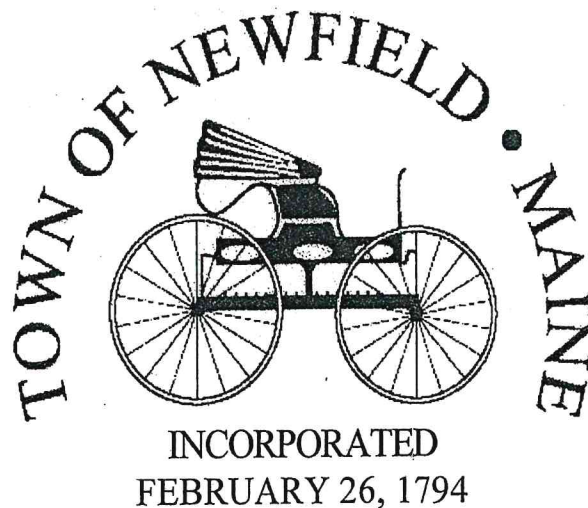

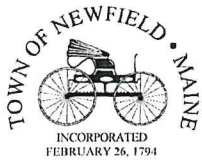
## MICHELE I. PALMER

## Office of Select Board, Assessors and Overseers of Poor

To the Citizens of Newfield,

Another year has come to an end. Our town has welcomed many new people over this past year and the town continues to grow with numerous new homes being built. We are hopeful this new growth will bring new people and their ideas to become involved in the betterment of the town.

The Select Board appreciates the work that each employee, volunteer, department, committee, and board oversee to make the town function on a daily basis. The town has many moving components and keeping things running smoothly is quite a task. The Select Board extends a sincere THANK YOU to all of you.

This year's budget season proved to be challenging due to the many increases in the operation of the town. Electricity costs for the town saw a large increase in the first month's bill. We are looking into different options for a rate lock in the supply charge and are hopeful this will be a savings to what was originally projected as the costs. Another large increase for the town is the cost of transporting and disposal of the Municipal Solid Waste, Recycling and Construction Debris. In August the Select Board sent out Request for Proposals for the town's municipal solid waste contract. The town received bids from 4 companies and the Selectmen were able to negotiate the best contract, which ultimately meant staying with the same company we have used for many years prior. Not only was this contract the best deal but staying with the same company was a benefit as the employees did not need to learn new operations and the normal operation to our citizens continued.

The Town Hall is available to rent for your functions. Town residents can rent the hall for a small fee of \$50 and a \$100.00 Security Deposit which is refundable upon inspection of the hall. Nonresidents can rent the hall for a \$200 fee with an accompanying \$200 security deposit. Tables and chairs are available for use when you have rented the hall.

The Select Board is pleased to present to the residents a referendum question this year to vote on approving entering into a loan agreement for the funds needed for the Sand and Salt Storage Facility project. Over the past two years the Select Board has worked with Haley Ward an engineering firm who has provided the town with a cost opinion and building design including necessary site work. The Select Board has received approval from Maine DOT and DEP for the location. Final approval for the project will be given once a Maintenance and Operations Manual has been established. The Select Board is hopeful that the residents will vote to approve the loan funding request and that the project can move forward. The Sand and Salt Facility has been needed in our town for many years. The current location outside means our salt is rained on and just as the salt washes away so does the taxpayer's money. We are confident that the salt being stored in the building will make the taxpayer's money go further.

The town's website, [www.newfieldme.org](http://www.newfieldme.org), is being migrated into a whole new site. The site will be easier to navigate which will make it simpler for the user to find the information they seek. The design of the site will be visually appealing and will feature some images sent in by our citizens displaying how beautiful our town is. It will feature a responsive web design that uses pixel rendering to accommodate better viewing of text and graphics for any screen size. The most exciting news about the new site is that we will be utilizing text and email alerts for anyone who signs up. This will allow citizens to stay informed about what is going on in town without having to seek out the information. Stay tuned for signing up for this service once the new site is launched.

Our Heating Assistance fund continues to be supported by the substantial donations of private citizens and social organizations. This year alone we have accepted \$4486.22 in donations; thank you one and all. With the funds donated we were able to help 8 Newfield residents heat their homes this winter season. If you know of a family or individual in Newfield that is struggling to pay for heat, please contact Nichole at the Town Office, assistance is available. Please keep bringing in all your returnables to the Transfer Station, as the monies raised from them are used in our Heating Assistance Program.

The town has received their first portion of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding. To date we have received \$83,797.77 and are expected to receive another estimated \$80,000. The guidelines and allowable uses for these funds have been ever changing since the beginning, up until the final guidelines were established in late December. A training is set for March 2<sup>nd</sup> to help Municipalities navigate through final rules and guidelines. The Board has been thinking about what the funds should be used for. Some of these projects could include purchasing turnout gear for the Fire Department, insulation in the Public Safety Building, expanding broadband into areas not currently serviced in town or using funds towards the salt and sand facility project. All funds to utilized from ARPA must be approved by a vote of the town. The Select Board is proposing with this warrant utilizing some of these funds to provide all town employees with a Cost-of-Living adjustment or an economic equity adjustment. This proposed adjustment in the office staff's pay is based on a salary survey from 2020 for municipalities in the State of Maine, length of time at job, quality of work and the duties performed.

The collection of taxes over this past year is at an all time high; collecting over 60% of the taxes due for the year prior to the second payment due date. We are also pleased to report that the past 2 years the town has not had to foreclose on anyone's property for unpaid taxes.

Each year the Select Board asks the citizens for funds to be appropriated to go towards Capital Improvements. This past year funds appropriated were used to have a new American Standard propane furnace installed at the Town Hall. With the funds remaining in that account along with the requested funds this year the Select Board is looking to have some much-needed building maintenance completed. These projects would include the roof at the Town Office being replaced due to leaking, the replacement of the hallway and bathroom floor at the town office as there are many broken tiles. The Public Safety Building bay area needs new insulation, and one area of the parking lot needs to be built up to prevent water from collecting and creating ice which leads to a safety issue. The Town Hall foundation needs some masonry work, and the basement windows will also be looked at while the mason is on site.

Volunteers are currently needed to serve on our Boards and Committees. If you are interested in serving your community, please contact us. We are also looking for representatives to serve on the Appeals Board, the Planning Board (as an alternate). On Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) and Southern Maine Planning and Development Commission (SMPDC). The Select Board meets on every other Tuesday evening at the Town Hall starting at 6:00 pm. All meetings are open to the public, and we encourage all to attend. The Select Board welcome any suggestions, comments, or concerns.

Please join us for the annual town meeting on Saturday, March 12, 2022, at 10:00 am at the Line School (818 Water Street). The election and secret ballot questions will be voted on a day prior on Friday, March 11, 2022, from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm at the Town Hall or by absentee ballot.

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your State Senator. I am humbled by the trust you have placed in me to be a voice for you, your family, and our community in Augusta. I can assure you I will continue to work tirelessly on your behalf.

The 1<sup>st</sup> session of the 130<sup>th</sup> Legislature was different than any previous session of the Maine Legislature. Zoom meetings replaced in person committee hearings and work sessions and it was certainly a learning process for everyone. As COVID-19 restrictions lifted, the Legislature met in person starting in June. It was high time we returned to the State House so that Legislators could speak in person to one another. The lack of human connection, so essential to accomplishing meaningful work for our constituents, made itself felt in the partisan nature of this session. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Regular session began in January and I am eager to discuss the issues important to all of you. I have heard from many of you regarding the increasing costs consumers are facing, as well as the countless ways the pandemic has affected every aspect of your life. As your State Senator, I will continue to do all I can to advocate for you in Augusta.

Again, thank you for electing me to serve you in the State Senate. The 130<sup>th</sup> Legislature certainly has a great deal more work to do; but I believe that if we come together, there is nothing we can't accomplish. This past year continued to be full of unexpected challenges at all levels in our schools, communities and our state government. Despite the COVID 19 pandemic, the first session of the 130<sup>th</sup> legislature was very busy and convened off site. We voted on over two thousand bills and returned to the House Chambers in June and to finish business on July 19.

We met again briefly this fall to vote on redistricting. *Redistricting* happens after the 10 year federal census. Based on population shifts, districts may change their configuration and numbering. You will see both changes in District 21 next year.

I continue to serve on the Joint Committee Education and Cultural Affairs where we continue to address pressing issues facing our children and their educational needs.

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000<sup>th</sup> consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

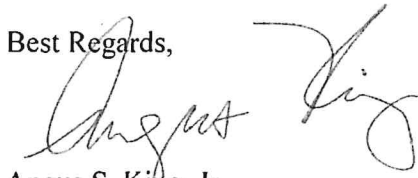
On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6<sup>th</sup> Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21<sup>st</sup> century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the *American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It is an honor to represent you and your family during these challenging times, and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to cause challenges for people in Maine and across the country. Please know that the health and safety of you and your loved ones, as well as the economic recovery of our communities, remains the driving force behind legislation I have pushed for in Congress.

In early 2021, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that makes investments to crush the virus, create millions of jobs, provide direct relief to working families, and help schools remain safely open. Not only did this legislation give 90 percent of American households a stimulus check, but it also helped local and state governments better respond to the pandemic, put food on families' tables, got more vaccine shots into arms, cut child poverty in half through the expanded Child Tax Credit, and so much more. The American Rescue Plan is one of the most important pieces of legislation Congress will ever pass, and I'm so proud to have supported it from the beginning. Our economic recovery from the pandemic will be accelerated even more thanks to the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which Congress passed in November. This legislation marks the most expansive infrastructure investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. From funding to repair our aging roads, bridges, and ports to high-speed broadband expansion and legacy pollution clean-up, this law is a once-in-a-generation investment in our future.

In addition to working on COVID-19 relief legislation, my Congressional colleagues and I are also collaborating on legislation that addresses the climate crisis, supports voting rights, and—through my role on the House Appropriations Committee—supports programs important to Maine.

After seven years on the House Appropriations Committee, I took the gavel and lead the subcommittee that oversees discretionary spending for the Department of the Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency, US Forest Service, and several agencies related to the arts and humanities. In my new role as Chair, I have fought to secure significant funding for Maine's tribes, environmental preservation programs, our cultural economy, and our forests.

I will keep pushing legislation to support America's long-term care needs, lower prescription drug costs, expand Medicare benefits, cut taxes for working people, make our workforce competitive with the world, and fight climate change.

So, as we reflect on 2021, let us welcome 2022 with a renewed sense of optimism. There is a lot to fight for, and I assure you I will continue to fight for Maine in Congress. I want you to know that my staff and I are doing all we can to support Mainers through this public health crisis and all the challenges that come with it. If you are unsure of the resources available to you, are having difficulty accessing resources, or if you'd just like to share a thought or opinion, please do not hesitate to reach out.

To: Newfield Selectmen

I am pleased to report to your community the state of our schools. The information provided represents the current 2021-2022 school year inclusive of all schools and specific attendance and budgetary information pertaining to your community.

**Curriculum/Programming:** We began the school year hopeful for a gradual return to a “normal” school year; however, the resurgence of Covid has forced us to make daily staffing adjustments to keep our schools open. The challenge of this situation presents unrest at times. We are appreciative of our staff, students, and families for keeping a steady course in supporting our primary purpose of offering quality educational opportunities for all learners.

We are now entering into our fourth (4th) year of an Early Education transformation, in a collaborative undertaking with the Maine Department of Education and Boston Public Schools, bringing a total of ten (10) Pre-K classrooms with PreK for ME, including the recent addition of our special-purpose public PreK program. This year we have thirteen (13) K classrooms with K for ME, and twelve (12) Grade 1 classrooms with Focus on First in the district. Our teachers have been the leaders in these efforts and have served as our trainers, as well as, supporting other Maine districts looking to make the transformation to these programs with proven results. This program expansion, especially in our PreK program, is evaluated annually based on interest and available space in buildings.

Massabesic Middle School continues to focus on a student-centered approach to the middle grades, emphasizing social-emotional learning and making connections to peers and to the school community. MMS restructured the Special Education department this year to integrate co-taught classes and additional specialized instruction. We look to build on this momentum next year as we refocus on interdisciplinary units across grade levels.

Massabesic High School (MHS) is currently preparing for its decennial visit (to be held in the spring of 2023) for regional accreditation through the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). This is the first time MHS will be reviewed based on the new NEASC standards, which will provide a new ten (10) year plan for school improvement. We welcome this opportunity to show areas we are expanding and improving, as well as insight into areas of desired growth and improvement. One area of programming growth that we are excited about is our career and college pathways work. Currently we have 330 students participating in 484 personalized extended learning opportunities (ELOs). Approximately one-third (1/3) of these students are accessing learning through independent studies and dual enrollment coursework for credit with accredited colleges and universities.

**Finance and Budget:** The School Board annually begins budget development in January. The Finance Committee will meet weekly to review each cost center’s recommendations, until a final budget is approved by committee in March. A final budget will reflect district goals, needs expressed by state and



federal requirements, staffing needs necessary to achieve educational goals, facility maintenance plans, and consideration of local economic conditions. Historically, adopted budgets have met the stated needs.

The School Board plans to have a final approved budget in April to present to the citizens of RSU #57. Citizens will be asked to attend the District Budget Meeting scheduled to be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, at the Massabesic Middle School at 7:00 p.m. The District Referendum Vote will be held on June 14, 2022, at your local precinct.

The total General Fund Budget for the 2021-2022 school year for RSU #57 is **\$44,943,662**. The Town of **Newfield's** local portion of this budget is **\$2,109,680**, which equals **7.44%** of the total local tax assessment and represents an increase in **Newfield's** local tax of **\$41.903** or **2.03%** over the 2020-2021 assessment. The district per pupil expenditure continues to be at a moderate level comparative to the state average.

**Facilities and Maintenance:** The School Board remains committed to the care of the district's facilities. Our buildings are aging, and future discussions must be held to determine if the infrastructure and the limited spacing in some of the buildings will meet the district's future needs. In the meantime, our custodial, maintenance and grounds staff work very hard to keep our facilities in terrific condition.

The School Board continues to ensure that buildings are well maintained through a preventative maintenance approach which includes roofing, leach fields, heating and ventilation systems, air and water quality, masonry, life safety and windows. The vast majority of these projects have been funded through the district's annual budget or the capital reserve fund; however, the district does seek grant support when applicable.

**Enrollment:** The total enrollment for RSU #57 was **2,905** students in grades Pre-kindergarten through 12 based on the October 1 count. A total of **192** students from **Newfield** represent **6.6%** of the total district enrollment. Current location of students:

These past two years have proven to be a challenging time for everyone associated with the district; however, given the perseverance and the level of cooperation, I am optimistic about our future.

We would like to remind you that School Board meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. and a schedule of committee meetings can be found on our website.

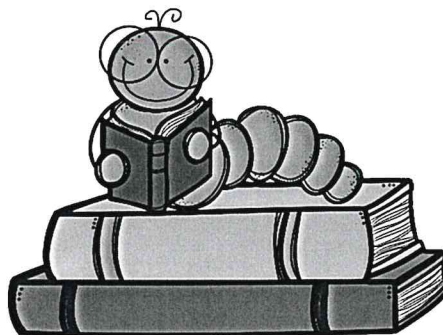

The Newfield Planning Board is volunteer and members are appointed by the Newfield Select Board pursuant to Title 30 § 4952 of Maine Statutes.

Membership consists of five full voting members and two associate members. Currently, the Board is seeking to fill one Associate Member position. The Planning Board meetings are held at the Newfield Town Hall located at 83 So. Effingham Rd. on the first Wednesday of each month at 7 PM and are open to the public.

The Board was busy this year and was able to return to in person meetings as the protocols for the pandemic waned. A total of 17 meetings were held to include workshops and public hearings.

A policy for the Planning Board to hold remote participation in public meetings was approved and adopted.

One site walk was performed as part of a Conditional Use Application review.

Two Conditional Use Permit Applications were received and acted upon as follows:

1. Food Concession Stand on Shady Nook Road
2. Farm, Retail Store on Libby Rd

One Shoreland Permit was issued to add a garage to a camp on Mirror Lake.

One Subdivision Application was received on the Wakefield Road.

Several Ordinances were drafted and updated as follows:

1. Subdivision Ordinance including recommended State guidelines
2. Land Use and Zoning Ordinance
3. Growth Ordinance – 3-year review complete with no changes recommended
4. Medical Caregiver Licensing Ordinance - Draft in progress  
(Guest Speakers were in attendance from the Office of Marijuana Policy and from the Hollis Planning Board on the topic of Medical Marijuana Rules, Regulations and Ordinance Enactment.)

The Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) worked with the Board on many of the application reviews and ordinance updates. The CEO commits numerous hours to assist the Planning Board in its work. The last two years have been very busy and our town may wish to add additional code enforcement hours in the near future.

The Board extends thanks to Eric Sanderson from SMPDC and Michelle Radley for their dedication and assistance. We welcome our new Administrative Assistant, Maria Marchant.

## CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER REPORT

### 2021

To the citizens of Newfield:

In this report I will be addressing Electrical Residential House Wiring, Shoreland Standards, and Permit Requirements.

In the State of Maine you are allowed to do electrical wiring in your own home or on a new home that you are going to live in. But, if you do not know about electrical wiring and the way to do it by the electrical codes then, you should not be doing it. A permit and inspection is required for any electrical work and I do my inspections by the National Electrical Code 2020. Maine has just adopted this new revised code book 2020 and there are a lot of changes in the Electrical Codes. So, if you do the wiring yourself and do it wrong and I make you rip it back out; this is going to cost you money. Safety is my first concern, it is best to hire a Licensed Electrician.

The Shoreland Zoning Book is being reviewed by the Town's Planning Board and many changes are being purposed. Anyway, you should always check with me before planning a project or doing work that will require a permit. Shoreland around a body of water is a distance of 250' but, the area that has the more restrictive requirements is within a 100' of the body of water. In that area even a permit is required to remove any trees. **CHECK WITH ME FIRST.**

**Permits Required-** No building or structure shall be erected, moved, added to, or structurally altered without a permit issued by the Code Enforcement Officer, also includes to Demo. If you are doing any electrical wiring, plumbing (this includes changing out plumbing fixtures) a permit is required. No work of any kind shall commence until a permit is taken out. **CHECK WITH ME FIRST**

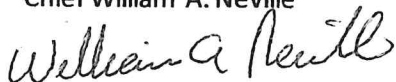

2021 was good year and bad year for Newfield Rescue, it was the busiest year that I know of for calls, mechanical issues with both Ambulance 2 and Rescue/Squad 1.

Rescue/Squad 1 had an electrical issue where we had to replace wiring to get the warning lights to work again. Late September Ambulance 2 started to run very rough and then would not start here at the station. It had to be towed to Scarborough where it was fixed, in October the same issue happened and again it was towed to be repaired. It has been running good since the last repair. Since the repairs we put together a new ambulance committee to look at replacing the ambulance in the future.

This year we want to increase the per diem hours from 9 hour shifts to 12-hour shifts. The increase of 3 hours would bring us from 54% call coverage to 74% during the per diem hours. We started on call shifts at night to help cover medical calls between 5p and 8am, it has been working so far. We are excited to announce that we are starting to EMT class here in Newfield Started in February. Wendy Elliott will be teaching the class; the class will last 15 weeks and should be completed sometime in June.

Newfield Rescue wants to congratulate Jannah Park in passing her paramedic class and becoming Newfield Rescue's newest paramedic. Jannah received her new license in October, Andrew Lord is near completion of his class.

This year we lost 2 members of the Rescue Squad, Hazel McGlincey and Michelle Palmer. They will be missed by many.

I would like Newfield Fire Dept for all the support last year, helping on calls and thank all the mutual aid departments that assisted us while the ambulance was down for repairs. I want to thank the Newfield Select Board and the towns people for their support as well. We are still dealing with COVID, please take care of yourselves and your families. Thank you to the families of Newfield Fire and Newfield Rescue for being there and supporting us while on calls.
