If your SNAP benefits are being reduced starting March 1 and you need help meeting your food needs, please feel free to come see us at the food bank.

In case of inclement weather, please call us at 293-2141 before heading out to see if we are open or check our Facebook page.

We offer full pantry items, eggs, meats, meals and toiletry items on the first and third Saturdays of the month; however, customers may come in every Saturday for fresh fruits, vegetables, bread, pastry items and deli items.

We also have a small supply of clothing and miscellaneous items.

If you are a new customer, you may come in any Saturday and we will provide you with enough food to get by until your next scheduled visit.

A working group made up of representatives of NDN and Readfield is now recruiting an initial group of drivers and riders with a plan to initiate service provision in the Spring. "We'll be scheduling training sessions for prospective drivers and conducting intake interviews of residents who are looking for rides," said Joe Austin, NDN's Executive Director.

Bredesen added that NDN volunteer drivers have now driven more than 100,000 miles to help over 180 different riders get to where they need to go. "The heart of NDN is the volunteer driver. It is that community spirit that makes NDN possible and that makes Readfield a natural next step. What better way to mark the 100,000 mile than to invite the neighbors."

**About Neighbors Driving Neighbors:** NDN is a non-profit organization founded in 2015 to enrich participating communities by matching volunteer drivers with those who do not drive. NDN's current service area comprises Belgrade, Fayette, Mt. Vernon, Readfield, Rome, and Vienna, and 40 volunteer drivers provide rides to 58 registered riders. # Aging in Place (AIP) Committee News

The Aging in Place Committee was initially formed during the comprehensive planning process. There is an age friendly section in the plan that was adopted in 2019.

At the time our planning process was happening, AARP began its own age friendly initiative nation-wide around 8 areas of livability. Since many of these areas were reflected in our comprehensive plan section, the committee decided to join the AARP age friendly network. While COVID certainly affected work on the goals, the committee has continued to move forward.

Part of the work of the AIP committee was establishing a "Caring Ears" program in which committee members and others made regular calls to those known to be most at-risk health-wise. Due to success with this effort, in 2021, the Maine Health Access Foundation awarded the AIP Committee a two-year grant to expand the program to Vienna and Fayette and to establish a system in the three towns that will be more pro-active in ensuring that older residents are not only able to age in place but also be healthy at home.

To that end, the AIP committee has contracted on a part-time basis with 2 individuals to assist it. Amy Perez-Blaisdell is a Mt. Vernon resident and a Licensed Social Worker. Working through the committee, people making Caring Ears calls, members of Mt. Vernon Rescue and others working in the 3-town community can ask Amy for assistance in providing resources for our older residents. This service can be especially helpful for people living alone with no family in the immediate area.


Kelly O'Neil, a Vienna resident, is the new Outreach Coordinator. Because the three communities are rural, it can be difficult to know all the people who are most likely to benefit from Caring Ears and other programs that could improve social contacts. Kelly will work with town departments and other organizations to locate people at risk of isolation and/or who have difficulty accessing health care. Ultimately, through this grant, we will learn how best the AIP committee can help older residents maintain their health while continuing to live at home.

If you are interested in joining the committee, have suggestions to offer or would like to speak with either Amy or Kelly, you would be welcome to come to a committee meeting. The **Mount Vernon Community Partnership (CPC)** is pursuing the possibility of housing for our seniors in Mount Vernon, which is a goal set forth in our town's 2019 Comprehensive Plan that calls for the town to create opportunities for more affordable/manageable housing for senior citizens.

The CPC is a **non-profit and non-governmental organization** that has been in existence since 1999. Its members are **volunteers who love Mount Vernon** and work to protect what's great about our town and to improve what needs improvement. Some projects have been to protect Minnehonk Lake from pollution, village traffic and pedestrian safety, and providing emergency fuel assistance to our more challenged citizens.

We strive to promote economic and community development for the benefit of the citizens of Mount Vernon and have been successful in many ways over the years with the input from the citizens, other organizations, and the select board.

We determined that one of the town's greatest coming needs is a place for people who've lived here, many for their entire lives, and who don't want to move but need to downsize.

We created a questionnaire to determine the support of the possibility of senior housing in town. The questionnaire asks what kind of housing they would prefer, what amenities they would want, and whether they would need transportation. The questionnaires are available at the town office, post office, and library. YOUR INPUT MATTERS.

We've gratefully received over 60 responses, and the majority of the responders are supportive of the effort. If you haven't filled out the questionnaire yet, please do so.

We are receiving guidance from nonprofits that work in the field of affordable housing, including one that may eventually be interested in developing a project in Mount Vernon. Finding a potential location has been challenging. Numerous property owners whom we approached were not ready to part with their land, but we have finally identified four properties that could be available to purchase for this project, and one of them looks feasible. If a nonprofit developer determines that it will take on the project, it will most likely consist of approximately 8 housing units and a community building that will be affordable for seniors. We have many more steps ahead of us in this process, and we'll keep you informed, but for now we want to make sure you know the facts.

The **Knit & Crochet group** meets each 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday at the library, from 1--3pm. All ages are welcome. This scheduled Crafternoon is well-received. You can learn skills from the folks who attend, or you can bring some other craft to work on while everyone works and visits. If you would like to know more or are in need of yarn, needles, or other knitting or crocheting supplies, come talk with Amy Jajliardo during craft time, or private message her on Facebook.

**Tech Help** is scheduled for each Wednesday morning between 9:00 and noon, by appointment. We are working with the town Digital Equity & Digital Inclusion committee to provide resources and training to help community members have access to digital resources and to help them learn skills so that they can communicate online with family, friends, and various services, as well as use programs like Word or Google Docs in order to create documents or papers they may need or want to put together. Please call or email us to see when we can schedule you and reserve a time with one of our tech help wizards! We are still in the early stages of this project, and hope to help make the internet more accessible for our local citizens as we reach out!

**Botanical Gardens passes**: We have purchased a Library Pass to the Maine Botanical Gardens in Boothbay, for our patrons' use. The pass is good from May until October (it does not cover a visit to Gardens Aglow). Once we are set up (soon!), we will be able to schedule one family (2 adults and any number of children under the age of 18) per day for visits to the gardens. You will need to call or email us at the library, and then we will check our calendar with them, and schedule a visit. We can print out passes for each member of the family that will be attending, for you to hand into the staff at the gardens when you arrive, or we can send the passes to you digitally so you can print them out yourselves or present them to the garden staff by showing them on your phone screen.

**Events email list**: Alice sends out an email once each week, listing various community happenings in Mt. Vernon, Vienna, Fayette, and other close communities. It is a helpful way to stay tuned in to what is going on in our towns! Please email or call us (leave your name and email address and use the word "events" in the subject line) to sign up to start receiving this weekly update, and we'll put you on the list!

## INSPECTIONS/PROJECT UPDATES

**Camp Laurel.** At the request of the town attorney, I sent a message to the U.S. Department of Justice requesting written clarification on whether pre-existing buildings after the inception of the ADA rules required buildings be retrofitted. I have received no response as yet. Camp Laurel has agreed that all new structures or new additions to existing structures will meet the ADA rules. In addition, they have hired a maine-licensed architect to evaluate the camp and provide a report to my attention this fall.

**183 Pond Road.** In response to a complaint, I visited the site and spoke with one of the property owners who was planning to burn a large pile of debris in the backyard. The property owner initially refused to pickout the non-burnable debris but after a call to the real estate agent who was selling the house the property owner called back and agreed to properly dispose of the debris pile in lieu of burning it. The fire chief was also consulted.
