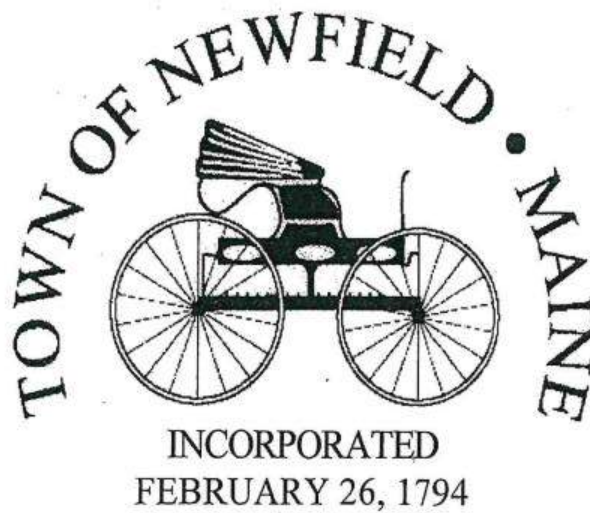

Dear Newfield Residents;

It's that time of year again, and as fiscal year 2019-2020 comes to an end, the Municipal Officers are once again pleased to report that the financial condition of the town remains in good standing. According to our year end January 2019 audit, the Town of Newfield's financial condition is the best it has ever been! The Municipal Officers continue to recognize the need to handle our funds in a fiscally responsible manner.

This year the residents of Newfield will be once again asked to continue their support of relocating the salt and sand to our Transfer Station where we own just over 21 acres. The request of \$50,000.00 in this budget is to continue the process of engineering the project; etc. This funding is coming out of our town's Undesignated Fund Account as to keep your property taxes low. The Select Board over this past year has met with DEP and DOT regarding the location and have received permit approval for an entrance separate, yet adjacent, to the Transfer Station entrance. Also, the need for a storage building to house our sand and salt is great, and the Board is moving forward in this process. Be looking for information about this on our website in the coming months.

The Town Hall was rented out to residents 5 times during the year. A few fundraisers were held to benefit our community members in need or experiencing tragedy, as well as fundraisers to support local organizations that help residents in need, and in setting up a scholarship fund for our children attending summer camps. Additionally, your Board of Selectman has decreased the rental fee for Newfield residents to just \$50.00; a 50% reduction. We recently passed a new town policy whereby fees will be waived for celebration of life gatherings for Newfield residents who have passed away. Information regarding renting the Town Hall for a function can be obtained by contacting the Town Office at 207-793-4348 or by email at newfieldso@metrocast.net.

We are proud and pleased to announce that our Recreation Department is back up and running! A brain storming session was held earlier this year with interested town residents and a pathway to success has been laid out. To date they've held a couple of paint nights, community game nights, and open mic nights down at the Town Hall. We look forward to a myriad of fantastic community events from them down the road.

Last year we made our final payment on our SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus) equipment for our all-volunteer Fire Department. Purchasing of this new equipment helps to keep our volunteers safe when they respond to various emergency situations. Starting this year, and in the coming years, the plan is to save based on the life expectancy of the equipment (i.e.: fire truck, SCBA's, ambulance, etc.) to split the cost over years of saving. This will help to keep taxes low while staying current with the safest equipment.

The website for the town, www.newfieldme.org, continues to be tweaked in an effort to make it more "user friendly" and to make access to information easier. Over this past year the office staff have worked diligently to input all pertinent information on the website. If you have not checked out the website, we encourage you all to do so. Information on current and upcoming events is updated as it becomes available. The website is a great tool and source of information. And, just to let you know, we've also instituted a bulletin board at the town Transfer Station with another, lighted one, planned on being installed at the Town Offices later on this year.

Our Heating Assistance fund continues to be funded by the generous donations of private citizens and social organizations. This year alone we have accepted \$6,811.50 in donations; thank you one and all. With the funds donated we were able to help 12 Newfield residents heat their home this winter season. Also, keep bringing in all your returnables to the Transfer Station as the monies raised from them are also used in our Heating Assistance Program.

Every year funds appropriated for Capital Improvements are used to make upgrades or repair a variety of items for the betterment of the Town. Over the past year the money appropriated for Capital Improvements has been used for a variety of purposes. Some of the items addressed this year were replacing/fixing the leach field (to include hydroseeding), replacing the water pump, fixing the well, and installation of a new furnace at the Public Safety Building (PSB).

Plans for this coming years' Capital Improvement funds include the continuing restoration and upgrades of the town buildings. The Public Safety Building (PSB) will need to have numerous holes and vents replaced, interior painting, installing air conditioning in the upstairs offices, and installing security cameras around the exterior. As of this report the Town Hall will have had a new water system (hot water heater, pump, filtration system, upgraded piping, etc.) installed and we plan on having the floor re-finished to help preserve its life. Plans are in the making to address a new back door, fix some siding issues, and a possible replacement of the furnace at the Town Hall. The Town Office will need to have some rotted trim boards replaced and painted, the well and landscaping are projects that the board is hopeful to accomplish, and a complete rebuild of the front entrance way.

Volunteers are currently needed to serve on our Appeals Board and Recreation Committee. We are also looking for representatives to serve on the Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) and Southern Maine Planning and Development Commission (SMPDC). The Select Board meets on every other Tuesday evening at the Public Safety Building starting at 6:00 pm. All meetings are open to the public, and we encourage all to attend. The Board of Selectmen welcome any suggestions, comments, or concerns.

Please join us for the annual town meeting on Saturday, March 14, 2020 at 7:00pm at the Town Hall (23 South Effingham Road). The election and secret ballot questions will be voted on Saturday, March 14, 2020 from 10 am to 2 pm at the Town Hall or by absentee ballot.

Lastly, the Select Board wishes to extend their appreciation to the many volunteers, board members, committee members, department members and employees that help to make our town operate on a daily basis. We cannot THANK YOU enough for your dedication and generosity to our community.

Dear Friends,

As 2019 ends and 2020 begins, I am pleased to report that Congress made progress on a number of issues important to Maine families despite the polarization in our country.

In a major win for surviving military and retiree spouses to whom we are deeply indebted, I was proud to co-lead the repeal of what is often referred to as the "Military Widow's Tax," an unfair offset of survivor benefits that has prevented as many as 67,000 surviving spouses—including more than 260 from Maine—from receiving the full benefits they deserve.

The high cost of health care and prescription drugs continues to be a top issue for families and seniors. To provide continued relief for more lower- and middle-income individuals, I led the charge to extend for another two years the medical expense tax deduction that I included in the 2017 tax law. Without this extension, nearly 20,000 Mainers and millions of Americans with high medical expenses, including many with preexisting conditions, would have faced an increased tax burden. In other good news, the CREATES Act I cosponsored became law. It will prevent pharmaceutical companies from blocking access to a sufficient supply of brand-name drugs needed for the studies that allow less expensive alternatives to enter the marketplace.

Improving people's health and wellbeing remains my priority. On a per capita basis, Maine has the highest incidence of Lyme disease in the country. In August, I held a Senate hearing at the University of Maine's Tick Lab on this growing public health crisis. A comprehensive public health strategy to combat this epidemic is needed, and the new law I authored will do just that.

In addition, I helped champion another \$2.6 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health, our nation's premiere biomedical research institution, including significant boosts for Alzheimer's disease and diabetes research. Last year, NIH funded more than \$111 million for research at 14 Maine institutions.

To help prepare the graduates of Maine Maritime Academy, I secured \$300 million for a new training ship, which will ensure rigorous instruction for MMA students for decades to come.

Significant federal funding was approved for work at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Funding appropriated by Congress will pay for three new destroyers, make a down payment on an additional ship, and finance infrastructure improvements at PNSY.

As Chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have led efforts to improve our nation's crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine's housing needs are addressed. For Maine's roads, bridges, airports, and seaports, tens of millions in federal funding will help make urgently needed upgrades and improve safety. Funding will also support housing assistance to low-income families and seniors and aid communities in reducing homelessness among our youth. The Community Development Block Grant program will assist numerous towns and cities in our State.

The Aging Committee I chair has continued its focus on financial security for our seniors. A new law I authored will make it easier for small businesses to offer retirement plans to their employees. Our Aging Committee's Fraud Hotline fielded more than 1,200 calls this year. Congress passed a new law to crack down on robocallers who are often the perpetrators of these scams. And a new law I authored will expand the IRS' Identity Protection PIN program nationwide to prevent identity theft tax refund fraud.

At the end of 2019, I cast my 7,262nd consecutive vote. In the New Year, I will keep working to deliver bipartisan solutions to the challenges facing Maine and the nation. 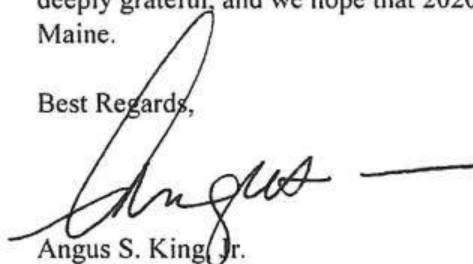
The beginning of a new year provides the opportunity to reflect on the progress of the past 12 months. If you've been watching cable TV, you might think that every waking moment of 2019 in Washington has been consumed by divisive, partisan issues – and while there's no shortage of those debates, there have also been opportunities for bipartisan cooperation. You sent me to the Senate to make the most of those opportunities, so as we enter into the New Year, I wanted to take a moment to update you on my efforts to work with members of both parties to make life better for the people of Maine.

One of my most important priorities this past year has been emphasizing preventive healthcare. Maine's distinction as the oldest state in the nation brings us wisdom, of course – but it also creates unique challenges, particularly relating to healthcare. The key to addressing these obstacles is being proactive, because the cheapest, safest medical procedure is the one that doesn't need to happen. That's why I've introduced legislation to incentivize healthier living, expand mental health screenings, and help more Americans access regular check-ups. We're making progress, but we've got a long way to go – and I'd like your help, because I know that the best ideas are the ones that come from families and communities on the front lines of these challenges. To strengthen this effort, I convened a policy forum on prevention in Bangor in October, which has already given me exciting new ideas that I'll carry with me into 2020. If you have additional thoughts on encouraging preventive healthcare, please share them with my office.

This year has also continued the growth of Maine's forest products industry – a key focus of my work to revitalize Maine's rural economy and communities. We've seen significant investment in mills across the state, creating good jobs to support rural Maine. I'm also pleased that the investments aren't just in our mills – the industry is thriving because of its commitment to innovation. We're fortunate to have the University of Maine's top-notch researchers exploring cutting-edge ways to use our forest resources, including capitalizing on the rise of 3D printing technology with the world's largest 3D printer. Combining this work with ongoing federal support, our vast forests, and Maine's dedicated workforce, I know that the future of this industry is bright, and I'll continue working to support it on all fronts.

I'm proud of all we've accomplished together this year, but even as I reflect on all that we've achieved, it is challenging to not think of the work left undone. It sometimes can be discouraging to watch these important priorities hang in limbo, but fortunately for me, encouragement is never far. After all, I get to live in Maine – which means I get to count Maine people as my neighbors and friends. I'm always struck by the kindness that our citizens show not only to me, but also to each other. This focus on collaboration and compassion is an inspiration, and it powers my efforts bring a little bit of Maine common sense to Washington. Thank you for all you do to for our state – Mary and I are deeply grateful, and we hope that 2020 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and the State of Maine.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to represent you and your family and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

In 2019, I was honored to work with my colleagues to pass hundreds of bills that address everything from fighting climate change to raising the minimum wage. And while Congress has become an increasingly partisan place, I was proud to continue my habit of reaching across the aisle, introducing a number of bipartisan bills and cosponsoring even more.

On the House Appropriations Committee, I worked to support programs important to Maine, such as rural broadband investment, Head Start, PFAS clean up, and shipbuilding at Bath Iron Works. Further, I firmly believe we need to make substantial investments in all aspects of our infrastructure, from safe drinking water and modernized schools, to upgraded highways, transit, and rail. From my seat on the Appropriations Committee I advocated for increased funding for the BUILD grants program which funds investments in transportation infrastructure by states, local governments, and transit agencies. I also pushed for increased funding for the Community Development Block Grant program, our national park system, local and organic agriculture, election security, and the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Since my time in the Maine State Senate, lowering the cost of prescription drugs has been one of my top priorities. This year I introduced two bills that would help Americans afford their prescription medications. I also voted for a bill that would allow the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to directly negotiate prices for certain drugs. I look forward to continuing this important work in 2020 so Americans are no longer faced with the choice of picking up prescriptions they desperately need or putting food on the table.

I am sure this coming year holds many challenges and opportunities for our country, and I promise that the interests and principles of Mainers will continue to guide my work. If there is anything my offices in Washington or Maine can do to be of assistance – whether you, your town, or your organization is applying for a grant; you're facing an issue with a federal agency; or if you'd just like to share a thought or opinion – please do not hesitate to reach out.

To: Newfield Selectmen

I am pleased to report to your community the state of our schools. The information provided is for the current 2019-2020 school year and is inclusive of all schools and will include specific information pertaining to your community.

Curriculum/Programming: The primary purpose of any public school district is educating all students to be career and/or college ready upon graduation. Our high school students now have increased exposure to various experiences since we have incorporated a Pathways Coordinator position. The Pathways Coordinator secures concurrent enrollment classes with universities, educational and work-place internships, and job shadowing opportunities for students. This program is only in its second year, but we have already begun to see a positive impact. This year we have a thirty percent (30%) increase from 2018-2019 in students attending area technical centers due to the change in the high school schedule. This year's schedule has a 6 period daily meeting structure, which aligns with technical centers, allowing more students to access core programming at MHS without conflicting with their ability to study the trades industry.

The recent expansion of instrumental music instruction at the elementary level has proven to be successful. We currently have over two hundred (200) students learning a musical instrument in grades 4 and 5. The middle school band has grown to nearly one hundred (100) students participating in the band program and we look forward to the future growth at the high school as a result of this program.

We continue to expand our Pre-K (4 year old program) throughout the district. Each elementary school in the district now has a program with plans to expand to meet the needs of individual communities. The results of this program have proven to bring positive results.

Communication: You may have noticed that the District has launched a new and improved website. We are now using the *Aptegy* Alert System to communicate quickly and effectively with parents, students and staff.

We also have our own app (RSU 57, Maine), which can be used by community members to receive notifications of school cancellations, announcements and district events.

The new bus/transportation app (MyStop), allows parents to track their student's bus in real time. These apps are available free of charge and we encourage you to check them out.

Finance and Budget: The School Board began the development of the fiscal year 2020-2021 budget in early January. The budget is developed annually based upon the district goals, needs as expressed by state and federal requirements, staffing needs which are necessary to achieve educational goals, facility maintenance plans as well as consideration of local economic conditions. The Finance Committee meets weekly from January through March to prepare a budget for the School Board's review and consideration. Historically budgets adopted by the School Board and approved by the voters of the RSU #57 communities have proven to be reliable and on target.

Facilities and Maintenance: The School Board and Finance Committee remain committed to reviewing and updating their annual and five-year facility maintenance plans. Given the aging nature of the District's facilities it is vitally important that they are cared for as efficiently as possible in an effort to keep unexpected repair costs to a minimum. We are extremely proud of our custodial and maintenance staff who work very hard to keep our facilities in terrific shape. The District continues to ensure that the buildings are well maintained through a structured approach to upgrades which includes roofing, leach fields, heating and ventilation systems, air and water quality, lighting and windows. The Finance Committee's strategic plan also addresses improvements to the District's campus roads and parking lots. The vast majority of these projects are completed through the District's annual budget or through the capital reserve fund. It is through this very structured approach that the District has been able to control repair and replacement costs and be as efficient as possible in using your local tax dollars.

Enrollment: The total enrollment for RSU #57 was 2,983 students in grades Pre-kindergarten through 12 based on the October 1 count. A total of 189 students from Newfield represent 6.3% of the total district enrollment:

The total General Fund Budget for the 2019-2020 school year for RSU #57 is \$44,281,253. The Town of Newfield's local portion of this budget is \$1,995,796, which equals 7.62% of the total local tax assessment and represents an increase in Newfield's local tax of \$67,019 or 3.47% over the 2018-2019 assessment. The district per pupil expenditure continues to be one of the lowest in the state, while the instructional programs and services continue to meet the needs of the students.

Educating our children is a cooperative effort between school and community. We welcome your participation in this process. School Board meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. and a schedule of meetings can be found on our website or you can contact RSU #57's Central Office and we can provide this information. Additionally, the District Budget Meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 12, 2020 at the Massabesic Middle School at 7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria. We hope you can attend.

In closing, I would like to thank the communities of RSU #57 for their continued support, enabling us to provide quality educational experiences for our students.

SACO RIVER CORRIDOR COMMISSION

"Communities Working Together To Protect Our Rivers"

- The Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) was created with one purpose in mind – to protect the rivers in the Saco Basin and all that these rivers represent to the people that live and work here. The legislature provided the start and the performance standards to initiate the program and the cleanliness of the river is a testament to that effort. The Commission's role is one of partnership. Each town has an opportunity to choose two people to represent them on the board and in this way, the Commission is functioning more as a local/regional group working to keep the water clean and to keep Maine looking like Maine. It's a fact that many people come to Maine from other places. They arrive proclaiming how wonderful Maine is, the clean air, the clean water and all the trees which looks "nothing like where they are from." Invariably, as areas are built up, the values that people sought out change, bringing inappropriate uses to the shore land area that can lead to land and water based problems.

The Town of Newfield is fortunate to have Robin Thayer on the Commission. However, the Alternate seat remains vacant. In a practical sense, Commissioners give the Town of Newfield an opportunity to participate in the present and future development patterns throughout the entire corridor from Fryeburg to Saco. Anyone interested in obtaining information about how to represent your community through this Commission should contact the Commission Staff and we will explain the town's role and the individual's role as well. Clean, healthy water is Maine's greatest asset. It's hard to understate this important fact.

We are happy to report that we concluded our nineteenth successful Saco River Water Quality Monitoring Program. Currently, staff and volunteers monitor for dissolved oxygen, conductivity, pH, turbidity, temperature, total phosphorus, orthophosphate, Alkalinity and *Escherichia coli*. Our testing takes place on a bi-weekly schedule along the Saco, Ossipee, and Little Ossipee Rivers at 35 different locations during the months of May through September. All of the information relating to the past eighteen years of the Commission's monitoring program can be found on our website located at www.srcc-maine.org. This information can be useful for Planning Boards, Code Enforcement Officers and developers in locating appropriate types of land uses close to the River.

The Commission's job is to work with the communities in the Corridor to help keep the rivers clean and healthy. Copies of the water quality monitoring information are available, or questions can be asked by calling Dalyn Houser, the Commission's Executive Director. As always, if the town or citizen has a place on the river they believe should be tested, we would love to hear about it. The Commission office is located at 81 Maple Street in Cornish, Maine (Telephone 207-625-8123) and can be found on the web at www.srcc-maine.org.

To the Citizens of Newfield:

Have a happy New Year.

A note as to the Building Codes and Life Safety Codes. All bedrooms are required to have one egress window (5.7 sq. ft. net clear opening), smoke detectors are required in each bedroom and one on each level of the homes with a smoke and carbon monoxide detector installed by a door opening to a garage and in the area of a fuel burning appliance. All stairways are required to have hand rails between 34" and 38" high, with stair raiser height no more than seven and three quarters of an inch and the tread depth of not less than ten inches. A stairway width shall be 36" when finished and have the headroom not less than 6'8" from the nose of any thread or platform. Exterior doors shall have a landing on both sides the width of the door served. The egress door (exterior door) shall not be less than 32" net clear opening. These are only a few codes people over look.

If your thinking of building a home or remodeling; meet with me to go over your plans to make sure you will have all the Code requirements. I have all the applications for the permits you will need for your projects. Remember all living areas require a **CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY**.

This year I will be visiting properties that have JUNKYARD VIOLATIONS!

Newfield Planning Board Annual Report for 2019

The Newfield Planning Board is an all volunteer board appointed by the Newfield Select Board pursuant to Title 30 § 4952 of Maine statutes. Membership consists of five full voting members and two alternate members. The Board employs the assistance of a correspondence secretary.

The Planning Board meets at the Town Hall on So. Effingham Rd. at 7 pm on the first Wednesday of each month. Meetings are open to the public and attendance is encouraged.

In 2019 the Planning Board met sixteen times and worked on a total of three conditional use applications, two subdivisions, and several ordinances. One of the permitted Conditional Use Permits is currently in the appeals process. The planning board has not had any shoreland permit requests brought forward for several years. The board has sought the assistance of a consultant at SMPDC to assist in completing an update of Newfield's Shoreland Zoning Ordinance requested by the Town's Codes Enforcement Officer. Some State technical assistance grant money has been made available to fund most of the cost of the Shoreland Ordinance update. Any new ordinances or update to ordinances will come before the voters of Newfield for approval before enactment.

The updated inventory section of the 1981 Comprehensive Plan was voted on and passed by the voters of Newfield in March 2019. Work on the Goals, Policies and Strategies section of the 1981 update has been started with assistance from Southern Maine Planning & Development Commission (SMPDC). Many avenues have been employed to attempt to obtain public input in writing these goals. Citizen participation has been low. A Community Opinion Survey was composed and made available on the Town's website. Over 1600 surveys were mailed out in the August tax bills. 219 surveys were returned by October first. The results of the few surveys returned indicated a theme that residents and taxpayers enjoy the rural character of Newfield, the low tax rate, availability of open space, limited housing growth and a majority of respondents are happy with the town services and facilities available.

The process of scanning and backing up planning board records from 1964 to present on an external memory device has been completed. The retyping of Newfield's Land Use and Zoning Book was finished and distributed to board members and C.E.O. A list of Conditional Use Permits approved in Newfield was researched, composed and shared with the Codes Officer and the Selectboard. Researching and compiling an updated list of subdivisions in Newfield is nearly complete.

The members of the Planning Board would like to thank all of the citizens that have taken time to participate in various public hearings and comprehensive plan input and update sessions.

With numerous dog at large complaints in 2019 I had to take some to the shelter in Kennebunk during the year or if the dog has rabies tags I am usually able to reunite them with owners thereby avoiding a trip to Kennebunk and a fine from the shelter for the dog's owner; I also do the same with cats as well.

I work with Feral Felines in trapping feral cats they are then neutered and given to farms that are having rodent problems.

I handle wildlife cases only pertaining to rabies cases and if necessary I also transport to Augusta the frozen heads of questionable animals that are then tested for rabies by the State;

I work with the State Animal Welfare Department with possible animal abuse complaints for all domestic animals including horses and other large animals. I also cover other legal issues by summoning pet owners for violations directed by the State of Maine. I also have to deal with dangerous dogs and have to supply reports to the court in some cases that involve court cases.

The town passed an ordinance that include a \$25.00 impound fee for any dog I pick up or have in my possession.

A current rabies vaccination is required for annual dog licensing to the town, rabies vaccinations protect both animals and humans from this dreaded disease, both dog licensing and vaccinations are the LAW.
