Our Tax year has come to a close. We have had our elections and our Town Meeting is over. We would like to thank the members of the Budget Committee for their help in putting together this year's budget. They were Tyler Dunn, Lucas Rumler, Daphne Sanders, and Aaron Berls. We would also like to thank all those who showed up for the Town Meeting.

The question of the Blake Hill Bridge came up again. We have three options.

1. If we were to go ahead and do the bridge now, we would have to pay the full price of the removal of the bridge and the building of the new bridge. The cost to the Town would be close to \$1,000,000.
2. If we wait for the state to do the work, it estimates their cost to do the bridge would be about 2.5 million dollars. Our cost would be zero.
3. If we wait until the state approves us doing the building of the bridge the state will pay 60% of the cost. In that case our cost would be between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event

Hosted by the Town of Readfield and
The Kennebec Valley Council of Governments

Mount Vernon is invited to participate in a one-day household hazardous waste collection. The event is scheduled for Sunday July 9th, 2023, and will run from 9 am – 12 pm at the Readfield Transfer Station.

Many chemicals commonly used around the home are hazardous – either alone or when combined with other chemicals and need to be disposed of by professionals trained to handle hazardous materials. Improper disposal of these materials can disrupt the function of sewage treatment plants or private septic systems, contaminate ground water, and harm animals and residents. Difficult to recycle or dispose of items can also become harmful if left unmonitored, items like electronic waste, paint, old fuels, mercury thermostats, etc.

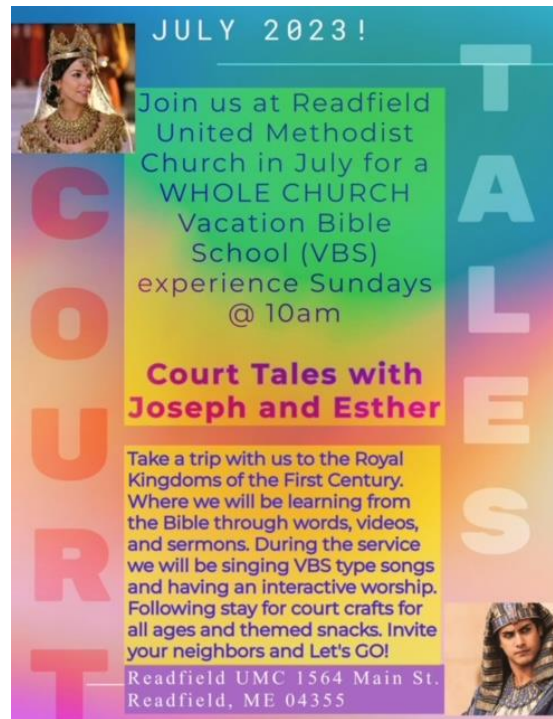

Food Bank Update and Information on Heating Assistance

With the high price of food in the grocery stores and reduction in SNAP benefits, you may be having a hard time feeding your family. If that sounds like you, please come to the First Baptist Church Food Bank any Saturday from 9:30 to 11:30. The food bank has an excellent selection of fresh, frozen, canned and dry foods. A local church purchases farm shares from a local farm to provide the freshest produce during the summer for customers.

In addition to food, the food bank provides a wide array of personal care items, clothing, and school supplies.

Though summer hasn't begun yet, it is time to begin applying for HEAP (home energy assistance program). Applying early means that you will have heat once cold weather arrives.

KVCAP is the organization that coordinates this program in our area. The best way to start the process is online. Go to their website kvcap.org, go to For the Home tab then Heating Assistance. If you do not have internet at home, do not despair. The Mt. Vernon, Readfield and Fayette libraries all have fast internet and public computers.

Torsey Pond Association Annual Meeting July 8, 10 a.m. at the Readfield Town Office

The Torsey Pond Association (TPA) will hold its annual meeting at 10 a.m. on July 8 at the Readfield Town Office. Anyone interested in helping to preserve this pristine pond is welcome to attend. To become a member of the TPA, or to donate, go to www.torseypond.org/membership.

One of the main goals of the association is to keep invasive plants out of Torsey, which is surrounded by ponds infested with variable-leaf milfoil and other invasive plants. Torsey is a shallow pond, and any infestation would quickly take over, destroying native wildlife and plants, ruining fishing and other recreation on the pond, and devastating property values.

Half of the annual membership dues (\$50) go toward funding our invasives protection program. This includes paying for annual plant surveys of the pond and for Courtesy Boat Inspectors (CBI), who check for plants on any watercraft entering or exiting the pond. These essential services are managed by the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed, but volunteers are also needed and much appreciated. If you would like to volunteer to be a CBI, please visit torseypond.org for more information.

At the annual meeting, Bill Monagle, executive director of the Cobbossee Watershed District, will talk about a grant the TPA has received to help protect the pond from erosion and runoff. Board members and officers will also be elected.

We hope that if you live on the pond, or boat, fish, or swim in Torsey that you will consider joining us. Torsey is at the head of the Cobbossee Watershed, which makes it especially important since other ponds in the watershed take in what Torsey sends out! FMI email: TPAinfo@torseypond.org.

Mr. Drew and His Animals Too! Mr. Drew is known all over Maine for his fun, educational programs about all kinds of rescued, rehabilitated, and exotic animals. He will bring some of his animal friends with him and will talk with us at the Mt. Vernon Community Center on Friday, July 7th at 4PM. We might even get to hold some of the animals! This free event is family oriented. Join us!

And Alice is busy putting together our annual Story Walk at the Ezra Smith Wildlife Conservation Area managed by the Kennebec Land Trust on Pond Road. We hope to have it up by the first week of July. The story will be posted along one of the paths, and a family will be able to stroll from page to page and enjoy the story as they also take note of ferns and cool rocks and other bits of the local environment. The story Alice chose this year is Maureen Wright's picture book, Share, Big Bear, Share. We also have a copy in our collection at the library. Enjoy this wonderful, local, quiet outdoor activity together. Many thanks to the Kennebec Land Trust for always welcoming us!

A program for our adult patrons: local poet Sarah Carlson will share readings from her book, In the Currents of Quiet, on Sunday afternoon, July 23rd, at 3PM at the Mt. Vernon Community Center. Sarah did a reading for us a few years ago, and it was well received. Join us for her reading and the chance to ask questions and hear her speak about writing poetry. Refreshments will be served!

Services at the library:

On Wednesday mornings, 9AM – Noon, you can come meet with the Aging in Place Committee Outreach Coordinator, Kelly O’Neil, to discuss needs and suggestions, thoughts, or concerns for sustainably and comfortably aging in place. Kelly will share these ideas with the committee so they can focus on the particular needs of our community elders.

On the 2nd and 4th Monday afternoons of each month, from 4pm – 6pm, the Social Worker who meets with the Aging In Place Committee, Amy Perez-Blaisdell, is available at the library to answer questions and help connect residents with resources regarding such topics as filling out Advance Directives, pre-burial planning, caregiver help at home, Meals on Wheels referrals, companionship, and other concerns.

Each Wednesday morning from 9AM – Noon, we provide Drop-In Tech Help. Bring your phone, laptop, or tablet with you and learn about its various uses. Or you can learn particular skills, programs, or apps on one of the library public access computers. Our wonderful Tech Help navigator is willing to help you connect to the world via your device.

This summer we are able to provide free passes to the Coastal Botanical Gardens in Boothbay for up to 2 adults and a small group of children under the age of 18. You can email or call us or come to the library to sign up. Please give us the date you wish to make your visit, and an alternate date in case the first date is already filled, the number of people in your group, and let us know the time of day you want to arrive (between 9AM and 3PM). We will sign you up and can email your passes to you or print them for you. People have definitely been enjoying their visits to the Gardens! 293-2565, or librarian@drshawlibrary.org.

Remember that on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month, from 1PM – 3PM, the local group of knitters, crocheters, and crafters meet at the library for their Crafternoon. They visit together and teach each other new skills. Everyone is welcome – bring a craft to do (they usually have extra supplies, if needed), or even just bring a crossword or puzzle to work on while you visit with them! A good bunch of folks.

You can ask to be added to the email list of people who receive our weekly “events” email that lists various activities and programs around the area. Just email us your request, with the word “events” in the subject line, and we’ll put you on the list. It is a helpful bit of information each week to help you plan which events you might want to put on your calendar!

We have started to place “staff picks” – books, audios, DVDs, children’s lit – that we like to recommend to our patrons, on a table in the main room. Take a look and see if anything looks good, and then check it out! We will change it up each month.

We have often recommended the Cornell Lab of Ornithology website for all sorts of great information of birds. We want to remind you that they also have an app for identification of birds (song or sightings) that comes in handy when you are out traipsing around the woods (for instance, maybe when you visit the Story Walk this summer). Broadband Committee Report for the Year Ending June 30, 2022

The Broadband Committee was in full swing during FY 2022, meeting over 20 times as a committee and additionally with outside agencies, consultants and prospective suppliers. Documents from these meetings as well as a July 29, 2021 public presentation of survey results can be found at <https://sites.google.com/view/mtvbroadbandinternetcommittee/home>. All of this hard work was aimed at fulfilling the 2019 Mount Vernon Comprehensive Plan's mission for the Committee, i.e.:

Mt Vernon has appointed a Broadband Committee to monitor events, study options, and recommend solutions that best meet the needs of the town. . The committee is charged to measure cost and assess funding options needed in order to implement an infrastructure. In addition, the committee will do the following: Measure success of internet strategy as it pertains to creating business opportunities. Coordinate necessary citizen education as needed through Anchor Institutions. Assure citizen knowledge of opportunities to connect with Health Care Providers. Coordinate with Aging In Place committee to capitalize on Broadband for seniors. Identify solutions to assist low-income citizens to afford high speed internet. Determine and monitor best practices with Internet Service Provider(s). (Comprehensive Plan, p. 22)

To this end, the Committee is pleased to report three major accomplishments during this reporting period:

1. Release of a Request for Proposals (RFP) to four prospective Internet Service Providers: Charter Communications, Matrix Design Group, Axiom, RedZone in February, 2022. The RFP was focused on the first half of the above mission, namely *infrastructure*. Evaluation of these proposals took place during the Spring and a decision to enter into negotiations with Matrix Design Group was reached in July, 2022;
2. Initiation of a Digital Equity & Digital Exclusion (DEDI) initiative to address the second, equally important half of the Comprehensive Plan's mandate, namely education about and access to the internet. The resultant DEDI Plan, September, 2022 and can be viewed at: <https://sites.google.com/view/mtvbroadbandinternetcommittee/digital-equity>; and,
3. Conducting detailed analysis of properties in Mt. Vernon, combining the results of the prior year's Casco Bay report and the Town's tax records to estimate the % of tax records with buildings that have access to cable-based broadband (61%) and those without (39%).

[Postscript: The Maine Connectivity Authority's (MCA's) Fall 2022 Grant Window saw \$100 million of applications for \$50 million in grants. As a result, towns like Mt. Vernon, with over 50% of residents having access to cable-based broadband, were not deemed high enough priority to warrant funding. That said, the data assembled by the Committee for the RFP process and the analysis of properties in town, proved essential to broadband infrastructure development in FY2022-2023.]
