Tom is missed dearly by his community of family and friends.

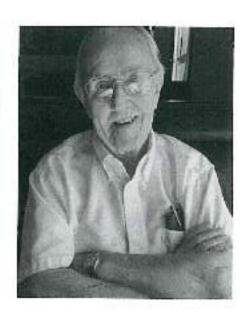
JAMES J. CAMPBELL, SR.

Dear Newfield Residents.

It's that time of year again, my friends, and what a long, strange trip this past year has been! It was, at best, a somewhat difficult year for all of us, as there were hurdles to clear and new procedures to implement. Due to the severity of COVID19 and guidance via Executive Order from the Governor, our town facilities had to drastically out operating hours, shut down completely for brief periods, or altogether curtail public access.

Just as a reminder, the Public Safety Building still is not open to the general public; fire permits may be obtained online through the town website; our Town Offices are open by appointment only; the town Transfer Station is running normal operating hours, but if you need to approach our employees for any reason, please stay 5 feet back or wear a mask whenever possible; and finally, our Town Hall is currently only being utilized for Selectman's and Planning Board meetings. We hope in the coming year it will once again be open for public use such as dances, Recreation Department activities, and be available for rent. To be quite honest, we'd really like to see all our facilities back up and running normally, but only time will tell when that will be possible. Your patience in this matter is greatly appreciated.

As fiscal year 2020-2021 comes to an end, the Municipal Officers are once again pleased to report that the financial condition of the town remains in good standing. According to the preliminary findings of our year end January 2020 audit, the Town of Newfield's financial condition is in excellent shape! The Municipal Officers continue to recognize the need to handle our funds in a fiscally responsible manner, and we believe this year's budget process aptly continued that trend.

And speaking of budgets, once again our various departments have come through and been very frugal with their budget submissions. Everyone should be commended for all the hard work they put in to keep things at, or close to, last year's numbers. This is especially noteworthy with the current situation we find ourselves living in.

This year we are once again asking the residents of Newfield to continue their support of relocating the salt and sand to our Transfer Station (where the town owns just over 21 acres). The request of \$60,000.00 in this budget is to continue the engineering process with the belief that we will break ground on this project this coming fall. Additionally, we have met with State of Maine DEP and DOT (regarding the location and entrance) and hired an engineering firm (Haley Ward Inc) who have completed a site survey and come up with preliminary plans and associated costs. We have also been researching loan options to complete the building process and to keep our taxes low. The need for a storage building to house our sand and salt is great, and the Board is actively moving forward in this process.

As you are probably all well aware, our town Recreation Department was well on its way to being a viable entity last year before being shut down in March of 2020 when Governor Mills issued the first of her many executive orders regarding the current pandemic. Up to that point, they had held a couple of paint nights, community game nights, open mic nights down at the Town Hall, a fund raiser dance, and had a dog training class scheduled. We look forward to a myriad of fantastic community events from them down the road once moratoriums on public gathering limitations have been lifted.

The website for the town, <u>www.newfieldme.org</u>, continues to be tweaked in an effort to make it more "user friendly" and to make access to information easier. Over this past year the office staff have continued to diligently list all pertinent information on the website. If you have not checked out the website, we encourage you all to do so. Information on current and upcoming events is updated as it becomes available. The website is a great tool and source of information.

Our Heating Assistance fund continues to be funded by the generous donations of private citizens and social organizations. This year alone we have accepted \$6,845.48 in donations; thank you one and all. With the funds donated we were able to help 11 Newfield residents heat their homes this winter season. Also, please keep bringing in all your returnables to the Transfer Station, as the monies raised from them are used in our Heating Assistance Program.

Every year funds are appropriated for Capital Improvements that we use to make upgrades, repairs, and improvements to a variety of important processes, facilities, and sundry Items for the betterment of the Lown. Over the past year the money appropriated for Capital Improvements has been used for a variety of purposes. Due to the current COVID19 situation we find ourselves in, we've added a door bell and intercom system at the town offices for residents, vendors, and such, when coming to the town offices to conduct business. Due to security concerns, at our Town Office we had the TRIO computer software upgrade accomplished. Down at the Public Safety Building (i.e., fire and rescue building) we had cameras installed and are in the process of obtaining an alarm system. At the Town Hall we replaced the water pump, hot water tank, bathroom sinks, and the galvanized water lines. We had the World War II Honor Roll sign (housed at the Town Hall) refurbished.

Additional plans for this coming year's Capital Improvement funds include the continuing restoration and upgrades of the town buildings. The Public Safety Building (PSB) will need to have numerous holes repaired and vents replaced, interior painting, and air conditioning installed in the upstairs offices. Plans are in the making to address a new back door, fix some siding issues, and a possible replacement of the furnace at the Town Hall. The Town Office will need to have some rotted trim boards replaced and painted and a complete rebuild of the front entrance. Some of these were projects that had to be placed on the back burner due to the pandemic situation we have been living with for the past year.

Volunteers are currently needed to serve on our Appeals Board and Recreation Committee. We are also looking for representatives to serve on the Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) and Southern Maine Planning and Development Commission (SMPDC). The Select Board meets on every other Tuesday evening at the Town Hall starting at 6:00 pm. All meetings are open to the public, and we encourage all to attend. The Board of Selectmen welcome any suggestions, comments, or concerns.

Please join us for the annual town meeting on Saturday, March 13, 2021, at 10:00 am at the Line School (818 Water Street). The election and secret ballot questions will be voted on a day prior on Friday, March 12, 2021, from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm at the Town Hall or by absentee ballot.

Lastly, the Select Board wishes to extend their appreciation to the many volunteers, board members, committee members, department members and employees that help to make our town operate on a daily basis. We cannot THANK YOU enough for your dedication and generosity to our community.

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Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to reflect on 2020, an incredibly challenging year for Maine families, small businesses, and communities.

When the pandemic struck, our country faced the specter of an overwhelmed health care system and devastation to our small businesses and the millions of people they employ. I immediately worked with Republicans and Democrats to pass multiple laws allocating approximately \$3 trillion to respond to this public health and economic crisis, including more than \$8 billion directed to Maine to support testing, schools, the economy, and other purposes — that is nearly double Maine's annual state budget.

I am especially proud of the bipartisan Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) I co-authored. This program has provided three out of four Maine small businesses with nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable loans, which has helped sustain more than 250,000 Maine jobs. I have met thousands of Maine small employers and employees in all 16 counties who are surviving because of the PPP. As one small business owner told me, the PPP provided "exactly what we needed at exactly the right time." The PPP also allowed employers to maintain benefits, such as health care, during this challenging time. Another round of PPP is needed to sustain small businesses and their employees.

While the pandemic continues across Maine, our nation, and the world. I thank the first responders, health care professionals, teachers, grocery store employees, factory workers, farmers, truck drivers, postal employees, and so many others who continue to stay on the job during this difficult time. With the deployment of the first vaccines, better tests, and the incredible speed with which these life-saving responses were developed. I am hopeful we can emerge from this crisis in the next few months.

While providing relief to American families was my focus throughout 2020, other accomplishments include the passage of the Great American Outdoors Act, which provides full funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and addresses the maintenance backlog at our national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges. As Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, in 2020 alone, I secured \$132 million to improve Maine's roads, bridges, airports, buses, rail, ferries, and seaports. Finally, as Chairman of the Aging Committee, I led the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, which funds programs that improve the well-being, independence, and health of our nation's seniors and their caregivers, and I authored laws to reduce the cost of prescription drugs and protect individuals with Alzheimer's disease.

As the end of 2020 is approaching, I have cast more than 7,535 votes, never having missed one. In the New Year, my focus remains to work with colleagues to find common ground on policies to help support the health and safety of Mainers and the safe, responsible opening of our communities. If ever I or my staff can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact one of my state offices. May the coming year be a successful one for you, your family, your community, and our state.

Dear Friends,

2020 was a year unlike any in our lifetimes. Our state and nation dealt with unprecedented challenges—the coronavirus pandemic, ensuing economic fallout, and a prolonged, heavily divisive campaign season each took a significant toll on all of us. The worst part? In order to protect each other, we had to face these challenges in isolation. But a new year represents new possibilities; a chance to take stock of what we're grateful for and focus on the opportunities in front of us. As we reflect back on 2020, we will remember heartbreak and loss – but we cannot forget the shining rays of hope that broke through the darkness, reminding us all that better days are ahead.

Throughout the pandemic, my top focus has been on bridging the partisan divide in Washington in order to deliver desperately-needed relief for Maine people. Joined by colleagues last March, we pushed for bipartisan negotiations to produce a strong bill that helped follow Mainers, businesses, and institutions weather this storm. In the weeks and months after the CARES Act passed, our team stayed in close contact with people throughout the state to determine how we should adjust our response to best support our citizens. Unfortunately, the aid provided by the CARES Act lapsed without Congressional action, leaving too many families and businesses in limbo. I never stopped pushing for a bipartisan relief bill and, after extensive negotiations, we ended the year on a good note by breaking the gridlock and passing new relief legislation. This new bill isn't perfect; in fact, it should just be the start our renewed response. As we enter 2021 with a new administration and new Congress, we must fight for additional legislation to help restore stability to our working families and rebuild our economy and public health infrastructure.

In the midst of this crisis, Congress did manage to accomplish a few successes that will outlast this awful pandemic. Among these was the *Great American Outdoors Act*, a bipartisan bill which was enacted into law in August 2020 and will help address a \$12 billion backlog at our national parks so future generations of Americans can enjoy these beautiful lands and create lifelong memories. Also, as we learn more about the recent backs of our nation's networks, there is help on the way: 27 of the cybersecurity recommendations made by the Cyberspace Solarium Commission – which I co-chair with Republican Congressman Mike Gallagher – made it into this year's defense bill. While there is no guarantee that these provisions would have prevented the massive back, they will certainly improve our cyber defenses.

Dospite the challenges, I'm hopeful for the future. Vaccines are being distributed across our state – starting with our healthcare herees, who have sacrificed so much throughout this unprecedented catastrophe and deserve our eternal gratitude. If there can be a silver lining from these challenges of 2020, maybe it will be this: I hope that, in the not-so distant future, we will be able to come together physically and we will be reminded of our love for each other. We have differences, without a doubt. But as Maine people stepped up to support each other, we saw again and again that our differences pale in comparison to the values we share. We are one state, and one community – and there is nothing we cannot or will not do for each other. Mary and I wish you a happy and healthy 2021. We can't wait to see you soon.

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Dear Friends.

2020 has been a year of unconscionable loss and hardship. The COVID-19 pandemic has ravaged our nation, magnifying long-unaddressed inequities. I hear daily from constituents whose lives have been upended by the pandemic. As we navigate these ongoing challenges, my top priority in Congress has been to advocate for the resources Maine residents, businesses, and institutions need to weather this crisis.

In March, the CARES Act was signed into law, providing much-needed relief to Mainers, including expanded unemployment benefits, stimulus checks, grants and loans for small businesses and nonprofits, and funding for health care providers on the front lines of this crisis. As this crisis were on, I saw increased need; that's why I voted for the Heroes Act in May and again in October to provide further support. I'm relieved we passed another relief package at the end of December, but I know another round of support is still much needed in the coming year.

The pandemic isn't the only crisis we face. Climate change threatens Maine's environment and industries. This summer, the Gulf of Maine recorded its hottest day, and we experienced the longest, most severe drought in 20 years. Maine farms continue to be stymicd by climate change, but they can also play a crucial role in combatting it. In February, I introduced the Agriculture Resilience Act to ensure American agriculture is net-zero by 2045. The release of Maine's Climate Action Plan is a major step in the fight against climate change. I will continue to work with state leaders to ensure they have federal support to achieve this agenda.

2021 will offer different challenges. We must distribute a vaccine to millions, restore jobs, uplift the economy, and repair the divisions that undermine our ability to make meaningful change. I look forward to working with the incoming presidential administration to meet these challenges and emerge as a stronger, more resilient nation.

As always, the needs of Mainers guide my work as we recover from this crisis. If there is anything my office can do to help, please reach out.

I am pleased to report to your community the state of our schools. The information provided is for the current 2020-2021 school year and is inclusive of all schools and will include specific information pertaining to your community.

Curriculum Programming: Let me start by saying that we recognize the hardships this situation has created for many families in our communities and the importance of the district's rule in our communities. We would like to thank the community for its support during these exceptional times. While the challenges of this situation have presented muest at times, we are grateful to our incredible staff, students, and families for keeping a steady course in supporting our primary purpose of offering high quality educational apportunities for all learners.

In March, along with the rest of the nation, RSU #57 experienced an abrupt disruption to school as we know it. We are proud to have launched remote education within days of closing schools in the midst of incredible unknowns and that our educational opportunities were sustained daily for our learners as the 2019-2020 school year came to a unique close. All the while, our teachers and administrators worked to prepare our learners for a socially supported and academically informed return to the 2020-2021 school year.

After assessing the needs of our families for the 2020-2021 school year, we are incredibly pleased to be offering a 5-day-a-week itt-person experience and a synchronous colline instructional program for our families to select from in order to meet their own unique needs. The preparation and maintenance for this structure has meant that our entire staff have had to make significant changes to how they perform their responsibilities. We appreciate their courageous approach and the personal adjustments they are making to accomplish our responsibilities to the communities.

I would like to highlight examples of educational programming changes that are proving to meet our students' needs.

At our high school, a total of 265 students (30% of high school students) have been carrolled in 328 different Extended Learning Opportunities (ELO) during the Fall semester. This includes students taking independent studies, dual/concurrent enrolled courses, vocational placement. School-to-Work and personal learning plans. The high school has increased their dual and concurrent enrolled enrollment numbers from approximately 24 students in the Fall of 2018 to approximately 58 students carolled in the Fall of 2019. We currently have a total of 84 students enrolled in a dual or concurrent enrolled course. This fall we introduced the School-to-Work program, a new program in the ELO program, that allows students to carn credit while working at local businesses. There are thirty-five students enrolled in this program who are able to carn credit for working while also following a curriculum that focuses on career/college readiness.

We are entering into our third (3rd) year of a transformation, in collaboration with the Maine Department of Education and Boston Public Schools, bringing nine (9) Pre-K classrooms with PreK for ME, twelve (12) K classrooms with K for ME, and eleven (11) classrooms with Focus on First. Our teachers have been the leaders in these efforts and have served as our trainers, as well as, supporting other Maine Districts looking to make the transformation to these programs with proven results.

We have installed state-of-the-art technology and cLearning resources to support all of our educators across the PK-12 continuum, allowing students and staff to engage in learning both remotely and in-person at the same time (synchronized). These projects were accomplished with state and federal funding sent to districts as COVID-19 Rebef Funds (CRF). This model will allow us to continue to offer a similar approach next fall as we continue to transition and recover from the impact of the pandemic.

Finance and Budget: The School Board began the development of the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget in early January. The budget is developed annually based upon the district goals, needs as expressed by state and federal requirements, staffing needs which are necessary to achieve educational goals, facility maintenance plans as well as consideration of local economic conditions. The Finance Committee meets weekly from January through March to prepare a budget for the School Board's review and consideration. Historically budgets adopted by the School Board and approved by the voters of the RSU #57 communities have proven to be reliable and on target.

Facilities and Maintenance: The School Board and Finance Committee remain committed to reviewing and updating their annual and five-year facility maintenance plans. Given the number of buildings and also the aging nature of the District's facilities it is vitally important that they are cared for as efficiently as possible in an effort to keep unexpected repair costs to a minimum. We are extremely proud of our custodial, maintenance and grounds stoff who work very hard to keep our facilities in terrific shape. The District continues to ensure that the buildings are well maintained through a structured approach to upgrades which includes roofing, leach fields, heating and ventilation systems, air and water quality, lighting and windows. The vast majority of these projects are completed through the District's annual budget or through the capital reserve fund. It is through this very structured approach that the District has been able to control repair and replacement costs and be as efficient as possible in using your local tax dollars.

Enrollment: The total enrollment for RSU #57 was 2,742 students in grades Pre-kindergarten through 12 based on the October 1 count. A total of 162 students from Newfield represent 5,9% of the total district enrollment:

The total General Fund Budget for the 2020-2021 school year for RSH #57 is \$44,968,547. The Town of Newfield's local portion of this budget is \$2,067,777, which equals 7.63% of the total local tax assessment and represents an increase in Newfield's local tax of \$71,981 or 3.61% over the 2019-2020 assessment. The district per pupil expenditure continues to be one of the lowest in the state, while the instructional programs and services continue to meet the needs of the students.

The current economic and social conditions we face require a strong cooperative effort between school and community to strengthen the educational purpose and meet the needs of our students. We welcome your participation in this process. School Board meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. and a schedule of meetings can be found on our website or you can contact RSU #57's Central Office and we can provide you this information. Additionally, the District Budget Meeting is scheduled to be held on Tuesday, May 11, 2021 at the Massabesic Middle School at 7:00 p.m. We hope you can attend.

In closing, I would like to recognize the entire starf of RSU #57 for all their hard work and thank the communities of RSU #57 for their continued support. This has been a challenging time for everyone; however, we are optimistic about our future.

SACO RIVER CORRIDOR COMMISSION

"Communities Working Together to Protect Our Rivers"

The Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) was created with one purpose in mind – to protect the rivers in the Saco Basin and all that these rivers represent to the people that live and work here. The legislature provided the start and the performance standards to initiate the program and the cleanliness of the river is a testament to that effort. The Commission's role is one of partnership. Each town has an opportunity to choose two people to represent them on the board, and in this way the Commission functions more as a local/regional group working to keep the water clean and to keep Maine looking like Maine. It is a fact that many people come to Maine from other places. They arrive proclaiming how wonderful Maine is, the clean air, the clean water and all the trees which looks "nothing like where they are from." Invariably, as areas are built up, the values that people sought out change, bringing inappropriate uses to the shore land area that can lead to land and water quality based problems.

The Town of Newfield is fortunate to have Robin Thayer on the Commission. However, the Alternate Seat remains vacant. Anyone interested in obtaining more information about how to represent your community through this Commission should contact the Commission Staff and we will explain the town's role and the individual's role as well. In a practical sense, Commissioners give the Town of Newfield an opportunity to participate in the present and future development patterns throughout the entire corridor from Frychurg to Saco. Clean, healthy water is Maine's greatest asset. It is hard to understate this important fact.

We are happy to report that we are concluding our twentieth successful year of our Water Quality Monitoring Program. Currently, staff and volunteers monitor for dissolved oxygen, conductivity, pH, turbidity, temperature, total Kjeldahl nitrogen, total phosphorus, orthophosphate, Alkalinity, and Escherichia coli. Our testing takes place on a bi-weekly schedule along the Saco, Ossipee, and Little Ossipee Rivers at 37 different locations during the months of May through September. All the information related to the past twenty years of the Commission's monitoring program can be found on our website located at www.srce-mainc.org. This information can be useful for Planning Boards, Code Enforcement Officers, and developers in determining appropriate types of land uses close to the River.

The Commission's job is to work with the communities in the Corridor to help keep the rivers clean and healthy. Copies of the water quality monitoring information are available, or questions can be asked by calling Dalyn Houser, the Commission's Executive Director. As always, if the town or a citizen has a place on the river they believe should be tested, we would love to hear about it. The Commission office is located at \$1 Maple Street in Cornish, Maine (Telephone 207-625-8123) and can be found on the web at www.sree-maine.org.

Newfield Planning Board Annual Report for 2020

The Newfield Planning Board is a volunteer board appointed by the Newfield Select Board pursuant to Title 30 § 4952 of Maine Statutes. Membership consists of five full voting members and two associate members.

This year has been a very challenging and busy year with the onset of the Pandemic. The Planning Board changed their meeting format and started holding meetings on-line via Zoom and at the Town Hall on So. Effingham Rd. Meetings are held on the first Wednesday of each month and are open to the public.

In 2020 the Planning Board met fifteen times to include monthly meetings, workshops and site walks. The Board worked on updating ordinances, applications for conditional uses, an application for Shoreland permit and an application for a subdivision.

One 13 lot Major Subdivision on the Libby Road that included a speed limit study by D.O.T. was considered and approved by the Planning Board in August.

Three conditional use permit applications were reviewed and consisted of an amendment to a permit for boat storage on the Sanborn Rd., another application for a storage facility for a medical marijuana business on Water St. and a 15-acre Ground Mounted Solar Array on Water St. Updates to the Subdivision Ordinance have been worked on by the Board and are ready for a vote by the residents of Newfield.

With the assistance of a consultant from SMPDC the Shoreland Zoning Ordinance update work continues.

The work on updating the 1981 Comprehensive Plan Goals, Policies and Strategies has been paused since the alternate method of meeting on Zoom has been started. We hope to get back to completing that update soon.

Linda Bisson, the boards recording secretary, completed many of the over-due tasks of filing, updating forms to word and pdf documents as well as organizing the filing system.

To the citizens of Newfield:

This past year 2020 is one that we are glad it is over but, will be hard to forget for all the hardships and death it caused. We can just hope that 2021 will start improving our way of life.

In this report we will be addressing Interior Plumbing and Subsurface Wastewater Disposal Systems.

Interior Plumbing---If you own and live in your home you are allowed to do your own plumbing as to the State Plumbing Rules, but you still have to get a permit and have the inspection done by the Plumbing Inspector. A plumbing permit is required if you relocate plumbing pipes or fixtures, repair pipes and lines, change out hot water tanks, install water filters, add on new fixtures or piping. Any year-round dwelling unit is required to have running water for sanitary reasons.

Subsurface Wastewater Disposal (SSWD)—A design is required for a system by a Licensed Soil Engineer for a new system, replacement system, expanding or repair of a system. Also a permit is required to install one. To keep a system working well have your septic tank pumped out at least every three years, do not dump grease down the drain or old out dated medicine. If you do have a failing system, do not wait for it to get really bad; get a hold of a professional for advise and get it corrected.

It is always best to hire a licensed plumber or a septic installer to do the job.

All dogs 6 months or over are required to be licensed as of December 31, 2020.

Applications for licenses after January 31, 2021 must be paid to include a late fee of \$25.00 per dog. See****

****Por Executive Order 29 FY 20/21, February 3, 2021 – An order amending executive order 35 FY 19/20 and reinstating certain licensing requirements – I. ORDER, B. Dog licensing.: 1. To protect the public by ensuring dogs are vaccinated against rables, for the 2021 calendar year only, the January 1 deadline for dog licensure set forth in 7 M.R.>S. §§3922(1)&(2) is extended to June 2, 2021. All other requirements governing dog licensure set forth in Title 7, Ch. 721 are hereby reinstated, prospectively, upon the effective date of this order. The enforcement of dog licensure requirements for the 2020 calendar year remains suspended.

No license shall be issued for any dog without a Valid State of Maine Rabics Immunization Certificate given by a licensed veterinarian within 730 days preceding the date of application. If spayed or neutered, certificate must be presented.

2020 Animal Control Annual Report

The usual calls that relate to dogs running at large were and still are an ongoing problem. If the owners cannot be determined then they are taken to the shelter and fines must be paid to get the animals returned to owners; avoid this by having the dogs tag allixed to their collar, a \$25.00 impound fee will be assessed but will save you a trip to the shelter.

With COVID-19 19 in 2020 we were not able to follow up on the unlicensed dogs but this year we will somehow follow up per the state requirements and they could be subject to a summons, please license your dogs.

I worked with Feral Felines in trapping feral cats they are then neutered and given to farms that are having rodent problems.

I do not deal with wild animals that are handled by the Warden Service; I do go on calls if they concern suspicion of rabies for both domestic and wild animals.

I work with the State Animal Welfare Department with possible animal abuse complaints for all domestic animals including horses and other large animals.

I also have to deal with dangerous dogs and times of quarantine and have to supply reports to the court in some cases that involve court cases.

A current rabies vaccination is required for annual dog licensing to the town, rabics vaccinations protest both animals and humans from this dreaded disease, both dog licensing and vaccinations are the LAW.

This helps keep our towns taxes down for all residents. We work hard to continue our dedication to the town and all of its needs. This past year we worked and continue to work with grant writers to help open up opportunities to improve on our fire equipment and gear. This will aid to relieve town expenses, as well as ensure we have the best equipment for safety of our members. We are closing on an application for a grant to receive extrication tools to upgrade the 40-year-old set we currently have available. This will be a huge improvement to our extrication abilities.

As always remember to check the batteries in your smoke/co detectors. Don't forget that these have a life span of 10 years so please replace your outdated ones. Make sure your house numbers are visible from the road. If your home is not visible from the road, please make sure that there is a number placed at the start of your driveway. 2020 was a first for many of us! Dealing with the COVID 19 global pandemic, putting into service new to us heavy rescue squad truck.

The COVID 19 global pandemic was hard to deal with, in March of 2020 the leadership from both Newfield Fire and Newfield Rescue met to discuss not if but when will it be in Maine. We wrote protocols on how to respond to calls, how to decontaminate the equipment used on calls and how to stay safe on calls. Many people donated safety equipment to include safety glasses, masks to wear calls, cleaning products for the station. York County EMA gave the rescue squad new reusable N95 masks called ENVOs, we purchased a Ryobi sprayer that we can use to decontaminate the fire trucks, ambulance, squad truck as well as the station. We attended many online meetings between York County EMA, Maine EMS, Newfield Select Board. Our EMS licensed providers have received the Moderna COVID 19 vaccine.

In April we were made an offer to trade both the backup ambulance and squad truck for a 1989 Federal E-One Heavy rescue truck. The new to us squad truck included a 24-foot light tower, build in air cascade system to operate our air tools. The squad truck can transport 6 personnel including the driver. In November we had a mechanical issue that caused the electrical system to fail. We replaced the alternator, parallel switches, and most of the warning lights and cabinet lights.

We have 2 members of the squad currently in Paramedic school, Jannah Park started medic school in June of 2020 and will be completing school later this year. Andrew Lord started paramedic school in September of 2020.

I would like to thank Chief Jason Neville and the Newfield Fire Dept for their assistance on medical calls this year, also I want to thank the Newfield Select Board for their support and the support from the towns people. Also, I want to thank Kenny Gates and Rob Elliott for overseeing Newfield EMA services to the town, assisting both fire and rescue in getting equipment for the departments. I would also like to thank the families of the members of both fire and rescue, especially during the pandemic.

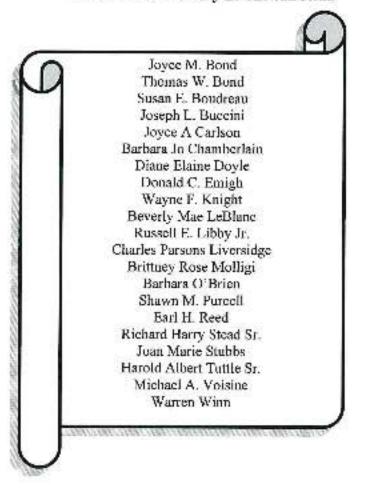

ARTICLE I PURPOSES

The purposes of these regulations are to assure the comfort, convenience, safety, health, and welfare of the people, of the Town of Newfield, to protect the environment and to promote the development of an economically sound and stable community. To this end, in approving subdivisions within the Town of Newfield, Maine, the Planning Board shall consider the following criteria and before granting approval shall make findings of fact that the provisions of these regulations have been met and that the proposed subdivision will meet the guidelines of Title 30, M.R.S.A. §4956, subsection 3, regulations of Title 30-A, M.R.S.A. Chapter 187, subchapter 4, § 4004. The subdivision:

- 1.1 Will not result in undue water or air pollution. In making this determination, the Board shall least consider:
 - A. The elevation of the land shove sea level and its relation to the flood plains;
 - B. The nature of soils and subsoils and their ability to adequately support waste disposal;
 - C. The slope of the land and its effect on effluents:
 - D. The availability of streams for disposal of effluents and
 - E. The applicable state and local health and water resource rules and regulations.
- 1.2 Has sufficient water available for the reasonably foreseeable needs of the subdivision.
- 1.3 Will not cause an unreasonable burden on an existing water supply, if one is to be utilized;
- 1.4 Will not cause unreasonable soil erosion or reduction in the capacity of the land to hold water so that a dangerous or unhealthy condition may result;
- 1.5 Will not cause unreasonable highway or public road congestion or unsafe conditions with respect to use of the highways or public roads existing or proposed;
- 1.6 Will provide for adequate solid and sewage waste disposal:
- 1.7 Will not cause an unreasonable burden on the ability of a municipality to dispose of solid waste and sewage if municipal services are to be utilized;
- 1.8 Will not have an undue adverse effect on the scenic or natural beauty of the area, aesthetics, historic sites, significant wildlife habitat identified by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife or the municipality, or rare and irreplaceable natural areas or any public rights for physical or visual access to the shoreline:
- 1.9 Is in conformance with a duly adopted subdivision regulation or ordinance, comprehensive plan, development plan or land use plan, if any. In making this determination, the municipal reviewing authority may interpret these ordinances and plans;
- 1.10 The subdivider has adequate financial and technical capacity to meet the standards of this section.
- 1.11 Whenever situated in whole or in part. within the watershed of any pond of take or within 250 feet of any wetland, great pond or tidal waters-river as defined in Title 38, chapter 3, subchapter 1, article 2-B. The proposed subdivision will not adversely affect the quality of the body of water or unreasonably affect the shoreline of that body of water.
 - A. When lots in a subdivision have frontage on an outstanding river segment, the proposed subdivision plan must require principal structures to have a combined lot shore frontage and setback from the normal high water mark of 500 feet.

- (1) To avoid circumventing the intent of this provision whenever a proposed subdivision adjoins a shoreland strip narrower than 250 feet which is not letted, the proposed subdivision shall be reviewed as if lot lines extended to the shore.
- (2) The frontage and set-back provisions of this paragraph do not apply either within areas zoned as general development or its equivalent under shoreland zoning. Title 38, chapter 3, subchapter 1, article 2-B, or within areas designated by ordinance as densely developed. The determination of which areas are densely developed must be based on a finding that existing development met the definition requirements of section 4401, subsection 1, on September 23, 1983;
- 1.12 Will not, alone or in conjunction with existing activities, adversely affect the quality of quantity of ground water;
- 1.13 All principal structures within the subdivision shall be constructed with their lowest floor, including the basement, at least one fact above the 100 year flood elevation. Based on the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps and Flood Insurance Rate Maps, and information presented by the applicant whether the subdivision is in a flood-prone area. If the subdivision, or any part of it is in such an area, the subdivider shall determine the 100-year flood elevation and flood hazard boundaries within the subdivision. The proposed subdivision plan must include a condition of plan approval requiring that all principal structures within the subdivision shall be constructed with their lowest floor, including the basement, at least one foor above the 100-year flood elevation;
- 1.14 All freshwater wetlands within the proposed subdivision have been identified on any maps submitted as part of the application, regardless of the size of these wetlands. Any mapping of freshwater wetlands may be done with the help of the local soil and water conservation district.
- 1.14A All farmland within the proposed subdivision has been identified on maps submitted as part of the application. Any mapping of farmland may be done with the help of the local soil and water conservation district:
- 1.15 Any river, stream or brook within or abutting the proposed subdivision has been identified on any maps submitted as part of the application. For purposes of this section, "river, stream or brook" has the same meaning as in Title 38, section 480-B, subsection 9;
- 1.16 The proposed subdivision will provide for adequate storm water management.
- 1.17 If any lots in the proposed subdivision have shore frontage on a river, stream, brook or great pond as these features are defined in Title 38, section 480-B, none of the lots created within the subdivision have a lot depth to shore frontage ratio greater than 3 to 1;
- 1.18 The long-term cumulative effects of the proposed subdivision will not unreasonably increase a great pond's phosphorus concentration during the construction phase and life of the proposed subdivision;
- 1.19 For any proposed subdivision that crosses municipal boundaries, the proposed subdivision will not cause unreasonable traffic congestion or unsafe conditions with respect to the use of existing public ways in an adjoining municipality in which part of the subdivision is located; and
- 1.20 Timber on the parcel being subdivided has not been harvested in violation of rules adopted pursuant to Title 12, section 8869, subsection 14. If a violation of rules adopted by the Maine Forrest Service to substantially climinate liquidation harvesting has occurred, the municipal reviewing authority must determine prior to granting approval for the subdivision that 5 years have elapsed from the date the landowner under whose ownership the harvest occurred acquired the parcel. A municipal reviewing authority may request technical assistance from the Department of Agriculture. Conservation and Forestry. Bureau of Forestry to determine whether a rule violation has occurred, or the municipal reviewing authority may accept a determination certified by a forester licensed pursuant to Title 32, chapter 76. If a municipal reviewing authority requests technical assistance from the bureau, the bureau shall respond within 5 working days regarding its ability to provide

assistance. If the bureau agrees to provide assistance, it shall make a finding and determination as to whether a rule violation has occurred. The bureau shall provide a written copy of its finding and determination to the municipal reviewing authority within 30 days of receipt of the municipal reviewing authority's request. If the bureau notifies a municipal reviewing authority that the bureau will not provide assistance, the municipal reviewing authority may require a subdivision applicant to provide a determination certified by a licensed forester.

For the purposes of this subsection, "liquidation harvesting" has the same meaning as in Title 12, section 8868, subsection 6 and "parcel" means a contiguous area within one municipality, township or plantation owned by one person or group of persons in common or joint ownership. This subsection takes effect on the effective date of rules adopted pursuant to Title 12, section 8869, subsection 14.

All of such tax anticipation notes, and any extensions, renewals, and replacements thereof, by at least a majority of the municipal officers, shall be payable on the last business day of December out of money raised by taxation during current year, may be issued in non-interest-bearing form and be sold at par or at a premium, and shall contain such other terms and provisions, not inconsistent herewith, and be discounted or bear interest at such rates as may be approved by the Treasurer.
