charged as fiduciaries to manage the Trust Funds, Capital Reserve Funds, and Expendable Trusts of the Town of Sandwich:

- Trust Funds are those given to the Town by private parties, usually through bequests
 or donation, generally with the income dedicated to specific purposes by the donor.
 Payments are requested by the Selectmen or by application by private parties at the
 Selectmen's Office. Payments are made once the Trustees confirm that the request
 conforms to the terms of the Trust.
- Capital Reserve Funds are those Town Funds appropriated by Town Warrant to fund large expenditures, such as capital improvements and equipment
- Expendable Trusts are generally Town Funds used for expenses as needed and approved by the Selectmen.

The Trustees have an Investment Policy for Trust Funds with an asset allocation of up to 70% in equities and a goal to maximize income while at the same time grow the principal. For Capital Reserve Funds and Expendable Trusts, which are town-funded, fully expendable and usually shorter-term, investments are limited to low risk vehicles such as CDs, with the goal of providing preservation of capital with growth in income and a high degree of liquidity.

In 2019, our funds were managed by Cambridge Trust of New Hampshire, who also did the accounting of our MS-9 reports as reported to the State of New Hampshire and shown in this report. The Trustees meet at least four times each year with their investment manager to review investments and oversee investment performance.

As of December 31, 2019, the Trustees were responsible for managing assets with a market value of \$3,723,140.99.

TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR

The year started like many before it: Year-end closing, preparing reports for the Department of Revenue, gathering documents for the annual audit, processing some delinquent taxes. Then the announcement that our long-time Town Clerk/Tax Collector Sharon Teel was going to retire after 23 years (18 as TC/TC, 5 as Deputy TC/TC). The goal from our NH Tax Collector's Mission Statement is to "keep the office operating at a high level of accuracy and efficiency." Sharon succeeded at this without question, passing every audit and in turn passing onto me the 'best practices' of running a fine-tuned office. Along with the citizens of Sandwich, I want to thank Sharon for her outstanding service to our Community.

TRAINING: After our March Town Election, I attended a workshop in Concord for New Tax Collectors, hosted by the NH Tax Collectors' Association and the Department of Revenue Administration.

TRANSITIONING: A Recommittal Warrant of outstanding taxes was issued to me after another audit of Sharon's records. We had a seamless transition as Sharon graciously stayed on as my Deputy, while we searched for a replacement. In April 2019 we welcomed Lois Brady as our new Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector.

DECADE-AT-A-GLANCE: We saw a modest increase of Registered Voters of 5% from 2009 to 2019, while Vehicle Registrations increased by 13% over the decade; titles issued in our office increased 37% (note: this number is for Private Sales of vehicles and new residents titling their vehicles in the State of New Hampshire; it does not include vehicles purchased and titled at a dealership).



TOWN WARRANT NARRATIVE

The following is a brief overview of each Article listed in the Town Warrant.

ARTICLES 1 and 2: Articles 1 and 2 in the Town Warrant will be decided by ballot on Tuesday, March 10, 2020 at Town Hall. Voting hours are 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. All other Articles contained in the Warrant will be considered at the Deliberative Session on Wednesday, March 11, 2020, at the Sandwich Central School at 7:00 P.M.

<u>OVERVIEW</u>: The Selectmen, Budget Committee, and Department Heads worked hard to provide a realistic budget to continue investing in necessary infrastructure projects and equipment replacements while also looking forward to the future with best management practices in regard to tax burden and Town debt. The overall Budget increased by 3.6%, but non-tax revenues increased 7%, reducing the impact to the tax rate. Once again, we are very fortunate to have the support of the Quimby Trustees and their ongoing generosity to the taxpayers of Sandwich.

ARTICLE 3: General housekeeping article notifying of any changes to Town Officer wages (specifically Town Clerk/Tax Collector) and an opportunity to reflect the adopted 2020 mileage rate.

ARTICLE 4: The General Government section of the budget is up 1.8% mostly due to the transition of personnel in the Selectmen's Office. The Legal line was increased due to ongoing utility company tax abatement appeals, and the Mapping/Engineering line was increased to continue the corrective work on the many Current Use files in our Town. The Town Building budget went down since many overdue building maintenance projects are now complete, and the Assessing budget decreased significantly since the Town's Revaluation is done. Overall, department operating budgets are fairly flat except for changes in personnel and vendor costs. Debt service covers the Town's bond payments for which we have two: Town Hall Building Renovation and the Young Mountain Road & Schoolhouse Road Bridge Projects.

<u>ARTICLE 5</u>: The Quimby Trustees are funding the creation of a website for the Sandwich Children & Youth Fund.

<u>ARTICLE 6</u>: The Town is required to update our Emergency Operation Plan every five years; if we do not do so, we won't be eligible for any Federal grants or FEMA funding. The update will be fully funded by a grant from the State's Homeland Security Emergency Management.

ARTICLE 7: The Police Department's operating budget increased by 3.8% from 2019. The only notable increases are due to personnel costs - wages and health insurance. The LEAD program taught at Sandwich Central School will continue to be funded by the Robert Ramirez Trust.

<u>ARTICLE 8</u>: The 2014 Ford Expedition is scheduled to be replaced in 2020. After research, the best deal for a new 4WD Cruiser is a 2020 Chevy Tahoe. The old Expedition will either be sold or traded, or the Selectmen may decide to retain it for use by the Fire Chief.

ARTICLE 9: The Town is still served by Stewart's Ambulance Service per the contract and Inter-Municipal Agreement established in 2010. In addition to regular ambulance service, this agreement provides for 24/7 paramedic coverage out of Moultonborough.

ARTICLE 10: The Police Department has requested the purchase of Dispatch Hub software to help them interface better with other departments within the County. This software not only provides better communication, it makes their reporting more efficient. This software will be fully funded thanks to the generosity of the Quimby Trustees.

ARTICLE 11: The Fire Department's operating budget is up by only 1.45% from 2019 due primarily to personnel costs. Included within this budget are the costs for the special detail at the Sandwich Fair (\$5,275), which are offset in full by the Sandwich Fair Association.

ARTICLE 12: The Town entered into a 5-year lease agreement in 2017 to purchase 16 air packs for the Fire Department. This year's fourth lease payment is \$26,718, and the Quimby Trustees have generously offered to cover the payment.

ARTICLE 13: The Town's new Broadband Advisory Committee has accomplished an enormous amount already this year. After issuing a Request for Proposals (RFP) to various broadband providers, the Committee is requesting \$10,000 to pay professionals in the field which may be required to study the options presented to determine what would work best for Sandwich. The funds may also be used to pay for any legal costs associated with the proposals.

ARTICLE 14: The Highway Department operating budget is up by 6.41% or \$42,691 from 2019. Part of this increase is due to personnel costs (wage adjustments to all the crew) and expense hikes for aggregate, fuel and sand/salt. The State announced they will no longer maintain the Notch Road but will instead pay the Town an annual stipend of \$3,364 to offset a portion of our costs.

ARTICLE 15: The Selectmen decided to return to investing \$200,000 this year in the maintenance of our roads. The funds appropriated will be primarily used for the repair and topcoat paving of portions of Bennett Street, Vittum Hill Road and Mason Road.

ARTICLE 16: The 2006 580Case Backhoe requires replacement. The Town plans on purchasing a 2020 580Case Backhoe and equipment for \$102,000 and will trade-in the 2006. This purchase will be funded with \$51,000 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve, a generous donation of \$20,000 from the Alfred Quimby Fund, with the balance raised by taxes.

ARTICLE 17: The Town will trade-in the 2000 GMC Dump Truck we purchased used from the Town of Moultonborough for a 2020 CV International Truck body and plow equipment for \$98,000. This truck is equivalent to an F550 in size and does not require a CDL license to drive. This purchase will be offset with \$49,000 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve with the balance raised by taxes.

ARTICLE 18: This Article is to raise and appropriate the funds for the 2nd year's lease payment for the two dump trucks acquired in 2019.

ARTICLE 19: Years ago, the Selectmen established a Capital Reserve to save funds to replace the Highway Shed Roof. The Highway Shed Roof will be covered with a new standing-seam roof with a small pitch to help shed snow and reduce ice build-up, as well as provide insulation. The \$80,000 project will be funded with \$56,000 from the Highway Shed Roof Capital Reserve with the balance raised by taxes.

ARTICLE 20: The Transfer Station operating budget reflects the largest department increase: 22% or \$31,103. While our general hauling fees increased in all categories with the renewal of our Waste Management contract, the Single Stream costs increased significantly. The good news is our new 6-year contract numbers are still better than other towns in the region and we can continue to recycle.

ARTICLE 21: This is a petitioned article submitted by the newly created Sandwich Climate Change Committee seeking to reaffirm the Warrant Article 53 passed at the March 13, 2007 Sandwich Town Meeting. The committee narrative reads: "The Town of Sandwich can have a place in reversing climate change, but even if climate change were not an issue, there are new energy and efficiency changes that the town's leadership, businesses and residents should be aware of on a continuing basis. Solar costs have dropped 70 percent in the last decade and storage batteries are getting cheaper and more efficient. Amazon just ordered 100,000 electric delivery vans. Mount Desert Island in Maine is just one of the communities building a solar farm that will serve a whole community with less expensive electricity. By passing this warrant article, with its doable goals, you as a voter at the 2020 Town Meeting will help ensure Sandwich is not left behind."

ARTICLE 22 & 23: These Articles are by petition from the Sewer Commissioners and covers their operating expenses and Capital Reserve deposit. These monies are derived from sewer user fees and have no impact on the tax rate.

ARTICLE 24: The Highway Department and Sewer Commissioners are going to share in the expense to purchase a used, trailer-mounted generator. This generator can be used to power the Transfer Station, run pumps for the sewer, and power the Highway Shed and fuel depot. The Sewer Commissioners will pay their half of the cost with funds from the Sewer Capital Reserve and the remaining half will be paid for by the Alfred Quimby Fund.

ARTICLE 25: Culture and recreation are important aspects of our Town's identity and this expenditure includes the Parks and Recreation Department, Old Home Week, 4th of July and Memorial Day celebrations. As always, the Town is very grateful to the Quimby Trustees for their continued support of these programs and the Parks and Recreation Department. This operating budget is up by almost 3.46% due to general personnel costs.

ARTICLE 26: There are two components to the Groundskeeping expenditure: General Groundskeeping (properties around Town buildings and other Town properties) and Roadside Snow Removal to provide downtown parking along Main and Maple Streets.

ARTICLE 27: Even though a section of Quimby Field was re-built in 2014, the field still requires ongoing aerating and maintenance. The Parks and Recreation Director continues to work with playing field specialists and the Quimby Trustees to make appropriate upgrades. The Quimby Trustees have generously offered to fund this maintenance.

ARTICLE 28: The Town's conservation expenses are typically used to support the Conservation Commission, assist with the funding of the Five Days of Sandwich (a very successful three-week program during the summer for children ages 7-14), and contribute to the Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG) toward their annual river testing. The Coolidge Conservation Trust assists the Town in funding these endeavors.

ARTICLE 29: The Town's Forest Fund will pay for expenses related to the maintenance and improvements of the Town's Meadow Brook property; specifically, mowing a small section of existing fields and encouraging/introducing pollinator plants.

<u>ARTICLE 30</u>: The Selectmen continued funding some of the Town's Capital Reserves and Expendable Trusts to save for future projects or purchases. \$40,000 from the Town's surplus (unexpended fund balance) is proposed to be used to offset these deposits.

ARTICLE 31: The driveway for 483 Holderness Road is a Class VI Town Road called Peaked Hill Road. The major portion of the road was discontinued in 1927. The current property owners are requesting the remaining portion of this road get discontinued this year.

ARTICLE 32: The Marjorie Thompson Trust may be used to assist children of Sandwich with the costs of their education or other needs. This is an annual article.

<u>ARTICLES 33 - 45:</u> These are petitioned articles requiring the signatures of at least twenty-one registered voters in Sandwich to be placed on the Warrant. Brief descriptions are as follows:

Samuel H. Wentworth Library: The Library Trustees once again submitted a petition for their 2020 budget of \$96,543. The Town's funding provides 60.9% of their budget. The balance of the Library budget is derived from income from the Wentworth Trust and private donations.

Starting Point: A non-profit organization serving victims of domestic and sexual assault in Carroll County. Services include a 24-hour hotline, emergency shelter, court and hospital advocacy, and support groups and education. All services are at no charge.

Tri-County Community Action: Community contact program which provides necessary services to Sandwich residents if they are financially unable to do so. They provide fuel and electric bill assistance, emergency shelter, and support several food pantries.

Community Food Bank - St. Andrews: Furnishes food to Sandwich residents and residents of other neighboring communities as needed every other week. They also provide families in need with both Thanksgiving and Christmas food baskets.

The Mental Health Center: This organization provides services to Sandwich residents who are unable to pay the full cost of their mental health care. They also provide a 24-hour emergency service as a public safety function to the community.

Moultonboro/Sandwich Senior Meals: This Sandwich Senior Meals program (Meals on Wheels) is run under Ossipee Concerned Citizens and provides home-delivered meals to area residents as well as hot meals served at the Benz Center and Moultonboro Lions Club.

Winnipesaukee Wellness Center: A health and fitness center providing necessary monitoring, testing, and training for improved health.

Doris L. Benz Community Center: Our local community center that provides a gathering place for private parties, meetings of clubs, social groups, Town government, charitable organizations, exercise, musical groups, and more.

Central New Hampshire VNA & Hospice: Visiting Nurse and Hospice organization, which provides home health care to those who are in need.

InterLakes Community Caregivers: An organization which provides rides to medical facilities, grocery stores, and personal appointments to Sandwich residents at no charge to assist them in remaining independent and in their own homes. 33 Sandwich residents were registered and volunteers responded to 253 calls in 2019.

Loon Preservation Committee: A non-profit whose goal is to protect and nurture the loon population.

Sandwich Children's Center: Since 1985, Sandwich Children's Center has provided a high-quality, affordable, early-learning experience for the children of Sandwich and surrounding communities.

Tri-County CAP's Homeless Intervention & Prevention Program: This new program was created to assist individuals who are experiencing homelessness or imminent threat of homelessness through counseling and housing placement.

Christopher Boldt moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Sharon Teel and the meeting was adjourned at 8:16 pm, becoming one of the shortest meetings in recent history. 123 Registered voters attended.

COMPLIANCE OFFICER

In the fourth quarter of 2019, the Compliance Officer position changed hands. Tom Johnson resigned and intended to fully retire on June 30, 2019; however, he agreed to help with the transition until a new replacement was hired. The transition was finally completed on October 8, 2019 when Michael Capsalis was hired.

In 2019, the office processed over 107 permit application and answered various questions from the public. Due to the part-time position of the Compliance Officer and Tom's resignation, many of these permits were handled by the Board of Selectmen during the 100 day transition period. The bi-weekly office schedule and remote electronic correspondence with the Compliance Officer Assistant, Jennifer Wright, seems to be



working well with property owners and their agents. The volume of applications has declined slightly this year; however, no change in scheduling is anticipated. least At one site inspection is needed with all applications and a few properties require multiple site visits. This is due to improper staking, marking or the site just not ready for compliance inspection. We continue to see new

dwellings, accessory structures, additions, septic systems, solar arrays, replacement wells, driveways, and signs. The Shoreland District properties continue to be active with renovations, tear downs and rebuilds. Some of these tear down/rebuilds have required Zoning Board of Adjustment approval.

Asking for cooperation through voluntary compliance seems to be working well with the residents, contractors and their agents. I am usually available via phone or e-mail for questions that require an immediate response.

We continue to work well with the Fire Chief and Road Agent in order to assist our property owners with any permit questions and issues. We also provide assistance and feedback to the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment regarding



applications, when requested by the applicant. We also propose and review zoning amendments and ordinance language.

The Compliance Officer deals with **land use** issues as directed by the Board of Selectmen. We do not perform any building inspections or actual construction activity dealing with the various adopted building codes, mechanical codes or energy codes. This is the responsibility of the contractor, owners or their designated agent per RSA 674:51 and 155-A:2. The 2015 International Code books are available for review at the Selectmen's Office. The Compliance Officer may be able to assist with code questions if needed as a courtesy.

I would like to personally thank Jennifer Wright for her guidance, help and patience during this transition. Jennifer's attention to detail is second to none. I will eventually get to know the back roads and the property owners, and I look forward to continuing to work for the town of Sandwich. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact me.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

For 2019, the Sandwich Fire Department responded to 235 calls for service. The majority of calls were EMS related and included medical aids, lift assists, backcountry carryouts and medical alarm activations. The next calls for service were fire alarm activations. Most of these were caused by disruptions in A/C power. Tree and wire calls continue to keep us busy with almost 30 responses. Police and Highway Departments also assist us with traffic control, utility company notification and debris removal. Motor vehicle crashes for the year were up to 17 responses. The Fire Department provided 11 service call responses mainly for flooded basements. Chimney fires, building fires and outside fires totaled 30. The Sandwich Fire Department provided or received mutual aid on nine different occasions for the year. Included were a brush fire on top of Mt. Whittier and a multi-alarm fire in West Ossipee. Backcountry carryouts were conducted with assistance from Fish & Game from several neighboring mutual aid towns.

Thanks to all Sandwich Fire Department members for their service and dedication. Also thank you to mutual aid departments for all their assistance and continued support.

We had a good turnout for the Pancake Breakfast and Open House during Old Home Week in August. Thank you to the Sandwich Fire and Rescue Association for sponsoring this event.



We replaced the flag pole at the central Fire Station. Thank you to Bruce Robinson Company and East Coast Foundation for volunteering their equipment and expertise!

The Sandwich Fire Department also kept busy with training, business and work details throughout the year. Hundreds of hours were spent with in-house training, Lakes Region Fire Mutual Aid,

NH Fire Marshal's Office and National Fire Academy training programs. Also one new member acquired his NR-EMT-B certification.

We performed regular maintenance on the fire pond and hydrant on North Sandwich Road and dry hydrant repair on Maple Ridge Road and Heritage Woods Road.

During winter storms we opened up the central Fire Station to serve as a warming/recharging location for townspeople during power outages. This was well received.

The Selectmen approved the disbursement of old apparatus from the Fire Department. The 1985 Ford B 350 and the 1985 Dodge pick-up trucks were sold. The Forestry truck now in service was completed in 2019. This vehicle responds first to outside fires, brush fires and tree and wire incidents. The Sandwich Firemen's Association purchased a 16-foot enclosed trailer. This unit will be



set up as a multi-function command center. It will also carry the ATV and rescue trailer. The trailer was purchased with Association funds which included Skrungloo donations. Thanks to all Sandwich taxpayers for supporting the Fire Department.

Please check your smoke detector and carbon monoxide batteries. Heating system vents around foundations should be kept clear. Any questions or assistance needed, please contact the Fire Station at 284-6264.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

This past year we were fortunate enough to have favorable weather conditions in the spring and summer which limited the amount of wildfire activity throughout the state. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. The towers' fire detection efforts are supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger is especially high.

Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The Forest Protection Bureau and local fire departments were very busy this year celebrating Smokey Bear's 75th year preventing wildfires. Many events were held at local

libraries, in fact, this program was so successful we will be offering it again in 2020. We were fortunate enough to partner with the Northeast Forest Fire Protection Compact and bring the Smokey Hot Air Balloon to Franconia Notch in August. The weather was fantastic and hundreds of people got the chance to ride in the balloon! Smokey's message has always been about personal responsibility – remember his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"



As we prepare for the 2020 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting <u>www.NHfirepermit.com</u>. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or <u>www.des.nh.gov</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. This is my tenth annual report as your Police Chief. I am honored to be your Chief and am very grateful and appreciative of the support that you show for your police department. We work very hard to both maintain order and serve the needs of this community in many ways, and in so doing that we "recognize always that the power of the police to fulfill our functions and duties is dependent on public approval of our existence, actions and behavior, and on our ability to secure and maintain public respect." Additionally, to "recognize always that to secure and maintain the respect and approval of the public means also the securing of the willing co-operation of the public in the task of securing observance of laws." And to that end "recognize always that the test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, and not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with them." *Sir Robert Peel*

The Year in Review:

Over the past year we have seen a decrease in motor vehicle crashes, property crime, and overall calls for service. However, our children's services related calls remain high, as do our domestic violence numbers. The department responded to a total of five non-fatal overdoses,



which required medical intervention. Two of these incidents were a result of THC intoxication (yes, marijuana) and two were for Methamphetimine intoxication, the fifth was combination of drugs. While our State remains in a drug crisis, it is important to remember that this crisis affects all communities and knows no socio-economic boundaries. It is also important to remember that it is not just heroin or fentanyl that is the problem.

Personnel Changes:

In July, Sergeant Shawn Varney was recognized for his many years of diligent and excellent service to the Town of Sandwich and the Police Department by being promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Congratulations! Staff department added two additional part-time officers. We were able to hire Officer Sean Welch, who а full-time officer Moultonborough Police Department and

we brought back a very familiar face, Officer Rich Young, who currently works as a Deputy Sheriff for the Carroll County Sheriff's Office. Welcome aboard! Parking Enforcement was handled this past summer by Dr. Aubrey Sapala, DVM who came to town after graduating from Ross University School of Veterinary medicine. Dr. Sapala worked for us while waiting to take her board exams to begin her internship program.

In order to provide you with the highest degree of law enforcement service and to maintain our certifications to practice law enforcement in the State of New Hampshire, we attended the following classes and seminars:

Community Outreach:

In January, Chief Monaghan and I were selected to work with the Nantucket Project and were awarded fellowships with them as Keepers of the Commons. Our work with them resulted





in the production of a 15-minute movie entitled "Inside the Box". The movie is now part of their Neighborhood Project, Season 2 Episode 3. Chief Monaghan and I have developed a presentation on law enforcement stress and officer wellness and resilience that we rolled out in December at the New England Chiefs of Police Command Training School at Roger Williams University; First Line Supervisor Course.

In February, Chief Cormier and I were selected to take part in a Drug Control and Prevention Policy meeting at the White House, Washington, DC with Vice President Pence and Jim Carroll, the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

The Department participated in the two National Drug Take Back Days in April and October, each event netting approximately 20 lbs of prescription drugs.

We continue to instruct LEAD and Project Flag at Sandwich Central School with the sixth grade class, and we continue to instruct Driver's Education with our partners at Driver's Edge and Red Hill Driving School.



The Department held two community talks on the drug crisis and other issues at Town Hall. Additionally, at the invitation of Ladies Aid, we conducted a presentation on Scams. We also were asked to provide a block of instruction on Active Shooter to the First Christian Church in Wolfeboro. The Department also participated in a community conversation about suicide and its effects on the community with our partners at the Off The Docks Theatre Company and the Carroll County Coalition for Public Health.

In closing, I would like to thank the members of the Police Department for their outstanding work over the past year. I would also like to thank Chief Call and the Sandwich Fire-Rescue Department, Cathy, Jennifer and Kelly at the Selectmen's Office, the Town Clerk's Office, Parks and Recreation, and the Highway Department. I would also like to thank our other law enforcement partners for their assistance over the past year: Carroll County Sheriff's Department, Moultonborough Police Department, NH State Police, NH Fish & Game, US Forest Service, US Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, US Secret Service, Internet Crimes Against Children Unit – ICAC. Finally, thank you to all of you for your continued support of your police department.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Throughout the year this department works directly with a variety of organizations and individuals. With the closing of the Sandwich Aquatic School, our town swim program had a dramatic increase in participation. In order to prepare for the rise in registration, former Sandwich lifeguard and Switzer's instructor Laura Thorndike was brought in to coach our team of instructors. With Laura's training, and their own experience and knowledge, the Sandwich lifeguards did a wonderful job with our swim program. Lifeguards Sam Seeley, Aidan Carney, Alyssa Floyd, and Raven Strother, thank you for your hard work.


Activities and Events: We offer a variety of events during the year. Sandwich Winter Carnival in late January was a popular day of activities. The Costume Nordic Race was great

From the pie eating contest to the Bike, Trike, Doll Carriage Parade to the annual tennis tournament, there is sure to be an event for everyone.

In the fall we had a lot of enthusiastic players in our youth soccer program. We also had the annual international soccer game where locals play against international workers from the Sandwich Fair. There were some excellent carvings, from spooky to silly, at the annual Pumpkin Wall. Our youth basketball program has great players in grades 3-6. The final event of the year was the Christmas tree lighting and caroling to start the weekend of Christmas in the Village.

Our programs rely on volunteer assistance. It would be impossible to list all the folks who helped in the last year, yet it is important to recognize some of the folks who have supported this department as volunteers.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Winter 2019 was very busy with twenty-one (21) storms, the last one in mid-April. We welcomed spring with a few roads being temporarily closed due to mud!

In early summer we completed our paving projects on a portion of Mt. Israel Road, Range Road (hill portion only), and made adjustments to the grade at the intersection of Maple Ridge Road and North Sandwich Road (Rt. 113).

Our Quaker Whiteface Bridge project was completed by Austin Construction and reopened by Columbus Day weekend. September we started work on installing the temporary bridge on Basket Street. The crew sandblasted, painted and added structural supports to the beams from the Young Mountain Road bridge to use as the structural supports for temporary bridge until the new abutments can be installed in 2020. The crew began the

installation on September 25 and opened the bridge on October 3. The bridge is posted at three (3) ton weight limit for light trucks and cars only.

Throughout the year, the crew removed hazardous trees and conducted high-limbing on seven and a half (7.5) miles of road.

During the summer, a portion of Dale Road was relocated away from a property owner's homestead for the safe removal of snow as well as road maintenance. This project was jointly funded by the town and the property owner.

In late October we added a new, all-wheel drive plow truck, and the second truck arrived in late December...just in time!


We would like to recognize and thank Jim Martel for his service; Jim stepped down in January. In April we welcomed David Manita to the crew.

AGRICULTURE COMMISSION

I thank all the members for their time, wisdom, and patience during the year. Pat Russell stepped down from the Agriculture Commission in 2018. We will miss him and wish him well.

We began the year with a community work session with nine members of the community present and seven members of the Agriculture Commission present. It was extremely helpful to have the broader community involved. In general, our meetings are open to all.

The issue of road weights during spring road closures and how this affected maple syrup operators reached us in March. We urged the sap haulers to contact the Road Agent via the Selectmen's Office to address their specific concerns.

We met with the Sandwich Farmers Market to better understand their operation and how we might support their activities. Market attendance can always be increased. State statutes regarding food production, marketing and sales were discussed, and various options to facilitate folks in town who wish to sell product(s). This discussion is ongoing in many forms.

We were successful in producing a report on certain wells in town and levels of arsenic. This can be seen on our website through the town portal.

This coming year we plan to publish, via the SandwichBoard, various bills that will be heard in Concord as they relate to Agriculture in NH.

We demonstrated apple pressing with commercial equipment this year at Chestnut Meadow Farm in September. We hope to plan more of these events in the coming year, with special focus on apples grown in Sandwich.

We continue to search for ideas and projects that will further agriculture, agriculture produce, branding, and identity for our small town as well as support all farms and the business of agriculture in Sandwich. We are pleased to note an increase in awareness of local food produc-



tion. We encourage all residents to support the Sandwich Farmer's Market (seasonally) on Saturday morning and Wednesday afternoon and try for themselves the quality and diversity of Sandwich agricultural products. We also encourage our local farmers to check out the


"Local Food Guide" available at the Town Hall and to have their listings included for the 2020 year. Contact us if you need help.

SANDWICH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Our goal is the protection of natural resources and watershed resources of our Town as defined by the State of New Hampshire in RSA36-A. The Sandwich Conservation

oversees and maintains hiking trails, and administers the Five Days of Sandwich summer day camp.

The SCC encourages Town residents to learn characteristics and control of invasive species that pose a threat to native species. Residents

Commission (SCC) reviews wetland concerns, provides stewardship of Town-held conservation lands and easements, works on issues and projects related to the Town's natural resources,

may find information about aggressive non-native plants at the SCC page on the Town's website and in written material available at Town Hall.

The Town holds conservation easements of nearly 2,200 acres, involving 24 landowners. These easements contribute to the rural and scenic character of the Town as well as

protecting its wild-

life and water resources. These easements must be monitored annually to ensure the conditions of the easement deeds are being upheld. The SCC welcomes volunteers to help with its annual visits of the easement properties.

SCC members Jean Knox, Tracy Ripkey, and Fred Lavigne, as trail stewards, oversee the maintenance of the Red Hill Pond Trail, the Bearcamp River Trail and the Sandwich Notch Park.

Adam Weeks returned for the fourth year to direct the Five Days of Sandwich summer day camp. He was again joined by Sandwich native Emma Bickford Basto, in her third year as assistant

The director. three one-weeklong sessions were held in July and each week was capacity of 12 campers. The program includes nature hikes, ecology and history lessons, visits to the Sandwich Creamery, service projects, fiber arts and swimming in local rivers, streams and the "pot hole".

Camper fees remain at \$40 per child, with need-based scholarships available. The fees cover a portion of the cost of this

program with monies from the Coolidge Trust funding the remainder. The camp is open to Sandwich residents and summer residents or relatives of locals.

The work of the SCC would not be possible without the service of many volunteers. We thank these dedicated individuals and groups who have worked with us to protect the natural resources of Sandwich.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The citizens of Sandwich voted to establish the Center Sandwich Historic District at Town Meeting in 1982. The motives for creating the Historic District are evident in the village that

we have today. Mr. Bryant Tolles wrote years ago: "Center Sandwich has long been regarded as one of the most aesthetically pleasant, historically noteworthy and architecturally significant rural villages in northern New England." It is our responsibility to appreciate what has been given to us and to care for what we will leave for the next generation. The Historic District is approximately bordered brooks: Stanton Brook, Red Hill River and Burleigh Brook (Creamery Brook).

The Historic District Commission meets on the third Tuesday of every month, providing there is new business. Applications should be made at Selectman's Office no later than 15 days prior to the next meeting. Among projects presented to us this year were the reconstruction of the Forbes House at the intersection of Maple and Church Streets, an application for solar panels at 15 Main Street, new paint colors for 7



Main Street honoring the Victorian integrity of the building, the addition of a dormer to 22 Maple Street also in accordance with the house's architecture and finally the sign posts in town. Businesses wanting to be included on the sign posts must apply to the Historic District Commission if they have not already done so.

Resources for the Center Sandwich Historic District Commission are the National Register of Historic Places, Guidelines for the Rehabilitation of Historic Buildings by the National Park Service and the New Hampshire Division of Historic Resources. The HDC is a resource for property owners in the Historic District to inform themselves as to the standards for rehabilitation of their historic property.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board is responsible for review and action upon applications for subdivision, boundary line adjustment, site plan review, earth excavation, steep slopes, and scenic road tree cuts. The members also review and propose amendments to the Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance, and Regulations through a process of public meetings, public hearings, and in the case of the zoning ordinance, Town Meeting approval. Capital Improvements Program (CIP) proposals are developed by the Planning Board and submitted to the Board of Selectmen as a plan for town long-term capital expenditures.

The Board, comprised of seven (7) regular members and up to five (5) alternate members, meets on the first Thursday of each month to review applications and conduct other board business as time allows. The Board meets on the third Thursday of the month, as needed, to work on planning. Members also staff applications, conduct on-site reviews and report their findings to the full board at meetings. Long-time members are gracious in their sharing of knowledge about the process and historical town information to newer members as applications are reviewed and board business is conducted.

Applications acted upon in 2019 included eight (8) site plans, five (5) boundary line adjustments, one (1) consultation, one (1) subdivision, three (3) scenic road tree cuts, and three (3) modifications of approved projects for a total of twenty-one (21) applications. In addition, the Board concluded one (1) 2018 subdivision and reviewed two (2) steep slopes cases.

Rules of Procedure govern the process the Planning Board employs for organizing the Board and conducting meetings. These are reviewed annually and amended as needed.

Zoning amendments for the 2020 ballot include the following:

Amendment #1: Article XV, Variances and Special Exceptions, 150-104.

Amendment #2: Article VII, Camping and Camping Area Regulations, 150-43 B(3).

The proposed zoning amendment language can be found on the Town's website (sandwichnh.org), Town Hall and the Library. Members of the public are encouraged to review the proposal before Town Meeting. Public hearings on the proposed hearings were held on January 2 and January 16, 2020.

The Planning Board cannot operate without the generous commitment of its members who give generously of their time, skills, and knowledge. All deserve a heartfelt thanks for their work this year. Thank you to Board members: Rich Benton, Julie Dolan, Toby Eaton, Mary Hillsgrove, Janina Lamb, Brewster Lee, Tim Miner, and Ben Shambaugh; and to Selectmen Ex-Officio member Chris Boldt for his service. Any town resident who would like to become a member of the board should contact the Selectmen's Office to volunteer. All will be welcome.

Selectmen's staff Cathy Graham and Jennifer Wright, and Land Use Secretary Martha Carlson are also to be thanked for keeping the many records in order.

The Capital Improvements Program (CIP) is an advisory subcommittee of the Planning Board as established by Town Meeting. Our goal is to provide the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Advisory Committee with a projection of future costs for significant capital equipment purchases and projects in an effort to maintain a stable rate of growth on the tax rate for our citizens and an overview of the Town's equipment and buildings.

Because of the yearly challenges of funding the Capital Reserves, the Planning Board updated the attached charts using previous formulae of appropriating 75% savings over a 6-year period to equipment/projects with greater than \$10,000 value. Obviously, when we're talking about \$500K fire trucks, \$400K graders or \$400K buildings, these figures can become overwhelming.

Citizens need to be vigilant about educating themselves regarding the budgeting process and continue to ask the tough questions about what is a "need" versus a "want". The Planning Board oversees the CIP and meets twice monthly; the Budget Committee meets from October to February every year; and the Board of Selectmen meet every Monday at 5:00 PM. All meetings are open to the public if anyone would like to see the action up close, or better yet – consider volunteering!

SEWER COMMISSION

The proposed 2020 operating budget will be \$25,650, same as last year.

In 2019, the metered water number was 1,966,827 gallons. Down 0.6% relative to 2018. The metered number is now a reliable number as all of the new meters have been installed. The meter readings are conducted remotely via a handheld data collector. We conduct direct unit readings, if necessary, to resolve any discrepancies in readings.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners currently operates the system under a New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) Permit by Rule. Under this permit, the Commission is required to manage the total flow into the system at less than 500,000 gallons per month (16,438 gallons per day). In the event that the flow increases beyond 500,000 gallons per month, the system would then revert to a Groundwater Discharge Permit, which is what the original NHDES permit was issued as and would allow the system to be operated up to the full design capacity. Total flow includes both wastewater flow and infiltration flow. Infiltration is an unavoidable component of the flow in sanitary sewer systems, and the current long-term average infiltration is consistent with the Facility Plan specifications. Reducing infiltration does not provide for an increase in capacity above the system design. No reserve capacity was designed into the system.

In 2019, the commissioners did not undertake any major maintenance projects or upgrades.

The Sewer Commission has the following policy: "The capacity for a given lot that was assigned by the NHDES in 1984 to determine the overall sewer system capacity is the maximum available capacity for that lot today." This is to make sure there is reasonable future capacity for all of the properties, no matter how they are currently being used.

All users are reminded that sump pump hook-ups to the system are illegal. If your sump pump is connected to the sewer, then it must be properly redirected immediately and permanently. Properly operating meters are the responsibility of the users. Non-working meters need to be replaced in a timely fashion. Replacement of meters /recorders and all repair costs are the responsibility of the user.

The system is thirty-three years old, and all users need to be careful about what ends up in the system. We are continuing to see substantial fats, oils and greases. Residential users must be careful as to what they put down the drain. If you have a grease trap, please check it frequently, and have your traps cleaned before they are ineffective. Remember, businesses with grease traps are required to provide documentation to the commission when the traps are cleaned.

Please be careful about what you discharge to the sewer system, and as always, be cautious and choose soaps and cleaning products which have no or are low in phosphates. In addition, no petroleum or hazardous substances are to be discharged to the sewer system. Please check your labels and dispose of these substances responsibly.

Finally, the commission would like to thank Jennifer, Alison and Cathy for their continued assistance without which we would not be able to perform our job. One additional thank you goes to the Highway Department; they are always willing to assist the commission when we call.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Town of Sandwich, over the years, has developed robust zoning ordinances to protect property rights and to effect the Master Plan. The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) is as a Constitutional "safety valve" to insure all property owners the right to appeal zoning-related denials by the municipal administration.

The ZBA hears appeals of administrative decisions, applications for special exceptions and variances to the Zoning Ordinance, requests for equitable waivers and, as needed, rehearings of ZBA decisions.

The ZBA is made up of five voting members and as many as three alternate members. They are all volunteers. We meet seven to eight times a year for anywhere from two to three hours, a seemingly light load. However adjudicating a ZBA appeal requires a great deal of premeeting preparation: Each member must read and understand the entire appeal, research related Town ordinances and State of New Hampshire statutes, and develop a thorough grasp of the unique situation that each particular case represents.



Currently, the ZBA has five voting members and two alternates. I've asked each member to introduce himself:

Peter Van Winkle, Chair

Peter's family came to Moultonborough in 1948; he and his wife Prudy retired to Center Sandwich in 2005. He graduated from Columbia University and has been an investment banker throughout his career.

Chris Grant, Vice Chair

Chris Grant and his wife Martha have

been Sandwich residents since 2013 and homeowners since 1998. Serving on the ZBA, Chris says, allows him to participate in the life of the town and help keep Sandwich the special place it's always been.

• Jim Bullitt, Member

Jim is a substitute teacher at Inter-Lakes High School and a summer staff member of the William Lawrence Camp in Tuftonboro. He moved to East Sandwich in 2005-2007 with his wife Anne. Both have been involved in Town government since 2011.

• Ross Currier, Member

Ross and his wife Joanne moved to North Sandwich 10 years ago. He retired in 2016 after 30 years in the commercial construction industry. Ross enjoys being on the ZBA because he is

an advocate for property ownership rights, but also because he believes in preserving the character of our town's rural and scenic beauty.



• Carl McNall, Member

Carl gave twelve years to the Planning Board helping to guide that committee through many important cases and critical discussions about the Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan. He decided in 2018 to join the ZBA to see how those Planning Board statutes are adjudicated when citizens challenge them or ask for variances and special exceptions.

• Jim Gaisser, Alternate

A lifelong resident of Sandwich, Jim served as a member of the ZBA and now as an alternate. He says, "When looking over an application prior to a meeting, I will generally form an opinion. Then during the subsequent hearing, upon

listening to the evidence and the thoughts of my colleagues, sometimes my opinion will change. That is when I know I have done my best."

• Katherine Thorndike, Alternate

Originally from Gilford, NH, Kathie moved with her family to North Sandwich in 1990. During that time, she worked as a Registered Nurse and Administrator in the Laconia and Meredith area. She joined the ZBA as she believes in giving back to our community and nurturing the beauty of our town and its citizens. Concerned about the influence of climate change in Sandwich, she wants our town government to take into consideration its effects when making decisions moving forward. She is involved in the Sandwich Climate Crisis Coalition, working to reverse climate change and transition to a renewable future.

In 2019, the ZBA met four times to consider 12 cases including four variances, five special exceptions, and three administrative appeals. Seven cases were granted, one was denied, one was not heard and three were withdrawn.

Having a board so talented and committed makes the job of chairman very easy and I cannot thank them individually enough for all they do to help me and the Town of Sandwich.

BROADBAND ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Broadband Advisory Committee (BAC) was formed by the Board of Selectmen in May 2019 in response to public sentiment regarding the lack of reliable and quality Internet service. Members were chosen by the Board of Selectmen and our first meeting was held on May 29th. A mission statement was drafted and approved: "... to explore and advise the Selectmen on how every Sandwich household and business can access fast, reliable Internet service at an affordable price."

We have worked concurrently to research the benefits and usage of high speed Internet, engage the community through a series of Listening Sessions and emails, assess our infrastructure options and research funding possibilities. We have found that only ~13% of current users can access federally defined broadband speeds of 25mbps download/3mbps upload, mostly served through DSL. At our Listening Sessions in August, we gathered much input from community members and common themes expressed included business and education impact, lack of reliability, aging in place via telemedicine, and lack of satisfaction with current service. We are also actively participating in the Carroll County Broadband Initiative, which is working on the same problem for all towns in our county. We have distributed Requests for Information to parties interested in designing, constructing, operation and financing a broadband system for all Sandwich residents.

I would like to thank all members of the Committee for their many hours of research, reading, meeting and discussing this complicated and multi-faceted issue. We have had to step onto a huge learning curve -- steeper for some than others, but we have all learned so much. As always, Cath, Jennifer and Kelly in the Selectmen's Office are invaluable in their assistance. Please check out the BAC page on the Town website for links to our work.

SAMUEL H. WENTWORTH LIBRARY

The Samuel H. Wentworth Library had a busy 2019, starting with a restoration/renovation project in the first quarter of the year. The Trustees oversaw the remodeling of the staff workroom and patron reception areas of the library. Trustee Peter Wobber writes:

At the beginning of the project we demolished the existing ceiling, only to realize that we had a vastly different (and better) *restoration* project on our hands. The original vaulted space in this wing of the library was pretty stunning and worth incorporating into the new space. New cabinetry and countertops were installed, as was new lighting and modular carpeting. We could not have accomplished this project without generous support from our patrons as well as the Quimby Trust. Come take a look and grab a book!

Other major projects included much-needed repairs to the roof; a grant from the Quimby Trust was used towards an exterior landscaping project, which included a new seating area with benches and rustic seating.

From January through April, while construction was on-going, patrons may have noticed that the Library reduced its hours, opening to the public at 2:00 pm instead of noon. During July and August, the Library closed on Wednesdays. The Library resumed regular opening hours of thirty-five hours per week at the end of August. The Library continued to serve as a resource for the entire community, including as an after-school haven for local students. We worked to maintain a relatively high-speed Wi-Fi, which was well-used by the community at all hours!

The total collection of holdings in the Library at the close of 2019 was 23,450 titles. The Library staff is committed to continually reviewing and refreshing

our inventory to ensure relevance to our patrons. As such, we circulated over 14,125 items. In addition to print books (classics, fiction and non-fiction, young adult, and children), we added to an extensive collection of audiobooks, DVDs and periodicals. As with the previous year, downloads and streaming services were increasingly popular.

The Library is part of the Carroll County Library Cooperative (CCLC), which meets several times a year, sharing information between libraries. The Library is further a member of the Bearcamp Valley Library Association (BVLA), which provides an additional 1,200 rotating DVDs and audiobooks every two months. This past fall, our Library participated, alongside other CCLC libraries, in One Book One Valley (OBOV). Each library had ten copies of Amy

Ellis Nutt's biography, *Becoming Nicole: the Transformation of an American Family*, to lend, and there were various educational programs and discussions held throughout the region.

In September, a newly updated and efficient SHARE-it library management program went on-line. As part of the NH Interlibrary Loan (ILL) program, we borrowed 82 items and lent out 339 items in 2019. Additionally, we continued our membership with the New Hampshire Downloadable Book Consortium, whose vast collection of over 13,000 e-books and 11,000 audiobooks were available for checkout to a patron's device. Library patrons checked out many e-books and audiobooks this past year and are encouraged to review and access this service on-line: http://nh.lib.overdrive.com. Many of our patrons accessed this service on their smartphones using a new app called Libby. Please contact the Library if you would like to learn more about this system.

The Friends of the Library continued with their support of the Library. In 2019 the popular "Books Sandwiched In" was again sponsored by the Friends. The Friends raised funds to help purchase books and a pass for discounted tickets to the Squam Lakes Natural Science Center. They supported the summer reading program and brought in speakers. This year the Library Trustees held modified book sales in the spring and during Old Home Week; the Friends held their annual Mother's Day Bake Sale and a mini book sale during Christmas in the Village. We thank them for their efforts!

The Library is very fortunate to have the interest from the Wentworth Trust, managed by the Trustees of Trust Funds, which provided over 21% of the Library budget income. This, together with generous gifts from the Friends of the Library, White Sylvania Trust, Heard Trust, Marjorie Wheeler family, The Sandwich Fair Association, Inc., friends and family of Arthur Nash, Jr., and our wonderful patrons, has allowed the annual request for town taxes,

through a warrant article in support of the Library, to be markedly lower than neighboring towns.

The Trustees of the Samuel H. Wentworth Library are governed by Chapter 202-A of the Revised Statutes Annotated (RSA). This chapter separates the elected Library Trustees from the governance of the Board of Selectmen, making the Trustees responsible for developing and managing a budget for the Library separate from the Town Budget; managing the operation and upkeep of the building, land, and other property of the Library employees and determine their compensation. The Trustees accept and expend donations.

The Trustees also maintain due diligence by regularly reviewing and updating existing Library policies.

In 2019, long-term Trustee Carla Muskat left the Board; we thank her for her fourteen years of dedicated service. In her place, the Board welcomed new Trustee Denise Read. Current Library Trustees are Emma Dassori (Chair), John Enright (Vice-Chair), Carol Clark (Treasurer), Peter Wobber (Secretary), and Denise Read. Linda Danielovich, Nancy Starmer, and Cyd Clark are Trustee Alternates.

The operating staff at the end of 2019 included Diane Cook Johnson (Acting Director), Anne Papen (BVLA Specialist), Laura Mudgett (Library Assistant), Rose De Mars (Inter-Library Loan Librarian and Library Assistant), Frederick Bickford (Circulation Clerk), Aislinn Hird and Hannah Coleman (Student Pages), Frank Rowell (Maintenance), and Dee Hutchins (Housekeeping).

The year brought several changes to Library staff. Library Assistants Tess Doggett and Beth Merchant, and Pages Trinity Flynn and Mela Wucjk, left for new horizons. Since August, the Library has missed the creative talents of Youth Services Librarian, Katie Wonders, who worked at the Library for nine years. Judi Knowles, a retired youth librarian, worked briefly in the fall.

Two other significant changes took place in the summer. Glynis Miner retired as Director at the end of July after seventeen dedicated years at the Library, where she started as a volunteer. She continued to share her expertise and knowledge with the Trustees and staff as a consultant during the fall to help ensure a smooth transition. We miss her and her wealth of knowledge and experience and wish her well. Another vigorous supporter of the Library, Wendy Shambaugh, wrapped up her service in August. Wendy was a long-term Trustee, Treasurer and Secretary as well as an energetic volunteer. Thank you, Glynis and Wendy, for all you have done for the Library and Town of Sandwich!

The Library is a welcoming hub of our community where folks can find a good book, reliable information, entertainment, friendly assistance, and a place to meet. Please look for Library information and upcoming events on the Town of Sandwich website or on Facebook (look for 'Samuel H. Wentworth Library'). You can access our online catalog at shwlibrary.booksys.net/opac/shwlb/. Better yet, come visit us in 2020. There is a lot happening, we have much to offer, and there is something here for every one of every age. The Library exists to serve you.

SAMUEL H. WENTWORTH LIBRARY FINANCIAL REPORT

ALFRED QUIMBY FUND

This has been a busy year for the Quimby Fund. As reported last year, we began the initial phase of the reconstruction of the Forbes House which will become a museum to honor the life of Alfred Quimby, the history of Quimby School and hopefully an exhibit depicting the history of the Sandwich Fair Association. In addition, office and meeting room space for the Quimby Trustees and their records will occupy the second floor. To date, the foundation and deck have been completed. Work will resume in the spring of 2020 with the goal of having a

completed shell by the end of the year. Plans call for the completion of the interior of the building during the third year of the project. The Quimby 'Trustees are extremely grateful to the Sandwich Fair Association for leasing the land to the Trustees for this building and for being supportive of our efforts as well as the Sandwich

Historical Society for gifting the disassembled frame to the Quimby Fund. The reconstruction of this historic Federal style house on a site which formerly housed an exact replica of the Forbes House, makes this project especially unique.

One of the projects that the Trustees are proud of supporting is the ongoing effort to update the Honor Roll adjacent to the Post Office. Over 20 names of Sandwich citizens who have served in two conflicts not listed on the Honor Roll will be added recognizing their service to our country. Hopefully, this project will be completed by Memorial Day.

This year the Quimby Fund assisted numerous organizations with their needs, scholarship aid to college and N.H. Technical Institute bound students and the Town of Sandwich with significant purchases and support of the Recreation Department and the Children and Youth Fund that makes unique short-term educational experiences available to our young people.

The organizations we have assisted this year include: scholarship aid structural improvements to the Sandwich Children's Center, tree work at the Rural Cemetery, marketing efforts by the Sandwich Business Group, capital improvements with Camp Hale's ongoing effort to upgrade their facility, support for the Sandwich Central School 6th grade trip to water D.C., Washington, quality training in the 6th grade at the Sandwich Central School by the Green Mountain Conservation Group, Sandwich Fair Association drainage project, structural improvements to the house at the Chapman Sanctuary/Visny Woods, capital improvements to the Mead Base Conservation Center, tree removal and painting at the Benz Center, remodeling work at the Samuel Library, Wentworth scholarship, equipment purchases and program



support for Advice To The Players and renovations to the Heard Barn owned by the Sandwich Historical Society.

Income from the Fund's investments is used for the following major categories of expenses: Administrative Expenses, Scholarship aid, Town requests and Sandwich-based Non-Profit Organizations. The expenses for the Forbes House project are tracked separately. During calendar year 2019, the following sums were spent in each of the above categories:

Administrative: \$35,819.64

Town of Sandwich: \$119,288.00

Scholarships: \$80,885.00 (Students \$38,800, Children and Youth Fund \$25,000,

Advice to the Players \$2085, Sandwich Children's Center \$15,000

Beneficiaries: \$164,986.00 (this figure excludes the scholarship aid listed above to the

ATTP and the SCC)

Forbes House Expenses to date: \$31,494.49

All the institutions assisted this year are outlined in a previous paragraph.

The Alfred Quimby Fund is administered by three volunteer trustees. Currently serving in that role are Peter Pohl, Kirke Read and Geoffrey Burrows. As with all non-profit organizations, our records are available for review by the interested public. The Quimby Trustees continue to work in partnership with the Trustees of the Trust Funds for the Town of Sandwich to fund the Children and Youth Fund. This fund assists families with children who have unique educational opportunities. This scholarship aid, available to young people under the age of 21, has helped students attend day and overnight summer camp programs, educational programs such as the summer Advanced Studies Program at St. Paul's School in Concord, N.H. licensed childcare programs, driver education, EMT training, ski programs and other enrichment opportunities. A special committee of volunteers review all applications and decide on the amount of aid provided. Individuals are encouraged to contribute to this fund. A total of 60 Children and youth took advantage of the multitude of enrichment opportunities in 2019. The Quimby Fund contributed \$25,000 through the Trustees of the Trust Funds to this program.

Applicants are encouraged to apply during two scholarship cycles. The first cycle provides funds for the school year (September 1-June 30), and the second cycle is intended for summer programs (July 1-August 31). Recipients of the fund will be considered on the basis of financial need outlined in the application with awards to be made accordingly. Applications are available through the Sandwich Central School, Sandwich Parks and Recreation, Selectmen's Office and the Sandwich Children's Center or by request at the following address: Sandwich Children and Youth Fund, P.O. Box 95, Sandwich, N.H. 03227.

The Alfred Quimby Fund contracts with the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (NHCF) to administer its scholarship awards. The fund provides scholarship aid to Sandwich students who have graduated from a secondary institution or homeschool experience other than Inter-Lakes High School. Inter-Lakes graduates qualify for scholarship aid from the Doris L. Benz Trust Fund. To inquire about scholarship assistance visit the NHCF's website at www.nhcf.org or contact Judith Burrows at (800) 464-6641, Ext 1224 or by e-mail at jb@nhcf.org. Contact Judith for the eligibility requirements for undergraduate assistance, graduate aid and other educational opportunities. In the case of graduate studies, one is eligible regardless from which high school you graduated. Specific deadlines are established for each category of assistance. The deadline for Statewide Student Aid is April 15, 2020; the Career Aid to Technical Students Program is June 1, 2020; and the Adult Student Aid Program has three deadlines throughout the year: May 15, August 15 and December 15. It is critical to meet these deadline dates in order to qualify for financial assistance.

SANDWICH FAIR ASSOCIATION

The winter of 2019 saw much snow, and therefore recreation, on the fairgrounds as it seemed to snow about every three days for much of the winter.



We spent the winter months planning for some major drainage work in the main parking lot off Squam Lake Road. The project involved replacing over 1000 feet of underground pipe that had been in the ground since the 1950's or 1960's. This project was price-shared by the Town of Sandwich, the Inter-Lakes School District, the Alfred Quimby Trust and the Sandwich Fair Association. All four entities

contributed 25% of the initial bid, with upgrades added during construction covered by the Fair Association.

This year we changed the process of mowing the Fair's fields and parking lots by using a new high-speed, diesel-powered mower; volunteers donated many hours to run the mower. Many compliments were received from townspeople and dog walkers alike.

The 2019 year saw the introduction of handicap scooters for fairgoers; we will attempt to continue that service with future fairs.



After several years of negotiations, a 45-year agreement was signed with Consolidated Communications to lease a right-ofway from Squam Lake Road to the parking lot on Skinner Street. This agreement was signed in time

to build a road before the fair allowing access from both Squam Lake Road and Skinner Street. This proved to be a great asset during a busy Sunday parade day to get cars parked and people on the grounds.



The fair itself was excellent with great fall weather and a great turn-out of happy fairgoers. Attendance tallied in at about 37,000, which is the most in several years. The midway rides had the best year ever with a gross of almost \$170,000 of which the fair receives a percentage. A

fair with success such as this helps to provide funds for upcoming projects in preparation for the next fair as well as continued repairs to infrastructure. A major project will be replacing water piping that has been underground for 50-60 years.

We are making every effort to build our team of volunteers to help control expenses, and we want to thank the large pool of very dedicated people who help year in and year out without fail. Without the enthusiasm, energy and endless volunteer hours we couldn't pull off the amount of work that it takes to have a fair. We are grateful!

As we begin to prepare for the 2020 Sandwich Fair, I want to thank the Board of Directors for their tireless efforts and endless contributions which ensure we are prepared to present another fair for all to enjoy.

SANDWICH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

2019 has been a busy year behind the scenes at the Sandwich Historical Society. We had a CAP (Collections Assessment for Preservation) Assessment which resulted in many suggestions that needed attention. We had to adjust our hours and staffing to deal with loss while staying efficient, and we had to celebrate 100 Excursions!

When the Sandwich Historical Society was founded over 100 years ago, they gathered objects, began to keep a record of them, and started researching and recording the history of this great town. Flash forward to 2019...we have just published our 100th Annual Excursion Bulletin! The exhibition this year, "Dear Old Sandwich, 100 Years of Excursions," celebrated this amazing body of work, the Excursions, and the picnics. We have an extensive collection and now keep track of it via a digital database; we have grown from one building to five buildings; and all of this needs care. The CAP grant program provided us with an expert in Historic Buildings and a second expert in Collections Preservation. These experts spent several days with us, viewing buildings, the collection, and asking many questions. They have produced a lengthy report which tells us what we are doing well, what we may want to change, and suggestions for moving forward into our next 100 years! This has meant that behind the scenes some things have changed, some things still need to change, but thankfully, we are doing a lot right and well!



TAX CREDITS/EXEMPTIONS

TAX CREDITS: Applications for the following permanent property tax credits must be filed by April 15 (credits are deducted directly from the tax bill).

- \$4,000 credit for service-connected total and permanent disability
- \$2,000 credit for widow of veteran killed or died on active duty
- Total tax credit for double amputee or paraplegic
- \$500 credit for veteran / veteran's surviving spouse

(Service-connected credits may also be claimed by those who served on active duty in the armed forces of our allies if they were citizens of the United States at the time of their entry into these armed forces and are presently residents of New Hampshire.)

TAX EXEMPTIONS: Applications for the following permanent exemptions must be filed by April 15 (exemptions are deductions from the assessed valuation)

- Solar Energy System
- Wood Heating Energy System
- Legally Blind
- Elderly subject to age, income and asset restrictions
- Owner / resident of property modified for the physically handicapped
- Current Use, Conservation Easement, and Conservation Restriction
