Summer fun in Schuylkill Haven isn't over. The 17th annual Island Park Festival – slated Saturday, August 17 – promises non-stop entertainment and activities for all ages. Then the fun continues well into fall with Borough Day, Fall Fest & Pumpkin Patch, the Haven Halloween parade and, of course, Trick-or-Treat on October 31.

Details on these events can be found in this issue of *Haven Highlights*; but first, we start with Borough Day. Now celebrating its 36th year, the area's largest street faire comes alive again on Saturday, Sept. 28.

Trains, food, entertainment ... Oh my!

A popular feature returns once again, drawing thousands of fans to hop on the Reading Blue Mountain & Northern Railroad passenger train. Choose from three round-trip excursions – leaving at 11 a.m., 1 and 3 p.m. Riders are encouraged to purchase their tickets in advance to ensure seat availability. Boarding

is at the RBM&N Train Station in the heart of the



Borough Day festivities for approximately a one-hour ride to Port Clinton and back again.

A sell-out every year, tickets are recommended in advance in-person or by phone (610-562-2102) at the Schuylkill Haven Train Station. Or reserve online at *www.RBMNRR-PASSENGER.com*. Very limited quantities may be possible on Borough Day.

Early risers are welcome to start the day with breakfast, beginning at 7 a.m., at the Schuylkill Hose Company #2, 51 S. St. Peter Street. Catch the R & J shuttle downtown as vendors will line the streets with crafts, jewelry, baked goods, clothing, artwork and food starting at 9 a.m.

Island Park Boat and Kayak Launch Gets Upgrade

The saying "there is strength in numbers" rings true when it comes to the powerful partners working together to impact positive change. What's even better is that we see this here in Schuylkill Haven.

Schuylkill Haven has been fortunate to benefit from a new asset in the community, thanks to the Schuylkill River Greenways and fellow partners. The Island Park's boat and kayak landing needed some attention while requests for accessibility and use increased.

Island Park Boat Launch is the official push-off point for the annual Schuylkill River Sojourn (SRG), an annual weeklong excursion. Now after a \$150,000 up-

grade, it offers an incredible access point for kayakers travelling the 130-mile Schuylkill River Water Trail. Through multiple partnerships, SRG raised funds for the new landing from several sources that includes the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, Schuylkill County, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, and the William Penn Foundation.

The new landing now includes a concrete ramp, a paved approach path, a circular gravel drive to pro-

vide a drop-off area for boats and equipment, handicapped parking spaces, water trail signage, and improved landscaping. Additional parking, including a handicapped accessible site, was also part of the project along with handicap accessibility to the river. New trees and shrubbery offer inviting landscaping as visitors are guided with directional signs and a kiosk map with safety information.


Here are a few of the highlights for Schuylkill Haven Island Park Landing:

- SRG partners with municipalities to provide improved water access to the Schuylkill River Water Trail.
- The Schuylkill River Water Trail and the Schuylkill River Sojourn start in the Borough at Schuylkill Haven Island Park, a large, multi-use community park.
- The new landing benefits from its location in the park adjacent to the Irish Flats Trail, ample parking, ballfields, restrooms, a large pavilion and a new stage.
- The new landing will accommodate more boating and fishing, and provide an accessible path to the river's edge.
- The project engineer is ARRO Consulting Inc. The construction contractor was Andy Aungst.

Schuylkill Haven Borough looks forward to welcoming those who want to kayak and fish along the river and can now expand its offering to those with special needs. As it does every year, the Borough looks forward to hosting the 2025 Schuylkill River Sojourn, attracting hundreds of kayakers to visit this area to kick off their weeklong 130-mile water adventure.

The Borough takes great pride in the efforts and activities of its Recreation Department that include youth and sports programs, playgrounds and open space that it maintains. The Department's mission is to continue improvement of park amenities and programs. The improved boat launch will serve as another great reason to live or visit Schuylkill Haven. Get outside and give it a try!

Keep Schuylkill Haven Beautiful . . . from The Code Guy

I encourage every property owner to walk out their front door. That's right, you're doing great! Now, take a few more steps and look down. See that? It's a sidewalk and it's your responsibility to keep all weeds and grass out of it.

It's really not rocket-science, I recommend spraying with a typical herbicide that can be purchased at any garden center, hardware store or most department stores. After the vegetation dies, remember to remove the defeated vegetation. Brown weeds are just as ugly as green weeds and the citation for either costs the same.

Animal nuisance

It's your pet and your responsibility. Your neighbor and surrounding residents didn't sign on to the care of your pet and shouldn't have to tolerate your lack of consideration and responsibility or the deficiency of training regarding your furry kid (pet).



Outside feeding of pet food, table scraps etc. to pets or other animals tends to encourage regular visits by stray cats, skunks, raccoons, possums, and – last, but of equal annoyance – the Code Officer! No, I won't be eating at the back step... although an amusing image I'm sure... but to enforce the nuisance animal ordinance when justified.

Trash & storage

Schuylkill Haven residents have worked hard over the years to earn a reputation as having the cleanest

town in Schuylkill County ... and who would dare refute it? Here are a few things, however, that could get overlooked because of busy schedules.

Remember to remove all trash and recycling containers from street view as soon as pos-



sible after the scheduled pickup day. Containers left out more than one day will likely catch the Code Department's attention and generate a warning.

Prior to pickup day, trash/rubbish must be kept in

conventional, well-maintained trash containers with tight-sealing lids. Keep containers clean, organized and out of street view, if possible. Trash bags are acceptable, but must be stored in a way that does not encourage or allow animals to rip them open.

Recyclables may not comingle with any household trash/rubbish. Prior to pick-up, keep recyclables in the Anthracite Waste Services containers out of street view, if possible.

Fall spruce-ups; get ready for winter

As summer gives way to fall, its not too early to plan yard and household maintenance that should be done before winter. Here are a few chores to consider:

- Cut grass one last time.
- Rake up all leaf litter and debris.
- Trim all shrubbery and tree limbs around buildings, sidewalk, and street areas.
- Organize trash storage areas; neatly stack firewood/lumber and other items that will be stored outside.
- Clean and store patio furniture, umbrellas, and children's summer toys.
- Touch up paint on trim, railings, and decks. Use a wire brush to remove flaking paint; prime bare wood first.
- Check caulk around windows and doors. Follow manufacturer's recommendations to re-caulk if needed.

- Inspect external doors and garage doors. Do they close tightly? Install weatherstripping, door thresholds if needed.
- Drain and store garden hoses. Install insulating covers on exterior spigots. If installed, have sprinkler systems blown free of water.
- Have chimneys and flues inspected and cleaned if necessary.

Leaf litter, safety and nuisances

The fall foliage will be doing just that ... falling! The Borough's Property Maintenance Code requires residents to keep leaf litter cleaned up.



Allowing leaves and leaf debris to accumulate on public sidewalk areas, public streets or alleys is a violation of the Property Maintenance Code and carries fines and penalties of \$300 to \$1000 per violation.

Your mind in the gutter? Take control of your gutters and downspouts and be sure all dead leaves, debris and pine needles are removed, allowing the gutters to work properly during the cold, wet months ahead.



Haven Community Garden at Bubeck Park

VISION Hands the Shovel to Recreation Department

In 2019, Schuylkill County's VISION, in collaboration with Schuylkill Haven Borough and partners like Hannah Burke, broke ground on a community garden.

Located at Bubeck Park, the garden now consists of four raised beds, a handicap-accessible bed, several container plots, and more. Plots are made available to community members at a nominal fee and some at no cost to senior citizens, first responders, and veterans.

In 2021, the garden experienced a "glow-up" with the addition of fencing. In an effort to keep costs low and reduce waste, VISION, Girl Scout Troop 03120, and volunteers refurbished chain link fencing from Schuylkill River Greenways to enclose the garden. In 2022, Jefferson Grange #1384 and volunteers managed the community plots that benefit the Schuylkill Haven Food Pantry and expanded its reach by donating harvest to additional pantries and projects. In 2022, the Girl Scout Troop built the first handicapaccessible raised bed in the garden.

To make it a true community garden with a sustainable impact on the Borough, VISION worked with Recreation Department staff member, resident, and gardener David Noll to assist with the management of the garden and the now transition of ownership to the Borough.

Those with questions or needing help can also call the Borough Office at 570-385-2841 and leave a message with the Borough Secretary. The tax office can also be reached by email at taxcollector@schuylkillhaven.org.

For last minute taxpayers, my office will be open the last few days of 2024 – Friday, Dec. 27 as well as Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 30 and 31 – from noon to 4 p.m. for cash or money order payments only.

Borough property tax and per capita tax bills were mailed March 1, 2024. If you did not receive a bill, call the office. Payments are in the penalty phase, now until the end of December. Any Real Estate or Per Capita bill not paid by then will be turned over to Tax Claim for collection or any additional service.

Tax bills may be paid by check or money order only. Anyone paying a tax bill after December 14 should pay by cash or money order so that payments can be properly credited by December 31. Keep in mind your tax is not paid until the check clears the bank

When paying a tax bill, include the proper amount on the check. If the check is incorrect for any reason, it will be returned to the taxpayer.



Electric Department news

On-demand electricity may be as close as your nearest outlet or light switch; but, the journey it takes to get there is far from short and simple. The following is a look at the fundamentals of how power travels from a power plant to your house.



- 1. The first step in electrical power starts with producing or generating energy in the form of electric current. This almost always comes from a power plant with a spinning electrical generator.
- 2. The power heads to a substation at the plant, where it is converted into a very high voltage so it can travel long distances on the transmission grid.
- 3. The transmission grid is comprised of wires carried on large towers that move the electrical power between the power plant and local substations.
- 4. At the local substation, the voltage is lowered using a transformer and carried to homes or businesses over distribution lines. These lines are wires typically supported by wood poles or buried underground along roadways.
- 5. The power headed to your house will need to be stepped down to a lower voltage again. This is done using pole-mounted transformers (power poles with a gray transformer drum attached) and pad-

mounted transformers (usually green steel boxes on the ground).

- 6. Power from the transformers travels via an overhead or underground line to the meter on your house.
- 7. The meter is connected to the circuit breaker panel, containing fuses and breakers that keep wires from overheating and becoming dangerous.
- 8. The circuit breaker panel then connects the power to the outlets and switches in your home, bringing electricity into your daily routine to help provide comfort, convenience, security, entertainment and much more.

Wastewater Treatment Plant

This newsletter I decided to do something a little different – spotlight our staff here at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Our facility is a 24/7, 365-day operation. The incoming flow never stops and our machines run constantly.

There are three of us that operate the plant. Our typical workday is Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Since we need to take readings every day, we take turns working weekends and holidays. Occasionally we will have to work unexpected times due to emergencies... and typically, these emergencies happen during high rainfall events. We can get called in any hour of the night and, in rare situations, we have worked over 30 hours straight trying to fight floods.

The first member of our crew that I would like to

introduce is Nick Scheithauer. Nick has been working at the plant for 3-1/2 years. He comes from the manufacturing industry and is great at thinking outside the box. Outside of work, Nick is an avid outdoorsman and performs in his own band called the "Nick Tauer Band." Nick decided to take a big step and



will be getting married in mid-August to his fiancée, Brittani.



The second member of our crew is Kyle Morgan. Kyle has worked at the plant for 12 years. Before working for the Borough, Kyle worked 11 years in the plumbing/HVAC industry. He is our "go to" maintenance man and is always good for a laugh. During his free time, Kyle is an active member of Schuylkill

Haven's Fire Department and Dive Rescue team. He is married to his wife Jenn and has a son and daughter, Timmy and Maci.

The final member of our crew is myself, Zack Faust. I have been working at the WWTP for over seven years and have been the department foreman for the

Water Treatment Plant

UGGH! MY WATER TASTES LIKE CHLORINE! Well, we're sorry for that; but, it's beyond our control. As

a treatment facility, we have regulations and procedures that require compliance.

These regulations are set by two governmental agencies – first you have the Environmental



Protection Agency (EPA) in Washington D.C. and then we have the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) in Pennsylvania.

When the water enters the distribution system from our storage tanks at Willow Lake, there is a minimum level of chlorine that must enter the system. Our system consists of approximately 50 miles of pipeline. Consumers at the beginning get hit harder than those at the end of the system. Requirements call for a minimum level at the end, known as a residual. This number tells us that our disinfection is working throughout the system and the residual is the little bit we have left over. In the past, this number was set at 0.02 mg/L; it now has been increased to 0.20mg/L.

We check for this minimum number once per week. Samples are checked for Total Coli Form Bacteria. There are seven DEP-designated collection sites in our system, mainly close to the ends of the system. We must record this residual number and report it to the DEP every month.

There are three basic mechanisms by which coliform bacteria can occur in treated drinking water. First is break-through from the treatment process, possibly from a high turbidity reading at the plant that would trigger an alarm for the operators.

Secondly, coliforms can regrow typically in the bio films in the distribution system. We try to control this with a chemical addition at the plant and through flushing the system two times during the year.

And, thirdly, organisms result from a recontamination of the treated water within the distribution pipeline system. This could come from events such as a water leak or water main break, thus triggering a "Boil Water Advisory." This is for your safety and is a

requirement. We also try to have enough chlorine in the system to control this type of contamination until the issue, if any, is corrected.

So, the next time you take a drink of your water and taste or smell some chlorine, don't complain. Feel safe, it's for your protection. Here's a quick fix... fill a pitcher and put it in the fridge overnight. The chlorine will dissipate on its own.

Have an enjoyable and safe rest of the summer.

Water Distribution / Wastewater Collection

Well, the days are growing shorter and the morning air is cooler. Leaves will soon be changing

color and starting to drop; so, it must mean fall is nigh. With the temps dropping, it's the perfect time to address any issues that popped up last winter that you didn't have time to finish before the summer heat kicked in (i.e. drafty basements that can cause



frozen pipes). Taking care of those issues now will make winter a little more bearable.

In my department, fall brings with it one semiannual and one annual maintenance project each year.

Every spring and fall, we clean our water distribution system and check our fire hydrants. This is mandated by DEP! Our water system has grown over the years, so what used to take two evenings now takes three eight-hour workdays to complete. This flushing serves two functions – it cleans out the water main lines and moves fresh-treated water around the system.

Each year in October, we subcontract with Dukes to apply an EPA-approved herbicide to our sewer collection system in areas that are lined with mature trees. This process kills the tree roots that enter our 1950 sewer collection system thru cracks and defective joints, preventing major sewer blockages.

What's nice about this procedure is it really works! We have many years of data proving this. They guarantee it and that it will not kill the trees or shrubs that line our streets.

Because we live in a very old town that has many beautiful mature trees, this has always been an issue. What we did was to identify the trouble areas that had re-occurring blockages and divided them into four years of treatment. This also spreads the cost out over the four years and maintains Duke's guarantee. The end result? No more sewer blockages in these areas and beautiful trees in our community.

Be assured that both of these tasks are vital to the Borough, providing you with trouble free utilities.

Note: Due to several water main breaks in recent years, the Water Department will replace 600 feet of 6" diam. main line pipe on Caldwell Street during the August time frame. As always, please plan an alternate route, as the road will be closed to all traffic. This will be a temporary inconvenience necessary for a permanent improvement.
